Dear Mayor Doorley:

The Bureau of Licenses submits herewith a report of its activities for the year ending-December 31, 1967.

The Bureau has authorized the issuance of 9,763 licenses of various types.

It has held approximately 149 informal hearings.

The Bureau has attended pre-views of motion pictures, after regular hearings and on mornings, other than regular hearing days totalling 13 days; plus appearances at court on several occasions, encompassing time element from 2 hours to full sessions, both mornings and afternoons, in the interest of determining the obscenity of motion pictures.

In addition, the Bureau conducted 79 formal hearings, to which licensees were summoned by the Bureau for violations of various kinds-violations of the provisions of State Statutes, Ordinances of the City of Providence, or Rules and Regulations of the Bureau of Licenses. Many were continued from the original hearing date, due to incomplete records presented, etc.

At these formal hearings, witnesses were summoned-police and other interested parties. In approximately 50% of the violations that were heard, licensees were represented by Counsel. An assistant City Solicitor represented the Police Department. Witnesses were sworn, testimony was taken, both direct and by cross-examination, and subsequently the members of the Bureau, discussed in executive session all said cases, after which they announced their decision.

For various reasons, cases were continued from time to time at the request of counsel, illness of licensee or interested parties, but usually-and this is a strict rule of the Bureau, licensees and applicants for licenses who applications were not approved were given prompt hearings.



Superintendent

During the past fiscal year, September 30,1966-September 30, 1967 the following projects have been completed:

#### NEW REST ROOMS

New rest room facilities for the public have been installed in the Bird House, Elephant House, Contact Area vicinity. I am sure that these facilities will be very much appreciated as, in the past, I have received much criticism due to the fact that there had been no such facilities provided for the visitors in this area, especially those with children. I feel that the money invested in this facility was very well spent.

#### MOUNTAIN LIONS

In June we were very fortunate to receive a pair of Mountain Lions donated by Mr. and Mrs. William Mauran. The \$17,000. structure for this display was donated by the Rhode Island Zoological Society, and other donors.

Guided tours have been an added attraction this year. Tour Guides have been provided by the Junior League and are mainly for the benefit of children visiting the park in school groups.

#### GARDEN DISPLAYS

Through an anonymous donation the appropriate garden and landscaping surrounding the Betsy Williams Cottage is being installed.

#### GARDEN DISPLAYS (Continued)

A new garden display is being created at the Farragut Ave. area of the park; the old Nock Fountain, not in operating condition for some time, will be replaced. We hope this will eliminate the public continually driving through the flower beds surrounding the fountain.

#### PARK MUSEUM OF NATURAL HISTORY

Several major improvements at the museum have been made over the past year:

1. A new door at the front of the building has been installed with half-rounds of glass over the door and in all arches of Museum lobby.
2. A beautiful scale model of Stonehenge, the pre-historic astronomical observatory and computer.

A current project is the raising of \$1000. to purchase a large meteorite or shooting star from the American Museum in New York City. (This would be placed on a pedestal in Geology Hall where the public can see and touch it.)

The most urgent need is for new gutter pipes in the North Wing. The old ones are so perforated that the walls are soaked with rain and snow and the inside plaster is falling daily, this terrible condition is actually unsafe.

### OUTSIDE PARKS

Through a Recreation Bond Issue we have installed a new "Tot Park" play area in the Gladys Potter Memorial Gardens, at Homboldt Ave and Elton Street.

### LIPPITT PARK

#### HENRY B. ANTHONY FOUNTAIN

Funds from the initial building of the Henry B. Anthony Fountain in Lippitt Memorial Park at Blackstone Blvd. and Hope St. have enabled us to renovate and restore this fountain for use. When security lights are installed this project will then be completed.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE PARK MUSEUM

FOR THE YEAR ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 1967.

TO Mr. Ralph J. Hartman, Superintendent of Parks, City of Providence, R.I.

Dear Mr. Hartman:

I report herewith on the work of the Park Museum during the past fiscal year.

BUILDING.

The work of renovation of the Museum has gone steadily forward. This year all the glass in the Main Lobby was replaced and a beautiful new front door was constructed and installed.

We appreciate greatly the allotment of the sum of \$2900 to replace the leaking gutters and to repair the damaged walls of the North Wing.

An inspection of the building was made and it was estimated that if the sum of \$2500 per year were spent for the next ten years, that our building could be put into proper repair. It must be remembered that it was built in 1895-1896.

Our major concern is the masonry of the roof which is in serious condition.

EXHIBITS.

We are still working on the last major hall - that of large mammals. Mr. Tedeschi, our expert preparateur, is with us now only on part time but the Hall will be finished this year. Prof. Angelo Rosati of R.I. College with his graduate students will paint the background for us on week ends beginning next February. This will be done without cost as a class project.

MUSEUM ATTENDANCE.

Our attendance on Sundays and Holidays totalled 54,595. (The R.I. School of Design rarely has 600 on any Sunday.)



PLANETARIUM.

We continue to serve the schools of this community.

We give a different program each month from October thru May. This year we did an elaborate one on Stonehenge with films, transparencies, models, and with two to three speakers on each Sunday and Holiday. It attracted a very fine class of visitor. We hope to improve our Weather Show and to prepare a scientific explanatory lecture on U.F.O.s.

BUDGET.

Our budget for Planetarium speakers has never been increased from \$1000 per year granted us many years ago. I must now ask for an additional \$500 per year for extra speakers, for the maintainance, repair and improvement of our equipment. We have now given over 5000 showings and the instrument is worn and must be kept in very careful repair. We could not replace our instrument for less than \$20,000. It should be remembered that the installation was a gift, for which the City was at no expense.

INSURANCE.

As of this date the City pays for our Fine Arts Floater Policy covering loans to us from other institutions. This costs \$40.40 every three years.

Insurance on our Dome and Instrument and some auxiliary equipment has long been paid for by the Friends of the Park Museum. They now feel that this should be the responsibility of the City, as the installation belongs to it. At present the Friends pay \$74 each three years period for insufficient protection to all equipment.

We asked Starkweather and Shepley to study our insurance problem and make recommendations. These are:

Insurance on the dome \$3500 Cost \$30.78 for three years. Insurance on the instrument and all other astronomical equipment to its actual value of \$14,000... Cost \$210.00 for three years. These items total \$240.78 for three years or an annual cost of \$80.26.

As \$80.26 in any one year would not replace a single major item, we urgently request that the City assume this burden.

#### INSURANCE FOR THE ANNUAL SPACE SHOW IN NOVEMBER.

We request the sum of \$35.00 be placed in the budget to cover large exhibits which we can obtain from NASA, IF we have this coverage which protects us up to \$10,000. This can come under our fine arts floater policy mentioned above.

#### THE FUTURE OF OUR MUSEUM.

We have always been individualists in a highly corporate age. This has given us a unique opportunity to influence students and to assist them in entering scientific careers. Many consider the Museum their real alma mater.

Yet we are only a small institution with a miniscule staff. We are the only Science Museum in the State. With the population of Providence shrinking and with this its revenues, we must face the fact that if we are to grow and serve our City-State, we may one day have to become part

of an overall educational program which would include the City and State Education Departments and the State Colleges. Such a plan is in the blueprint stage. If it ever reaches fruition, vast Federal Funds might be available.

I have tried to secure grants for us as a small museum and have so far had no success. We must therefore be prepared to do whatever is best for our community.

STAFF.

I often wonder if the City authorities realize how much we must operate with a skeleton staff. As Director I must fill the shoes of the Director of the Museum; Director of the Planetarium; Head of Educational Work; Librarian; Information Service; Finder of Lost Children, etc.

Since Mr. Tedeschi left us as a full time employee, I have no trained scientific person on my staff. He is an expert bird and mammal man besides all his skills as a builder.

I have one secretary; 2 janitors; and 1 guard.

It is impossible to give some of the services offered when the Director had a staff of four girls, 2 teachers and 2 office workers, to help him.

We should be training younger people to carry on our work. This cannot be done on anything like our present budget.

CONCLUSION.

However, during my 42 years here, we have completely remodeled our exhibits; put our library in excellent order; added the planetarium; taught several hundred thousand students and have served the entire public in our field. This is a basis for future expansion.
