All construction with relation to the said shelters is to be completed in accordance with plans and specifications submitted by RIPTA to the City Department of Inspection and

Standards as those plans may have been modified and/or approved by said department, the Department of Public Works, and the Council Committee on Public Works.

RIPTA shall supply and retain in effect a certificate of insurance or alternatively satisfactory evidence of self-insurance in an amount of not less than one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000.00) per location protecting the City and its successors and assigns, its agents, servants, officers and employees as additional-named insureds against claims for the construction, maintenance and/or existence of said shelter. Said insurance or self-insurance shall be from a company in a form acceptable to the Department of Law.

RIPTA shall execute an indemnification and hold harmless agreement satisfactory to the Department of Law.

RIPTA shall in no way interfere or inhibit existing public utility(ies) and/or governmental agency(ies).

A certified copy of the within Resolution shall be recorded in the Office of the Land Evidence of the City of Providence.

Any rights or obligations granted hereunder shall be deemed to run with the land and shall operate against any and all successors in interest and/or title.

Any rights or obligations granted hereunder shall remain in full force and effect for so long as the easements granted hereby do not cease to be utilized for the purposes for which they

were granted provided, however, RIPTA shall, at its own expense, remove said encroachment in the event that City gives RIPTA or any successor in interest thirty (30) days notice of the intent of the City to utilize said realty for any purposes. By commencing any alterations pursuant to this grant, Petitioner specifically agrees to the conditions contained herein and waives any claim for damages it may have for such use.

PERSONAL EXPRESSION

COUNCILWOMAN DiRUZZO requests the privilege of the floor to speak on a point of personal expression, and states:

"If you will recall when we passed the budget this year, one of the items that I talked about was the proposal that Luke Driver had made to the Finance Committee at a very late point in the budget hearings. I remember having a discussion with the Majority Leader, and he indicated to me that they would have Mr. Driver come back in and talk to what we are going to do about the rat problem in the city. It is a quality of life issue, I must tell you a very short story about a phone call that I received this week, which I already shared with Councilman DeLuca and the reporter. I received a message from a very good friend of mine, saying you have to call me. Did you receive a telephone message from Marie in the Mayor's Office with regard to the rat problem we are having, and she named three streets. One, which my mother lives on in Cranston. She said we are signing petitions and you had better do something about the rat problem here. I called her back and I said, there seems to be some confusion because I have my own rat problems in Providence, you are calling me from Cranston to talk to me about the problems you have there. She said, well, I have been talking to people and I talked to the Mayor's Office and people from Public Works and they told me that the rats are coming from Providence into Cranston, and you have to do something about it. So I said, how do you know that. Do they talk Providentian or something. Do they talk a different language. We really have a big problem here in Providence. I said no Marie called me from the Mayor's Office, but I will tell you what I am willing to do. I will address the problem. I pacified her and I when I hung

up the phone I said to myself this problem is so bad. I told her it was the brewery that created the problem in my neighborhood with the rats, when they knocked it down. I know that they are supposed to treat buildings. We did check, and they did treat it, but the rat population is increasing, and we are really not doing a lot about it. Cranston, still, I did look at some of their ordinances, we shared them. I am going to meet with them because I want to compare what we do versus what they do, since I am getting blamed for the rats in Cranston. They still bait even though there is a liability problem. I don't know how they get away with it and we can't do it. They say we can't bait because of the liability problem. I think it is always good to reach out and exchange information. I would like to urge the Finance Committee and the leadership to bring the Department of Public Works back in and let's talk a little bit more about the rat population because it is just getting worse, it is not getting any better."

COUNCILWOMAN NOLAN requests the privilege of the floor to speak on a point of personal expression, and states:

"As everybody knows, I have a solution for rats, I feed the stray cats, so it's no problem in my neighborhood. We all know there is now a strike going on with the school buses and I think that one thing that is very clear to me is the problem that the council has been talking about for many years, how children in the same family are sent to different schools throughout the city. A woman who works in my office has four children in the city schools and each one

goes to a different school in a different part of time, so she has to leave to drop off all her kids in the morning before she comes to work and then she has to leave work at 2:30 in order to pick up all her children, and she has to go to every north, south, east, west, every part of town. There was a woman on television tonight with a similar problem. She had four children and every one of them goes to a different school. I believe that school bus drivers should get a raise. They make about half of what a regular bus driver makes and the cargo that they carry is

certainly more precious than . . . one of the union leaders talks about garbage collectors making more money than school bus drivers. You noticed on television tonight that all the parents were up at arms and coming out about what this is doing to their individual families. I think it would behoove the bus company and the union to get together right away. I think the School Department needs to realize what happens when all of a sudden there isn't a bus to take these children to school and what parents have to go through. Thank you."
