YOUTH BASEBALL LEAGUES

During the summer, the Department of Recreation assisted the neighborhood Baseball Leagues, the eight little leagues, the five senior leagues, the four softball leagues, and the Babe Ruth League. The department issued the park permits for the use of the fields for the leagues. The department also acted on behalf of the leagues for field maintenance with the Parks Department.

The Department of Recreation also assisted the leagues with operating costs for charitable tournaments. For these tournaments, the department assisted with defraying the cost of umpires, T-shirts, pins, and trophies.

The Department continued it's promotion of the National Youth Sports Coaches Association (NYSCA). The program certifies coaches in the areas of coaching psychology, first aid, drug awareness, and practice organization. The NYSCA program was extended to certifying second year and third year coaches, as part of the three year certification program.

The Department of Recreation also coordinated the Mayor's Cup Tournament for the Senior League at Davis Park, and for the Little League at Neutaconkanut Park. The Senior League Champion, and the Little League Champion from each league participated in 'round robin' tournament for their respective division.

This year marks the beginning of a Mayor's Cup Tournament for Girl's Softball. Two teams from three little leagues, Elmwood, Mount Pleasant, and Silver Lake,

participated in a 'round robin' tournament in the Senior League Tournament. Two teams from Mount Pleasant and Silver Lake and one team from Elmwood participated in a 'round robin' tournament in the Little League Tournament.

Challenger Division Baseball

In conjunction with the Elmhurst Little League, the Providence Department of Recreation assisted with the formation of a City-wide Challenger Division of Baseball. The team was called the Providence Heroes. This program is for physically and mentally challenged children from ages six to eighteen and older provided that the child is in school.

The team attracted twenty-six children from throughout the city. Everyone is welcome, no one is turned away. Team members would be assisted by other members of the little league called "buddies".

The team would play games among themselves, and was also a member of the State-wide Challenger Program, playing teams from Coventry, Warwick, West Warwick, Wickford, and others. The team also had family games, where the team would play their parents and siblings. A fun time was had by all. Each member of the Challenger Team received a trophy at the year end banquet.

SWIMMING POOLS

The Department of Recreation operated six swimming pools from July 1, 1992 to August 28, 1992. The pools were open to all city residents at no charge. The pools accommodated between 275 and 400 people during peak hours, and a total of 700 to 900 people daily in each neighborhood.

Due to high temperatures and inclement weather, on some days these hours were altered.

During the week, the Summer Lunch Program served nutritious and well balanced lunches to the children at the six pools.

Also during the summer, the city residents were treated to an Evening in the Neighborhood. A special event that took place after hours at the pools. These shows included the Puppet Workshop, the seventeen-piece Night Life Orchestra, and a cookout featuring hamburgers and hot dogs.

During the winter, the Department of Recreation operates an indoor swimming pool at the Davey Lopes Recreation Center. The pool is open to all city residents. The department also provides transportation for children from the other recreation centers to the pool.

SWIM LESSONS

Swimming lessons were conducted at the six pools, Monday thru Friday for 8 weeks. Lessons were offered for beginners between the ages of 5 to 12. Some parents assisted in the program, while other parents took lessons. The program attracted between 25-100 participants at each location. A total of 150 swimmers graduated.

During the winter, the Department of Recreation offers a Learn to Swim Program in conjunction with the Providence School Department. The program is open to all fourth graders throughout the city. As part of the program, the Department of Recreation provides transportation to Pleasant View School.

SWIM MEET

On Wednesday August 26, 1992, the Department of Recreation held its annual Swim Meet at the Joslin Pool. Events were arranged by age group, with awards for each of the top three finishers, and trophies for the top three teams overall. The event was enjoyed by several hundred city residents.

ALFRED "T-BONE" TAVARES MEMORIAL BASKETBALL HOT SHOT CONTEST

On August 12, 1992, the Providence Department of Recreation sponsored the Alfred "T-Bone" Tavares Basketball Hot Shot Contest. Children from throughout Providence participated in a basketball shooting contest held at Fagnoli Park. After two rounds of competition, awards were given out to the top three finishers in each category.

RECREATION CENTERS

The Providence Department of Recreation ran four full-time recreation centers, and two part-time recreation centers. The four full-time centers were located at Rogers-Selim Recreation Center, Davey Lopes Recreation Center, Zuccolo Recreation Center, and Joslin Recreation Center. The two part-time centers were located at Robert F. Kennedy Elementary School and Martin Luther King Elementary School. The centers are open Monday-Friday 3:00 pm - 9:00 pm, and Saturday 9:00 am - 2:00 pm.

The recreation centers scheduled activities for boys and girls from ages 8-15. The activities included basketball, wiffleball, volleyball, soccer, kickball, street hockey, frisbee football, ping pong, and board games. Practice time was also scheduled for the youth basketball teams representing the recreation centers in the Midget Division, the Hassett Division, and the Girls Basketball Leagues. Time was also allotted for other organizations to use the facilities for practice for their teams in the leagues. Special events were also scheduled, including Sleeque Feet, Looking Glass Theater, Movies, a Halloween Party, and a city-wide Christmas Party at Rogers Recreation Center.

PROVIDENCE INTRAMURAL BASKETBALL LEAGUE

In October of 1989, a group from the Elmhurst and Mount Pleasant areas, formed a youth league that would teach the fundamentals of basketball through good sportsmanship. The league is made up of four levels, Little Friars, Grade 1; Division I, Grades 2-3; Division II, Grades 4-6; and Division III, Grades 7-8.

The Providence Department of Recreation assists this league by assisting in securing the Kennedy Elementary School gym for practice and games. The Recreation Department also supplies the referees for the games.

This year, the Intramural League also became involved with the NYSCA program. All league coaches and administrators participated in the coaches certification program.

WINTER SPORTS CARNIVAL

The Providence Department of Recreation held a Winter Sports Carnival during the February Vacation, February 18-21. The carnival was open to participants from the City's Recreation Centers. The Preliminary rounds of competition were held at the respective recreation centers, with the Carnival championship competition held on Friday, February 21, 1992 at the Davey Lopes Recreation Center. The Carnival included competition in wiffleball, basketball hot shot, and swimming competition. The winner of the wiffleball competition was Zuccolo Recreation Center, the winner of the swimming competition was Zuccolo Recreation Center.

The Carnival also included trips to rollerskating, movies, and bowling. The Carnival also included Arts and Crafts.

SUMMER IN THE CITY - 1992

In conjunction with the Mayor's Office and the Parks Department, the Department of Recreation was involved in the "Summer In the City" program. The program was developed to promote various activities offered by the City of Providence.

Activities offered by the Department of Recreation included, the Swimming Pools, Swimming Lessons, City Wide Swim Meet, Arts and Crafts, Puppets by the Pools, the Summer Lunch Program, Transportation, Co-Ed Beach Volleyball, High School Basketball Leagues, Midnight Basketball, and trips to Camp Cronin.

The Adult Midnight Basketball League was sponsored by the City of Providence and the Rhode Island Attorney General's Office. The league attracted twenty teams of men 17 and older, about 300 men participated in all. The games were played at Camp Street Park, Bucklin Park, Davis Park, and at Chad Ad on Tuesday and Thursday nights from 9:00 pm to past midnight.

Another program developed this summer was the Mayor's Youth Squads. The youth squad offered employment to 20 city teenagers. Their main task was to clean up parks and playground areas in their neighborhood. They were also called upon to do special tasks, such as clean up vacant lots in the city.

The Providence Recreation Department offered an "Evening in the Neighborhood". These events were held at each of the city's pools, plus the Fox Point Boy's and Girl's Club.

These evenings offered the Puppet Workshop, the 17 piece Nightlife Orchestra, and a cookout, featuring hamburgers and hot dogs. Approximately 300 people attended at each loacation, and a fun time was had by all in their own neighborhood.

The Providence Recreation Department also offered, Youth Day at Camp Cronin. Each pool site had a one day field trip. Children from each pool were transported to Camp Cronin for games, a cookout, and swimming at Sand Hill Cove.

HALLOWEEN PARTY

On Friday, October 30, 1992, the Department of Recreation held a Halloween Party to kick-off its 1992-1993 Winter Season. The parties were held at the four Recreation Centers, and at the Mount Hope Community Center. The parties included movies, and a magician. The parties were enjoyed by several hundred city children at each location.

CHRISTMAS PARTY

The Department of Recreation held a Christmas Party at the Rogers Recreation Center for the children of the five recreation centers. The party was held on Monday, December 21, 1992. Toys were given out to the children by Santa Claus. The toys were donated by the Rhode Island National Guard Annual Toy Drive. Refreshments were provided, along with entertainment from Newport Children's Theater. The party was enjoyed by several hundred city children.

Arts & Crafts

During the Summer, Arts and Crafts were offered at the six pool locations throughout the city. The classes taught creative expression through short-term projects, such as painting, puppets, masks, clay and plaster sculpting.

During the winter, a more extensive Arts & Crafts class was offered at the full time recreation centers. Classes were offered once a week from 3:00 pm to 6:00 pm.

The instructor and all materials were supplied by the Recreation Department.

Adult Aerobics

The Department of Recreation offered classes in Low Impact Aerobics at the Kennedy Recreation Center on Tuesday and Thursday evenings, from January to May. The exercise program provides an energetic workout without the stress of jumping and bouncing. All classes were taught by a certified instructor, and were well attended.

Theater Movement

The Department of Recreation is offering a new class in theater. The class is offered in conjunction with a grant from the Rhode Island State Council on the Arts.

Children will participate in a number of different theater games, improvisations and working with a story or script. The class is offered once a week at the Joslin and Rogers Recreation Centers, began in November 1991 and continued until March 1992.

Physical Comedy-Clowning

The Providence Recreation Department, along with a grant from the Rhode Island Council on the Arts, are offering a class in Clowning.

Children will do physical and vocal warm-ups. They will then move onto work on humorous presentations, such as juggling and memory games, and finish up with basic clowning techniques. The class will be offered once a week at Zuccolo Recreation Center and Davey Lopes Recreation Center, began in November 1991 and continued until March 1992.

Neighborhood Sing-A-Longs

During the summer, Neighborhood Sing-A-Longs were held at each of the six pool locations. Classes were offered once a week from 3:00 to 4:30 pm. Approximately 35 children participate at each location.

SPECIAL EVENTS 1992

Movies:

The Department of Recreation sponsored movies at four recreation centers: Rogers Recreation Center, Joslin Recreation Center, Lopes Recreation Center, and Zuccolo Recreation Center, from January to April and from November to December. The movies were held at each center once a month. Many city residents attended.

Puppet Workshop:

The Providence Recreation Department, along with Rhode Island Hospital Trust, presented nine performances of the Puppet Workshop. Eight performances were held at the six city pools, one of these six performances was at the Rogers Recreation Center as part of the Fifth Annual Summer Recreation Kickoff. One performance was at the Fox Point Boy's and Girl's Club, and the other performance was at the Regent Avenue Playground. The shows combined comedy and music, that were enjoyed by several hundred city residents. Some of these performances were held as part of the Evening in the Neighborhood program held at each location.

Miniature Golf / Bowling / Roller Skating:

The Providence Recreation Department sponsored trips for city youngsters. These trips included Miniature Golf in Cranston, Legion Bowl in Cranston, US Skates in East Providence, and Riverdale Skates in West Warwick. The trips were enjoyed by several hundred children.

North Pole Telephone Calls:

The Department of Recreation held the Fourth Annual North Pole Telephone Calls from "Santa Claus". The program is run in conjunction with a city school. This year it is Broad Street School. The calls were made to children in grades 1 to 3 from 5:00 pm to 7:00 pm on Wednesday, December 23, 1992. The calls were made by volunteers.

RHODE ISLAND COUNCIL ON ALCOHOLISM
AND OTHER DRUG DEPENDENCE
ALCOHOL FREE WEEKEND 1992

On Sunday April 5, 1992, the Providence Department of Recreation, along with the Rhode Island Council on Alcoholism and Other Drug Dependence, co-sponsored the Third Annual 5K Road Race and Fun Run. The race began at 11:00 am at the Boat House in Roger Williams Park.

The Department of Recreation offered assistance in the planning and organization of the race. Staff members served on the planning committee, and assisted on race day. The department also donated the use of some equipment on race day. The race attracted approximately 200 participants.

Also on that weekend, was the 27th Annual Spring Class C Softball Tournament, April 3, 4, and 5. Twelve teams competed in the tournament, and were guaranteed three games. The Recreation Department assist with the field permits, and other tournament operations.

COLUMBUS DAY CROSS COUNTRY INVITATIONAL 1992

On Monday, October 12, 1992, The Department of Recreation sponsored the 48th annual Columbus Day Cross Country Invitational. Created in 1944, the race began as a public road race, it went down Elmwood Avenue and finished at Columbus Square. During the mid 1960's, the race was moved onto the trails of Roger Williams Park. The race organizers also changed the race to include only high school cross country teams. The race almost saw its end in 1981 with the death of long time Director of John O'Shea. The race was salvaged by the efforts of Providence Recreation Director, Raymond L. Brown, who was then Athletic Director at Our Lady of Providence, and City Councilwomen Josephine DiRuzzo.

The park provides an excellent view for spectators and a challenging course for participants along its 3.1 mile course. The Timer's Guild has contributed greatly to the success of the race by laying out the course, timing, and scoring the race.

This year's field consisted of 274 runners representing 19 high schools. The schools included: Central, Classical, Hope, Mount Pleasant, Barrington, Bishop Hendricken, Cranston East, Cranston West, Cumberland, Coventry, East Greenwich, East Providence, Johnston, LaSalle, North Providence, Pilgrim, Saint Raphaels, Scituate, and Tolmam. Competition was held for both boys and girls in three categories: Freshman/Novice, Junior Varsity, and Varsity. Awards were given out to the top finisher in each event and to the top

team, for both the overall meet and the Providence Public Schools.

This year, runners from the Rhode Island Special Olympics were invited to enter in a 1.7 mile race. This event was part of the races held during the Columbus Day Cross Country Invitational Meet. Trophies were awarded for the first five male and female runners.

HERSHEY'S TRACK AND FIELD YOUTH PROGRAM 1992

The Providence Department of Recreation was active in the Hershey's National Track and Field Youth Program. The program was co-sponsored by the Department of Recreation, the Rhode Island Parks and Recreation Association, and Hershey's Inc. The local coordinator of the program was Thomas Spann, and the state coordinator of the program was Alan Southwick, from North Kingstown.

The Providence Department of Recreation City Championship Meet was held at Connolly Stadium at Mount Pleasant High School on July 1, 1992. Fifty-eight children ages 9-14 from the John Hope Settlement House, South Side Boys and Girls Club, and the Providence Cobras Youth Track Team participated in this meet. The events that were held were the 50 meter dash, 100 meter dash, 400 meter dash, 800 meter run, 1600 meter run, relays, softball throw, and long jump.

Thirty-two children from the City Meet participated in the State Championship Meet held July 15, 1992 at the McCoy Annex in Pawtucket. The Providence team turned in some outstanding performances, receiving 10 gold, 3 silver, and 4 bronze medals.

Everyone who participated in this program received a certificate of participation and a T-shirt. Transportation and lunches, from the Summer Lunch Program, were provided by the Providence Recreation Department.

PROVIDENCE RECREATION - FOX POINT BOYS & GIRLS CLUB
SUMMER RECREATION PROGRAMS

For the seventh year, the Providence Department of Recreation coordinated a program with the Fox Point Boys and Girls Club. This project began in 1985 as a joint effort for a large number of youths have some summer fun, through well organized recreation programs. Every weekday the Department of Recreation would pick up between 55-60 children at the Mount Hope Neighborhood Center and bring them to the Fox Point Boys & Girls Club. Later in the afternoon the children would then be returned to the center. Another 90-100 children, from throughout the city, also participated.

The Fox Point Program also took advantage of the transportation offered by the Department of Recreation. The trips included Rocky Point, Coventry Waterslide, Lincoln Woods, and Goddard Park. The Department of Recreation also delivered 75 breakfasts and 175 lunches daily. The meals were provided as part of the department's Summer Lunch Program.

As part of the recreation program, the children participated in "Biddy" Basketball League, Kickball League, and Capture the Flag League. The children also were given swimming lessons three days a week, and arts & crafts twice a week. The children of the program were also visited by the Puppet Workshop, which is co-sponsored by Rhode Island Hospital Trust.

The children also were part of the two events held by the Department of Recreation, the Annual Kick Off and an

evening in the Neighborhood. Over the past seven years, this program has had a high success rate, mainly because the project has become part of the children's normal summer activity.

NATIONAL YOUTH SPORTS COACHES ASSOCIATION 1992

A new program instituted by the Department of Recreation during 1990 was NYSCA, National Youth Sports Coaches Association. The Program was developed to train volunteer coaches, working with children in out-of-school youth sports leagues, in the fundamentals of coaching.

NYSCA is a three year instructional program to be given to volunteer coaches to help them develop skills in coaching psychology, drug awareness, first aid, and practice organization. First year coaches were given two three hour instructional sessions. The first session dealt with coaching psychology, drug awareness, first aid, strength and conditioning, and the dangers of steroids. The second session was a sport specific tape that dealt with practice organization and practice tips. Second year certification is a three hour session that deals with the psychological and emotional development of children, and the differences among different age groups. Third year certification is also a three hour program that deals primarily with the basics of all sports, throwing, catching, hitting, and kicking.

At the completion of each course, each coach signs a "Coaches' Code Of Ethics". This pledge and the 11 Standards set forth a framework which each coach should work from to better the experiences of the athletes. With their certification, coaches receive a \$500,000 Liability Insurance policy to guard against wrong doing by the coach.

The NYSCA program has certified coaches in each of the

city's youth baseball and softball leagues. The NYSCA has also been incorporated into all the youth sports leagues offered by the Department of Recreation. So far this year, as of 12-9-92, 186 coaches have completed their first year of certification, 89 coaches have completed thier second year of certification, 26 coaches have completed their third year of certification.

The program was expanded this past year to include young athletes and parents involved in the baseball and softball leagues, and the Providence Intramural Basketball League, through the Youth Sports Initiative Grant. The NYSCA Program will be expanded to include certification of coaches in many different youth sports. These sports will include, football, soccer, flag football, hockey, volleyball and cheerleading. The program will also continue to develop coaches in baseball, basketball, softball.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

This past year, the Providence Department of Recreation made a special effort to promote the department's programs. Press releases were sent out to Channels 6, 10, & 12 and to the Providence Journal, notifying them of events which were being held. As a follow-up, results of all events were sent to the media.

Numerous articles and stories have appeared in area newspapers and on television, reporting on the Recreation Department's programs. Throughout the year, public service announcements promoting the Recreation Department's activities have aired on the local television stations, local cable television, and in local newspapers.

The Recreation Department had announcements made in the schools promoting its activities. Posters were also posted in the schools and in the community centers notifying people of up coming events.

FIELD TRIPS

The Providence Recreation Department, in conjunction with other organizations, provided trips to many sites throughout Rhode Island. These trips were organized to provide the youth of Providence with an opportunity to visit many different locations.

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BE A WINNER/PLAY IT STRAIGHT
Substance Abuse Prevention Program

On July 8, 1992, the Providence Department of Recreation began the 1992 Summer Program with its Fifth Annual Kickoff held at the Rogers Recreation Center. The goal of the program is to show the youth of the city the dangers of drug and alcohol abuse, and alternate activities that are available. The event was sponsored by Mayor Vincent A. Cianci, Jr., the Department of Recreation, and Rhode Island Hospital Trust. Approximately 300 city youngsters participated. Entertainment was provided by the Puppet Workshop, and music by Just Friends.

TENNIS AGAINST DRUGS

For the fourth summer, the Department of Recreation offered "Tennis Against Drugs", a summer long clinic teaching the fundamentals of tennis to city children. The clinic was held on Tuesday and Thursday mornings at Roger Williams Park. The program was offered in conjunction with the Providence Housing Authority, and court fees were paid by the Todd Rozzelli Fund. "Tennis Against Drugs" was a location where lunches were distributed by the Summer Lunch Program. Approximately 160 city children benefited from this program by learning the basics of tennis, learning about alternatives to drugs, learning about themselves, and receiving awards at the end of the season.

THE SUMMER FOOD SERVICE PROGRAM 1992

The Department of Recreation sponsored the Annual Summer Food Service Program for children. The program is an extension of the School Lunch Program and is funded by the Federal Government through the Department of Agriculture and monitored by the Rhode Island Department of Education, Food Services Division. City residents up to the age of eighteen are eligible to receive a breakfast and lunch.

The program, which ran from June 29, 1992 through August 28, 1992, served meals at over one hundred and twenty locations throughout Providence and was monitored by both state and local officials.

Operating with a budget over five hundred thousand dollars, the program was able to distribute 72,414 breakfasts, and 336,296 lunches to city youngsters. The program also offered summer employment to over one hundred and sixty city residents, mostly comprised of senior citizens, young adults, and teenagers.
