I. ORGANIZATION AND FUNCTIONS

A. Legal Basis

The City Plan Commission operates under two basic legal documents. The State Enabling Act and the Ordinance adopted by the Providence City Council in 1944. The first authorizes the cities and towns of the State of Rhode Island to establish planning agencies, and lists some of their powers and responsibilities. The second prescribes the organization and specific duties of the City Plan Commission.

B. Membership

The City Plan Commission consists of the Mayor (ex officio), five qualified citizens appointed by the Mayor, and two councilmanic members elected by the City Council. The present members and officers are:

2. The Department operated under a budget of about \$50,700. Expenditures for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1954 and for the previous year, 1952-1953, are tabulated in Appendix A.

D. Operations

1. The purpose of the City Plan Department is to give technical advice and assistance to the Council, the Mayor, and the various departments and boards of the city administration, and to the people of the community.

2. The major role of the Department is the preparation of the various elements of a Master Plan for the City of Providence. These are developed by the staff and adopted by the Commission following public hearings.

3. All matters which come before the City Council dealing with physical improvements within the city are required to be referred to the Commission for study and advisory opinions. The Director advises on all cases coming before the Zoning Board of Review.

Since the Department's inception in 1944, it has dealt with 654 Council Referrals, and 677 Board of Review Referrals. In Appendix B, Part I is a tabulation of the City Council Referrals for 1953-1954, and Part II is a tabulation of the Board of Review Referrals for the past fiscal year.

4. Since 1944 the Commission has published thirteen reports, ten of which are Master Plans (listed below), four Annual Reports, and four supplements to the CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM 1950-1956.

II. MAJOR ACTIVITIES 1953-1954

A. The final report on THE EFFECT OF EXPRESSWAY CONSTRUCTION ON SURROUNDING PROPERTY was published following approval of the Commission. This report was written in an effort to indicate the extent to which a major highway affects the adjacent area and in what way.

B. The staff also participated in the site selection of an Off-Street Parking Garage. The City retained Ramp Buildings Corporation of New York for advice in selecting the best possible site for the first garage of this type in Providence. After many conferences it was decided that the best site would be that site bounded by Page, Pine, Garnet and Friendship Streets.

C. As a result of a request from the Mayor the staff completed a study of unimproved streets, and a report on RECOMMENDATIONS FOR UNIMPROVED STREETS IN PROVIDENCE, RHODE ISLAND was published in limited edition. It includes recommendations for street improvements, abandonments, turnarounds, extensions and widenings.

D. In view of the fact that the City has contemplated selling Dexter Asylum, and the possibility that Union Station might be relocated, plus many other factors, a proposed DRAFT OF SUBDIVISION REGULATIONS for the City of Providence was prepared. A final draft of these regulations was not published pending several conferences to be held with the Building Inspector, a representative from the Law Department, the Tax Assessor, the Mayor's Administrative Assistant, and the Plan Commission.

E. The Department, in collaboration with the Finance Director, submitted to the City Council a Capital Budget for 1954-1955 of \$5,833,206 exclusive of the Water Supply Board. Of this total amount \$107,166 is to be financed from current revenue and \$5,726,040 from bond authorities. The total Capital Budget for 1954-1955 is larger than in previous years because of the proposed expansion of the dock and facilities at Fields Point which will cost about \$2,000,000.

F. As a result of "Hurricane Carol" the Commission felt that a Flood Control Study should be made. In this connection the staff prepared preliminary plans which showed 3 different locations for a dam. Immediately following "Hurricane Carol" the Commission made recommendations to the Mayor for an approach to the Army Engineers for flood control plans and also recommended the establishment of an adequate hurricane warning system to be put into effect as soon as possible.

G. Nine reports, recording LAND USE information, were finally completed during the year. Also, in this connection new Land Use Maps were prepared.

H. The Department staff continued to assist the Recreation Department in the preparation of site plans for playground and playfield development. Final plans for Davis Park were prepared, and preliminary plans were prepared for the Camp-Cypress Playground, Clara-Danforth Playground and the Patrick A. Cunningham Memorial Park which will be expanded into part of what was the former Whitman Farm.

I. The latter part of the fiscal year the staff worked on plans for an industrial development in the West River Area of the City. This study will be continued in collaboration with the Providence Redevelopment Agency to effect the redevelopment of a slum blighted area into a large, modern industrial park. This is essential in order to gain and hold industries in the City of Providence, especially industries displaced by Freeway construction.

IN MEMORIAM

In March of this fiscal year, Chairman George Hurley passed away. His passing brought sorrow on both the Commission and staff members and the following Resolution, as a formal expression of regret, was adopted:

WHEREAS George Hurley was Chairman of the Providence City Plan Commission from the time of the original appointment of such Commission in 1944 until the time of his death; and

WHEREAS Mr. Hurley gave freely of his time and tremendous ability to the work of such Commission, and through such work made a very substantial contribution to the welfare of the City of Providence; and

WHEREAS Mr. Hurley was held in the highest personal esteem by his fellow Commission members

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY UNANIMOUSLY RESOLVED that this Commission express its deep regret in his loss to the Commission and to the community and its sympathy to his family, and in token thereof directs that a copy of this resolution be transmitted to his widow.
