ORDINANCES SECOND READING

The following Ordinances were in City Council September 6, 1984, Read and Passed the First Time and are returned for Passage the Second Time:

An Ordinance Adopting the Official Capital Improvement Program 1984-89.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Be it ordained by the City of Providence:

Section 1. The plan attached hereto shall constitute the official Capital Improvement Program for the years 1984-1989 which official copy shall be maintained and safeguarded in the Department of the City Clerk. No amendments or additions to said plan shall be approved or undertaken without the express review and approval, by Ordinance, of the City Council. No funds shall be expended nor any commitments to expend funds given for Capital Improvements unless they are a part of the Official Plan as approved.

An Ordinance in Amendment of Sections 21-27, 21-28 and 21-29 of Article II of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Providence entitled: "Contracts, Purchases and Sales."

Be it ordained by the City of Providence:

Section 1. Sections 21-27, 21-28 and 21-29 of Article II of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Providence entitled: "Article II. Contracts, Pur-

chases and Sales" are hereby amended to read in their entireties as follows:

Sec. 21-27 (Competitive Bidding). All contracts for purchase of materials, supplies, services, equipment and property on behalf of the city, the price of consideration of which shall exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00) but amount to less than two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) shall be made by the director of public property on the basis of three (3) or more informal competitive bids, which may be solicited without advertising, but which must be submitted in writing. Upon receipt of said informal bids any such contract shall be awarded to the lowest responsible bidder among them. All such contracts made on behalf of the city, the price or consideration of which shall exceed two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) shall be made by the board of contract and supply on the basis of sealed bids solicited through public advertisement in a newspaper of general circulation in Providence and in such other newspapers published outside the city as said board in its discretion may determine, such bids to be submitted, opened and considered in accordance with rules and regulations approved by the board. All purchases made on behalf of the city, the price or consideration of which shall be five hundred dollars (\$500.00) or less, shall be made by the department or agency requiring the materials, supplies, services, equipment or property involved, in accordance with rules and regulations established by the director of public property.

Sec. 21-28 (Division of Purchase Orders). No purchase request which is essentially a unit shall be divided for the purpose of evading the requirement of solicitation of competitive bids set forth in Sec. 21-27 of Article II hereof.

Sec. 21-29 (Emergencies). Said requirements for competitive bidding set forth in Sec. 21-27 of Article II hereof may be dispensed with to allow emergency purchases upon the recommendation of the director of public property with the approval of a majority of all the members of the board of contract and supply. Emergency shall be

defined for the purposes of Sec. 21-27 of Article II hereof as an unforeseen situation, requiring immediate attention in order to safeguard the welfare of the people of the city, and one which renders the process of competitive bidding impractical or impossible.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.
