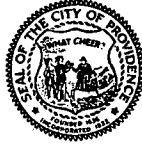

COUNCILMAN GLAVIN moves that His Honor Mayor Vincent A. Cianci, Jr., be invited to the City Council Chamber to explain to the people why a tax increase is needed and that the Council be in Recess.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT FARGNOLI requests an opinion of the Deputy City Solicitor.

DEPUTY CITY SOLICITOR ROTONDI states that under the auspices of a Special Meeting should be the special business for which the meeting is called. The first order of business under Rule 4 of the Rules of the City Council, is the Ordinance for the Assessment and Collection of Supplemental Taxes. That is the purpose and the reason this meeting was called and what the City Council must proceed on.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT FARGNOLI rules the Motion to Recess, Out of Order.

The Motion to Sustain the Ruling of the Chair is Put to Vote and Not Sustained.

RECESS

COUNCIL PRESIDENT FARGNOLI thereupon declares the City Council be in Recess at 11:05 o'clock P.M.

RECONVENTION

The City Council Reconvenes at 11:30 o'clock P.M. at which time Mayor Vincent A. Cianci, Jr. joins the Members of the City Council and addresses the people present.

Upon the departure of Mayor Vincent A. Cianci, Jr. at 12:00 o'clock Midnight, COUNCIL PRESIDENT FARGNOLI directs the Clerk to Call the Roll to ascertain if there is a quorum present.

Accordingly, the Roll is called for Passage of the Ordinance the Second Time; as follows:

An Ordinance Authorizing the Assessment and Collection of a Supplemental 1980 Tax in a Sum Not Less Than Fourteen Million, Three Hundred Ninety-Nine Thousand, Six Hundred Ninety-Six Dollars (\$14,399,696.00) and Not More Than Sixteen Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$16,500,000.00) Being Based on One Hundred Percent (100%) of the 1980-1981 Fiscal Year Tax Collection.

Be It Ordained by the City of Providence:

Section 1. The City of Providence is authorized to assess and collect a supplemental 1980 tax in a sum not less than Fourteen Million, Three Hundred Ninety-Nine Thousand, Six Hundred Ninety-Six Dollars (\$14,399,696.00) and not more than Sixteen Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$16,500,000.00) being based on One Hundred Percent (100%) of the 1980-1981 Fiscal Year Tax Collection.

Sec. 2. The City Council of the City of Providence hereby orders the assessment and collection of a supplemental tax on the ratable real estate and tangible personal property, as well as orders the assessment and collection of an excise tax on all registered motor vehicles and trailers in a sum not less than Fourteen Million, Three Hundred Ninety-Nine Thousand, Six Hundred Ninety-Six Dollars, (\$14,399,696.00) and not more than Sixteen Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$16,500,000.00) being based on One Hundred Percent (100%) of the 1980-1981 Fiscal Year Tax Supplemental Collection, as amended; said tax is for ordinary expense charges for the payment of interest and indebtedness in whole or in part of said City and for other purposes authorized by Law.

Sec. 3. The City Assessor shall assess and apportion said tax on inhabitants and ratable real estate and tangible personal property of said City as of the 31st Day of December A.D., 1979 at midnight, Eastern Standard Time, as well as assess and apportion said excise tax on the owners of registered motor vehicles and trailers

in the City of Providence during the calendar year 1979, according to law, and shall on completion of said assessment, date and sign the same, and shall make out and certify to the City Collector of the City of Providence, on or before the 1st day of May, A.D., 1981, a complete list containing (1) the names of persons taxed and the total value of all the real estate taxed to each person; (2) the amount of personal estate except manufacturers' machinery and equipment assessed against each person; (3) the amount of the motor vehicle excise assessment against each person, and (4) the total amount of tax assessed against each person on said real estate, personal estate and motor vehicles opposite the name of the person or persons assessed.

The assessment of real estate and personal estate shall appear in separate columns in said list. The assessment of motor vehicles shall appear on a separate list.

Said taxes shall be due and payable on and between the first day of May, A.D., 1981 next and the first day of April, A.D., 1982 next and all taxes remaining unpaid on said last named day shall carry until collected, a penalty at the rate of twelve percent (12%) per annum upon such unpaid real estate and personal estate taxes, except that a penalty at the rate of eight percentum per annum upon such unpaid excise taxes shall be levied.

Provided, however said taxes may be paid in five installments the first installment of fifty (50) percentum on and between the first day of May, A.D., 1981, and the thirty-first day of May, A.D., 1981, next and the remaining installments as follows: 12.5%; the second installment of 12.5 percentum, on and between the first day of July, A.D., 1981 next and the thirty-first day of July, A.D., 1981, next; the third installment of 12.5 percentum on and between the first day of October, A.D., 1981 next and the thirty-first day of October, A.D., 1981; next; the fourth installment of 12.5 percentum on and between the first day of January, A.D. 1982 and the thirty-first day

of January, A.D., 1982, next; the fifth installment of 12.5 percentum on and between the first day of April, A.D., 1982, and the thirtieth day of April, A.D., 1982, next. Each installment of taxes if paid on or before the last day of each installment period successively and in order shall be free from any charges for interest.

If the first installment or any succeeding installment of taxes, is not paid by the last day of the respective installment period or periods as they occur, then the whole tax or remaining unpaid balance of the tax, as the case may be, shall immediately become due and payable and shall carry, until collected, a penalty at the rate of twelve percentum per annum on said real estate and personal estate, and the penalty at the rate of eight (8) percentum per annum on said motor vehicle.

The City Collector, shall have advertisement in a Public Newspaper of the City, notify all persons assessed to pay their respective taxes at his office on and between the said first day of May, A.D., 1981 and the first day of April, A.D., 1982, inclusive; said Collector shall attend daily during said periods Saturdays, Sundays, and Holidays excepted, at his office from Eight-Thirty o'clock A.M. to Four-Thirty o'clock P.M. to receive taxes.

Sec. 4. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its Passage.

Section 1. To defray the expenses of the City of Providence for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1981, the sums of money or so much thereof, as are authorized by law, indicated in the accompanying schedule, are hereby appropriated for the objects and purposes, and in amounts expressed therein provided that payments thereunder shall be subject to the provisions of the Charter of the City of Providence, Chapter 832 of the Public Laws of 1940, enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Rhode Island at its January Session, A.D., 1940 and approved April 26, 1940, as amended, and subject to the provisions of the City Ordinances relative to the expenditures of money from the City Treasury. Title I Revenue Sharing, Fiscal Assistance to State and Local Government rules and regulations shall govern the portion of this Budget so designated.

Sec. 2. All moneys appropriated are to be expended under the direction of the respective Department Heads unless otherwise provided subject to the approval of the Director of Finance. All moneys specifically earmarked with Federal Revenue Sharing Funds shall be so provided unless amended. Any unused Federal Revenue Sharing moneys not appropriated or not used shall not revert to surplus; but shall be reappropriated in the following fiscal year.

Sec. 3. The payments to the School Fund of the following estimated receipts included in the appropriation of \$52,277,485.00 for the support of the Public Schools for the City of Providence fiscal period 1980-1981, will be increased or decreased to conform with the actual amounts received from such sources during the City of Providence fiscal year 1980-1981.

Sec. 4. The Department of Recreation and Public Property are hereby abolished in accordance with Public Laws 1963-104. All money appropriated in this ordinance and unspent on April 1, 1981, shall be transferred on that date to the Departments of Public Parks and Public Works on a pro-rata basis to be determined by the Finance Director in accordance with the Classification Ordinance, but the total sum appropriated shall not be changed.

Sec. 5. PROVIDENCE REVIEW COMMISSION.

Section 28-1. *Intention of City Council.* It is the intention of the City Council and it is hereby ordained that the provisions of this ordinance shall become and be made part of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Providence, Rhode Island, and the sections of this ordinance may be renumbered to indicate such intention.

Section 28-2. *Declaration of Policy.* The City Council finds that it is in the interest of the residents of the City of Providence (hereinafter sometimes called the "City," "City of Providence" or "Providence") to establish the Providence Review Commission to help:

(a) To ensure the fiscal solvency of the City of Providence through the improvement of local financial management and the avoidance of financial obligations that exceed the capacity of the City;

(b) To correct existing and potential operating fund revenue/expenditure imbalances;

(c) To eliminate a consistent pattern of

current expenditures exceeding current revenues with resulting accumulated operating deficits;

(d) To ensure that the lack of effective management and spending controls of Providence does not severely affect the opportunity and the cost of borrowing by other Rhode Island cities and towns and the State of Rhode Island;

(e) To investigate, review and recommend correction of deficiencies in said City's fiscal management; and

(f) To develop a financial plan for said City.

Section 28-3. *Creation of Providence Review Commission.*

(a) The City Council hereby creates the Providence Review Commission (hereinafter referred to as the "Commission") for the purpose of monitoring and overseeing the management of the financial affairs of the City of Providence as it pertains to general municipal and school department operations.

(b) The Commission shall be composed of eleven members having the qualifications and/or offices set forth below and selected in the following manner: six members to be selected by the Providence City Council on the recommendation of the Finance Committee of the Providence City Council; one member to be selected by the Governor of the State of Rhode Island; one member to be selected by the Speaker of the Rhode Island House of Representatives; one member to be selected by the Majority Leader of the Rhode Island Senate and the Auditor General of the State of Rhode Island, ex officio. Each member of the Commission shall be a qualified elector and resident of the City of Providence and/or shall be employed by or be practising his or her business, occupation or profession in or out of an office located within the City of Providence; provided, however, that at least six members of the Commission shall be qualified electors and residents of the City of Providence. In addition, at

least one member of the Commission shall be a practising attorney, at least one member of the Commission shall be an independent certified public accountant, at least one member shall be engaged in business, banking or finance, at least one member shall be a member of a labor union, at least one member shall have experience in the study of or a profession related to governmental finance and at least one member shall be a representative of the general public in the City of Providence. None of the members of the Commission shall have any contractual arrangement other than as a member of the Commission with the City of Providence or any of its departments which provides for compensation or economic benefit to such person during his or her term on the Commission. The members of the Commission shall be selected within thirty (30) days after the effective date of this ordinance and in the event of the failure of any member to be selected within such period, the Commission shall commence operations on the thirtieth (30th) day after said effective date without such member until his or her selection.

(c) Each member of the Commission other than the Auditor General shall serve on the Commission for a term which shall end with the expiration of the term of office of the City Council which appointed certain of the members and until their respective successors are appointed and qualified.

(d) The Chairperson of the Commission shall be selected by the Commission from its membership, and the Commission shall adopt by-laws and rules of procedure consistent with this Chapter 28 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Providence governing its operations.

Section 28-4. Authority of the Commission. The Commission is hereby authorized and empowered to take any of the following actions with respect to the City of Providence:

1. To make an analysis of all factors and circumstances contributing to the financial

condition of the City of Providence and to recommend steps to be taken to correct any such conditions;

2. To propose limits on the total amount of City appropriations for any fiscal year, to monitor and review expenditures, to develop a financial plan for the City covering at any time the City's current and next two fiscal years and setting forth requirements to achieve balanced budgets and cash flow sufficient to meet the City's obligations in a timely manner for each such fiscal year and to evaluate all contracts, obligations, receipts and expenditures of the City in terms of their impact on and compliance with such plan;

3. To verify the estimates of revenues to fund any fiscal year operating budgets of the City of Providence and to monitor the receipt and collection of those revenues;

4. To require and prescribe the form of special reports to be made by the City of Providence Finance Director, Internal Auditor, City Collector, City Controller and any department directors or other officers or employees of the City to keep the Commission continually informed of the financial affairs of the City;

5. To issue a fiscal note before the City Council and/or Mayor can take any action regarding the approval of any ordinance, contract, encumbrance or transfer of property, loan, creation or elimination of any positions other than elected ones, and the filling of vacancies in a permanent position by the appropriating authority. The Department of Community Affairs may be requested to prepare the fiscal notes for the Commission;

6. The Commission shall investigate any and all matters relating to (i) any proposed or actual bidding or purchasing procedure or transaction and any appropriation, encumbrance or expenditure of City funds and of State or Federal funds received or receivable by the City; (ii) any

proposed or actual investment, loan or borrowing by the City or any of its departments or agencies; (iii) any City accounts or methods of administration; (iv) any proposed or actual decision or action involving hiring, firing or retention of any person by the City; (v) any proposed or actual contract, written or verbal, by and between any third party and any City department, agency, officer or employee, and (vi) any action arising out of or in connection with a collective bargaining agreement between any union and the City or any of its departments. In addition to and not in limitation of the foregoing, whenever any payroll, bill or other claim against the City is presented to the Finance Director, City Treasurer or City Controller or if the Finance Committee of the Providence City Council learns of any such item, and if any such item seems of doubtful validity, excessive in amount or otherwise contrary to any applicable law or ordinance or contrary to the City's interest, any such City officer of said Committee, as the case may be, shall refer such item to the Commission, which shall immediately investigate the facts surrounding same and report the results of its investigation to the party referring same to the Commission and to said Committee. Until completion of said report, payment of such item shall be withheld.

7. The Commission shall coordinate its activities with any management, reorganization or efficiency studies of all or any portion of the City's operations which may be conducted at the request of or under the sponsorship of the Mayor, Finance Committee of the City Council, the City Council or the Finance Director. In the event that the Mayor, the City Council, the Finance Committee of the City Council or any City department director proposes or requests a reorganization of any City department or operation or an efficiency, cost-saving or management study of any City operations within its, his or her jurisdiction, the Commission shall assist in carrying out such study and shall report its evaluation of the proposed reorganization or management efficiency or cost-savings measures. Furthermore, in the event that a management

study of City operations is not commenced by July 1, 1981 the Commission shall sponsor, organize and complete as expeditiously as possible such a study.

8. The Commission shall approve, disapprove or approve with amendments any contract, purchase or other transaction which requires the approval of the City Board of Contract and Supply prior to action thereon by the City Board of Contract and Supply.

Section 28-5. Cooperation. All departments, employees, agencies and elected and appointed officers of the City of Providence shall be required to cooperate with the Commission. The Commission shall have access to all records and books of account of the City and may require the attendance of witnesses and the production of books, papers, contracts and other documents relating to any matter within its authority. The Commission may issue subpoenas which shall be signed by the Chairperson of the Commission or, in his or her absence, by any other officer of the Commission. In the alternative, if the Commission requests the Finance Committee of the City Council to conduct an investigation of any matter within the Commission's authority or within Section 2.6 of the Providence Charter Act of 1940 (P.L. 1940, c. 832, §147, as amended), the City Council shall authorize the Finance Committee to conduct such investigation and the Finance Committee shall conduct such investigation and exercise the powers granted to the City Council and said Finance Committee by Section 2.7 of said Providence Charter Act of 1940 in accordance with the Commission's requests from time to time.

Section 28-6. Operation of the Commission. The members of the Commission shall receive no salary, but may receive such, as may be appropriated by the City Council, per diem allowance and shall be reimbursed for their ordinary and necessary expenses incurred in carrying out their duties as members of the Commission, provided such members are not, at

the time such expenses are incurred, public employees otherwise entitled to such reimbursement. Such reimbursement shall also be subject to the Commission's rules and City payment and fiscal procedures. The Commission is authorized to employ such consultants, experts, legal counsel and other persons and to incur such other expenses as the Commission may deem necessary and such expenses shall be paid by the City from its general revenues in an aggregate amount not exceeding \$50,000, exclusive of costs relating to the operations of the Internal Auditor, in any City fiscal year or such additional amount as may be appropriated for the Commission by the City's appropriation ordinance. The appropriation ordinance for each fiscal year shall include such amount, up to \$50,000 as may be requested by the Commission and such additional amount, if any, as may be appropriated for the Commission by the City appropriation ordinance. The Finance Director, City Controller, City Treasurer, Finance Department Personnel and the Internal Auditor shall assist the Commission in carrying out its responsibilities by providing all services and facilities requested by the Commission; provided, however, that provision of said services and facilities by said City officials and department shall be subject to their performance of their other duties as set forth in said Providence Charter Act of 1940.

Section 28-7. Reports by the Commission. The Commission shall make a semi-annual report to the General Assembly, Governor, City Council, City Finance Director and Mayor on or before each January 31 and July 31 of each year regarding its findings and recommendations for the six-month period ending 31 days before each such date as well as actions taken by the City.

Section 28-8. Prior Approval of Certain Contracts, etc. Any contract, purchase or other transaction which must be approved, accepted, awarded or acted upon by the City Board of Contract and Supply under the Providence Charter Act of 1940 shall not be approved, accepted, awarded or acted upon by the City Board

of Contract and Supply unless and until the Commission shall have approved or approved with amendments such contract, purchase or other transaction and then may be approved, accepted or awarded by the City Board of Contract and Supply only in accordance with the Commission's approval or approval with amendments.

Sec. 28-9. Cessation of Providence Review Commission. The Commission shall cease to exist when the City has had operating surpluses for two consecutive fiscal years and on the thirtieth (30th) day after receipt by the City Council and the Commission of a certified annual audit report of the City prepared by the City's independent certified public accountants which establishes the second such consecutive operating surplus.

Section 28-10. Prohibitions; Penalties, Disciplinary Action, etc. Any City employee, officer or elected official who willfully violates or fails to comply with any order of the Commission which is within the Commission's authority and any City employee, officer or elected official who willfully prepares, presents or certifies any document, instrument, agreement or information, including without limitation any projections or estimates of revenue or expenditure requested or subpoenaed by the Commission or any agent or employee of the Commission, knowing the same to be false or misleading or knowing that same omits to state a material fact or if any such person, upon learning that any such document, instrument, agreement or information is false, misleading or omits to state a material fact, fails promptly to advise the Commission thereof, shall be deemed to be in violation of this ordinance and such violation shall be grounds for dismissal or suspension from duty without pay by the proper officer or elected official of the City and shall be guilty of a violation of this ordinance and punishable by a fine of up to \$200 for each such offense.

Section 28-11. Severability. If for any reason any provision of this Chapter 28 of the Code of

Ordinances of the City of Providence shall hereafter be declared unconstitutional or unenforceable by any court of proper jurisdiction, all other provisions of this chapter shall remain in full force and effect.

Sec. 6. This Ordinance shall become effective upon the last to occur of passage of this Ordinance and its approval by the Mayor and passage and approval by the Mayor of the Compensation and Classification Ordinances introduced in the City Council concurrently with this Ordinance.

Sec. 65. *Personnel Control Procedure.* All personnel transactions in the City of Providence regarding the hiring, reinstatement, transfer, and/or adjustments in compensation and benefits shall be carried out in accordance with the following procedures:

1. Department Heads may submit requests only to the Director of Finance along with written justification.

2. The Director of Finance shall certify whether or not:

- a. Funds are included in the budget;
- b. The position is authorized.

3. If funds are not available and/or the position is not authorized, the Director of Finance shall *automatically* reject the requested personnel change unless an emergency exists as to the filling of the position and the Mayor so certifies in writing to the Director of Finance.

4. The Director of Finance shall also recommend rejection of any requests for hiring, reinstatement, transfer, etc., if in his opinion such requests are not justified in view of the City's current financial emergency.

5. The Director of Finance shall make such recommendations directly to the Mayor, who

shall either personally approve or reject (in writing) the recommendations of the Finance Director consistent with the Mayor's Executive Order of February 6, 1981.

6. Concurrently with the making of any certification under paragraph (3), above, and concurrently with any approval or rejection under paragraph (5), above, the Mayor shall cause a true copy of any such certification, approval or rejection to be properly forwarded to the Chairperson of the Finance Committee of the Providence City Council and to the Providence Fiscal Commission.

Sec. 66. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage, except that any positions abolished by adoption of this ordinance shall not take effect unless there is compliance with the State Labor Relations Act and/or any valid collective bargaining agreement between the City of Providence and Laborers International Union on behalf of Public Employees Local Union 1033.

Be It Ordained By The City Of Providence:

Section 1. The City Treasurer, with the

approval and direction of the Mayor and the Committee on Finance, is authorized to issue notes of the City of Providence in anticipation of Taxes under General Law Section 45-12-4 at one time or from time to time during the 1980-1981 fiscal year, to an amount which shall not exceed

in the aggregate the limits set forth in said Section or in Section 26 of Chapter 1665 of the Public Laws of 1945.

Sec. 2. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its Passage.

An Ordinance in Amendment of and in Addition to Section 2, Chapter 2 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Providence, entitled, "Administration".

Be It Ordained By The City of Providence:

Section 1. Chapter 2 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Providence entitled, "Administration" is hereby amended by adding thereto Section 2-42, as follows:

Section 2-42. CITY COUNCIL INTERNAL AUDITOR.

The City Council by a majority of all its members shall appoint a City Internal Auditor who shall be a certified public accountant who shall have a minimum of five years experience in finance, operational auditing or equivalent training or experience. The City Internal Auditor shall have access to the books and records of all offices, departments and other agencies of the City, and it shall be the duty of all officers and employees thereof to supply such information and documents concerning the affairs of the City as the Internal Auditor may request.

(A) Powers and Duties of the Internal Auditor.

The powers and duties of the Internal Auditor shall be without limitation, the following:

(1) To perform audits of all offices, departments and other agencies of the City, and additional audits as directed by the Committee on Finance of the City Council or by resolution of the City Council or Providence Review Board.

(2) To report the findings of such audits to the City Council at least quarterly;

(3) To issue a report to the City Council at least annually of all operations of the City;

(4) To submit such reports and financial data, information and statements to the City Council as it may from time to time require;

(5) To perform such other duties as may be assigned by ordinance and perform other auditing services of an official nature as may be required by the City Council.

(B) Scope of Audits.

Audits shall include, but shall not be limited to determining:

(1) Whether financial operations are properly conducted in accordance with standards for governmental accounting and generally accepted accounting controls;

(2) Whether the audited entity is operating within its budgetary limits;

(3) Whether the audited entity is in compliance with the State constitution, this Charter, City ordinances, and all other applicable laws and regulations;

(4) Whether the audited entity is managing and utilizing its resources in an economical and efficient manner;

(5) Whether the management information system, administrative procedures and organizational structure are adequate to insure the timeliness and reliability of management information;

(6) Whether the property of the City is properly accounted for and safeguarded from losses;

(7) Whether the objectives or benefits of the audited entity are being achieved.

Sec. 3. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

An Ordinance to Provide for the Providence Review Commission.

Be It Ordained By The City of Providence:

That the Code of Ordinances of the City of Providence, Rhode Island, is hereby amended by adding a chapter to be numbered Chapter 28, which reads as follows:

CHAPTER 28

PROVIDENCE REVIEW COMMISSION

Section 28-1. Intention of City Council. It is the intention of the City Council and it is hereby ordained that the provisions of this ordinance shall become and be made part of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Providence, Rhode Island, and the sections of this ordinance may be renumbered to indicate such intention.

Section 28-2. Declaration of Policy. The City Council finds that it is in the interest of the residents of the City of Providence (hereinafter sometimes called the "City," "City of Providence" or "Providence") to establish the Providence Review Commission to help:

(a) To ensure the fiscal solvency of the City of Providence through the improvement of local financial management and the avoidance of financial obligations that exceed the capacity of the City;

(b) To correct existing and potential operating fund revenue/expenditure imbalances;

(c) To eliminate a consistent pattern of current expenditures exceeding current revenues with resulting accumulated operating deficits;

(d) To ensure that the lack of effective management and spending controls of Providence does not severely affect the opportunity and the cost of borrowing by other Rhode Island cities and towns and the State of Rhode Island;

(e) To investigate, review and recommend correction of deficiencies in said City's fiscal management; and

(f) To develop a financial plan for said City.

Section 28-3. Creation of Providence Review Commission.

(a) The City Council hereby creates the Providence Review Commission (hereinafter referred to as the "Commission") for the purpose of monitoring and overseeing the management of the financial affairs of the City of Providence as it pertains to general municipal and school department operations.

(b) The Commission shall be composed of eleven members having qualifications and/or offices set forth below and selected in the following manner: six members to be selected by the Providence City Council on the recommendation of the Finance Committee of Providence City Council; one member to be selected by the Mayor of the City of Providence; one member to be selected by the Governor of the State of Rhode Island; one member to be selected by the Speaker of the Rhode Island House of Representatives; one member to be selected by the Majority Leader of the Rhode Island Senate and the Auditor General of the State of Rhode Island, ex officio. Each member of the Commission shall be a qualified elector and resident of the City of Providence and/or shall be employed by or be practising, his or her business, occupation or profession in or out of an office located within the City of Providence; provided, however, that at least six members of the Commission shall be qualified electors and residents of the City of Providence. In addition, at least one member of the Commission shall be a practising attorney, at least one member of the Commission shall be an independent certified public accountant, at least one member shall be engaged in business, banking or finance, at least one member shall be a member of a labor union, at least one member shall have experience in the study of or a

profession related to governmental finance and at least one member shall be a representative of the general public in the City of Providence. None of the members of the Commission shall have any contractual arrangement other than as a member of the Commission with the City of Providence or any of its departments which provides for compensation or economic benefit to such person during his or her term on the Commission. The members of the Commission shall be selected within thirty (30) days after the effective date of this ordinance and in the event of the failure of any member to be selected within such period, the Commission shall commence operations on the thirtieth (30th) day after said effective date without such member until his or her selection.

(c) Each member of the Commission other than the Auditor General shall serve on the Commission for a term which shall end with the expiration of the term of office of the City Council which appointed certain of the members and until their respective successors are appointed and qualified.

(d) The Chairperson of the Commission shall be selected by the Commission from its membership, and the Commission shall adopt by-laws and rules of procedure consistent with this chapter 28 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Providence governing its operations.

Section 28-4. Authority of the Commission. The Commission is hereby authorized and empowered to take any of the following actions with respect to the City of Providence:

1. To make an analysis of all factors and circumstances contributing to the financial condition of the City of Providence and to recommend steps to be taken to correct any such conditions;

2. To propose limits on the total amount of City appropriations for any fiscal year, to monitor and review expenditures, to develop a

financial plan for the City covering at any time the City's current and next two fiscal years setting forth requirements to achieve balanced budgets and cash flow sufficient to meet the City's obligations in a timely manner for each such fiscal year and to evaluate all contracts, obligations, receipts and expenditures of the City in terms of their impact on and compliance with such plan;

3. To verify the estimates of revenues to fund any fiscal year operating budgets of the City of Providence and to monitor the receipt and collection of those revenues;

4. To require and prescribe the form of special reports to be made by the City of Providence Finance Director, Internal Auditor, City Collector, City Controller and any department directors or other officers or employees of the City to keep the Commission continually informed of the financial affairs of the City;

5. To issue a fiscal note before the City Council and/or Mayor can take any action regarding the approval of any ordinance, contract, encumbrance or transfer of property, loan, creation or elimination of any positions other than elected ones, and the filling of vacancies in a permanent position by the appropriating authority. The Department of Community Affairs may be requested to prepare the fiscal notes for the Commission;

6. The Commission shall investigate any and all matters relating to (i) any proposed or actual bidding or purchasing procedure or transaction and any appropriation, encumbrance or expenditure of City funds and of State or federal funds received or receivable by the City; (ii) any proposed or actual investment, loan or borrowing by the City or any of its departments or agencies; (iii) and City accounts or methods of administration; (iv) any proposed or actual decision or action involving hiring, firing or retention of any person by the City; (v) and proposed or actual contract, written or verbal, by and between any third party

and any City department, agency, officer or employee; and (vi) any action arising out of or in connection with a collective bargaining agreement between any union and the City or any of its departments.

In addition to and not in limitation of the foregoing, whenever any payroll, bill or other claim against the City is presented to the Finance Director, City Treasurer or City Controller or if the Finance Committee of the Providence City Council learns of any such item, and if any such item seems of doubtful validity, excessive in amount or otherwise contrary to any applicable law or ordinance or contrary to the City's interest, any such City officer of said Committee, as the case may be, shall refer such item to the Commission, which shall immediately investigate the facts surrounding same and report the results of its investigation to the party referring same to the Commission and to said Committee. Until completion of said report, payment of such item shall be withheld.

7. The Commission shall coordinate its activities with any management, reorganization or efficiency studies of all or any portion of the City's operations which may be conducted at the request of or under the sponsorship of the Mayor, Finance Committee of the City Council, the City Council or the Finance Director. In the event that the mayor, the City Council, the Finance Committee of the City Council or any City department director proposes or requests a reorganization of any City department or operation or any efficiency, cost-saving or management study of any City operations within its, his or her jurisdiction, the Commission shall assist in carrying out such study and shall report its evaluation of the proposed reorganization or management efficiency or cost-savings measures. Furthermore, in the event that a management study of City operations is not commenced by July 1, 1981 the Commission shall sponsor, organize and complete as expeditiously as possible such a study.

8. The Commission shall approve, disapprove or approve with amendments any contract, purchase or other transaction which requires the approval of the City Board of Contract and Supply prior to action thereon by the City Board of Contract and Supply.

Section 28-5. Cooperation. All departments, employees, agencies and elected and appointed officers of the City of Providence shall be required to cooperate with the Commission. The Commission shall have access to all records and books of account of the City and may require the attendance of witnesses and the production of books, papers, contracts and other documents relating to any matter within its authority. The Commission may issue subpoenas which shall be signed by the Chairperson of the Commission or, in his or her absence, by any other officer of the Commission. In the alternative, if the Commission requests the Finance Committee of the City Council to conduct an investigation of any matter within the Commission's authority or within Section 2.6 of the Providence Charter Act of 1940 (P.L. 1940, c. 832, §147, as amended), the City Council shall authorize the Finance Committee to conduct such investigation and the Finance Committee shall conduct such investigation and exercise powers granted to the City Council and said Finance Committee by Section 2.7 of said Providence Charter Act of 1940 in accordance with the Commission's request from time to time.

Section 28.6 Operation of the Commission. The members of the Commission shall receive no salary, but may receive such, as may appropriated by the City Council, per diem allowance and shall be reimbursed for their ordinary and necessary expenses incurred, in carrying out their duties as members of the Commission, provided such members are not, at the time such expenses are incurred, public employees otherwise entitled to such reimbursement. Such reimbursement shall also be subject to the Commission's rules and City payment and fiscal procedures. The Commission is authorized to employ such consultants, experts, legal counsel and other persons and to incur such other

expenses as the Commission may deem necessary and such expenses shall be paid by the City from its general revenues in an aggregate amount not exceeding \$50,000, exclusive of costs relating to the operations of the Internal Auditor, in any City fiscal year or such additional amount as may be appropriated for the Commission by the City's appropriation ordinance. The appropriation ordinance for each fiscal year shall include such amount, up to \$50,000, as may be requested by the Commission and such additional amount, if any, as may be appropriated for the Commission by the City appropriation ordinance. The Finance Director, City Controller, City Treasurer, Finance Department personnel and the Internal Auditor shall assist the Commission in carrying out its responsibilities by providing all services and facilities requested by the Commission; provided, however, that provision of said services and facilities by said City officials and department shall be subject to their performance of their other duties as set forth in said Providence Charter Act of 1940.

Section 28-7. Reports by the Commission. The Commission shall make a semi-annual report to the General Assembly, Governor, City Council, City Finance Director and Mayor on or before each January 31 and July 31 of each year regarding its findings and recommendations for the six-month period ending 31 days before each such date as well as actions taken by the City.

Section 28-8. Prior Approval of Certain Contracts, etc. Any contract, purchase or other transaction which must be approved, accepted, awarded or acted upon by the City Board of Contract and Supply under the Providence Charter Act of 1940 shall not be approved, accepted, awarded or acted upon by the City Board of Contract and Supply unless and until the Commission shall have approved or approved with amendments such contract, purchase or other transaction and then may be approved, accepted or awarded by the City Board of Contract and Supply only in accordance with the Commission's approval or approval with amendments.

Section 28-9. Cessation of Providence Review Commission. The Commission shall cease to exist when the City has had operating surpluses for two consecutive fiscal years and on the thirtieth (30th) day after receipt by the City Council and the Commission of a certified annual audit report of the City prepared by the City's independent certified public accountants which establishes the second such consecutive operating surplus.

Section 28-10. Prohibitions; Penalties, Disciplinary Action, etc. Any City Employee, officer or elected official who willfully violates or fails to comply with any order of the Commission which is within the Commission's authority and any City employee, officer or elected official who willfully prepares, presents or certifies any document, instrument, agreement or information, including without limitation any projections or estimates of revenue or expenditure requested or subpoenaed by the Commission or any agent or employee of the Commission, knowing the same to be false or misleading or knowing that same omits to state a material fact or if any such person, upon learning that any such document, instrument, agreement or information is false, misleading or omits to state a material fact, fails promptly to advise the Commission thereof, shall be deemed to be in violation of this ordinance and such violation shall be grounds for dismissal or suspension from duty without pay by the proper officer or elected official of the City and shall be guilty of a violation of this ordinance and punishable by a fine of up to \$200 for each such offense.

Section 28-11. Severability. If for any reason any provision of this Chapter 28 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Providence shall hereafter be declared unconstitutional or unenforceable by any court of proper jurisdiction, all other provisions of this chapter shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 28-12. Effective Date. This Act shall take effect upon its passage by the City Council and approval by the Mayor.

An Ordinance Creating within the Department of Public Parks, the Division of Public Programming Services, the Division of Development and Environmental Services and the Division of Grounds Maintenance Services.

Be It Ordained By The City of Providence:

Pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 104 of the Public Laws of 1963, there is hereby created within the Department of Public Parks, the Division of Public Programming Services, the Division of Development and Environmental Services, and the Division of Grounds Maintenance Services.

The Superintendent of Parks shall appoint the heads of the several divisions and other officers hereby created, who shall hold office during the pleasure of the Superintendent. Each Division Head shall recommend to the Superintendent such subordinate officers and employees within the appropriation therefore as may be required.

The head of the Division of Public Programming Services shall assume under the Superintendent of Public Parks, the powers and duties formally vested in the Director of Recreation.

The Division of Public Programming Services will be divided into the following programming units:

1. The Program Unit will be responsible for all performing arts events and educational programs presented in Roger Williams Park, Neighborhood Parks and Playgrounds, and the Museum of Natural History, as well as for collaborative programming in community centers and other public spaces.

2. The Activities Unit will be responsible for the programming and operation of all recreational sites, including pools, recreation centers, playgrounds, and athletic fields, and for administering the summer urban daycamp program and the winter program series in the community centers.

The Division of Grounds Maintenance Services shall have the functions and services of (a) maintenance of public parks, (b) maintenance of Roger Williams Park, (c) maintenance of City cemeteries, (d) forestry section, and (e) sidewalk repair.

The head of the Division of Grounds Maintenance Services shall assume, under the Superintendent of Public Parks, the powers and duties formerly vested in the Director of the Department of Public Property relating to open spaces and public lands, the City Forester and those functions formerly vested in the Sidewalk and Grass Maintenance Sections of the Department of Public Works.

The head of the Division of Development and

Environmental Services shall assume under the Superintendent of Public Parks, the responsibility for finance, design, construction, gardens, greenhouses and planning.

Those duties assigned by law or ordinance to the Director of the Department of Recreation shall be assumed by the head of the Division of Public Programming Services.

The Department of Public Property is hereby abolished and the purchasing functions shall be assigned to the Department of Finance and the functions of Public Buildings shall be conveyed to the Department of Public Works.

This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage and all ordinances inconsistent herewith shall be repealed.

Resolution Requesting the Attorney General of the State of Rhode Island to Investigate Alleged Violations of the City Charter of Providence by the Mayor, the former City Solicitor, Department Heads and any Others, which violations led to the current fiscal crisis to determine whether or not charges should be brought Against These Various Individuals.

Whereas, The City of Providence is currently in the midst of a serious fiscal crisis, directly attributable to mismanagement of funds, over-expenditures of funds and improper appropriations of funds, and

Whereas, The City Charter of the City of Providence is a State of Rhode Island Law; and said Charter contains numerous provisions forbidding the various actions that have led to this crisis, and

Whereas, The Mayor is Chief Administrator of the City and ultimately responsible for all management of City Affairs and the City Solicitor is the Chief Guardian of the Charter, and Department Heads are responsible for expenditures under their budgets, and

Whereas, There is no City Solicitor for the City of Providence, and employees of that department can not reasonably be expected to objectively evaluate allegations which may include that department.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, That the Attorney General of the State of Rhode Island is hereby requested to conduct an immediate and full investigation of any violations of the City Charter, by the Mayor, former City Solicitor, City Department Heads and any others, which

violations led to the current fiscal crisis, and he is further requested to file and pursue appropriate charges against any such individuals if sufficient cause for such action is found.

Read and Passed, on motion of COUNCILMAN ADDISON, seconded by COUNCILMEN EASTON and DILLON.

COUNCILMEN ALMAGNO, MANSOLILLO, PENNINE and SNOWDEN desire to be recorded as voting "No".

The motion for Passage is Sustained.

COUNCILMAN GLAVIN and COUNCILMAN FLYNN:

Resolution Requesting the Outlet Company, the Old Stone Bank and Textron, Inc., on behalf of themselves and any other Equity Participants in the ownership of the Biltmore Hotel Properties, are hereby requested by the City Council of the City of Providence to waive all exemptions granted to them under the Provisions of the Tax Stabilization Plan approved by the City Council on July, 29, 1976.

Whereas, Under the provisions of the Tax Stabilization Plan, Biltmore Properties for the years 1977 through 1980, have been relieved of the payment of approximately Two Hundred Forty Thousand Dollars (\$240,000.00) and

Whereas, By their assenting to the waiver of this Tax Stabilization Plan, additional tax payments to the City of Providence for the years 1981 through 1986 will be approximately Four Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$400,000.00), and

Whereas, The present fiscal condition of the City mandates that the City of Providence use every means available to it in attempting to lessen the tax burden on the home owners in our residential neighborhoods, and

Whereas, The Biltmore is now a fully operating Hotel facility and should be able to pay taxes in accordance with the tax schedules under which hotels in the City are assessed,

Now, Therefore, Be it Resolved, That the Outlet Company, the Old Stone Bank and Textron Inc., on behalf of themselves and any other Equity Participants in the ownership of the Biltmore Hotel Properties, are hereby requested by the City Council of the City of Providence to waive all exemptions granted to them under the Provisions of the Tax Stabilization Plan approved by the City Council on July 29, 1976.

COUNCILMAN GLAVIN moves the Resolution be Read and Passed.

This motion is seconded by **COUNCILMAN FLYNN**.

COUNCILMAN SNOWDEN moves the Resolution be referred to Committee on Finance.

This motion being seconded by **COUNCILMEN FARMER** and **MANSOLILLO** and having precedence over the Main Motion for Passage is Put to Vote and Not Passed, by the following Roll Call Vote:

Resolution Requesting the City Solicitor to prepare, cause to be introduced in the General Assembly and Urge Passage of Legislation enabling the City to Defer Payment of the Unpaid Balance of the Fiscal Year 1980 Appropriation for the City's Contribution to the Employees' Retirement System of the City of Providence such Unpaid Amount approximating Four Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,900,000.00).

Resolved, That the City Solicitor is requested to prepare, cause to be introduced in the General Assembly and urge passage of legislation enabling the City to defer payment of the unpaid balance of the fiscal year 1980 appropriation for

the City's contribution to the Employees' Retirement System of the City of Providence, such unpaid amount approximating \$4,900,000. and such deferral to be in effect until a current actuarial study and funding plan for said Employees' Retirement System is completed.
