Dear Councilmen and Councilwoman:

In response to Resolution #737 of the City Council, I note the following:

At the initiation of each of the individually oriented programs of the Mayor's Office of Community Development, public notices have been placed in the local news media advising the public of the availability of each program service. See attached copies of notices on the HIP, Elderly and Handicapped Paint, Section 312, Storefront Improvement, TERP, and SWAP programs.

Because of the overwhelming response to those notices, and in the case of HIP, outreach efforts, both HIP and the Section 312 program presently have on file more applicants than the available funds will service. Consequently, neither program is soliciting applicants at this time.

The Painting Program for the Elderly and Handicapped ceases activity during the winter months. Adequate media coverage will be provided upon resumption of the program in the Spring.

Attached also are samples of flyers for the TERP and Neighborhood Storefront Improvement Programs. These flyers will be made available to the public.

In reference to the Council's request that Councilmen be invited to MOCD meetings, I note that all full CAC and Subcommittee meetings are open to the public. In conformance with the increased citizen participation requirements detailed in the October 25, 1977

Federal Register, the Mayor's Office of Community Development will both hold move meetings, specifically neighborhood oriented, and undertake more public advertisement activities.

It should be noted, however, that the Public Hearing held at St. Michael's Church Basement on November 29, 1977 for which there was extensive advertising drew forth not one Councilman or Councilwoman, and that one Councilman only appeared at the Public Hearing held on December 6, 1977.


BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Members of the City Council be invited to meetings periodically so that they will be informed of the Various Programs.

PROVIDENCE — Mayor Vincent A. Cianci Jr. today announced the city's Office of Community Development has earmarked \$390,600 for a home improvements program for the elderly and physically handicapped.

The money will be available to elderly and handicapped homeowners living on fixed incomes. It will assist qualified applicants in painting or refurbishing their homes.

The program, Cianci said, will be run in conjunction with the Community Development home improvement program, under which housing rehabilitation loans are offered at low-interest rates.

Cianci said an additional \$100,000 will be allocated if there is a strong interest in the new program.

## CITY-WIDE — (PROVIDENCE) SECTION 312 REHABILITATION PROGRAM

The Federal Department of Housing and Urban Develop-  
 ment has assigned Section 312 rehabilitation loan funds to the  
 City of Providence for those Community Development Block  
 Grant areas set forth in its Housing Assistance Plan.

These funds are additional to those offered by the Mayor's  
 Office of Community Development and the Providence  
 Redevelopment Agency, and are available to those applicants  
 who satisfy the Federal regulations for the 312 program.

Briefly, the 312 rehabilitation program offers 3% low  
 interest loans of up to 20 years to owner occupants and  
 absentee owners who satisfy rigid credit and income  
 investigations and who agree to rehabilitate their property to  
 comply with minimum property standards.

Applications for loans will only be accepted from the  
 applicant, or his authorized representative, no earlier than  
 Monday, May 16, 1977 at 8:30 a.m. at the City-Wide Section  
 312 Rehabilitation Program office at 44 Washington Street  
 during office hours, and will be numerically listed in the order  
 of time and date of application. A maximum of 10 applications  
 will be serviced at one time from the established list to assure  
 utilization of the assigned funding prior to the statutory cut-off  
 date.



## CITY OF PROVIDENCE TENANTS EMERGENCY REPAIR PROGRAM

The Mayor's Office of Community Development has contracted with the Department of Planning and Urban Development to undertake an action program through its housing code enforcement division to provide emergency repairs within housing units of approved Community Development Block Grant Areas within the City of Providence.

Emergency repairs are those which require immediate action to abate a direct hazard, or immediate peril to the health, safety, or welfare of the occupants of a dwelling.

Any occupant of a housing unit within an approved Community Development Block Grant Area of the City of Providence who feels that emergency repairs are required for their living unit should immediately contact the Division of Code Enforcement, City Hall, Providence, Rhode Island 02903, telephone number 421-7740, ext. 357.

Complaints will be processed on a first-come basis except for extraordinary emergencies and the existing backlog of complaints.

THE STOP WASTING ABANDONED PROPERTY PROGRAM (SWAP) WILL BEGIN ACCEPTING APPLICATIONS FOR ASSISTANCE IN RENOVATING ABANDONED PROPERTY. IF YOU HAVE PURCHASED SINCE DECEMBER 1, 1976 OR ARE IN THE PROCESS OF PURCHASING AN ABANDONED HOME, YOU MAY BE ELIGIBLE FOR FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE UP TO \$3,500.

ALL APPLICATIONS MUST BE MADE IN PERSON AT 25 MYSTIC STREET, PROVIDENCE, ON AUG. 1, 1977, BEGINNING AT 8:30 A.M. FUNDING FOR THE PROGRAM IS PROVIDED BY THE MAYOR'S OFFICE OF COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AND IS AVAILABLE ON A LIMITED FIRST COME FIRST SERVE BASIS.

APPLICANTS MUST PROCESS A FULL DEED OR A LEGAL SALES AGREEMENT.

### An abandoned home:

- must be completely vacant for over 90 days
- must be boarded up, or scheduled to be boarded up by the Building Inspector's Office or Code Enforcement

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## Aid requests set under SWAP plan

PROVIDENCE — Owners or prospective owners of boarded-up houses in the city may apply tomorrow only for financial aid made possible by the city, six financial institutions and the citizen group called SWAP (Stop Wasting Abandoned Property).

Applications will be accepted on a first-come, first-served basis beginning at 8:30 a.m. tomorrow at the offices of SWAP, 25 Mystic St. An advertisement in yesterday's *Journal-Bulletin* said incorrectly that opening time would be at 8:30 p. m.

The financing plan, proposed by SWAP, works in this way:

- Owners or prospective owners of boarded-up houses are awarded grants of as much as \$3,500 to go toward the renovation of the house. The grants are awarded by the Mayor's Office of Community Development (MOCD). A total of \$200,000 is available.

- Participating financial institutions then give qualified applicants a renovation mortgage. The MOCD grant is used as the down payment on the mortgage. Banks usually require a 20 percent down payment on a mortgage. A grant of \$3,500 thus would help get a mortgage loan of \$17,500 for renovations.

The participating institutions are Citizens Bank, South Providence Credit Union, Rhode Island Hospital Trust Bank, Old Stone Bank, People's Bank and Old Colony-Newport National Bank.

Applicants must have a deed of ownership or a sales agreement, and must meet MOCD income limits. The use must have been vacant at least 90 days, and be boarded up or scheduled to be boarded up by the city.


