

We have completed our investigation which you requested of the need for "STOP" control at the intersection of Elmdale Avenue and Priscilla Avenue.

Volume studies show a low volume of traffic on both streets. In addition, there have been only three reported accidents at this location in the past three years. In view of the satisfactory operation we do not recommend the establishment of "STOP" control at this intersection.




Gentlemen:

We have completed our investigation, which you requested, of the need to replace the "YIELD" control at the intersection of Sunset Avenue and Killingly Street with "STOP" control.

Since the establishment of the "YIELD" control in May, 1961 there have been three reported accidents at this location. Two of these were rear-end collisions. In addition, the visibility is excellent.

In view of these facts, we do not recommend any change at this time.




Dear Mr. Whelan:

At the School Committee meeting last night the Chairman read to the members the resolutions numbered 221, 242 and 244 requesting the School Committee to arrange and conduct a Public Hearing concerning the proposal to close Manton Avenue School, Esek Hopkins Junior High School, Branch Avenue School, Grove Street School, Almy Street School, Hammond Street School and Samuel W. Bridgham Junior High School.

The School Committee has agreed to conduct such a Public Hearing provided the Superintendent should recommend the closing of any of these schools in question.

However, the Committee was not certain concerning the place of the Public Hearing. It seemed to be the sentiment of the Committee that if any such Public Hearing is held, it should be held in the auditorium of the Central High School. This is not conclusive, however, and the final decision would not be made until the Superintendent presented a recommendation for closing any or all of these schools.




Gentlemen:

The Providence Redevelopment Agency, in accordance with the provisions of Paragraph 12 of Chapter 1375, as amended, of the Ordinances of the City of Providence, approved December 2, 1960; and Title 45, Chapter 32, Section 5 of the General Laws of Rhode Island, 1956, hereby reports concerning the proposed sale of real property within the Mashapaug Pond Redevelopment Project.

Pak-All Products, Inc., the prospective purchaser, printers and manufacturers of flexible packages, proposes to erect an initial building of 50,000 square feet with an ultimate expansion to 100,000 square feet. This Company, which will soon enter into the relatively new field of the lamination of flexible films, will increase its present labor force of 50 by an additional 50 and an eventual 150 employees.

The Agency proposes to convey to Pak-All Products, Inc., a Rhode Island corporation and a wholly owned subsidiary of the Draper Corporation of Hopedale, Massachusetts, a parcel of 5 acres at 25 cents per square foot for a sale price of \$54,450.



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
