ORDINANCES SECOND READING

The following Ordinances were in City Council June 5, 1986, Read and Passed the First Time, and are Returned for Passage the Second Time:

An Ordinance providing for the Assessment and Collection of 1986 Taxes in a Sum Not Less than One Hundred Ten Million Dollars (\$110,000,000.00) and Not More than One Hundred Twelve Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$112,500,000.00) being based on One Hundred Percent (100%) of the 1986-1987 Fiscal Year Tax Collection.

Be it ordained by the City of Providence:

Section 1. The City Council of the City of Providence hereby orders the assessment and collection of a tax on the ratable real estate and tangible personal property as well as orders the assessment and collection of an excise tax on all registered motor vehicles, in a sum not less than One Hundred Ten Million Dollars

(\$110,000,000.00) and not more than One Hundred Twelve Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$112,500,000.00) being based on One Hundred Percent (100%) of the 1986-1987 Fiscal Year tax collection, as amended; said tax is for ordinary expense charges for the payment of interest and indebtedness in whole or in part of said City and for other purposes authorized by law.

Section 2. The City Assessor shall assess and apportion said tax on inhabitants and ratable real estate and tangible personal property of said City as of the 31st day of December, A.D. 1985 at midnight, Eastern Standard Time, as well as assess and apportion said excise tax on the owners of registered motor vehicles in the City of Providence during calendar year 1985, according to law, and shall on completion of said

assessment, date and sign the same, and shall make out and certify to the City Collector of the City of Providence on or before the 15th day of June, A.D. 1986, a complete list containing (1) the name of persons taxed and the total value of all the real estate taxed to each person, (2) the amount of personal estate except manufacturers' machinery and equipment assessed against each person, (3) the amount of the motor vehicle excise assessment against each person, and (4) the total amount of tax assessed against each person on said real estate, personal estate and motor vehicle opposite the name of the person or persons assessed.

The assessment of real estate and personal estate shall appear in separate columns on said list. The assessment of motor vehicles shall appear on a separate list.

Said taxes shall be due and payable on and between the 1st day of July, 1986 next, and the Twenty-Fourth day of July, A.D. 1986 next, and all taxes remaining unpaid on said last named day shall carry until collected, a penalty at the rate of twelve (12) percentum per annum upon such unpaid real estate, personal estate and excise taxes.

Provided, however said taxes may be paid in four installments, the first installment of Twenty-Five (25) percentum on or before the Twenty-Fourth day of July A.D. 1986 next, and the remaining installments as follows: Twenty-Five (25) percentum on the Twenty-Fourth day of October A.D. 1986; Twenty-Five percentum on the Twenty-Sixth day of January A.D. 1987; and Twenty-Five percentum on the Twenty-Fourth day of April A.D. 1987. Each installment of taxes, if paid on or before the last day of each installment period successively and in order, shall be free from any charges for interest.

If the first installment, or any succeeding installment of taxes, is not paid by the last day of the respective installment period or periods as they occur, then the whole tax or remaining unpaid balance of the tax, as the case may be, shall immediately become due and payable and

shall carry, until collected, a penalty at the rate of twelve (12) percentum per annum on said real estate and personal estate, and penalty at the rate of Twelve (12) percentum per annum on said excise taxes.

The City Collector, shall by advertisement in a public newspaper of the City, notify all persons assessed to pay their respective taxes at his office on and between the said 1st and Twenty-Fourth day of July A.D. 1986 both days inclusive; said Collector shall attend daily during said periods, Saturdays, Sundays, and Holidays excepted, at his office from Eight-Thirty o'clock A.M. to Four o'clock P.M. to receive taxes.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Now, Therefore, Be It Ordained By the City of Providence:

Section 1. To defray the expenses of the City of Providence for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1987, the sums of money or so much thereof, as are authorized by law, indicated in the accompanying schedule, are hereby appropriated for the objects and purposes, and in amounts expressed therein provided that payments thereunder shall be subject to the provisions of the Home Rule Charter of 1980, validated by the General Assembly of the State of Rhode Island at its January Session, A.D., 1981 and approved November 4, 1980, and subject to the provisions of the City Ordinances relative to the expenditures of money from the City Treasury. Title I Revenue Sharing, Fiscal Assistance to State and Local Government rules and regulations shall govern the portion of this Budget so designated.

Sec. 2. The payments to the School Fund of the following estimated receipts included in the appropriation of \$75,337,106.00 for the support of the Public Schools for the City of Providence fiscal period 1986-1987, will be increased or decreased to conform with the actual amounts received from such sources during the City of Providence fiscal year 1986-1987.

Section 3. The budgeted transfer from Expendable Trust Funds shall be restricted to the payment of principal on debt obligation of the City of Providence. The transfer is not to exceed the amount determined by the Finance Director.

Section 4. Any operating surplus that is achieved in the 1987 fiscal year will be applied to reduce the cumulative deficit of the City's general fund.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Sec. 59. The number of employees in the Office of the Mayor shall not be limited. The Mayor may appoint without reference to civil service provisions and without the necessity for approval by the City Council a Chief of Staff and such Deputies, Assistants, Aides, Secretaries, Stenographers, Clerks and other personnel as he may deem necessary.

Sec. 60. No person shall be appointed to, and the City Treasurer shall not pay, nor shall an officer or employee of the City issue a check for the payment of, nor pay any salary or compensation to a person holding or claiming to hold a position in the classified service in any department which is in excess of the total number of positions or the number of any individual class of positions provided herein for the particular department, provided; however, that with the approval of the department head and the Director of Finance, said maximum may be exceeded temporarily when regular employees are absent on vacation and the excess employees do not aggregate more than the number on vacation or during the absence of employees due to injuries received while discharging their duties as employees, or during absences of employees on sick leave and it is necessary to employ temporary employees for the duration of the employees sick leave, or during the absence of employees who have been granted a temporary leave of absence, or when in the opinion of the Director of Finance, a temporary emergency exists.

Sec. 61. Where no maximum limit is fixed on the total number of positions or the number of any individual class of position in a department, the number of persons appointed and employees shall be determined by the unexpended appropriation available.

Sec. 62. Chapter 1985-85 of the Ordinances of the City of Providence approved November 27,

1985, with all amendments and additions thereto, is hereby repealed and all other Ordinances or parts thereof inconsistent herewith, are likewise repealed.
