



To the Honorable The City Council of Providence

Honorable Gentlemen:

The City Council Resolution of October 1, 1959, requesting the Chief of Police to provide a school crossing guard at the intersection of Atwells and Harris Avenues, was referred to the Chief for investigation and recommendation. The Chief reports that thorough investigation was made by officers of the Central Precinct and the Juvenile Division. Commander Holt and Lt. May are of the opinion that the situation does not warrant posting a crossing guard. The Chief concurs in this recommendation.

The investigation reveals the following:

1. This intersection is equipped with traffic signal lights.
2. Sister Mary Admirabila, Principal of Holy Ghost School had no complaint about this intersection, and had received no complaint about this intersection, and had received none from parents or children.

3. A survey shows a total of thirty-two pupils from Holy Ghost School and one from Academy Ave. School who would use this intersection when walking. About half of the Holy Ghost pupils are transported by their parents, and most stay at the school for lunch.

4. On Oct. 15, 1959 from 8:00 to 9:00 A.M., nine children crossed. From 11:45 A.M. to 1:00 P.M., two children crossed, and from 2:45 to 3:45 P.M. nine children used this route.

On October 19, 1959, one child crossed from 11:20 A.M. to 1:25 P.M., and from 2:25 to 3:45 P.M., thirty-two children crossed.

On October 20, 1959 from 8:00 to 8:55 A.M., twenty-nine children used this intersection.

The Chief's report ends with the following statement.

"....In view of the traffic signal light at the intersection, the scarcity of numbers of students crossing and the problem of personnel shortage, it is believed that a school crossing guard cannot be made available for duty at this intersection."
