Be it ordained by the City of Providence:

Section 1. Section 1 of Chapter 1979-31 of the Ordinances of the City of Providence approved June 22, 1979 as amended, is hereby further amended as follows:

An Ordinance Amending the Appropriation Ordinance Chapter 1979-30, Approved June 22, 1979, by Appropriating a Sum Not to Exceed Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000.00) for the City of Providence Law Department, Special Items 3, for Claims Against the City of Providence.

Be it ordained by the City of Providence:

Section 1. Chapter 1979-30 of the Ordinances of the City of Providence, as approved June 22, 1979 and entitled: "An Ordinance Making Appropriation of \$117,978,739.44 for the Support of the City Government for the Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 1980, as Amended", is hereby further amended by appropriating the sum of Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000.00) for the City of Providence Law Department Claims — Special Items 3, for Claims against the City of Providence.

Sec. 2. The said sum of Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000.00) as thus added and appropriated shall be obtained by authorizing and directing the City Controller and the City Treasurer to transfer a like sum from Anticipated Revenues of the current fiscal year ending June 30, 1980.

Sec. 3. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Whereas, Annual celebrations continued through the early part of the twentieth century, and

Whereas, In an attempt to revive this noble tradition, the Irish Council of Rhode Island and the City of Providence have scheduled a Saint Patrick's Day Parade in Providence on Saturday, March 15, 1980,

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, That the City Council extends to all who find ancestral or spiritual roots in that "Land of saints and scholars" an invitation to participate in the Saint Patrick's Day Parade of 1980.
