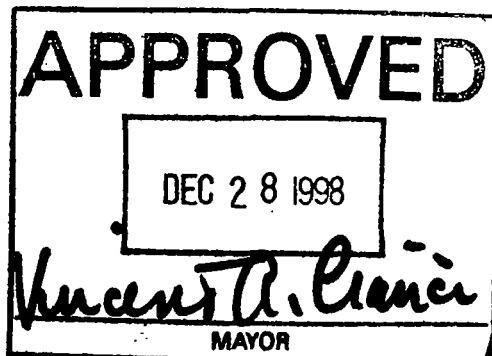

Entered Into Eternal Rest
Wednesday, Dec. 30, 1970

**E. Wiley,
City Worker,
Dies at 70**

Edward E. Wiley, 70, a city worker for more than 25 years who was a lifetime Democrat and the clerk of joint committee on accounts and claims of the General Assembly, died today.

Mr. Wiley, who lived at 369 Orms St. in the city's 12th Ward, was chairman of the ward committee there for about 12 years.

He was known as an enthusiastic party worker. "Anything for the Democratic Party, he could be relied upon to put it over," said Russell J. Boyle, former president of the city council.

Mr. Wiley's ward was the most solidly Democratic in the city. Last election it delivered a better than three to one return for Democratic Mayor Joseph A. Doorley Jr.

Mr. Wiley worked with the city as an equipment operator. He retired in 1964 from his po-

sition of foreman in the public works department.

He was known as a dapper dresser for a man of his years. He was well known in political circles and particularly in his own area, where he was noted for his willingness to help his constituents.

In his position as clerk of the claims committee, which he took after his retirement from city work, Mr. Wiley dealt with claims made by individuals against the state for injuries and damage suffered. He held the position at the time of his death.

He was the husband of Charlotte H. (Greaves) Wiley and was born June 2, 1900, in Somerville, Mass.

Besides his wife he is survived by two children, Miss Gertrude M. Wiley and Robert W. Wiley and two grandchildren.

The funeral will be at 8:30 Saturday morning from the Russell J. Boyle Funeral Home, 331 Smith St. with a Mass of the Resurrection in St. Patrick's Church, Smith Street, at 9:30 a.m.

Burial will be in the Gate of Heaven Cemetery, East Providence.
