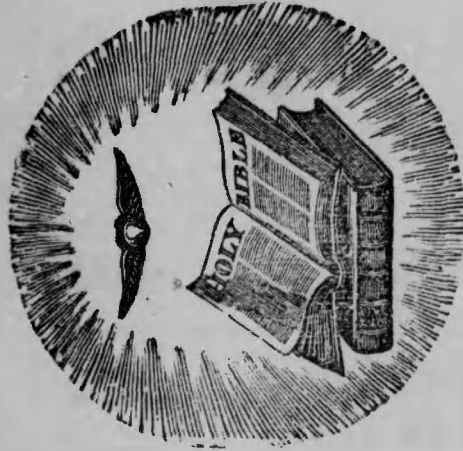

## Sermon on the Death of Gen. Washington.

Believing that the annexed Sermon on the death of Gen. WASHINGTON, delivered by the Rev. STEPHEN GARD, in the First Baptist Meeting-House in this city, January 5, 1800, will be read with interest by many of the friends of that venerated man, we give it a place on our pages.

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### A SERMON.

LAMENTATIONS V. PART OF THE 16th AND 17th VERSES.

*The joy of our heart is ceased—the crown is fallen from our head.*

MY BRETHREN AND FELLOW-CITIZENS,

THE late afflicting dispensation of Divine Providence, in removing from this life the First Man in the nation, is universally felt, and sincerely lamented. Such is the force of this shock, which millions feel with the keenest sensibility, that eloquence fails to express it, and imagination to paint it.

Let others engage actors on such occasions, as some of the ancients have done, to exhibit external marks of grief—a vain mockery, which passeth off like an empty tale: but when the heart is pierced with anguish, even nature herself directs to suitable expressions of it. Such are the tears, and such the badges of mourning in our nation, on this solemn occasion. To mourn with those who mourn, is a principle of nature, particularly enforced by the Christian religion. It is at the same time a mournful satisfaction to friends; the means of exciting a laudable emulation among survivors, and of transmitting to posterity characters rendered illustrious by their public services, by their talents, and by their virtues.

I shall take the liberty to apply our text to the mournful subject of our discourse, although originally expressive of Zion's sorrows: and

I. I shall consider something of the public loss we have sustained—*The crown is fallen from our head.*

II. The effect this loss has produced—*The joy of our heart is ceased.* And

Lastly, conclude with some reflections and inferences from the subject.

I. In considering the public loss we have sustained, it is not to be expected we should fully display the character of the departed, nor the greatness of this national calamity. Indeed it is a subject so far beyond my feeble powers of expression, that I was ready to mourn in silence, with my beloved country, in this common calamity. But lest we should appear deficient in respectful attachment to the memory of this best of men, I have been emboldened to ask your attention to this solemn and affecting subject—while I hold up to your view this bright example of public services and private virtue.

His fame and great military talents shone conspicuous early in life; and as if destined by Heaven to be the instrument of saving his country, he then, by his foresight, prudence and bravery, brought off the remnant of a defeated British army, and baffled an army of superior number. This exploit excited several predictions respecting his future glory.\* These predictions have been verified in the late revolutionary war. Our countrymen, at the commencement of the war, were unprovided with military stores; untutored in the art of war, and destitute of a leader to direct their military operations. How could they meet the veteran bands of foes, led on by generals grown old in war? Lo! the renowned friend and father of his country, WASHINGTON appears! The ornament of human nature, to compose whose character, such an assemblage of shining virtues conspire, that it were difficult to mention one most eminent. His dignity of mien, propriety of manners, wisdom in council, valor in the field, disinterested patriotism, inflexible probity, humanity to his enemies, sympathy to the suffering, and veneration for virtue, rendered him the joy of the people, and gave him an unrivalled ascendancy in our armies through an eight years war. From this height of dictatorial power, equally possessing the unbounded confidence of soldiers and citizens; having accomplished the object of his appointment, and the wishes of his heart, he returns to the common rank of citizenship; retiring to the peaceful shade of Vernon, without pension or emolument to himself or family, and without other reward for his long, painful and important services, than the affectionate, glowing hearts of his countrymen, and the admiration of the world. How unlike a Cæsar or a Cromwell, or the heroes of antiquity! When they had acquired or usurped the sovereign power, the reins of government were handed to aggrandize themselves at the expence of their country's liberties. It was reserved to this first of men, with disinterested zeal for his country's welfare, to secure her freedom, and then, to retire to enjoy, in common with his fellow-citizens, the blessings he had procured with so much toil and danger.

Had his life terminated with our revolutionary war, what American heart would not have lamented his departure? He stood unparalleled in human glory and greatness;—but Heaven, as if determined to show to posterity the sublimest virtues of human nature, preserves his important life until the exigencies of public affairs

requires the aid of his other talents and virtues. The statesman and civil ruler remain to be displayed. Although our foreign enemies are driven from our favored land, and the dove with the olive branch of peace settles upon the bosom of our country—yet, without order and government, peace cannot long be maintained; like a vessel destitute of rudder and compass, she lies exposed to the fury of every wave. Alike great in war and peace, this man of the people again steps forth, and presides in the formation of our excellent Constitution. Called by the unanimous voice of his country, he relinquishes his beloved retreat, and guides the helm of government. At this critical moment, his consummate prudence, inflexible firmness and endearing moderation, secured his country from the machinations of designing internal enemies, and the horrors of civil war. Under the auspices of his most excellent administration, we reposed in peace under our "vines and fig-trees." The paternal advice he gave us on his voluntary retirement from this exalted station, his country being in a prosperous condition, I hope is indelibly engraven on the tablets of all our hearts, and will be faithfully transmitted to posterity, as the best of earthly legacies.

His acceptance of the command of the armies of the United States, on a recent apprehension of his country's danger, from the hostile aggressions of a great and ambitious nation, enhances our obligations of gratitude, and more especially as he was in the decline of life. Yet such was the energy of his mind, and ardor for public usefulness, that he was yet ready once more to forsake the most endearing domestic enjoyments, when his country demanded the sacrifice.

While we contemplate such heroic virtue in this ever faithful leader and friend to his country, we are constrained to admire and to applaud;—to rejoice in such a noble sample of the sublime virtues to which our fallen nature may be restored in this life. But the instance is singular, nor can the annals of history furnish a parallel.

If we believe that God raised up, girded and went before Cyrus, to deliver Israel from their oppressors, why are we not to believe that this far more meritorious character has been, by an especial and particular Providence, raised up to deliver and to secure the people of this land?

But what avails our weak essay? Has not the trumpet of fame long since circulated through the nations of Europe the achievements and virtues of this hero and patriot? But, my fellow mourners, we have this day to lament that "The crown is fallen from our head." "How are the mighty fallen!" And we may say, with greater emphasis than David said of Abner, "Know ye not that a Prince and a great man is fallen?" Yes, Americans, your crown, your friend, the friend of man, the father of his country, the guardian of your rights, sleeps in dust. How incalculable the loss! No more will he lead our armies to victory and peace—no more shall he hear our call on the greatest public exigencies—no more shall he add dignity to order and government by his illustrious examples—no more salutary counsels shall flow to us from his lips, now sealed up in death. "The joy of our heart has ceased." I proceed to consider,

II. The effects this loss has produced in our country.—It always has been customary, in days of great public calamities, to indulge public expressions of grief. Who can forbear, upon an occasion like the present, to mingle their sorrowful notes with the millions whose "joy has ceased," and whose song of melody is turned into mourning? Why this solemn appearance in the house of prayer? Why these uncommon ensigns of mourning which meet our eyes and damp our joys in the house of God? We may well lament a friend to virtue fallen. Let not the reproachful complaint be repeated in our ears, which the Lord made by the Prophet, "The righteous perisheth, and no man layeth it to heart." The melancholly tidings produced a general shock pervading the nation, and the sorrow stands depicted on every countenance, which shews that the joy of the heart has ceased: from every part of our country the sad echo finds the nation in tears.

The badges of mourning exhibited among all ranks and ages of citizens strikingly portray the feelings of their hearts. While our sorrow is expressed in national groans, what heart interested in human affairs can be indifferent? Weep, then, my friends; ye do do well to weep with your country, with the world. And while we drop our tears over his precious dust, and bewail this public bereavement, we join in the general lamentations of all that is human. Mourn, then, ye veterans, whose heads have been shielded in the day of battle, for your beloved leader! Mourn, ye young and rising generation, for you have lost a faithful friend and counsellor! Mourn, ye friends of liberty and justice, for our crown is fallen! Mourn, ye friends of the arts and sciences, your patron is removed! Let the world mourn, for WASHINGTON IS DEAD!

Let us close with some reflections and inferences:

1st. In all the dispensations of Divine Providence, it becomes rational beings to contemplate the Sovereign Disposer of all creatures, and make suitable reflections for their own profit. And in all God's dispensations of judgments, we may trace the emanations of His goodness, infusing some salutary cordial into the most bitter draught. This sentiment is strikingly exemplified in the present melancholly instance. It has been a singular blessing, that God should raise up such a wonderful character, at such a very critical time of our nation, as a luminary to shed his rays upon us in dark and dismal times.

2d. The preservation of his life, which seemed essential to our national existence, was no less expressive of God's goodness. In the name of WASHINGTON were all the hosts of America united. The security which all felt under his guidance, has no paral-

\*On this melancholly occasion, the meeting-house exhibited such affecting testimonies of affection, as were highly calculated to impress the mind with serious and solemn veneration. The pulpit was entirely covered with black, with the addition of a mourning-piece in front, representing a pedestal and urn, with three angels over it, as guarding the richest dust of America; the pedestal inscribed with this motto; "SACRED TO THE MEMORY OF WASHINGTON," under it the following lines:

"Glory with all her lamps shall burn,  
"And watch the Warrior's sleeping clay,  
"Till the last trumpet rouse his urn,  
"To aid the triumphs of the day."

tel. His name united the different parties in the nation, and reconciled them to a change in the system of government. Our most excellent Constitution, under his administration, dispelled the fears of those who were jealous of innovations.

3. The example of his dignified retirement to the condition of a private citizen, cultivating those peaceful employments which give strength to the government, and happiness to the governed, is worthy imitation. He has taught this lesson, that happiness does not consist more in leading armies, or filling a presidential chair, than in filling the duties of our several stations with industry, probity, honor and virtue. Indeed we cannot turn our eyes upon this first of men, but our hearts are filled with veneration, and warmed with the flame of sincere and filial love. However fondly we may wish that talents and virtues like these might be continued upon earth, Heaven has otherwise ordained, to shew us that "all flesh is grass, and all the goodliness thereof as the grass which perisheth."

We shall now infer,

1st. If death has entered Vernon's shade, and taken the great, the good and wise, who can expect to escape? If temperance, that best preservative of health and life; if the collected virtues of the Man, the General and the President, could have secured an earthly immortality, never, O lamented WASHINGTON, never should they fall have added fresh honors to the trophies of death! But since he is no more, let the great and the mighty of the earth prepare to die like men. Let us be wise, and consider our latter end, when the alarm of mortality is sounded from such an elevated height:—and he who lived for our benefit, may then die for our benefit too—to remind us that we also must die.

Death sweeps off our fellow citizens every year, every day. Our neighbors, like leaves in the autumn, drop into the grave in a thick succession. The air, the earth, the ocean, and all the elements, are armed with death. A thousand dangers lie in ambush for us. The principles of mortality lurk in our own constitutions; and sickness, the herald of the last enemy, often warns us to prepare. Yet how few realize the thought, that they must die! How many forget this solemn subject, till they feel it! They stand fearless and unapprehensive upon the slippery brink of eternity, till they unexpectedly fall, and are ingulphed in the boundless ocean. But shall not this loud alarm awaken us out of our vain dreams of an earthly immortality? When the mighty is "fallen," shall not the feeble tremble? If the father of a people must cease to live, shall not the people expect to die? If common deaths are so frequent that they have lost their monitory force, shall not the death of this mighty man constrain us to realize our own mortality? Shall it not awaken that universal seriousness which that prospect inspires? How great a blessing might this awful dispensation prove, if thus religiously improved?

2d. Americans have been indulged with a living example of such distinguished and rare virtues, are they not bound to improve it, by copying those parts of it within their particular spheres of action? Let not the exalted height deter us from the attempt. The more fair, beautiful and perfect the original, the more refined the pleasure we shall have in the imitation. It is not expected that we should

all be generals, presidents or rulers; but we should all be good citizens—peaceable, industrious, virtuous and faithful, in our several stations; “rendering unto Cæsar the things that are Cæsar’s, and unto God the things that are God’s.” Do we venerate the character of the deceased? Let us give evidence of our veneration, by imbibing his spirit, treasuring up his advice in our bosoms, and transmitting the same to posterity, that our children may learn to lip that beloved name, and look up to him as a model for their imitation. Let us cherish his philanthropic sentiments—let us copy his example of humanity, and convince the world that Americans have caught the “mantle” of our departed FATHER and BENEFAC-TOR.

3d. If all that is great in human nature is but mortal—if “*the joy of our heart is ceased*,” it becomes a rational, immortal being to seek permanent, unchanging good. Where shall it be found? Only in the Supreme Good. Let us then lay up for ourselves “treasures in heaven,” and be rich towards God. There is one gift of heaven to mankind, which shall survive the dissolution of the world, which shall flourish and reign forever; I mean religion. Yes, the divine religion of our adorable Saviour, who conquered death when he died, who has opened the portals of eternal glory, “and holds the keys of death and the grave;” who openeth, and no man shutteth; who shutteth, and no man openeth. This religion will shine bright in the night of affliction—will irradiate the thick glooms of death, and blaze out into immortality. This will be a source of happiness through the revolutions of eternal ages: what inconceivable comfort does our religion disclose to the believing eye! It guides the pilgrim in the house and prison of his clay; it points out the road to duty and happiness; it soothes the mourner in the deep anguish of sorrow, when his earthly “*crown is fallen*,” and “*the joy of his heart ceased*.” When the “king of terrors” knocks at the door of the pious, he may bid him welcome; for, with a well grounded hope of eternal life by JESUS CHRIST, he can sing, “Oh death, where is thy sting? Oh grave, where is thy victory? Thanks be unto God, who giveth us the victory, through our Lord JESUS CHRIST.” Yes, this religion unfolds the mystery of a resurrection; that the precious dust of the righteous has the guard of Omnipotence, and the deep sounding trump of God shall finally bring forth the sacred deposit. Then shall corruption put on incorruption, and the vile bodies of his servants “be fashioned like unto the glorious body of our Lord JESUS CHRIST.”

Now we may ask, in the language of an elegant writer, “Is this senseless dust all that is left of this greatest of men? Has he suffered a total extinction of being? Is he dead to himself, to the universe, and to his God? No, he lives! he greatly lives the life of immortals—he lives in the immense regions of spirits; where all the superficial distinctions of birth, riches, power and majesty, are lost forever; and all the distinction that remains, arises from virtue and vice; from our having acted our part well or ill in the station where we are fixed. There triumphant tyranny, that bade defiance to human power, is blasted and degraded by the frown of Omnipotence; and there those rulers of man, who were the servants of God, are advanced to a higher sphere of dominion and benefi-

cence, and the badges of earthly greatness are superfluous to their dignity, and would but conceal their worth;” “for they are made kings and priests unto God forever.” There they are clothed with the robes of salvation, and the garments of praise; and wear crowns of unfading glory, infinitely brighter than those which the gold, and gems, and glittering trifles of the earth, can compose.

This view of the great, good and mighty, does not diminish, but heighten and brighten their glory: for what renders the nature of man, and even of angels, so important, so noble, so divine, is immortality? This advances the offspring of the dust to a kind of equality with the natives of heaven. Are not sentiments like these congenial with our most ardent wishes and rational feelings, when we see the great, good and useful of our fellow creatures fall before the all-conquering hand of death? If so, let us forever banish from our hearts every seed of infidelity, which filled the soul with black despair; and has no virtue to calm and soothe the mind, torn by the heart-rending anguish of parting with the objects of our dearest affections; and let us cherish the religion of our Saviour; let us receive it as a heavenly balm, fitted to fortify us against the trials of the present life, and to give us the soul-comforting confidence, that our godly separated friends are disposed of to their everlasting advantage, in their enjoyment of the heavenly world.

TO THAT SOVEREIGN, ALL-WISE AND MOST GRACIOUS GOD, WHO “KILLETH AND MAKETH ALIVE, AND FROM WHOSE HAND NONE CAN DELIVER,” LET US GIVE ADORATION, PRAISE AND THANKSGIVING, NOW AND FOREVER.

## HISTORICAL.

About twenty-five years ago, an interesting volume was published in this city, entitled, "RECOLLECTIONS OF THE JERSEY PRISON SHIP; taken and prepared for publication from the original manuscript of the late Capt. THOMAS DRING, of Providence, R. I., one of the Prisoners. By ALBERT G. GREENE."

As this work is now out of print, and has probably never been seen by the larger portion of our readers, we extract a few pages. In the eloquent language of Jonathan Russell, in his celebrated 4th of July Oration, it may well be said, "It was here, that hunger and thirst and disease, and all the contumely which cold-hearted cruelty could bestow, sharpened every pang of death. Misery there wrung every fibre that could feel, before she gave the blow of grace, which sent the sufferer to eternity."

After the termination of his confinement on board the *Jersey*, Capt. Dring entered the merchant service, and soon attained the command of a ship. He sailed from the port of Providence for many years, and was well known as an able and experienced officer. In the year 1803, he retired from his nautical profession, and soon after established himself in Providence, where he resided during the remainder of his life. He died August 8, 1825, aged 67 years; leaving many by whom his memory will long be preserved, as a kind relative, an intelligent and industrious citizen, a worthy and an honest man.

FRENCH.

Among the varied events of the war of the American Revolution, there are few circumstances which have left a deeper impression on the public mind, than those connected with the cruel and vindictive treatment which was experienced by those of our unfortunate countrymen whom the fortune of war had placed on board the Prison Ships of the enemy. Still, among the vague and indistinct narrations which have been made, (although in almost every instance falling short of the dreadful reality) but few statements

have been given to the world in an authentic form; and these have been for the most part relations of detached facts and circumstances, rather than such distinct and connected accounts as might afford the reader a correct view of all the important facts in relation to the subject.

Indeed, most of those who have spoken and who could have written of these facts with the fidelity of eye witnesses, have already passed beyond the scenes of earth; and while living, had but slight inducements to devote the necessary time and labor to record the history of their former sufferings.

Hence, so little that is authentic, has ever been published upon the subject, and so scanty are the materials for information respecting it, which have as yet been given to the rising generations of our country, that it has already become a matter of doubt, even among many of the intelligent and well informed of our young citizens, whether the tales of the Prison Ships, such as they have been told, have not been exaggerated beyond the reality. They have not been exaggerated. Much of the truth has indeed been told; but not one half the detail of its horrors has ever been portrayed.

But the period has now arrived, which requires that some authentic record should be made, in order that the truth of these events shall not remain a subject of doubt and uncertainty. And so few of those who suffered in these terrific abodes remain alive, that as a matter of precaution, it seems to be required that some one possessing actual knowledge of the facts, should embody them in a form more permanent than the tales of tradition, and more detailed than can appear on the page of the general historian.

All the important occurrences of that eventful period, all which conspired to give its peculiar character to the lengthened contest, or which had an effect in advancing or retarding its issue—every thing which tends to shew the spirit with which it was conducted on either side—is certainly worthy of record and of remembrance. In this light, I view the facts in relation to the treatment of the American seamen on board the British Prison Ships. These facts are a portion of our country's history; and that history would not be complete, one of its deepest lessons would be lost, were the page which bears the record of these facts, to be obliterated.

The number of those who perished on board the prison and hospital ships at the Wallabout, has never been, and never can be known. It has been ascertained, however, with as much precision as the nature of the case will admit, that more than TEN THOUSAND died on board the *Jersey*, and the hospital ships *Scorpion*, *Strombolo* and *Hunter*. Thousands there suffered, and pined and died, whose names have never been known by their countrymen. They died where no eye could admire their fortitude, no tongue could praise their devotion to their country's cause.

For years, the very name of "the old *Jersey*," seemed to strike a terror to the hearts of those whose necessities required them to venture upon the ocean; the mortality which prevailed on board her was well known throughout the country; and to be confined within her dungeons, was considered equal to a sentence of death, from which but little hope of escape remained.

It was my hard fortune, in the course of the war, to be twice

confined on board the prison ships of the enemy. I was first imured in the year 1779, on board the *Good Hope*, then lying in the North River, opposite the city of New-York; but after a confinement of more than four months, I succeeded in making my escape to the Jersey shore. Afterwards, in the year 1782, I was again captured and conveyed on board the *Jersey*, where for nearly five months, I was a witness and a partaker of the unspeakable sufferings of that wretched class of American prisoners, who were there taught the utmost extent of human misery.

In the month of May, 1782, I sailed from Providence, R. I. as Master's mate, on board a privateer called "*The Chance*." This was a new vessel, on her first cruise. She was owned in Providence, by Messrs. Clarke & Nightingale, and manned chiefly from that place and vicinity. She was commanded by Capt. Daniel Aborn, mounted 12 six pound cannon, and sailed with a complement of about 65 men.

Our cruise was but a short one; for in a few days after sailing, we were captured by the British ship of war *Belisarius*, Capt. Graves, of 26 guns. During the next day, the *B.* captured two more American vessels, and having on board upwards of 130 prisoners, soon made her way for New-York, in company with her prizes. Our situation on board this ship was not, indeed, a very enviable one; but uncomfortable as it was, it was far preferable to that in which we soon expected to be placed, and which we soon found it was our doom to experience. The ship dropped her anchor abreast of the city, and signals were immediately made that she had prisoners on board. Soon after, two large gondolas or boats came along side, in one of which was seated the notorious *David Sproat*, the Commissary of Prisoners. This man was an American Refugee, universally detested for the cruelty of his conduct and the insolence of his manners.

We were then called on deck, and having been released from our irons, were ordered into the boats. This being accomplished, we put off from the ship, under a guard of marines, and proceeded towards our much dreaded place of confinement, which was not then in sight. As we passed along the Long Island shore, against the tide, our progress was very slow. The prisoners were ordered, by Sproat, to apply themselves to the oars; but not feeling any particular anxiety to expedite our progress, we declined obeying the command. His only reply was, "I'll soon fix you, my lads."

We at length doubled a point, and came in view of the Wallabout, where lay before us the black hulk of the *OLD JERSEY*, with her satellites, the three Hospital Ships; to which Sproat pointed in an exulting manner, and said, "There, Rebels, *there is the cage for you*." Oh! how I wished to be standing alone with that inhuman wretch upon the green turf, at that moment."

As he spoke, my eye was instantly turned from the dreaded hulk: but a single glance had shewn us a multitude of human beings moving upon her upper deck. Many were on her bowsprit, for the purpose, as I afterwards learned, of getting without the limits.

It was then nearly sun-set; and before we were alongside, every man, except the sentinels on the gangway, had disappeared. Previous to their being sent below, some of the prisoners, seeing us approaching, waved their hats, as if they would say, Approach us not: and we soon found fearful reason for the warning.

## THE FIRST NIGHT ON BOARD.

"Hail, dark abode! what can with thee compare?  
 "Heat, sickness, famine, death, and stagnant air.  
 "Pandora's box, from whence all mischiefs flow,  
 "Here *real* found, torments mankind anew.  
 "Swift, from the guarded decks, we rushed along,  
 "And vainly sought repose, so vast our throng.  
 "Three hundred wretches here, denied all light,  
 "In crowded mansions, pass th' infernal night.  
 "Some, for a bed their tatter'd vestments join;  
 "And some on chests, and some on floors, recline.  
 "Shut from the blessings of the evening air,  
 "Pensive we lay, with mingled corpses there.  
 "Meagre and wan, and scorched with heat below,  
 "We looked like ghosts, ere death had made us so."

FRENNEAU.

We had now reached the accommodation ladder, which led to the gangway on the larboard side of the *Jersey*; and my station in the boat, as she hauled alongside, was exactly opposite to one of the air ports in the side of the ship. From this aperture proceeded a strong current of foul vapor, of a kind to which I had been before accustomed, while confined on board the *Good Hope*; the peculiarly disgusting smell of which I then recollected, after a lapse of three years. This was, however, far more foul and loathsome than anything which I had ever met with on board that ship, and produced a sensation of nausea far beyond my powers of description.

Here, while waiting for orders to ascend on board, we were addressed by some of the prisoners from the air-ports. We could not, however, discern their features, as it had now become so dark that we could not distinctly see any object in the interior of the ship. After some questions, whence we came, and respecting the manner of our capture, one of the prisoners said to me, that it was "a lamentable thing to see so many young men in full strength, with the flush of health upon their countenances, about to enter that infernal place of abode." He then added, in a tone and manner but little fitted to afford us much consolation, "Death has no relish for such skeleton carcasses as we are, but he will now have a feast upon you fresh comers."

After lanterns had been lighted on board for our examination, we ascended the accommodation ladder, to the upper deck, and passed through the barricado door, where we were examined and our bags of clothes inspected. These we were permitted to retain, provided they contained no money, or weapons of any kind.

After each man had given his name and the capacity in which he had served on board the vessel in which he was captured, and the same had been duly registered, we were directed to pass through the other barricado door, on the starboard side, down the ladder leading to the main hatchway. I was detained but a short time with the examination, and was permitted to take my bag of clothes with me below; and passing down the hatchway, which was still open, through a guard of soldiers, I found myself among the wretched and disgusting multitude, a prisoner on board the *Jersey*.

The gratings were soon after placed over the hatchways, and fastened down for the night; and I seated myself on the deck, holding my bag with a firm grasp, fearful of losing it among the

crowd. I had now ample time to reflect on the horrors of the scene, and to consider the prospect before me: It was impossible to find one of my former shipmates in the darkness; and I had, of course, no one with whom to speak during the long hours of that dreadful night. Surrounded by I knew not whom, except that they were beings as wretched as myself; with dismal sounds meeting my ears from every direction; a nauseous and putrid atmosphere filling my lungs, at every breath; and a stifled and suffocating heat, which almost deprived me of sense, and even of life.

Previous to leaving the boat, I had put on several additional articles of apparel, for the purpose of security; but I was soon compelled to disencumber myself of these; and was willing to hazard their loss, for a relief from the intolerable heat.

The thought of sleep did not enter my mind; and at length, discovering a glimmering of light through the iron gratings of one of the air-ports, I felt that it would be indeed a luxury, if I could but obtain a situation near that place, in order to gain one breath of the exterior air. Clenching my hand firmly around my bag, which I dared not leave, I began to advance towards the side of the ship; but was soon greeted with the curses and imprecations of those who were lying on the deck, and whom I had disturbed in attempting to pass over them. I however, persevered; and at length arrived near the desired spot; but found it already occupied, and no persuasion could induce a single individual to relinquish his place for a moment.

Thus I passed the first dreadful night, waiting with sorrowful forebodings for the coming day. The dawn at length appeared, but came only to present new scenes of wretchedness, disease and woe. I found myself surrounded by a crowd of strange and unknown forms, with the lines of death and famine upon their faces. My former shipmates were all lost and mingled among the multitude, and it was not until we were permitted to ascend to the deck, at eight o'clock, that I could discern a single individual whom I had ever seen before. Pale and meagre, the throng came upon deck; to view, for a few moments the morning sun; and then, to descend again, to pass another day of misery and wretchedness.

### THE FIRST DAY.

"Dull flew the hours, till from the East displayed,  
Sweet morn dispelled the horrors of the shade.  
On every side, dire objects met the sight,  
And pallid forms, and murders of the night—  
The dead were past their pain; the living groan,  
Nor dare to hope another morn their own.  
But, what to them is morn's delightful ray?  
Sad and distressful as the close of day.  
O'er distant streams appears the dewy green,  
And leafy trees on mountain tops, are seen.  
But they no groves nor grassy mountains tread,  
Marked for a longer journey to the dead."

FERRAAR.

After passing the weary and tedious night, to whose accumulated horrors I have but slightly alluded, I was permitted to ascend to the upper deck, where other objects, even more disgusting and loathsome, met my view. I found myself surrounded by a motley crew of wretches with tattered garments and pallid visages, who had

hurried from below, for the luxury of a little fresh air. Among them, I saw one ruddy and healthful countenance, and recognized the features of one of my late fellow prisoners on board the *Belisarius*. But how different did he appear from the group around him, who had here been doomed to combat with disease and death. Men, who, shrunken and decayed as they stood around him, had been, but a short time before, as strong, as healthful and as vigorous as himself. Men, who had breathed the pure breezes of the ocean, or danced lightly in the flower-scented air of the meadow and the hill; and had from thence, been hurried into the pent up air of a crowded prison ship, pregnant with putrid fever, foul with deadly contagion: here to linger out the tedious and weary day, the disturbed and anxious night; to count over the days and weeks and months of a wearying and degrading captivity, unvaried but by new scenes of painful suffering, and new inflictions of remorseless cruelty: their brightest hope and their daily prayer, that death would not long delay to release them from their torments.

In the wretched groups around me, I saw but too faithful a picture of our own almost certain fate; and found that all which we had been taught to fear of this terrible place of abode, was more than realized.

During the night, in addition to my other sufferings, I had been tormented with what I supposed to be vermin; and on coming upon deck, I found that a black silk handkerchief, which I wore around my neck, was completely spotted with them. Although this had often been mentioned as one of the miseries of the place, yet as I had never before been in a situation to witness anything of the kind, the sight made me shudder; as I knew, at once, that so long as I should remain on board, these loathsome creatures would be my constant companions and unceasing tormentors.

The next disgusting object which met my sight, was a man suffering with the small pox; and in a few minutes, I found myself surrounded by many others, laboring under the same disease, in every stage of its progress.

As I had never had the small pox, it became necessary that I should be inoculated; and there being no proper person on board to perform the operation, I concluded to act as my own physician. On looking about me, I soon found a man in the proper stage of the disease, and desired him to favor me with some of the matter for the purpose. He readily complied, observing that it was a necessary precaution on my part, and that my situation was an excellent one in regard to diet, as I might depend upon finding that *extremely moderate*.

The only instrument which I could procure for the purpose of inoculation, was a common pin. With this, having scarified the skin of my hand, between the thumb and fore-finger, I applied the matter and bound up my hand. The next morning, I found that the wound had begun to fester, a sure symptom that the application had taken effect.

Many of my former shipmates took the same precaution, and were inoculated during the day. In my case, the disorder came on but lightly, and its progress was favorable; and without the least medical advice or attention, by the blessing of Divine Providence, I soon recovered.

## THE GUN ROOM AND MESSES.

" But such a train of endless woes abound,  
So many mischiefs in these hulks are found,  
That, of them all, the memory to prolong,  
Would swell too high the horrors of our song.  
Hunger and thirst, to work our woe, combine,  
And mouldy bread, and flesh of rotten swine:  
The mangled carcass, and the battered brain,  
The doctor's poison, and the captain's cane,  
The soldier's musket, and the steward's debt,  
The evening shackle, and the noon-day threat."

FRÉNAU.

On the arrival of prisoners on board the Jersey, the first thing necessary to be done, was, as soon as possible, to form, or be admitted into some regular *mess*. On the day of a prisoner's arrival, it was impossible for him to procure any food; and even on the second day, he could not procure any, in time to have it cooked. No matter how long he had fasted, nor how acute might be his sufferings from hunger and privation; his petty tyrants would on no occasion deviate from their rule of delivering the prisoner's morsel at a particular hour, and at no other. And the poor, half-famished wretch must absolutely wait until the coming day, before his pittance of food could be boiled with that of his fellow captives. It was therefore most prudent for a newly arrived prisoner, to gain admittance into some old established mess, (which was not attended with much difficulty, as death was daily providing vacancies;) for he would thereby be associated with those who were acquainted with the mode of procuring their allowance in time; and be also protected from many impositions, to which as a stranger he otherwise would be liable, during the first days of his confinement.

The cruel tyrants, to whose petty sway we were subjected on board this hulk, knew no distinction among their prisoners. Whether taken on the land or on the ocean, in arms, or from our own fire-side, it was the same to them. No matter in what rank or capacity a prisoner might have been known before his capture, no distinction was here made; we were "all *Rebels*." Our treatment, our fare, its allowance and its quality were the same. They did not, of course, interfere in our private arrangements; but left us to manage our affairs in our own way.

The extreme after part of the ship, between decks, was called the *Gun Room*. Although no distinction was made by our masters, yet those among the prisoners who had been officers previous to their capture, had taken possession of this room as their own place of abode; and from custom, it was considered as belonging exclusively to them. As an officer, I found my way into this apartment; and with such of my late companions as had been officers, was received with civility by those who were already in possession of it; who humanely tendered us such little services as were in their power to offer. We soon became incorporated with them, and having formed ourselves into messes, as nearly as possible according to our grades, we were considered as a part of this family of sufferers. The prisoner must receive for his mess whatever was offered; and be its quantity or quality what it might, no alteration or change was ever allowed. We as prisoners, were allowed each day for six men, what was equal in quantity to the rations of four men at full

allowance in the British navy, though of a far inferior quality. We were never allowed any fire or lights, on any occasion whatever.

## OUR SITUATION.

" Oh! my heart sinks, my trembling eyes o'erflow,  
While memory paints the picture of their woe,  
Where my poor countrymen in bondage wait  
The slow enfranchisement of lingering fate;  
Greeting with groans the unwelcome night's return;  
While rage and shame their gloomy bosoms burn,  
And chiding, every hour, the slow paced sun,  
Endure their woes till all his race was run,  
No eye to mark their sufferings with a tear,  
No friend to comfort, and no hope to cheer,  
And like the dull unpitied brutes, repair  
To stalls as wretched and as coarse a fare,  
Thank heaven, one day of misery was o'er,  
And sink to sleep, and wish to wake no more."

DAY.

The prisoners were confined on the two main decks below. My usual place of abode being in the Gun Room, on the centre deck, I was never under the necessity of descending to the lower dungeon: and during my confinement, I had no disposition to visit it. It was inhabited by the most wretched in appearance of all our miserable company. From the disgusting and squalid appearance of the groupes which I saw ascending the stairs which led to it, it must have been more dismal, if possible, than that part of the hulk where I resided. Its occupants appeared to be mostly foreigners, who had seen and survived every variety of human suffering. The faces of many of them were covered with dirt and filth; their long hair and beards matted and foul; clothed in rags, and with scarcely a sufficient supply of these to cover their disgusting bodies.

To men thus situated, every thing like ordinary cleanliness was impossible. Much that was disgusting in their appearance, undoubtedly originated from neglect, which long confinement had rendered habitual; until it created a confirmed indifference to personal appearance.

As soon as the gratings had been fastened over the hatchways for the night, we generally went to our sleeping places. It was, of course, always desirable to obtain a station as near as possible to the side of the ship; and, if practicable, in the immediate vicinity of one of the air-ports; as they not only afforded us a better air, but also rendered us less liable to be trodden upon by those who were moving about the decks, during the night.

But silence was a stranger to our dark abode. There were continual noises during the night. The groans of the sick and the dying; the curses poured out by the weary and exhausted, upon our inhuman keepers; the restlessness caused by the suffocating heat and the confined and poisoned air; mingled with the wild and incoherent ravings of delirium, were the sounds, which, every night, were raised around us, in all directions. Such was our ordinary situation; but at times, the consequences of our crowded condition were still more terrible, and proved fatal to many of our number in a single night.

But strange as it may appear, notwithstanding all the maladies and sufferings which were there endured, I knew many who had

been inmates of that abode for two years, who were apparently well. They had, as they expressed it, "been through the furnace, and become *seasoned*." Most of these, however, were foreigners, who appeared to have abandoned all hope of ever being exchanged, and had become quite indifferent in regard to their place of abode.

But far different was the condition of that portion of our number who were natives of the Northern States. These formed, by far the most numerous class of the prisoners. Most of these were young men, who had been induced by necessity or inclination, to try the perils of the sea; and had, in many instances, been captured soon after leaving their homes, and during their first voyage. After they had been here immured, the sudden change in their situation was like a sentence of death. Many a one was crushed down beneath that sickness of the heart, so well described by the Poet:

"Night and day,  
Brooding on what he had been, what he was,  
'Twas more than he could bear. His longing fits  
Thickened upon him. His desire for home  
Became a madness."

These poor creatures had, in many instances, been plundered of their wearing apparel by their captors. And here, the dismal and disgusting objects by which they were surrounded; the vermin which infested them; their vile and loathsome food; and what, with them, was far from being the lightest of their trials, their ceaseless longing after their homes and the scenes to which they had been accustomed; all combined to produce a wonderful effect upon them. Dejection and anguish were soon visible in their countenances. They became dismayed and terror stricken; and many of them absolutely died that most awful of all human deaths, the effects of a broken heart.

"Denied the comforts of a dying bed,  
With not a pillow to support the head,  
How could they else, but pine and grieve and sigh,  
Detest that wretched life, and wish to die?"

#### THE FOURTH OF JULY.

"Black as the clouds that shade St. Kilda's shore,  
Wild as the winds that round her mountains roar,  
At every post, some sturdy vagrant stands,  
Cull'd from the English or the Scottish bands.  
Dispensing death, triumphantly they stand,  
Their muskets ready to obey command,  
Wounds are their sport, as ruin is their aim;  
On their dark souls compassion has no claim,  
And discord only can their spirits please.  
Such were our tyrants—only such as these."

FRÉDÉRIC.

A few days before the fourth of July, we had made such preparations as our circumstances would admit, for an observance of the anniversary of American Independence. We had procured some supplies, wherewith to make ourselves merry on the occasion; and intended to spend the day in such innocent pastime and amusement as our situation would afford; not dreaming that our proceedings would give umbrage to our keepers; as it was far from our inten-

tion to trouble or insult them. We thought, that although prisoners, we had a right, on that day at least, to sing and be merry. As soon as we were permitted to go on deck in the morning, thirteen little national flags were displayed in a row upon the booms. We were soon ordered by the guard, to take them away; and as we neglected to obey the command, they triumphantly demolished, and trampled them under foot.

Unfortunately for us, our guards at that time, were Scotchmen, who, next to the Refugees, were the objects of our greatest hatred; but their destruction of our flags was merely viewed in silence, with the contempt which it merited.

During the time we remained on deck, several patriotic songs were sung, and chorusses were repeated; but not a word was intentionally spoken to give offence to our guards. They were, nevertheless, evidently dissatisfied with our proceedings, as will soon appear. Their moroseness was a prelude to what was to follow. We were in a short time, forbidden to pass along the common gangways, and every attempt to do so, was repelled by the bayonet. Although thus incommoded, our mirth still continued. Songs were still sung, accompanied with occasional cheers. Things thus proceeded until about four o'clock, when the guards were turned out, and we received orders to descend between decks, where we were immediately driven, at the point of the bayonet.

After being thus sent below in the greatest confusion, at that early and unusual hour, and having heard the gratings closed and fastened above us, we supposed that the barbarous resentment of our guards was fully satisfied; but we were mistaken, for they had further vengeance in store, and merely waited for an opportunity to make us feel its weight.

The prisoners continued their singing between decks, and were of course more noisy than usual; but forbore, even under their existing temptations, to utter any insulting or aggravating expressions. At least, I heard nothing of the kind, unless our patriotic songs could be so construed.

In the course of the evening, we were ordered to desist from making any further noise. This order not being fully complied with, at about nine o'clock, the gratings were removed, and the guards descended among us, with lanterns and drawn cutlasses in their hands. The poor, helpless prisoners retreated from the hatchways, as far as their crowded situation would permit; while their cowardly assailants followed as far as they dared, cutting and wounding every one within their reach; and then ascended to the upper deck, exulting in the gratification of their revenge.

Many of the prisoners were wounded; but from the total darkness, neither their number nor their situation could be ascertained; and if this had been possible, it was not in the power of their companions to afford them the least relief. During the whole of that tragical night, their groans and lamentations were dreadful in the extreme. Being in the Gun Room, I was at some distance from the immediate scene of this bloody outrage; but the distance was by no means far enough to prevent my hearing their continual cries, from the extremity of pain, their applications for assistance, and their curses upon the heads of their brutal assailants.

It had been the usual custom, for each prisoner to carry below, when he descended at sunset, a pint of water, to quench his thirst during the night. But on this occasion, we had thus been driven to our dungeons, three hours before the setting of the sun, and without the usual supply of water.

Of this night I cannot describe the horrors. The day had been very sultry, and the heat was extreme throughout the ship. The unusual number of hours during which we had been crowded together between decks, the foul atmosphere and sickening heat, the additional excitement and restlessness caused by the wanton attack which had been made;—above all, the want of water, not a drop of which could we obtain during the whole night, to cool our parched tongues; the imprecations of those who were half-distracted with their burning thirst, the shrieks and wailings of the wounded, the struggles and groans of the dying, together formed a combination of horrors which no pen can describe.

In the agonies of their suffering, the prisoners invited, and even challenged their inhuman guards to descend once more among them; but this they were prudent enough not to attempt.

It was not until ten o'clock in the forenoon, that the gratings were at length removed. We hurried on deck, and thronged to the water cask, which was completely exhausted before our thirst was allayed. Our rations were delivered to us, but of course not until long after the usual hour. During the whole day, however, no fire was kindled for cooking in the galley. All the food which we consumed that day, we were obliged to swallow raw. Every thing, indeed, had been entirely deranged by the events of the past night; and several days elapsed before order was restored. This was at length obtained by a change of the guard, who to our great joy, were relieved by a party of Hessians.

The average number who died on board during the period of 24 hours, was about five; but on the morning of the 5th of July, eight or ten corpses were found below. Many had been badly wounded, to whom, in the total darkness of the night, it was impossible for their companions to render any assistance: and even during the next day, they received no attention, except that which was afforded by their fellow prisoners, who had nothing to administer to their comfort; not even bandages for their wounds.

I was not personally acquainted with any of those who died or were wounded on that night. No equal number had ever died in the same period of time, during my confinement. This unusual mortality was of course caused by the increased sufferings of the night.

Since that time, I have often, while standing on the deck of a good ship under my command, and viewing the rising stars, thought upon the terrors of that night, when I stood watching their progress, through the gratings of the old Jersey. And when I now contrast my former wretchedness, with my present situation, in the full enjoyment of liberty, health, and every earthly comfort, I cannot but muse upon the contrast, and bless the great and good Being, from whom my comforts have been derived. I do not now regret my captivity nor my sufferings; for the recollection of them has ever taught me how to enjoy my after life, with a greater degree of contentment than I should perhaps have otherwise ever experienced.

## OUR ORATOR.

“Stranger Youth,  
So noble and so mild is thy demeanor,  
So gentle and so patient—such the air  
Of candor and of courage which adorns  
Thy manly features, thou hast won my love.”

During the period of my confinement, the Jersey was never visited by any regular clergyman, nor was divine service ever performed on board. And among the whole multitude of the prisoners, there was but one individual who ever attempted to deliver a set speech, or to exhort his fellow sufferers.

This individual was a young man named Cooper, whose station in life was apparently that of a common sailor. He was a man of eccentric character, but evidently possessed talents of a very high order. His manners were pleasing, and he had every appearance of having received an excellent education. He was a Virginian, but I never knew the exact place of his nativity. He told us that he had been a very unmanageable youth, and that he had left his family, contrary to their wishes and advice; that he had been often assured by them, that the Old Jersey would bring him up at last, and the Wallabout be his place of burial. “The first of these predictions,” said he, “has been verified; and I care not how soon the second proves equally true; for I am prepared for the event. Death, for me, has lost its terrors, for with them I have been too long familiar.”

On several Sunday mornings, Cooper harangued the prisoners in a very forcible yet pleasing manner, which, together with his language, made a lasting impression upon my memory. On one of these occasions, having mounted a temporary elevation on the spar deck, he in an audible voice requested the attention of the prisoners; who having immediately gathered round him in silence, he commenced his discourse.

He began by saying that he hoped no one would suppose he had taken that station by way of derision or mockery of that holy day; for that such was not his object; on the contrary, he was pleased to find that the good regulations established by the former prisoners obliged us to refrain even from recreation on the Sabbath: that his object, however, was not to preach to us, nor to discourse upon any sacred subject. He wished to read to us our By-Laws, a copy of which he held in his hand; the framers of which were then in all probability sleeping in death, beneath the sand of the shore before our eyes. That these laws had been framed in wisdom, and were well fitted to preserve order and decorum in a community like ours: that his present object was to impress upon our minds, the absolute necessity of a strict adherence to those wholesome regulations: that he should briefly comment upon each article, which might be thus considered as the particular text of that part of his discourse.

He proceeded to point out the extreme necessity of a full observance of these Rules of Conduct; and portrayed the evil consequences which would inevitably result to us, if we neglected or suffered them to fall into disuse. He enforced the necessity of our unremitting attention to personal cleanliness, and to the duties of

morality: he dwelt on the degradation and sin of drunkenness; described the meanness and atrocity of theft; and the high degree of caution against temptation, necessary for men who were perhaps standing on the very brink of the grave: and added, that in his opinion, even sailors might as well refrain from profane language, while they were actually suffering in Purgatory.

He said that our present torments, in that abode of misery, were a proper retribution for our former sins and transgressions: that Satan had been permitted to send out his messengers and inferior demons in every direction, to collect us together: and that among the most active of these infernal agents, was *David Sproat, Commissary of Prisoners!*

He then made some just and suitable observations on the fortitude with which we had sustained the weight of our accumulated miseries: of our firmness in refusing to accept the bribes of our invaders and desert the banners of our country. During this part of his discourse, the sentinels on the gangways occasionally stopped, and listened attentively. We much feared, that by some imprudent remark, he might expose himself to their resentment; and cautioned him not to proceed too far. He replied, that our keepers could do nothing more, unless they should put him to the torture; and that he should proceed.

He touched on the fact, that no clergyman had ever visited us; that this was probably owing to the fear of contagion; but it was much to be regretted, that no one had ever come to afford a ray of hope, or to administer the word of life in that terrific abode: that if any minister of the gospel desired to do so, there could be no obstacle in the way; for that even *David Sproat* himself, bad as he was, would not dare to oppose it.

He closed with a merited tribute to the memory of those of our fellow sufferers who had already paid the debt of nature. "The time," said he, "will come, when their bones will be collected; when their rites of sepulture will be performed; and a monument erected over the remains of those who have here suffered, the victims of barbarity, and died in vindication of the rights of man."

I have myself lived to see his prediction verified. Those bones have been collected: those rites have been performed: that monument has been raised.

The remarks of our Orator were well adapted to our situation, and produced much effect upon the prisoners; who at length began to accost him as "Elder," or "Parson Cooper." But this he would not allow; and told us, if we would insist on giving him a title, we might call him "Doctor;" by which title he was ever afterwards saluted, so long as he remained among us. Cooper was soon afterwards released.

We have not room for further extracts. In October, 1782, a petition was presented to Gen. Clinton, then in command of the British forces in New-York, that the prisoners on board the Jersey might be permitted to send a memorial to Gen. Washington, describing their deplorable condition. Their request was granted, and soon after, by an exchange of prisoners, all the survivors of the crew of the "Chance" were set at liberty.

While on the subject of streets, it may be well to state, that a few months since, a memorial was addressed to the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of this city, by the publisher of this work, calling their attention to the practice, which has too much prevailed in this community, of persons taking upon themselves to give names to new streets, and sometimes to alter the long-established names of old ones, without any authority for so doing, by which confusion and uncertainty as to the correct name of some of our streets, has sometimes prevailed. It must be apparent to every reflecting mind, that this practice must be prevented, and it should be known and understood by all that there is but one source of authority in the city for establishing names to the streets. That authority rests with the Mayor and Board of Aldermen. Another evil connected with this practice has been, giving a name to a street, when the same name already existed in another part of the city. As an illustration, it will be seen by the preceding list, that we have a Park street on each side of the river. The Street Commissioners have done what they could to remedy these evils, but probably did not feel authorized to assume any powers not clearly conferred upon them by the city.

The memorial above spoken of was received, and the subject of naming the streets, numbering the houses, &c. was placed by appointment in the hands of a gentleman well qualified for the duties; but he being taken sick about that time, felt it his duty to decline the appointment, and no one has been since appointed in his place. But as the subject has already engaged the attention of our city authorities, we have no doubt it will be attended to in due time.

It is now seven years since the houses were regularly numbered, and from the rapid growth and extension of the city, the work is greatly needed to be done again. When this is accomplished, and which will probably be before another Directory is issued, we hope to be able to give more exact directions to find those living on our sparsely settled streets, than it is possible to do at the present time.

PERSONAL RECOLLECTIONS OF PROVIDENCE.  
BY AN AGED CITIZEN.

MR. BROWN,  
It is often said that it is the privilege of old people to be garrulous, and to talk about matters and things as they existed when they were young. Perhaps it is so, and with your permission, I should like to remark on the great changes I have seen in Providence. Having always lived here, I feel a lively interest in all that pertains to our good city; and though I know but few of the young business men of the present time, I well knew their fathers and grandfathers, if they resided here. My recollection extends back to 1790, and even earlier, when Providence was a mere village, with a population of about 6000. At this period, I well recollect that on each side of Westminster street were meadows where the inhabitants pastured their cows. And very near the foot of Washington street, then the south shore of the cove, was a pottery, for the manufacture of earthen ware. Vessels were built at the north part of the cove, very near Smith's bridge, and even higher up, were floated down at spring tides, and passed Weybosset bridge by means of a draw. At this period, and for many years after, the cove afforded excellent fishing ground, and thousands of the finny tribe have I captured there, as well as from each side of the bridge. Numerous sail boats were then kept in the cove, and large parties of young persons then enjoyed themselves in the beautiful woods and groves at its margin. My memory oft recalls those scenes, as well as the names and features of the loved ones who have passed away. Every thing is now changed, the woods and groves have disappeared, and numerous manufacturing establishments have taken their place.

Many changes, not only of men and of localities, but of the manner of doing business, have I seen in my day. At that period, if a

man failed for a few thousand dollars, it produced an almost electric shock throughout the community—the man had *broke*, it was said, and woe to him if he could not show that he had been really unfortunate. It was not so easy to obtain credit then, as it now is, and there were not so many temptations to folly and extravagance, as at present. I think if many of our young men would return to the frugal habits of their fathers, they would enjoy more than they now do, and in many cases preserve life, health and reputation.

But I wish not to be censorious. Allowance must be made for our rapid increase in wealth and population; and even luxury and extravagance, though evils to those who indulge in them, are the means of giving employment to thousands of the industrious poor.

But I am willing to allow there have also been important changes for the better. Among these may be mentioned the great and glorious change which has taken place in the public mind on the subject of Temperance. I can recollect when many of our really respectable citizens were engaged in the sale and use of ardent spirits; and at that time, singular as it may now appear, a meeting house could not be raised, a public dinner given, an ordination or an election held, a funeral attended, or even a child be born, without the use of *rum*! True, this glorious reform is not yet fully accomplished, but I believe it is destined to be, and although I am too far advanced in life to labor with those engaged in promoting it, from my heart I bid them God-speed.

Another great change in public sentiment may be mentioned as regards the subject of Slavery. It is well known that during the last century, professedly Christian men were engaged in the African slave trade; until the labors of Wilberforce and other kindred spirits struck a chord in the conscience of many which has never ceased to be felt; and although corrupt politicians may continue to truckle to the slave power, we believe its days are numbered. My feelings have led me rather off the track, and I will return.

I know it is said we live in a progressive age. No doubt it is so; but may we not progress too fast? I suppose I am too antiquated for this go-ahead age, but I want to state my views of changes which have occurred since I was young, which I think are not for the better. Formerly it was the practice for young lads to serve a regular apprenticeship of several years, when they went to a trade, and at the age of 21 came out finished workmen. Now, if our young men attempt to learn a trade at all, they think a year or two must suffice, and while yet boys, they imagine they are men, too often slight the advice of the "old man," and run into habits of extravagance, if not of dissipation, most injurious in their consequences.

While I have thus animadverted on some things that are wrong among us, it is far more pleasant to my feelings to advert to those which are praise-worthy. And among these, I might allude to many Societies and Institutions in our midst, which have sprung up within a few years, designed to promote the spiritual, temporal and physical well-being of our fellow men, and which I should like to allude to by name; but where there are so many deserving of praise, it would appear invidious to name but a part; and besides, I am aware you could not spare me room to name all.

I have examined your work for many years, and as I find at each new issue, some new Society or Association for the good of our community, I have felt a pleasure that it was so, and a just pride in the growth and prosperity of my native place.

#### SHIP-BUILDING IN PROVIDENCE.

Ma. Brown,

Having observed that you have frequently inserted articles in your Directory, not only as regards Providence as it now is, but as it formerly was, I am induced to make a few suggestions respecting a branch of business which formerly flourished with us, but which of late years, seems to have been almost entirely abandoned. I do not profess to be so intimately acquainted with this business, or with that of her twin sister, Commerce, as to be able to show why this important branch of business has so much declined amongst us of late years. No doubt various causes have contributed to produce it. Our merchants and capitalists have had their attention withdrawn from foreign commerce to manufactures, which have probably been thought to be more remunerative. One thing, however, we think is self evident, that ever since the discovery of the gold mines of California, a great impulse has been given to our American commercial marine. Hundreds of our ships have gone to that country, many of which never have and probably never will return. This has created a demand for new ones of larger size, has greatly increased and prospered the business of ship-building in other places, and at length has reached us. I was exceedingly gratified to learn that about half a dozen vessels have been put on the stocks in the ship yards of this city, the present season, some of which have been launched, and the keels of others it is expected will soon be laid. I can see no reason why ship-building should not again prosper amongst us; for we certainly have facilities for the successful prosecution of the business, equal to many of our neighbors, who have prosecuted it for years; and with the well known energy and enterprise of our merchants, I trust we shall continue to hear the cheerful sound of the broad axe in our ship yards, for years to come.

What can be a more splendid specimen of American manufactures than the noble clipper ship, as she spreads her white sails to the breeze, and bears to distant climes the fame and the wealth of our country? I trust and believe, that with the rapid increase of American commerce, this branch of business will again prosper amongst us, and perhaps to an extent never before known.

## Societies and Institutions in Providence.

## BROWN UNIVERSITY.

This Institution of learning was founded by the Baptists in 1764, and incorporated in February, of the same year. It was at first located in Warren, where, on the 7th of September, 1769, the first Commencement was celebrated. In 1770 the College was removed to Providence, where its exercises have since been held, with a temporary suspension of some few years during the revolutionary war. The Institution received its present name in honor of its most liberal benefactor, the late Hon. NICHOLAS BROWN, by a vote of the Corporation, passed September 6, 1804.

The Charter which is now the "Constitution" of Brown University, secures to the Baptists forever the government of the College. Some of its provisions are as follows:—"That into this liberal and Catholic institution shall never be admitted any religious tests: but on the contrary, all the members hereof shall forever enjoy full, free, absolute and uninterrupted liberty of conscience: And that the places of Professors, Tutors, and all other officers, the President alone excepted, shall be free and open for all denominations of Protestants: And that youth of all religious denominations shall and may be freely admitted to the equal advantages, emoluments, and honors of the College or University."

The Corporation for the regulation and government of the University, consists of two branches; "that of the Trustees and that of the Fellowship." There are thirty-six Trustees, and twelve of the Fellowship, including the President. Of the Trustees, twenty-two by the Charter, are to be Baptists, five of the denomination called Friends, or Quakers, four Congregationalists, and five Episcopalians. Of the Fellows, eight are to be Baptists, "and the rest indifferently of any or all denominations." The President must be a Baptist. "The instruction and immediate government of the College," says the Charter, "shall forever be and rest in the President and Fellows, or Fellowship."

In 1850 material changes were made in the system of instruction given at this Institution; the range of studies was greatly extended, and the sum of \$125,000 (raised by subscription) mostly among the citizens of Providence) was added to the College funds, thus augmenting them to about \$200,000.

## LIBRARIES.

The University Library is in Manning Hall, and contains at present about 26,000 well selected volumes. A large proportion of these have been purchased within the last few years, with special reference to the wants of students and gentlemen engaged in literary and scientific pursuits. It is constantly increasing from the proceeds of a permanent fund of \$25,000, established for this purpose in 1830. The Library is open four hours daily, from 9 A. M. till 1 P. M. In addition to the University Library, the Libraries of the Philermenian and the United Brothers' Societies, comprise together nearly 7000 volumes, accessible to all the students of the University.

The present number of volumes in the Library is nearly 19,000. From the 1st Monday in April to the 1st Monday in October, the Library is open from 9 A. M. until sunset. During the remainder of the year, from 10 A. M. until 9 in the evening. The price of a share in this Institution is only \$15, and the annual tax cannot exceed \$5.

## PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

The Public Schools of the city of Providence are placed by the ordinances of the city under the management of the School Committee, consisting of 30 members, annually elected by the people in the several wards, and serve *without any compensation*. The experience of many years has shown, that the members of this Committee, each one feeling more or less heavily the pressure of his own private or professional business, cannot give that amount of time to the Public Schools, which an economical and successful management of them requires. For this reason, they have wisely entrusted much of the active duty of the committee to a Superintendent.

Samuel S. Greene, Esq. is the present Superintendent of the Public Schools, and also acts as Principal of the High School. He spends all his time in visiting the different schools, exercising a careful supervision over them, and while passing from school to school, he aims to remove existing defects in the modes of teaching and management, and to introduce such improvements as his own observation and the progress of popular education may have shown to be useful. He also furnishes all necessary supplies, superintends all repairs, and in every practical way promotes the improvement of the Public Schools.

There are at present established in the city forty-seven Public Schools, in which are engaged one hundred and ten teachers; thirteen gentlemen and ninety-seven ladies, who devote themselves

faithfully to the instruction and government of their respective schools, which together contain about six thousand six hundred pupils.

These Public Schools are divided into five grades, viz:

1st. Primary Schools,	4th. High School,
2d. Intermediate do.	5th. Normal School.
3d. Grammar Schools,	

**FIRST GRADE.** There are now established in the city *twenty-two Primary Schools*. These schools are designed for pupils from five years of age to six or seven, according to their advancement in learning. Each school is under the immediate government and instruction of two female teachers—a Preceptress and an Assistant, and usually contains about one hundred and thirty pupils. The teachers in these schools, besides teaching the elements of *Reading, Spelling and Arithmetic*, give their pupils much oral instruction of a familiar kind, suited to their age, with daily exercises in *Vocal Music*.

**SECOND GRADE.** There are *sixteen Intermediate Schools* established for children from six to eight or nine years of age, including those that were formerly in the first classes in the Primary Schools, and those in the lowest classes in the Grammar Schools. Each of these schools usually contains about one hundred and twenty pupils, who are under the instruction and management of two female teachers—a Preceptress and an Assistant. The scholars in these schools advance progressively to more difficult lessons in *Reading, Spelling and Arithmetic*, and begin to take lessons in *Writing and Geography*. *Vocal Music*, in these schools is taught by a *professional Teacher*, employed by the School Committee.

**THIRD GRADE.** *Seven Grammar Schools* are now established in the city, for the instruction of scholars from eight or nine years old to twelve or fourteen. Each Grammar School, except the one for colored children, usually contains upwards of two hundred pupils, who are under the government and instruction of a Master and three female Assistants.

In these schools the scholars use a new set of text books, which present more enlarged and accurate views of the branches they have already begun, and in these books continue their exercises in *Reading, Spelling, Writing, Arithmetic and Geography*, and commence *English Grammar, the History of the United States, and General History*. Instruction in *Vocal Music* is given in these schools, and also in the High School, by a professional Teacher.

**FOURTH GRADE.** One High School with two departments—one for boys and one for girls. Each department will accommodate one hundred and twenty pupils—making two hundred and forty in the school. The full course of studies in this school occupies *three years*, and in accordance with this arrangement, the boys are divided into three classes of forty each, and placed in separate rooms, under the government and instruction of a Master. The girls are also divided into three classes, and each class placed in a separate room, under the care and instruction of a Mistress. The course of studies in each department is adapted to the conditions of the pupils in after life; each sex pursuing all the common branches alike, but the boys taking the more scientific course, and the girls the more literary. The art of drawing is taught in both departments, by a professional Teacher.

**NORMAL SCHOOL.**

The State Normal School, established by the Legislature, at its May session, 1854, was organized and opened in due form, in the rooms adjoining the 2d Universalist church on Broad-street, on Monday, May 29. The exercises were commenced with prayer by Rev. Mr. Cook. The State Commissioner, Hon. E. R. Potter, then delivered an appropriate address, unfolding the objects of a Normal School, and indicating, briefly, the benefits to the cause of Common School Education, that were expected from the establishment of this institution. He was followed by Gov. Hoppin, who dwelt on the importance of education as a safeguard of our dearest social and civil interests, and the adaptedness of this School to aid the work, by raising up an army of educators, thoroughly trained in the art of teaching. Brief remarks were also made by S. S. Greene, Esq. Superintendent of Public Schools, and Rev. E. M. Stone.

The establishment of this School marks an important era in the history of education in Rhode-Island. The need of such an institution has long been felt and acknowledged. Its supervision is in the hands of the State Commissioner, its teachers are gentlemen of experience, and its entire arrangements are such as to render it attractive. We wish it abundant prosperity, and cordially commend it to public favor.--*Jour.*

**TEACHERS' INSTITUTES.**

During the past year, as in previous years, meetings have been held in different parts of the State, for the gratuitous instruction of those Teachers who attended. These meetings are generally denominated "Teachers' Institutes," and continue for one week. Lectures are delivered upon the various modes of teaching in the different branches of education, discussions are held upon different topics, in which the lecturers and teachers take part, and addresses are delivered to the parents and others who are assembled together, frequently in large numbers, by the interest they excite.

**FRIENDS' YEARLY MEETING BOARDING SCHOOL,**

Established in 1819.

This Institution is under the direction of a committee of the New England Yearly Meeting, who appoint Principals and teachers. The number of teachers varies with the number of scholars, who are taught in the various branches of an English education, including the Mathematics, and the Latin, Greek and French languages. Lectures are regularly delivered in Natural Philosophy and Chemistry, illustrated by experiments, and occasionally upon other subjects embraced in the course of study in the school.

The school is furnished with an extensive and valuable Philosophical and Chemical apparatus. There is also a valuable Cabinet of Minerals belonging to the Institution. The pupils have access to a library of about 1200 volumes.

The number of scholars of both sexes averages about 130.

**DEXTER ASYLUM.**

The general superintendence of this Institution is placed in charge of the Mayor and Aldermen, who act as a Board of Over-

seers. They hold quarterly meetings at the Asylum on the first Saturdays of August, November, February and May. They also appoint one from their body, weekly, to act as a visiting committee for that period, who reports the next succeeding Monday, to the Board of Aldermen, the state of the establishment during his tour of duty. The immediate charge of the house is in care of a Master and Matron, annually appointed by the Board of Aldermen. The present incumbents are Hollis Chaffin and wife. Divine service is performed in the chapel every Sabbath.

The medical department is entrusted to a Board of Physicians, appointed annually by the Mayor and Aldermen. This Board at present consists of Drs. Collins and Ely, who attend the sick quarterly, in succession. In all cases of peculiar interest or difficulty, they meet in consultation, keep a record of sickness, a report of which is made to the Board of Overseers, at their quarterly meetings; and also an annual report of the sick during the year, at the meeting of the Board on the first Saturday in August. The number of inmates in the Institution is between one and two hundred.

**BUTLER HOSPITAL FOR THE INSANE.**

The Hospital can accommodate about 145 patients. It is in a flourishing condition, under the able management of Dr. Ray.

The Butler Hospital is situated in the north-east corner of the city. The grounds embrace 114 acres of land, pleasantly situated upon the Seekonk river.

Application for the admission of patients may be made to one of the trustees, or to Dr. Ray. Letters and small parcels for the officers or patients may be left at Abner Gay's, 50 North Main street.

**PROVIDENCE REFORM SCHOOL.**

This excellent institution went into operation Nov. 1, 1850. It is located at the lower end of East street, at what was formerly

called the Tockwotten house. It is designed for the confinement, instruction and reformation of idle and vicious children.

#### MINISTRY AT LARGE.

This institution was established at the close of 1841. Its object is to provide moral and religious instruction for persons whose wants have not been met by the regular churches of the city. A Free Chapel has been erected on Benefit-street, a considerable Sunday school has been gathered, and by evening schools, conferences and visiting, the Minister and his assistants exert an important influence. Rev. Edwin M. Stone is the Minister at large. He is at his office in the Chapel, from 11 to 12 A. M. daily. His residence is No. 22 Halsey-street. This institution is supported by voluntary contributions, chiefly from the First Congregational and Westminster churches, and its direction is entrusted to the care of twelve managers from these congregations.

It will be seen by an examination of the above Table, that five new Pastors have been settled over churches in this city the past year. Five have been pastors here for 12 years or upwards: one for 23 years, and one (the venerable Dr. Crocker) for more than half a century. This is believed to be the longest period in which any individual has ever held the pastoral relation, in this city. The late Dr. Stephen Gano held that relation to the First Baptist church for 36 years, and the late Rev. James Wilson was Pastor of the Benevolent Congregational church for about the same period.

## ACCOMMODATIONS FOR PUBLIC WORSHIP IN PROVIDENCE.

We extract the following from "An Account of the Churches in Rhode-Island, presented at a late meeting of the R. Island Baptist State Convention. By Rev. Henry Jackson, Pastor of the Central Baptist Church, Newport, R. I."

This work evinces great industry and research, and is well worthy of preservation by all who feel the least interest in the religious history of Rhode-Island.

"In the city of Providence there are forty-eight religious congregations assembling on the Sabbath, representing fifteen denominations of professing Christians, all existing on the voluntary principle in a State where, concerning religious compulsion, there has never been enacted in any form a law; but every citizen is recommended by his Excellency the Governor to offer thanksgiving upon his own acknowledged altar, and to observe God's holy day in a manner becoming and in accordance with the requisitions of the Bible.

"Of these forty-eight assemblies, four meet in public halls. To these several denominations are assigned their proportion of seats and their estimated value in the annexed table, viz.

"There are therefore in this city, in the forty-eight places of public worship, 32,390 seats, and \$828,400 property in church premises, being full one half of the pecuniary investments of this character in the State, and as I have before stated, nearly one third of the pew accommodations.

"Of these forty-eight meetings, there are seven Orthodox Congregational, four Roman Catholic, six Methodist Episcopal, four Episcopal, three Unitarian Congregational, two Universalist, two Christian, four Free Will Baptist, one Mariner, one Wesleyan Methodist, one Society of Friends, two Second Advent, one Scotch Presbyterian, one New Jerusalem, and nine Associated Baptists."

## RHODE-ISLAND STATE PRISON.

By the annual report of the Inspectors of the State Prison, for the year ending Dec. 31, 1853, it appears that the

Expenses of State Prison and Jail were	\$8,942 05
Earnings of " "	6,544 73
Excess of expenses above earnings,	2,397 32

By comparing this with the expenses of the preceding nine months, it has been shown that a saving of \$2,973 45 has been made.

"The health of the prisoners has been unusually good. No death has occurred during the year, and scarcely a case of serious illness. The discipline of the prison has also been greatly improved. In

only 20 cases has punishment been administered. The number of stripes inflicted is 27, and the number of hours of solitary confinement 256. The improvement of the condition of all the departments of the Prison is chiefly owing to the integrity and skill of the Warden, Wm. Willard, Esq. He has watched with ceaseless vigilance over the interests of the State; and while he has brought the Prison into admirable order, he has endeared himself to the prisoners by his constant attention, both to their physical comforts and their moral improvement.

"The means employed for the intellectual and moral cultivation of the prisoners, are the following:

"Divine service is performed in the presence of all the prisoners, on the morning of every Sabbath day, by the Rev. A. Woods and the Rev. Wm. Douglas, alternately. In the interval between divine services, Bible classes are attended by such of the State prisoners as choose. About 30 attend those classes. They have during the year been instructed by the Warden, Stephen Atwater, Esq. and the Chairman of the Board. The exercises are commenced by singing, conducted by the prisoners themselves, and their conduct and improvement are such as to afford high gratification to their instructors. The Library of the Prison contains 400 well-selected volumes, and is enlarged by devoting to it the fees received of visitors. Free access to the library is granted to the prisoners, and as a lamp is allowed to each cell, opportunity is afforded for intellectual improvement, after the labors of the day are ended. It will thus be seen that it has been the design of the Board to render the Rhode-Island State Prison not only a place of confinement and useful labor, but especially a school of reformation, and to do this at the least possible expense to the State."

## FIRE DEPARTMENT.

ENGINEER'S OFFICE, JUNE 5, 1854.

To the Honorable City Council:

As required by the 4th section of the Fire Ordinance, the undersigned, a Committee of the Board of Engineers, hereby report the state of the Fire Department for the year ending May 31st, 1854.

The Department now consists of eleven Engine Companies, composed of 408 members, and one Hook and Ladder Company, with 13 members. There are also eleven stewards, making in all Four hundred and thirty-two men, all of whom are under pay.

There are thirteen Engines now on hand, eleven of which are in active service, also eleven Hose Carriages, and one Hook and Ladder Carriage, with all the necessary appurtenances. The Engine which was formerly stationed in Olneyville, was taken away in the early part of the year, in consequence of disturbances there at fires, and there being no company to take charge of it. This Engine is in bad condition, and will require considerable expense to put it in good order. The other Engines are in good condition.

The four old Engines which were on hand last year, viz: Old Hydraulions Nos. 1 and 2 and old Engines Nos. 9 and 10 have been disposed of.

There are about eighty-five hundred feet of hose on hand, a considerable portion of which will have to be replaced with new, as it is old and weak.

The Engine Houses are in good condition. A new one has been erected the present season for Engine Company No. 4.

The Department has been called out during the past year, from fires in the city, fifty-four times; false alarms, thirty-five times; burning of chimney, once; alarms originating out of the city, eleven; rekindling of ruins and repetition of alarms, four; making a total of 105 times the Department has been called out.

The amount of loss by fire, as far as can be ascertained, is Three hundred thirty-four thousand and seventy-five dollars; (\$334,075) on which there was one hundred ninety thousand three hundred and thirty-six dollars (\$190,336) insurance. More than seven-eighths of this loss was divided between the three principal fires which have visited us during the past year. The loss at the fire of Whitaker's store, Sept. 16, was estimated at twelve thousand

dollars; that of Arnold's block, Oct. 11, at fifty thousand and five hundred, and that of Howard's block and adjoining buildings, at Two hundred and forty thousand—making the total loss at these three fires, three hundred and two thousand and five hundred dollars.

The facilities for obtaining water are a little better than last year, though in no way equal to the demands of the city. Four Steam Forcing Pumps have been put in operation during the past year, viz: At Moulton & Ingraham's, near the Canal Market, New-England Screw Co.'s, Elm-street, and New-England Butt Co.'s works. The first and last mentioned are owned by the city. Iron pipes have been laid from the one at the N. E. Screw Co.'s works, so as to carry the water up the hill into North Main-street; also from the N. E. Butt Co.'s works into High-street, opposite the Hoyle tavern. A new reservoir in Codding-street is now about completed, and it is expected that another will be commenced, near the Carpenter-street school house, the present week.

The committee beg leave to add, that those who have closely watched the Fire Department for the few past years, and, from their acquaintance with its condition, have been competent to judge of its prospects, could not have failed to perceive that the state which it was then in could not long continue, but that a change at no distant day must inevitably take place. It was evident that our city was fast outgrowing a Volunteer Department, and that though it might do for a city of twenty or thirty thousand inhabitants, it was not adapted to one of fifty thousand. While our citizens were reluctantly receiving these impressions, it was with no little anxiety that they watched for the moment when necessity would create the change, and not without fear that they waited for the consequences. When it should be done was of but little consequence in comparison to *how* it should be effected. The disbanding of the present Department without their sanction and sympathy, was regarded as a serious matter, and not to be attempted without careful deliberation, and as an act of real necessity. It was expected that another Department could not be formed without the aid of the present, and therefore any action taken in violence to their wishes would be fatal. But while these thoughts and fears were operating upon many, and even while your Honorable Body were considering the propriety of a change, the crisis unexpectedly came, but, as it proved, fortunately to the city, as it relieved her of the responsibility of disbanding the Fire Department, by the withdrawal of the members thereof. To organize a permanent volunteer Department was of course out of the question, and the Board of Engineers, acting by the authority given them by your Honorable Body, immediately improved the opportunity offered, by hiring men to work the engines. The arrangements then entered into have been continued; and, as it is contemplated to make them permanent, it seems proper that we should, in this report, give you such information regarding their practical operation, as may be in the possession of the Board. For so short a period as three months, which only have elapsed since the paid system was first entered into, it is of course impossible to form any extensive comparison between it and the volunteer system. Enough, however, has been seen of

it to satisfy the Board that, in many, if not in all respects, it is far the superior. All the advantages of a paid department are not revealed at a glance; and at first the comparison may, and undoubtedly does appear more favorable to the volunteer system than it actually is. This applies particularly to the comparative expense of the two systems. The casual observer, reasoning from partial facts, would say, that if we pay the Firemen, it must cost more than if their services were voluntary; and so far he would be correct; but when we take into consideration other facts, we find that the difference is much less than at first supposed. It is true that the amount paid from the City Treasury will be more than heretofore, and yet much less than the casual observer would expect. Many items, though separately small, when taken in the aggregate make no small sum, which have heretofore entered into the expense account, will either be entirely unknown, or very much diminished in amount. Among these may be mentioned refreshment and station money, both of which have been by no means inconsiderable amounts, but are now unknown. Also, gas and oil, fuel and wear and tear, all of which have been greatly lessened.

It is estimated in Boston, that each alarm of fire subjects the city to an expense of one hundred dollars. Should we take but half of this amount for our estimate, we should have then an important item to the credit of the paid system; for, be the cause what it may, it is none the less true, that, with a paid department, the number of fires and alarms has wonderfully decreased; and our history in this respect is but a repetition of the history of every city that has adopted a similar change. Thus for the quarter ending May 31, 1853, there were forty alarms of fire, while for the corresponding three months in 1854, there were but fourteen alarms. This reduction in the number of alarms has, if in no other way, been quite a saving in wear and tear. But the most important item to be considered, is the safety of property from fire. The amount of this saving, it is, of course, impossible to obtain, but it is obvious, as a rule, that if we can decrease the number of fires, the loss is also decreased. It is therefore fair to presume that, as the number of fires has decreased during the past quarter, the loss has proportionately decreased. Could this amount be ascertained, it might be found that so far from the expenses having increased, they may have been materially lessened; for it is a true saying, that "what is saved is so much gained," and it may be added, that what is gained to the citizen, is so much gain to the city. Therefore when a comparison is made between the volunteer system and the paid, (as it has ever proved itself,) by estimating the expense to the treasury, it is not reasoning upon correct principles.

Not intending to accuse the old department of inefficiency, yet it is due the new to say that, in the opinion of the Board, we never have had a more efficient department in every respect than the present. Contrary to the general expectation that paid Firemen would be inactive and uninterested, they have manifested from the first an activity and interest which has never been excelled. Conscious that the more prompt they are, the more activity they display, and the more diligently they work, the sooner will their labor end, they all appear to be actuated with the desire to be on hand

as early as possible, and to do what duty is required of them in an orderly and quiet manner.

The large number of applications for membership which have been made, has enabled the Board to select such as were well qualified. Many of them are old Firemen, who, from their experience in years past, have proved themselves a valuable acquisition to the present department.

The decorum manifested in going to and returning from fires, as well as while on duty, and also in and around the several Stations, has been the subject of favorable comment by the citizens. The Houses are but little frequented and no complaint against a paid Fireman has yet been made.

The number of false alarms heretofore has been large, while for the past three months the Department has not been called out, without a cause. At the time the change first went into operation, several attempts were made to create false alarms, but as their origin and motive were well known, they failed in their object.

In view of the facts herein mentioned, the Board congratulate the City on the change which has been effected. It must be gratifying to those who are interested in the City's welfare and progress, that a change, so important, one which it was evident must at no distant day take place, and one which, so desirable, has been made with so little difficulty; and that the new system is in such successful and satisfactory operation. Let us hope that it may thus continue, and that its beneficial effects, and its superiority over other systems, may command the respect and receive the support of all our citizens.
