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CHAPTER 583.

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An Ordinance Creating and Regulating the Providence Civilian Defense Council and Operations.

(Approved February 25, 1952.)

*Be it ordained by the City of Providence :*

The City Council of the City of Providence hereby declares that the preparation of a plan, and the means for its full implementation, for the protection of lives and property in the City of Providence from enemy attack, natural disaster or any other cause, is essential. The City Council further finds that in times of emergencies which may imperil the safety of the inhabitants of the City, or their property, it becomes necessary to effectuate and place into operation the preconceived plans and preparations with a minimum of delay. The City Council finds, therefore, that the preparation, adoption, and full implementation of such plans are now desirable.

*Now, Therefore, Be It Enacted by the City Council of the City of Providence :*

SECTION 1. There is hereby created the Providence Civilian Defense Council which shall consist of the following :

(a) The Mayor of the City of Providence who shall serve as Chairman of the Council.

(b) A Director of Civilian Defense to be appointed by and serve at the pleasure of the Mayor of the City. The Director

shall be charged with the preparation of the civilian defense plan for the City, together with such other duties as the Mayor may prescribe. He shall also serve as Vice-Chairman of the Council.

(c) An Assistant Director of Civilian Defense appointed by and holding office at the pleasure of the Director, subject to approval of the Mayor, who shall exercise such duties as the Director may prescribe.

(d) The Deputy Directors of Divisions and the Chiefs of Services of such Divisions as may be provided for by Ordinance of the City Council, said Deputy Director to be appointed by the Director of Civilian Defense, with approval of the Mayor.

(e) Representatives not to exceed twenty-five (25) in number from civic, business, industry, labor, veterans, professional, or other groups, to be selected and appointed by the Mayor.

SEC. 2. The powers and duties of the Providence Civilian Defense Council shall include the recommendation for adoption by the City Council of a civilian defense plan for the City of Providence and the recommendation for adoption by the City Council of any and all mutual aid plans and agreements which are deemed essential for the implementation of such civilian defense plan. The duties of such Civilian Defense Council shall also include a continuing study of the need for amendments and improvements in the civilian defense plan adopted by the City Council. The Providence Civilian Defense Council shall meet upon the call of either the Chairman or the Vice-Chairman.

SEC. 3. The Office of Director of Civilian Defense is hereby created. The Director of Civilian Defense shall have the authority to request the declaration of the existence of an emergency by the City Council or by higher authority. In the event that it is deemed necessary to declare the existence of an emergency without delay if the City Council is not in session, the Mayor, upon his own initiative or upon request of the Director, may do so, but such action shall be subject to confirmation by the City Council at its next meeting.

The duties and responsibilities of the Director of Civilian Defense shall include the following:

(1) The control and direction of the actual or training efforts of the civilian defense organization of the City of Providence;

(2) The determination of all questions of authority and responsibility that may arise within the civilian defense organization of the City of Providence;

(3) The maintenance of necessary liaison with other municipal, area, state, regional, federal, or other civilian defense organizations;

(4) The marshaling, after the declaration of an emergency as provided for above, of all necessary personnel, equipment or supplies from any department of the City of Providence to aid in the carrying out of the civilian defense plan;

(5) The issuance of all necessary proclamations as to the existence of an emergency and the immediate operational effectiveness of the civilian defense plan;

(6) The issuance of reasonable rules and regulations which are necessary for the protection of life and property in the City of Providence including but not limited to rules and regulations applicable to blackouts and air raids.

(7) The supervision of the drafting and execution of mutual aid agreements entered into by the City of Providence.

(8) The supervision of and final authorization for the procurement of all necessary supplies and equipment, including acceptance of private contributions.

(9) The authorizing of agreements, after approval of the City Solicitor, for the use of private property for air raid shelter and other purposes.

(10) The powers and duties referred to in Paragraphs 4, 5, 6 and 8 of this Section shall be exercisable only with the prior approval of the Mayor.

SEC. 4. The operational civilian defense organization of the

City of Providence shall consist of the officers and employees of the City of Providence designated by the Director of Civilian Defense as well as all volunteer municipal defense workers. The functions and duties of this organization shall be distributed among such divisions, services and special staff as the City Council shall prescribe by Ordinance. Any such Ordinance shall set forth the forms of organization, establish and designate divisions and services, assign functions, duties and powers, and designate officers and employees to carry out the provisions of this Ordinance. Insofar as possible, the form of organization, titles and terminology shall conform to the recommendations of the federal government and the recommendations of the civilian defense agency of the State of Rhode Island.

SEC. 5. Each person serving as a member of the Civilian Defense Council, or as an officer, employee or volunteer in any capacity in the civilian defense organization created by Ordinance pursuant to the authority herein conferred, shall, prior to assuming their duty or duties, take an oath which shall be substantially as follows:

"I, \_\_\_\_\_, do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support and defend the constitution of the United States and the constitution of the State of Rhode Island, against all enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same; that I take this obligation freely, without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion; and that I will well and faithfully discharge the duties upon which I am about to enter. And I do further swear (or affirm) that I do not advocate nor am I a member of an affiliate of any political party or organization, group or combination of persons that advocates the overthrow of the government of the United States or of this State by force or violence; and that during such time as I am a member of the Civilian Defense Organization of the City of Providence I will not advocate nor become a member or an affiliate of any organization, group, or combination of persons or of any political party that advocates the overthrow of the government of the United States or of this State by force or violence."

SEC. 6. Any light displayed contrary to any order, rule or regulation promulgated pursuant to the provisions of this Ordinance constitutes a public nuisance and when deemed necessary in order to protect life or property during blackouts or air raids, the police are authorized and directed to enter upon any premises within the City of Providence, using reasonable force, and extinguish lights or take other necessary action to make effective any order, rule or regulations promulgated under the authority conferred by this Ordinance.

SEC. 7. Any unauthorized person who shall operate a siren or other device so as to simulate a blackout signal or air raid, or the termination of a blackout or air raid, shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this Ordinance and shall be subject to the penalties provided for by Section 10 of Chapter 1 of the Revised Ordinances of 1946.

SEC. 8. At all times during the existence of an actual emergency when the orders, rules and regulations made and promulgated pursuant to this Ordinance shall be in effect, they shall supersede all existing Ordinances, orders, rules and regulations insofar as the latter may be inconsistent therewith, unless the City Council shall otherwise determine.

SEC. 9. This Ordinance shall not be construed so as to conflict with any State or Federal statute or with any military or naval order, rule or regulation.

SEC. 10. This Ordinance is an exercise by the City of its governmental functions for the protection of the public peace, health and safety and neither the City of Providence, the agents and representatives of said City, nor any individual, receiver, firm, partnership, corporation, association, or trustee, or any of the agents thereof, in good faith carrying out, complying with or attempting to comply with, any order, rule or regulation promulgated pursuant to the provisions of this Ordinance shall be liable for any damage sustained to person or property as the result of said activity. Any person owning or controlling real estate or other premises who voluntarily and without compen-

sation grants to the City of Providence a license or privilege, or otherwise permits the City to inspect, designate and use the whole or any part or parts of such real estate or premises for the purpose of sheltering persons during an actual, impending or practice enemy attack, shall, together with his successors in interest, if any, not be civilly liable for the death of, or injury to, any person on or about such real estate or premises under such license, privilege or other permission or for loss of, or damage to, the property of such person.

SEC. 11. It shall be unlawful for any person wilfully to obstruct, hinder, or delay any member of the Civilian Defense Organization in the enforcement of any rule or regulation issued pursuant to this Ordinance, or to do any act forbidden by any rule or regulation issued pursuant to the authority contained in this Ordinance. It shall likewise be unlawful for any person to wear, carry, or display any emblem, insignia, or any other means of identification as a member of the Civilian Defense Organization of the City of Providence unless authority so to do has been granted to such person by the proper officials. Convictions for violations of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be punishable as provided for by Section 10 of Chapter 1 of the Revised Ordinances of 1946.

SEC. 12. If any portion of this Ordinance shall, for any reason, be declared invalid, such invalidity shall not effect the remaining provisions hereof.

SEC. 13. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

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#### CHAPTER 584.

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An Ordinance Amending Chapter 2 of the Revised Ordinances of 1946 by Renumbering Section 137 Thereof, and Adding Section 137.2 Relative to Weighing of Goods, Wares and Merchandise.

(Approved February 25, 1952.)

*Be it ordained by the City of Providence:*

SECTION 1. Chapter 2 of the Revised Ordinances of 1946 is hereby amended by renumbering Section 137 thereof to read 137.1 and by adding Section 137.2 as follows:

Sec. 137.2 *Weighing of goods, wares and merchandise.*

No person shall sell or deliver or service any goods, wares or merchandise, the price of which is determined by weight unless the weight thereof is clearly and visibly marked thereon or upon the parcel, package or container or upon a slip accompanying the same, except where said goods, wares or merchandise are weighed in the immediate presence of the purchaser upon a scale whose face is clearly visible to the purchaser. Any person violating this provision shall be deemed guilty of an offense.

SEC. 2. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage, and all Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

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CHAPTER 585.

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An Ordinance Amending Sec. 3 of Chapter 33 of the Revised Ordinances 1946 Relative to Bond of Side-walk Contractor.

(Approved February 25, 1952.)

*Be it ordained by the City of Providence:*

work of building or altering sidewalks and further conditioned that the applicant shall indemnify and save harmless the City and said Director and the owners of the premises abutting the sidewalks on which any work is being done, from all suits and actions of every name and description brought against said City, or any officer of the City, or any such owner, for or on account of any injuries or damages received or sustained by any person in consequence of or resulting from any improper work performed by said applicant, his servants or agents, or of or from any improper materials used in said work, or of or from any negligence in guarding said work, or of or from any act or omission of said applicant, his servants or agents. It shall also be conditioned that the applicant shall faithfully perform said work in all respects to the satisfaction of the director of public works, and that said applicant shall comply in all respects with the rules and regulations established by the director relative to said work and shall also pay all fines imposed upon him for violation of any such rule or regulation. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to effect the provisions of Chapter 2, Sections 94 to 96 of this volume.

SEC. 2. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage as to licenses hereafter granted but shall not affect licenses heretofore issued.

SEC. 3. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

“(c) A building or structure lacking sufficient automobile parking space in connection therewith as required in Sec. 24 may be altered or enlarged to create additional dwelling units in the case of dwellings, seats in the case of auditoriums, theatres, stadiums, and other similar places of assembly; floor area in the case of institutions, business, industrial or commercial buildings; guest rooms in the case of hotels and clubs; and sleeping or living units in the case of tourist homes, provided additional automobile parking space is supplied to meet the requirements of Sec. 24 except that such requirements shall apply only to such additional dwelling units, seats, floor area or guest rooms as the case may be.”

Section 24 is hereby amended by inserting between B and C and relettering the following paragraphs:

“C. Automobile Parking Space

There shall be provided at the time of the erection of any main building or structure or at the time any building or structure is enlarged or increased in capacity, permanently maintained parking space of not less than 150 square feet net area per parking space, (in determining automobile parking spaces, if not shown by actual plan and count, 300 square feet of gross area per parking space shall be equivalent to 150 square feet net area) with adequate provisions for ingress and egress by standard automobiles as follows:

1. *Parking Space for Dwellings*—There shall be permanently maintained at least one parking space on the same lot with the main building or the enlargement of a main building, accessory to each dwelling unit in the case of a new building or to each dwelling unit added to an existing building, or in lieu thereof such parking space may be provided in a building. Parking space on lots used for residential purposes shall have a capacity not to exceed (a) one more than the number of families housed on the lot, or (b) one vehicle for each 2,500 square feet of lot area, whichever is the greater.

Required parking space with a capacity for more than 4

automobiles must conform to the provisions of paragraph E of this section.

2. *Parking Space for Buildings Other Than Dwellings*—For a new building or structure or for the enlargement or increase in seating capacity, floor area or guest rooms of any existing main building or structure, there shall be permanently maintained parking space as follows with reference to new buildings or structures or such enlargements of existing buildings or structures:

(a) For auditorium in high schools, colleges and universities, for theatres, general auditoriums, stadiums and other similar places of assembly at least one parking space for every 10 seats provided in said buildings or structures.

(b) For hotels, apartment hotels and clubs, at least one parking space for every two of the first 20 individual guest rooms or suites; one additional parking space for every 6 guest rooms or suites in excess of 20 but not exceeding 50; and one additional parking space for every 8 guest rooms or suites in excess of 50 guest rooms or suites.

(c) For tourist courts and tourist homes, at least one parking space for each individual sleeping or living unit.

(d) For business or commercial buildings or structures or any other use not specifically stated in other paragraphs in this section having a floor area of 1,500 square feet or more, at least one parking space for every 500 square feet of gross floor area in said buildings or structures, excluding automobile parking space.

(e) For industrial buildings or structures having a gross floor area of 7,500 square feet or more or a lot area of 4,000 square feet or more, at least one parking space for every 8 employees of said premises.

Parking space as required above shall be on the same lot with the main building or structure or use or when located on another lot no part of such parking space shall be more than 600 feet away from the nearest boundary of the lot on which the building,

structure or use is located with a capacity for more than 4 automobiles must conform to the provisions of paragraph E of this section.

3. *Modification of Requirements*—These requirements may, upon application be modified by the Board where the conditions or circumstances provide substantial reasons to justify such action. The recommendation of the Traffic Engineer shall be requested in each case but such recommendation shall be advisory only.

have less than the minimum area requirements for R Zones, may nevertheless be used for the following purposes and subject to the following conditions; provided that these exceptions to minimum area requirements shall not apply where the total width of adjoining lots in the same ownership at the time this Ordinance became effective, exceeds 120 feet.

(a) A single family dwelling may be erected on any lot separately owned at the time of the passage of this Ordinance or on any lot shown on any plat duly recorded at the time of the passage of this Ordinance.

(b) In R-2, R-3 and R-4 Zones *respectively*, for any use permitted in these zones, provided that for any building containing more than one dwelling unit the lot must have a width of at least 35 feet and an area of at least 3,200 square feet.

(c) Lots of record at the time this Ordinance became effective may be changed by adding additional land to such lots of record without prejudice to the right of the owner of such lots to obtain a permit pursuant to the provisions of this section.

# STATE LAWS

RELATING TO THE

## CITY OF PROVIDENCE

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CHAPTER 2968.

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An Act Authorizing the City of Providence to Issue Bonds in the Sum of Two Hundred Thousand (\$200,000) Dollars for Sewer Purposes.

*It is enacted by the General Assembly as follows:*

SECTION 1. The city of Providence is hereby authorized and empowered, in addition to and not in substitution for authority previously granted, to issue, in addition to the bonds heretofore issued and now outstanding under its corporate name and seal, serial bonds in any form which the city council of said city may approve, in a sum not exceeding two hundred thousand (\$200,000) dollars. Said bonds shall be of any denomination not exceeding twenty thousand (\$20,000) dollars each, shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding three percentum (3%) per annum, payable semi-annually; the principal thereof and the interest thereon shall be payable in any coin or currency of the United States of America, which at the time of payment is legal tender for public and private debts and the debts incurred by said bonds shall be obligatory on said city

in the same manner and to the same extent as other debts lawfully contracted by said city. The dates of maturity of said bonds shall in no case be more than twenty (20) years after date of issue and not less than three and one-half ( $3\frac{1}{2}$ ) per centum nor more than six and one-half ( $6\frac{1}{2}$ ) per centum of the principal amount of said bonds issued shall become due and payable in any one year; provided, however, no bonds shall mature later than the year 1985.

SEC. 2. Said bonds shall be signed by the city treasurer and countersigned by the mayor of the city of Providence and shall be issued and sold at such times and in such amounts as the city council of said city shall determine; provided, however, that the premiums, if any, arising from the sale of said bonds shall be applied to the payment of the principal of said bonds in the order of their maturity. The proceeds arising from the sale of the bonds authorized by this act shall be delivered to the city treasurer, and such proceeds, except as hereinbefore provided in respect to the premiums arising from the sale thereof, shall be expended for the purpose of constructing and repairing sewers and/or for the purpose of acquiring land or easements in land in said city for sewer purposes. No purchaser of any of said bonds, however, shall be in any way responsible for the proper application of the proceeds derived from the sale thereof.

SEC. 3. The city of Providence shall annually appropriate a sum sufficient to pay the interest upon the bonds issued and outstanding under the authority of this act, and also to pay the principal of the bonds maturing in any such year, until said bonds are paid in full. All obligations of said city which are incurred under authority of this act shall be excepted from the operation of section 25 of chapter 329 of the general laws of 1938.

SEC. 4. This act shall take effect upon its passage and shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the city of Providence at the next general or special election in said city, and said bonds shall not be issued unless a majority of the voters of said city voting thereon shall approve this legislative action.

## CHAPTER 2969.

An Act Authorizing the City of Providence to Issue  
Bonds in the Sum of Three Hundred Thousand  
(\$300,000) Dollars for Highway Purposes.

*It is enacted by the General Assembly as follows:*

SECTION 1. The city of Providence is hereby authorized and empowered, in addition to and not in substitution for authority previously granted, to issue, in addition to the bonds heretofore issued and now outstanding under its corporate name and seal, serial bonds in any form which the city council of said city may approve, in a sum not exceeding three hundred thousand (\$300,000) dollars. Said bonds shall be of any denomination and not exceeding twenty thousand (\$20,000) dollars each, shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding three percentum (3%) per annum, payable semi-annually; the principal thereof and the interest thereon shall be payable in any coin or currency of the United States of America, which at the time of payment is legal tender for public and private debts and the debts incurred by said bonds shall be obligatory on said city in the same manner and to the same extent as other debts lawfully contracted by said city. The dates of maturity of said bonds shall in no case be more than twenty (20) years after date of issue and not less than three and one-half ( $3\frac{1}{2}$ ) percentum nor more than six and one-half ( $6\frac{1}{2}$ ) percentum of the principal amount of said bonds issued shall become due and payable in any one year; provided, however, no bonds shall mature later than the year 1985.

SEC. 2. Said bonds shall be signed by the city treasurer and countersigned by the mayor of the city of Providence and shall be issued and sold at such times and in such amounts as the city council of said city shall determine; provided, however, that the premiums, if any, arising from the sale of said bonds shall be applied to the payment of the principal of said bonds

in the order of their maturity. The proceeds arising from the sale of the bonds authorized by this act shall be delivered to the city treasurer, and such proceeds, except as hereinbefore provided in respect to the premiums arising from the sale thereof, shall be expended for the purpose of constructing and repairing such highways in the city of Providence as said city council may determine, including the acquisition of land in said city of Providence for highway purposes. No purchaser of any of said bonds, however, shall be in any way responsible for the proper application of the proceeds derived from the sale thereof.

SEC. 3. The city of Providence shall annually appropriate a sum sufficient to pay the interest upon the bonds issued and outstanding under the authority of this act, and also to pay the principal of the bonds maturing in any such year, until said bonds are paid in full. All obligations of said city which are incurred under authority of this act shall be excepted from the operation of section 25 of chapter 329 of the general laws of 1938.

SEC. 4. This act shall take effect upon its passage and shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the city of Providence at the next general or special election in said city, and said bonds shall not be issued unless a majority of the voters of said city voting thereon shall approve this legislative action.

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## CHAPTER 2970.

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An Act Authorizing the City of Providence to Issue Bonds in the Sum of Eight Hundred Thousand (\$800,000) Dollars for a Public Works Garage and/or a Municipal Garage and Warehouse.

*It is enacted by the General Assembly as follows:*

SECTION 1. The city of Providence is hereby authorized and empowered to issue, in addition to the bonds hereto-

fore issued and now outstanding under its corporate name and seal, serial bonds in any form which the city council of said city may approve, in a sum not exceeding eight hundred thousand (\$800,000) dollars. Said bonds shall be of any denomination and not exceeding twenty thousand (\$20,000) dollars each, shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding three percentum (3%) per annum, payable semi-annually; the principal thereof and the interest thereon shall be payable in any coin or currency of the United States of America, which at the time of payment is legal tender for public and private debts and the debts incurred by said bonds shall be obligatory on said city in the same manner and to the same extent as other debts lawfully contracted by said city. The dates of maturity of said bonds shall in no case be more than twenty (20) years after date of issue and not less than three and one-half ( $3\frac{1}{2}$ ) percentum nor more than six and one-half ( $6\frac{1}{2}$ ) percentum of the principal amount of said bonds issued shall become due and payable in any one year; provided, however, no bonds shall mature later than the year 1985.

SEC. 2. Said bonds shall be signed by the city treasurer and countersigned by the mayor of the city of Providence and shall be issued and sold at such times and in such amounts as the city council of said city shall determine; provided, however, that the premiums, if any, arising from the sale of said bonds shall be applied to the payment of the principal of said bonds in the order of their maturity. The proceeds arising from the sale of the bonds authorized by this act shall be delivered to the city treasurer, and such proceeds, except as hereinbefore provided in respect to the premiums arising from the sale thereof, shall be expended for the construction, furnishing and equipping of public works garage and/or a municipal garage and warehouse in said city. No purchaser of any of said bonds, however, shall be in any way responsible for the proper application of the proceeds derived from the sale thereof.

SEC. 3. The city of Providence shall annually appropriate a sum sufficient to pay the interest upon the bonds issued and outstanding under the authority of this act, and also to pay

the principal of the bonds maturing in any such year, until said bonds are paid in full. All obligations of said city which are incurred under authority of this act shall be excepted from the operation of section 25 of chapter 329 of the general laws of 1938.

SEC. 4. This act shall take effect upon its passage and shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the city of Providence at the next general or special election in said city, and said bonds shall not be issued unless a majority of the voters of said city voting thereon shall approve this legislative action.

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## CHAPTER 2994.

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An Act in Amendment of and in Addition to Chapter 489 of the Public Laws, 1923, Entitled "An Act to Provide for the Retirement of Employees of the City of Providence," as Amended.

*It is enacted by the General Assembly as follows:*

SECTION 1. Subdivision (11) of section 1 of chapter 489 of the public laws, 1923, as amended, is hereby amended to read as follows:

(11) "Final compensation" shall mean the average annual compensation, pay or salary earnable by a member during the ten successive years of his service as an employee during which such average was highest in the case of a class A employee and the average during five of such years in the case of a class B employee.

SEC. 2. The second paragraph of subdivision (1) of section 5 of said chapter 489 is hereby amended to read as follows:

"The proportion so computed for a member one year younger than the minimum retirement age for service retirement from his group shall be applied to any member who has attained a greater age before entrance into the retirement system. The retirement board shall certify to the head of each department and the head of each department shall deduct from the compensation of each member on each and every payroll of such department, for each and every payroll period, the proportion of earnable compensation of each member so computed; but the head of any department shall not make any deduction for annuity purposes from the annual compensation of a member who elects not to contribute if he has attained the minimum retirement age in the case of a class A employee or if he has completed twenty-five years of creditable service in the case of class B employee. In determining the amount earnable by a member in a payroll period, the retirement board may consider the rate of annual compensation payable to such member on the first day of the payroll period as continuing throughout such payroll period and it may omit deductions from compensation for any period less than a full payroll period if an employee was not a member on the first day of the payroll period; and to facilitate the making of deductions it may modify the deduction required of any member by such amount as shall not exceed one-tenth of one percentum of the annual compensation upon the basis of which said deduction is to be made."

SEC. 3. Paragraph (c) of subdivision (3) of section 5 of said chapter 489 is hereby amended to read as follows:

(c) Immediately succeeding the first valuation, the actuary engaged by the retirement board shall compute the rate percentum of the total compensation of all members during the preceding fiscal year which is equivalent to four percentum of the amount of the total pension liability on account of all members and beneficiaries not dischargeable by the aforesaid normal contribution made on account of such members during the remainder of their active service. The rate percentum originally so determined shall be known as the "deficiency contribution rate." On the basis of the first actuarial valuation following

the 1st day of April, 1953 the deficiency contribution rate shall be revised to provide for the liquidation of the deficiency then existing.

SEC. 4. Paragraph (b) of subdivision (1) of section 9 of said chapter 489 is hereby amended to read as follows:

(b) Any member may retire upon his written application to the retirement board setting forth at what time, not less than thirty nor more than ninety days subsequent to the execution and filing thereof, he desires to be retired, provided that the said member at the time so specified for his retirement shall have attained the minimum retirement age for his group and notwithstanding that, during such period of notification, he may have separated from service. The minimum ages for service retirement from the groups created by section 7 of this act, shall be as follows:

#### GROUP NAME

1 Laborers, mechanics and workers engaged in duties requiring principally physical exertion.	60
2 Clerical, administrative, professional and technical workers engaged in duties requiring principally mental exertion	60
3 Members of the teaching staff of public schools of the city of Providence	60
4 Members of the fire department of the city of Providence	58
5 Members of the police department of the city of Providence.	58

Notwithstanding the foregoing, as of the 1st day of April, 1951, the board shall reclassify the membership of groups 1 and 2 as class A employees and the membership of groups 4 and 5 as class B employees and the minimum retirement ages shall be as follows:

Class A employees	60
Class B employees	55 or the age at which 25 years of service is completed if prior thereto.

When the duties of a member so require, the retirement board may reclassify him in another class provided that no member

having 15 or more years of service creditable to him as a member of one class may be so reclassified.

SEC. 5. Paragraph (c) of subdivision (2) of section 9 of said chapter 489 is hereby amended to read as follows:

(c) if the member is a class B employee a pension which together with his annuity shall be equal to one-fiftieth of his final compensation multiplied by the number of years of his total service not in excess of 25 years.

SEC. 6. Paragraph (b) of subdivision (4) of section 9 of said chapter 489 is hereby amended to read as follows:

(b) if the member is a class A employee, a pension which together with his annuity shall be equal to nine-tenths of one-seventieth of his final compensation multiplied by the number of years of his total service; no member retiring with less than 15 years of total service shall receive a benefit less than he would have received had he had 15 years of total service, with the exception, however, that if a member did not enter the city service until after he had attained an age within fifteen years of the minimum service retirement age he shall not receive an allowance greater than ninety per cent of the rate of allowance which he would have received had he remained in service until the minimum retirement age. Notwithstanding the foregoing if such a member is in service on the 1st day of April, 1951 and does not elect to increase his contributions as provided under subdivision (1) of section 5, his pension shall be reduced by the actuarial equivalent of the amount by which his accumulated contributions would have been increased had he elected to pay said increased contributions.

SEC. 7. Subdivision (4) of section 9 of said chapter 489 is hereby further amended by adding a new paragraph (c) to read as follows:

(c) if the member is a class B employee a pension which together with his annuity shall be equal to nine-tenths of one-fiftieth of his final compensation multiplied by the number of years of his total service not in excess of 25 years.

SEC. 8. Paragraph (b) of subdivision (12) of section 9 of said chapter 489 is hereby amended to read as follows:

(b) Should a member die before retirement or should a retired member die within thirty days after the date upon which the first payment on account of his retirement allowance becomes normally due, his accumulated contributions, less the amount of any retirement allowance payments he may have received, shall be paid to his estate, or to such person as he shall have nominated by written designation, duly executed and filed with the retirement board.

SEC. 9. Paragraph (c) of subdivision (12) of section 9 is hereby amended to read as follows:

(c) Should a retired class B employee who has not made an optional election as provided in section 10 hereof, die more than thirty days after the date upon which the first payment on account of his retirement allowance becomes normally due, his accumulated contributions less the amount of any retirement allowance payments he may have received shall be paid to his estate, or to such person as he shall have nominated by written designation duly executed and filed with the retirement board.

SEC. 10. Section 3 of chapter 2780 of the public laws, 1951, is hereby amended by changing the word "third", which appears in the first line of said section 3, to read "fourth."

SEC. 11. This act shall take effect April 1, 1953, as to sections 1 to 8 inclusive, and shall take effect upon its passage as to section 9, and all acts or parts of acts inconsistent herewith shall stand repealed.

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## CHAPTER 3040.

---

An Act in Amendment of Sections 9 and 10 of Chapter 176 of the General Laws, Entitled "Department of Education," as Amended.

*It is enacted by the General Assembly as follows:*

SECTION 1. Sections 9 and 10 of chapter 176 of the general laws, entitled "Department of education," amended as to re-

organization by chapter 660 of the public laws, 1939, are hereby further amended to read as follows :

“Sec. 9. The board of education is hereby authorized to provide, in cooperation with Brown University, Providence College and Salve Regina College, suitable post-graduate courses of instruction in said university and colleges in the principles and practise of education designed to prepare students for positions as superintendents of public schools and high school teachers and principals.

“Sec. 10. The board of education is hereby authorized to appoint persons of proper age, character and acquirements who desire to become teachers, principals or superintendents in the public schools of this state to state scholarships which shall entitle them to pursue such post-graduate courses in education in Brown University, Providence College and Salve Regina College.”

SEC. 2. For the purpose of carrying this act into effect during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1953, the sum of \$15,000.00 is hereby appropriated, out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, in addition to the sum appropriated for similar purpose in house number 683, being the act making appropriation for the support of the state for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1953, to be expended by the board of education for such state scholarships, such sum to be allocated as follows :

“\$5,000.00 for state scholarships for attendance at Brown University ;

\$5,000.00 for state scholarships for attendance at Providence College ;

\$5,000.00 for state scholarships for attendance at Salve Regina College ; and the state controller is hereby authorized and directed to draw his orders upon the general treasurer for the payment of such sum, or so much thereof as may be required from time to time, upon the receipt by him of properly authenticated vouchers.

SEC. 3. This act shall take effect upon July 1, 1952, and thereupon all acts and parts of acts inconsistent herewith shall stand repealed.

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No. 1. Ordinance, See Chapter 568.

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No. 2. Resolution Refunding to the Columbus National Bank of Providence a Certain Sum of Money Representing Payments of Taxes Erroneously Assessed.

(Approved January 4, 1952.)

RESOLVED, That to the Columbus National Bank of Providence, 33 Weybosset street, Providence, Rhode Island, the sum of Two Hundred Forty-seven Dollars and Twenty Cents (\$247.20) be refunded whenever the City shall be released in a manner satisfactory to the City Solicitor for all claims for same, said sum representing payments of 1943 to 1950 personal property taxes erroneously assessed and paid according to certificates of the City Assessor and the City Collector; said sum to be paid in the ordinary course of payments by the City of Providence according to the Ordinance governing such payments.

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No. 3. Resolution Authorizing the Installation of Gasoline Facilities on Point Street.

(Approved January 4, 1952.)

RESOLVED, That effective immediately upon the removal of restrictions by the National Production Authority of the United

States of America, the following named person, firm or corporation is hereby granted permission to erect, alter or use a building or structure at the location named herein for the sale of petroleum, kerosene, gasoline, coal oil and their products, compounds and components as described and shown in and on the application therefor and accompanying plat, all on file in the office of the Inspector of Buildings subject to the conditions that said person, firm or corporation shall not violate any of the laws of the State of Rhode Island or any of the Ordinances of the City of Providence relative to the erection, use or occupation of said structure and that said person, firm or corporation shall not allow petroleum, kerosene, gasoline, coal oil or their products, compounds or components, to be conveyed over or across any sidewalk by means of any pipe or hose, and upon such special conditions as are hereby enumerated, viz.:

Ward 12. Merit Oil Company, 83 Point street, Plat 21, Lot 298, 4 gasoline filling pumps, making 12 filling pumps in all.

The erection or location of any buildings or structures not shown on the original plat on file with the Inspector of Buildings or any change in the location of buildings or structures from that shown on said plat shall be deemed a violation of this permit.

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No. 4. Resolution Transferring Twenty-three Thousand, Seven Hundred (\$23,700) Dollars from Water Depreciation and Extension Fund to Special Account to Be Known as "Equipment for Introducing Fluorine into Providence Water System".

(Approved January 4, 1952.)

RESOLVED, That the sum of Twenty-three Thousand, Seven Hundred (\$23,700) Dollars is hereby ordered transferred by the Commissioners of Sinking Funds from the Water Depreciation and Extension Fund to a special account in the Trust and Special Fund, entitled: "Equipment for Introducing Fluorine

into the Providence Water System". Said sum or so much thereof as may be necessary shall be expended for this purpose and any balance remaining in said fund on completion of said work shall revert to the Water Depreciation and Extension Fund.

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No. 5. Resolution Authorizing Conveyance to Providence Lying-In Hospital of Certain Land on Pleasant Valley Parkway.

(Approved January 4, 1952.)

RESOLVED, That in consideration of the conveyance by the Providence Lying-In Hospital to the City of Providence of those parcels of land containing a total area of approximately 46,881 square feet and designated by the letters O-R-S and A-B-C-D-E-F-G-H-J-K-L-M-A on that plan entitled "Proposed Exchange of Land, Providence, R. I., P. W. Dept., Engineering Office, City Property Section, Plan No. 060418, October 29, 1951", and further the payment by said hospital of Four Thousand (\$4,000) Dollars, the City by His Honor, the Mayor, will convey to Providence Lying-In Hospital that certain parcel of land located on Pleasant Valley parkway, containing approximately 32,156 square feet, and designated by the letters N-O-P-Q-U-V-N on the aforesaid plan; and furthermore, as soon as reasonably possible after request from said Providence Lying-In Hospital, the City will relocate and construct a highway approximately twenty (20) feet south of the southerly boundary line of the property to be conveyed by the City to the hospital, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That Resolution No. 784 of the Providence City Council as approved December 7, 1951 be and the same is hereby annulled and rescinded.

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No. 6. Resolution Authorizing the Redemption or Sale of Land on Chalkstone Avenue.

(Approved January 4, 1952.)

RESOLVED, That the City Treasurer may give notification in

writing addressed to the owner of Lots Nos. 469, 470 and 471 on Plat No. 68 (located on Chalkstone avenue) made for the use of the Board of Assessors as said plat appeared in the office of the said board on June 15th, 1940, said lots having been sold to the City of Providence at tax sale held March 26th, 1942, said notice in writing addressed to the owner of record at the time of the sale, his heirs, assigns or devisees at their last usual place of abode, and notifying them that said real estate will be offered for sale at private sale unless redeemed within thirty days of said notification.

The City Treasurer has received an offer made by Dora M. Curran by her attorney, David B. Lovell, Jr., of \$559.75 for Lots Nos. 469, 470 and 471 on Plat No. 68 and as the period for the redemption of this property has expired, this offer is hereby approved in accordance to the law thereto appertaining.

If said real estate shall not be redeemed within said thirty days, the City Treasurer is hereby authorized to sell and convey to the said Dora M. Curran for the price herein approved.

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### No. 7. Resolution Authorizing the Redemption or Sale of Land on Audubon Avenue.

(Approved January 4, 1952.)

RESOLVED, That the City Treasurer may give notification in writing addressed to the owner of Lot No. 27 on Plat No. 122 (located on Audubon avenue) made for the use of the Board of Assessors as said plat appeared in the office of the said board on June 15th, 1933, said lot having been sold to the City of Providence at tax sale held September 26th, 1935, said notice in writing addressed to the owner of record at the time of the sale, his heirs, assigns or devisees at their last usual place of abode, and notifying them that said real estate will be offered for sale at private sale unless redeemed within thirty days of said notification.

The City Treasurer has received an offer made by Anthony

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Palmieri of \$639.62 for Lot No. 27 on Plat No. 122 and as the period for the redemption of this property has expired, this offer is hereby approved in accordance to the law thereto appertaining.

If said real estate shall not be redeemed within said thirty days, the City Treasurer is hereby authorized to sell and convey to the said Anthony Palmieri for the price herein approved.

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No. 8. Resolution Requesting the Traffic Engineer to Study the Advisability of Installing Traffic Signal Lights on Allens Avenue at the Intersection of Ernest Street.

(Approved January 4, 1952.)

RESOLVED, That the Traffic Engineer be and he is hereby requested to study the advisability of installing traffic signal lights on Allens avenue at the intersection of Ernest street.

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No. 9. Resolution Ordering That That Portion of Barbara Street, from Glenbridge Avenue to Ponagansett Avenue, Be Established as a Public Highway.

(Approved January 4, 1952.)

RESOLVED, DECREED AND ORDERED, That the portion of Barbara street from Glenbridge avenue to Ponagansett avenue which has been dedicated for highway purposes under the provisions of Chapter 987 of the Public Laws of 1913 is hereby declared a public highway to be repaired at the expense of the City and that the remaining portion of said street is hereby established as a public highway pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 1549 of the Public Laws of 1917.

No. 10. Resolution Ordering That That Portion of Barbara Street, from Glenbridge Avenue to Ponagansett Avenue, Be Brought to the Established or Defined Grade.

(Approved January 4, 1952.)

RESOLVED, DECREED AND ORDERED, That the Director of Public Works is hereby directed to cause that portion of Barbara street, from Glenbridge avenue to Ponagansett avenue to be brought to the established or defined grade at the expense of the abutting owners thereof.

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No. 11. Resolution Ordering That Curbing Be Set on That Portion of Barbara Street, from Glenbridge Avenue to Ponagansett Avenue.

(Approved January 4, 1952.)

RESOLVED, DECREED AND ORDERED, That the curbing be set on that portion of Barbara street from Glenbridge avenue to Ponagansett avenue.

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No. 12. Resolution Ordering That the Grade of That Portion of Chatham Street, from Ashton Street to Northup Avenue, Be Defined.

(Approved January 4, 1952.)

RESOLVED, DECREED AND ORDERED, That the grade of that portion of Chatham street, from Ashton street to Northup avenue be defined as delineated upon the plan and profile 034957 on file in the Engineering Office of the Public Works Department and this day presented to the City Council.

RESOLVED, That the City Council of the City of Providence hereby orders the assessment and collection of a tax on the ratable real estate and tangible personal property and ratable intangible personal property (the tax on ratable intangible property to be at the rate of forty cents on each one hundred dollars of the value thereof) in a sum not less than \$18,750,000.00 nor more than \$19,250,000.00; said tax is for ordinary expenses, charges and sinking funds, for the payment of interest and indebtedness in whole or in part of said City, and for other purposes authorized by law.

The City Assessor shall assess and apportion said tax on the inhabitants and ratable property of said City as of the 31st day of December, A. D. 1951, at twelve o'clock noon, Eastern Standard Time, according to law, and shall, on completion of said assessment, date and sign the same, and shall make out and certify to the City Collector of the City of Providence, on or before the 15th day of June, A. D. 1952, a complete list of the names of the persons taxed and of the total value of all the real estate taxed to each person, also the amount of personal estate assessed against each person, and also the total amount of the tax assessed against each person on said real estate and

personal estate, opposite the name of the person or persons assessed, the assessment of real estate and of personal estate to appear in separate columns in said list. Said tax shall be due and payable on and between the 1st day of October, next, and the twenty-fourth day of October, A. D. 1952, next, and all taxes remaining unpaid on said last named day shall carry until collected a penalty at the rate of eight per centum per annum upon such unpaid taxes. Provided, however, said tax may be paid in four installments, the first installment of twenty-five per centum on or before the twenty-fourth day of October, A. D. 1952, and the remaining installments as follows: Twenty-five per centum on the twenty-fourth day of January, A. D. 1953; twenty-five per centum on the twenty-fourth day of April, A. D. 1953; and twenty-five per centum on the twenty-fourth day of July, A. D. 1953. Each installment of taxes, if paid on or before the last day of each installment period successively and in order, shall be free from any charge for interest. If the first installment or any succeeding installment of taxes is not paid by the last date of the respective installment period or periods as they occur, then the whole tax or remaining unpaid balance of the tax, as the case may be, shall immediately become due and payable and shall carry until collected a penalty at the rate of eight per centum per annum. The City Collector shall, by advertisement, in the public newspapers of the City, notify all persons assessed to pay their respective taxes at his office on and between the said 1st and twenty-fourth days of October, A. D. 1952, both days inclusive; said Collector shall attend daily during said periods, Saturdays, Sundays and holidays excepted, at his office from nine o'clock A. M. to five o'clock P. M. to receive said taxes.

After the filing of said description, plat and statement, the Board of Contract and Supply is hereby authorized and empowered to confer with the owner or owners of any part or parts of land taken hereunder and to agree in behalf of the City of Providence upon the price of the land and improvements so taken. The Board of Contract and Supply is hereby further authorized as a part of any such agreement made by it to sell to the owner or owners thereof any and all improvements upon the premises of said owner or owners and is also authorized, as a part of any such agreement, to convey to the owner or owners thereof any excess land which said City may acquire by reason of said condemnation from such owner or owners.

The Board of Contract and Supply is hereby authorized to determine rents and charges for the use or occupancy of any and all lands or premises condemned pursuant to the provisions of this Resolution and may designate some person to collect the rents for the City Collector of the City of Providence.

The Director of Public Works who is designated by Resolution No. 695, approved October 17, 1947, to represent the City in all negotiations between the Federal Government, the State and the City, with respect to the Olneyville Expressway, is hereby authorized to make determinations for the City with respect to the disposal of buildings and other improvements within the condemnation area, and upon his approval the said Board of Contract and Supply may sell at public auction or private sale

any and all buildings and improvements within the condemnation area which have not been sold to the owner or owners thereof as part of the settlement agreements hereinbefore provided.

The cost of taking said land and property for the extension of the Olneyville Expressway, and all costs incidental thereto incurred in carrying out the terms of this Resolution shall be paid from the special fund known as the "Federal Aid Highway Matching Fund" established by the General Treasurer of the State of Rhode Island under the provisions of Chapter 1929 of the Public Laws of 1947, entitled, "An Act Authorizing and Providing for the Participation of Cities and Towns in the Benefits of the Federal Aid Act, Approved July 11, 1916, and All Acts Supplementary Thereto and in Amendment Thereof", the City Council having lawfully appropriated its share of the total estimated cost of the construction and reconstruction of highways in the Olneyville Expressway area by several Resolutions as follows: Resolution No. 694, approved October 6, 1947 entitled "Resolution Authorizing the City Treasurer to Borrow Not Exceeding \$3,000,000.00 for the Construction, Reconstruction, Relocating and Modernizing Certain Highways in the City of Providence", and having designated so much of said money as may be necessary for the Olneyville Expressway, by Resolution No. 695, approved October 17, 1947, entitled, "Resolution Proposing the Construction or Reconstruction of Highways in the Olneyville Area"; and the City Council having appropriated funds for highway purposes by Resolution No. 428, approved August 5, 1948, entitled "Resolution Authorizing the City Treasurer to Borrow Not Exceeding Five Hundred Thousand (\$500,000) Dollars for Highway Purposes," and also by Resolution No. 606, approved October 6, 1949, entitled "Resolution Authorizing the City Treasurer to Borrow Not Exceeding Two Hundred Thousand (\$200,000) Dollars for Highway Purposes"; and said City Council having appropriated money for the Olneyville Expressway, by Resolution No. 418 approved May 8, 1950, authorizing the City Treasurer to borrow \$1,500,000.00 for highway purposes in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 2589 of 1950 entitled "An Act Authorizing the City of Providence to Issue Bonds in the Sum of One Million, Five

Hundred Thousand (\$1,500,000) Dollars for the Rebuilding, Relocating and Modernizing of Regional Traffic Arteries and for Other Highway Purposes", Resolution No. 537, approved July 5, 1951, authorizing the City Treasurer to borrow not exceeding Six Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$650,000) Dollars for Highway Purposes (Olneyville Expressway) in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 2688 of the Public Laws, 1951, the City Treasurer of the City of Providence is hereby authorized upon approval by the Director of Public Works of the City of Providence to pay to the General Treasurer of the State of Rhode Island, to be deposited in the special fund to be known as the "Federal Aid Highway Matching Fund", from time to time as may be required, so much of said appropriated funds as may be necessary for said extension of the Olneyville Expressway, and the same shall be charged to the Capital Appropriation Accounts authorized by said Resolution No. 694, approved October 17, 1947, and by Resolution No. 428, approved August 5, 1948, and by Resolution No. 606, approved October 6, 1949, and by Resolution No. 311, approved April 25, 1949, and by Resolution No. 418, approved May 8, 1950, and by Resolution No. 443, approved May 7, 1951, and by Resolution No. 537, approved July 5, 1951, and by this Resolution.

And the City Council of Providence hereby gives notice that necessary funds have been lawfully appropriated by said City Council in an amount equal to its share of the total estimated cost of the proposed project, by the Resolutions enumerated above, and that an appropriation is available for the purposes set forth in this Resolution.

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No. 340. Resolution Authorizing the Director of Public Works to Participate with the State of Rhode Island in the Extension of the Olneyville Expressway and to Rebuild, Modernize and Pave Regional Traffic Arteries in Accordance with the Recommendation of the Smith-Dibble Report.

(Approved May 19, 1952.)

RESOLVED, That the Director of Public Works of the City of Providence is hereby authorized to represent the City in all negotiations between the Federal Government, the State and the City with respect to the proposed Eagle Street Extension of the Olneyville Expressway between Atwells avenue and Kinsley avenue, as a project eligible for participation in the benefits conferred by the Federal Aid Highway Act, approved July 11, 1916 and all acts supplemental thereto and in amendment thereof, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 1929 of the Public Laws of Rhode Island, 1947; and to represent the City of Providence and cooperate with the State Director of Public Works in all matters relating to Federal Aid Highways; and said Director of Public Works of the City of Providence is hereby authorized to rebuild, relocate, modernize, repair and pave such highways included in the Smith-Dibble Report as may be approved from time to time by the City Council, and such other highways as may be determined by the Director of Public Works, the cost thereof to be charged to loan accounts already authorized for highway purposes.

MINUTE

John C. Mahoney was born in the City of Providence December 19, 1882, a son of Patrick and Catherine (Shea) Mahoney. Following an elementary education in the parochial and public schools of the City of Providence, he was graduated from Brown University in 1905, and received his Law Degree from Harvard University in 1908. The private practice of law was his chief occupation, until in 1913 he became a Special Assistant to the United States District Attorney for the District of Rhode Island. This was the beginning of a public career, marked by election as Providence City Solicitor, and by a 1935 presidential appointment as United States Judge for the District of Rhode Island.

In 1940, Justice Mahoney was elevated to the United States Circuit Court of Appeals for the First Circuit—the first Rhode Islander in that court in over a quarter of a century.

A life-long resident of this City, John C. Mahoney was a model of integrity, sincerity and ability. His long and illustrious public career was distinguished by keen intellectual ability and an unswerving sense of public responsibility. His judicial stature was one of conscientious fairness and outstanding ability. As a private citizen or as a public servant, John C. Mahoney was an exemplary character. By the attributes which he possessed and practiced so well throughout his entire lifetime, Judge Mahoney brought renown to himself, his family and his community.

Signally honored by his Alma Mater, Brown University,

which elected him a life trustee, Judge Mahoney was also a worthy recipient of the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Laws from that institution.

The members of this City Council in lamenting the passing of such an upright citizen hereby express the sincere appreciation of a grateful community for the service of this great public servant, and extend to the members of his family their deepest sympathy.

*Whereas*, It is recognized that Title I of the Housing Act of 1949 requires that contracts for financial assistance thereunder impose certain obligations and responsibilities upon local public agencies availing themselves of such financial assistance, including among other things: (1) the approval of the redevelopment plan by the governing body of the locality in which the project is situated, with appropriate findings (a) that financial aid by the Federal Government is necessary, (b) that the redevelopment plans for the redevelopment areas in the locality will afford maximum opportunity, consistent with the sound needs of the locality as a whole, for the redevelopment of such areas by private enterprise, and (c) that the redevelopment plan conforms to a general plan for the development of the locality as a whole; (2) the provision of local grants-in-aid; (3) the development of a feasible method for the relocation of families displaced from the project area; and (4) the several other local obligations and responsibilities that are imposed pursuant to Title I of the Housing Act of 1949 in connection with the undertaking and carrying out of slum clearance and urban redevelopment projects; and

*Whereas*, Pursuant to Title I every contract for a Federal capital grant will require local grants-in-aid in connection with the project which, together with the local grants-in-aid to be provided in connection with all other projects of the local public agency on which contracts for Federal capital grants have been made, will be at least equal to one-third of the aggregate net project costs involved in such projects; and

*Whereas*, Such local grants-in-aid may be provided by a state, municipality or other public body, or by any other entity, and may consist of donations of cash, land, demolition or removal work, and streets, utilities, or other site improvements, and the

provision of parks, playgrounds, and other public buildings or facilities which (1) are primarily of direct benefit to the project and are necessary to serve or support the new uses of land in the project area or (2) are of direct and substantial benefit both to the project and to other areas in the community.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED By the City Council of the City of Providence, as follows :

SECTION 1. That the financial assistance provided by Title I of the Housing Act of 1949 to assist local slum clearance and urban redevelopment projects is necessary ; and

The permission hereby granted is upon the condition that said pipe shall be so used, kept, maintained, repaired and replaced as not to interfere with the use of said Pine street or Eddy street by the public or by any person or corporation having the right to maintain pipes or conduits under and across said streets, and it is further provided that the permission hereby granted is upon the condition that said pipe shall be repaired and replaced under the supervision and control and to the satisfaction of the Director of the Department of Public Works, and upon the condition that said pipe shall be removed upon ninety (90) days' previous notice from the City Council whenever in the opinion of said City Council the public interest may require its removal; and upon the condition that in case the City of Providence shall at any time hereafter be authorized to assess abutting owners for the private use and occupation of the public highways that passage of this Resolution shall not in any manner affect the right of the City to charge and collect rent for the use of said Pine street and Eddy street by said Narragansett Hotel, Inc., or for maintaining therein said pipes and upon the condition that said Narragansett Hotel, Inc. shall hold and keep said City of Providence harmless, safe and indemnified from and against loss, cost, damage, payment and expense on account of any injuries to persons or damage to property for which said City may become liable on account of the use, keeping, maintenance, repair or replacement, or neglect to properly use, keep, maintain, repair or replace, or any defect of said pipe under and across said Pine street and Eddy street, unless the wrongful act or negligence of said City, its officers or employees, shall cause such injury or damage as mentioned aforesaid, and upon condition that said Narragansett Hotel, Inc. shall file a bond in the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) in form satisfactory to the City Solicitor to hold and keep said City harmless, safe and indemnified as aforesaid, and it is agreed by the acceptance hereof that the amount of said bond shall not be construed or held to limit the general obligation of said Narragansett Hotel, Inc. to hold and keep said City harmless, safe and indemnified as aforesaid; and upon the condition that said Narragansett Hotel, Inc., its successors and
