

RE : Street Name Changes

Pursuant to your request, I asked Michael Lepore of this Department to investigate the naming of Tippecanoe St. Attached is his memo.

The significance of the name certainly lies with the original battle as apposed to a former President. I check into whether there was a pattern of naming any streets for historical battles. It appears that Tippecanoe was the only one in the immediate vicinity. Indeed there are very few streets named after battles.

RE: Re-naming of Tippecanoe St.

As per your request, I investigated the name of Tippecanoe Street. According to the State Historic Preservation, the street was named after the Battle of Tippecanoe, which was fought during the War of 1812. The Commanding General was William Harrison, who later became President.

Hence, his campaign slogan was "Tippecanoe and Tyler too;" Tyler being his Vice-President.
