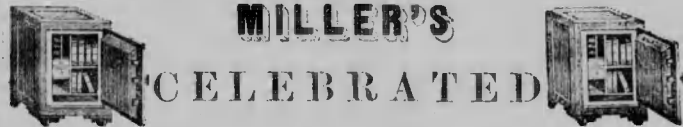

WITH our thanks for the patronage received, we present the PROVIDENCE DIRECTORY for 1856-7, being the sixteenth No. issued. Having employed experienced and we believe faithful men for collecting the names, we trust the work will be found more full and complete than any we have heretofore issued. It will be perceived that the work contains 32 additional pages of names, about 12,400 in the whole. HISTORICAL.

PROVIDENCE IN THE OLDEN TIME.

HAVING copied in our last issue a number of pages from STAPLES'S "ANNALS OF PROVIDENCE," a work of great research, and containing a vast amount of interesting facts, we make another extract from the same, furnished by the late SAMUEL THURBER, Esq., a very worthy inhabitant of Providence, whom many of our more aged citizens still remember. The information was furnished in reply to a Circular issued by Judge STAPLES, soliciting information in regard to such historical facts and incidents connected with the early settlement of the town, and the manners and customs of the age, as might have come to the knowledge of Mr. T. The latter replies as follows:—

SIR—Your request for information concerning circumstances and things appertaining to this town, I cannot answer agreeable to my desire, by reason of having been permitted to outlive my memory or recollection, in a very considerable degree, being now in my 81st year. I will endeavor, however, to recollect, then must take things as they occur, therefore you must not expect accuracy or uniformity. Should I happen to state any thing worth your notice, make such use of it as you think may be beneficial.

Changes in the face of the soil, in this town, are hardly visible, excepting near the streets, where the improvement or change is great. The time is within my recollection when there were not more than six or eight buildings on Benefit-street, and no street over the hill excepting that called Jail lane. The old jail, standing on the north side of it, was one of the buildings. All carriages going to or from the east part of the town, passed through Olney's lane, or through a street quite at the south part of the town. At that time I think I had some knowledge of nearly every family in town. As respects the river, I doubt whether the tide covers half the ground it did seventy years

since; wharves first built, then Water-streets beyond the wharves, acres filled or raised south of Weybosset and Broad-streets.—Where Westminster-street is, and all north of it, the tide flowed. I am told that there was a knoll, or small round hill, near the head of what is now called the Long wharf, which at that time was an island. Old people have often told me of having picked berries on it. An old man long since told me that while there was difficulty with the Indians, several of them got slyly upon that hill and fired at a small company of white young men who were playing at nine pins, near where the Court house now stands, and hit one of their pins.

I am told that the first vessel which sailed from this town for the West Indies, was loaded at a wharf that was then a little to the westward of the canal market. I once saw a vessel of about thirty or forty tons, a fisherman, unloading at a wharf then adjoining to what is now called Smith street. Many vessels of large burthen have been built on the west side of what is called the canal basin, and at other places north of the great bridge, which bridge I believe was fifty or sixty feet longer than it now is.—There was a draw in it, for the purpose of letting vessels through. The channel, I think, is now covered by Water street.

As respects schools, previous to about the year 1770, they were but little thought of; there were in my neighborhood, three small schools, [perhaps about a] dozen scholars in each. Their books were, the Bible, spelling-book and primer. One kept by John Foster, Esq., in his office; one by Dr. Benjamin West. Their fees were seven shillings and sixpence per quarter. One kept by George Taylor, Esq. for the church scholars. He, it was said, received a small compensation from England. Besides these, there were two or three women schools. When one had learned to read, write, and do a sum in the rule of three, he was fit for business.

About this time, Dr. Jonathan Arnold made a move for building a proprietors' school house; by his exertions he obtained enough to build one at the northerly end of Benefit street, which was called Whipple Hall, in consequence of Mr. Joseph Whipple giving the lot for two shares. George Taylor, jun. was the first master. The town, a few years since, bought the proprietors out.

At a time many years since, I fell in with an old gentleman standing viewing what was called the old Turpin house. He says to me, I am taking a view of the old house where the General Assembly used to sit; I have been there, and should like to go

in to see whether it looks as it did formerly. I went in with him. After looking round, he says, it is much as it was. The house then was standing on the west side of North Main street, nearly opposite to the Fourth Baptist meeting-house. It appears that in the days of Turpin, the original owner, this was a very sightly place, and a place of very considerable business. He had a large yard, with an elm tree in it, a fine garden, handsomely fenced in, through which there ran a small brook, which came from a small swamp, laying a little to the eastward of where the meeting-house now is.

The Rev. John Graves, the church priest, from England, was, I believe, a very pious man. As he was sent over under the pty of that government, his piety obliged him to attend to his engagement, consequently his hearers left him and employed another. After the king had acknowledged our independance, he considered himself discharged from that quarter, then offered, as I was told, to officiate as an American, but could not be reinstated. He died soon after. The Rev. Joseph Snow was a truly worthy man, one, it is said, who had done much for his society, and who, after becoming old, was slipped aside. The old gentleman died with grief. The Rev. Samuel Winsor was a worthy, plain Baptist preacher, and a very useful man. The Rev. James Manning did great things in the way of enlightening and informing the people. Schools revived by means of his advice and assistance. Previous to him, it was not uncommon to meet with those who could not write their names.

Doctors Joseph Hewes, Ephraim Bowen, and Jonathan Arnold, all at the same time, were our most eminent physicians. Arnold, at the commencement of the revolutionary war, took charge of the hospital, and there continued until the peace of 1783. He afterwards went as a member to Congress. He finally made a settlement in Vermont, and there died.

As for lawyers, I never had much to do with them, as I ever had a contemptible opinion of their trade. I however will relate from information an instance. There was a man whom I recollect of once seeing, by the name of John Aplin. It is said that he was a man of learning and of good address, a poor Englishman. He found friends, who put him forward. He soon became popular, and acquired a handsome estate. He, like some others of the trade, became very avaricious. A very important case presented, both sides wanted him, and he so engaged, and received a fee from each. This was discovered; he consequently, between two days,

up keleg and scud for Connecticut. I doubt whether he was ever in Rhode-Island afterwards. He had six sons; one of them, by the name of Joseph, was educated to the same trade. He was a TORY, and went off to the British. I don't know that either of them is now living or that there is an inch of their property in the name.

Manners and fashions were very plain. The dress in general was meant to be durable. Men mostly with wash leather breeches; cloth for most purposes, generally manufactured in their families; laborers of almost every description with leather aprons; the best dress of the most opulent, was of English manufacture, in a plain style. Some who were a little flashy, would wear a cocked hat, a wig, or a powdered head, their hair clubbed or queued; sometimes would buy or borrow some, for the purpose of giving the club or queue the better appearance. Women of the same neighborhood would visit each other with a clean checked apron, a striped loose gown, a handkerchief over the shoulders, and a sun bonnet; then pleasantly sit down and divert themselves over a dish of bohea tea and a piece of bread and butter. A few, who considered themselves somewhat superior, would wear a silk or calico gown, with long ruffle cuffs, a lawn apron, a little roll over the head, resembling a crupper to a saddle, with the hair smoothly combed over it, a flat chip hat, with a crown about one inch deep, all covered with a thin silk, some black, some white, others red, green, &c. &c. Young men would at times amuse themselves in the lots, at ball, shooting at poultry or at a mark, now and then at wrestling or jumping; at times muster in small parties with young women, then have a dance; at harvest time would go miles to a husking, as the farmers generally would at that time make merry. At the season for pigeons, there was too much diversion in destroying them. There were many stands set up around our cove, by means of which thousands were annually destroyed by shooting. In the country they were mostly taken in nets, and brought to market by horse loads, in panniers. A man told me that he at a time carried a load in that way to Boston, that they were so plenty that he could not sell them, neither give them away; he thought there might be those who had rather steal than to have it thought they were beggars, so set his panniers down by the side of a street, there left them for a while; when he returned, he found more than he had left.

Captain Jabez Whipple, who lately died in his one hundredth year, told me, that when a young man, he, with several others, kept a pack of hounds, with which they would at times divert

hemselves in a fox chase; that at a time they followed one most of the day; at evening they holed him, then made a fire at the hole, in order to keep him in during the night; they came with tools for digging, went to work, and soon found him, suffocated, as they supposed; took him out, handed him from one to the other, with every appearance of being dead, so threw him on the ground, when he instantly took to his toes, and so gave them another day's chase.

As for particular places of resort, I can hardly say that I know of any; the great bridge was a considerable of a place for it, at a pleasant time. Captain Joseph Olney kept the principal public house. As the town increased, it settled the fastest nearer the tide water. Col. Knight Dexter opened a public house where the people could be more conveniently accommodated; this and other houses being opened for the same purpose, drew the custom from the old place, so that it became abandoned. Elisha Brown, at a time was doing a very considerable business to the northward of Capt. Olney's, near Joseph Turpin's. To him there was great electioneering resorting. For several seasons party ran high between Samuel Ward, of Newport, and Stephen Hopkins, of this town. No one more zealously engaged in the cause than Brown, for Ward, and for himself as Deputy Governor. His zeal, I believe, was rather expensive, as he left to his family near nothing, of a good estate.

The first coach that I ever saw, and I do not know but the first one that was ever in this town, was owned by a Mr. Merritt, an Englishman, who came and purchased the farm and built the house where the venerable Moses Brown lately died, in his 99th year. This coach would once in a while come into the street, by way of Olney's lane; then there would be a running of the children, and a looking from the windows, to see the new wonderful thing. About this time, there would be, now and then, a person who wanted a passage to Boston. Col. William Brown, who lived quite at the north-east corner of the town, on a farm, kept what was called a curricule, drawn by two horses; he would be their carrier. It would take him about three days to go and return. After a while, Thomas Sabin, I think, was the first that set up a stage; he generally went once a week. After him, Robert Currey, then Samuel Whipple; when they got through by day light, they thought to have done well. The mail was carried by a Mr. Mumford, on horseback, once a week, between this and New-London, and so back May, 1776, I went to Pomfret,

thirty-six miles, in a chaise; the road was so stony and rough, that I could not ride out of a slow walk, but very little of the way. I was near two days in going; such was the general state of our roads at that time.

Eminent men, I can refer to whom they were, the world knows them, a Washington, a Franklin, a Lafayette, together with all who composed our first Congress, then will add seven eighths at least of New-England men. The object and design of the great majority at that time was the same. They were ready and willing to make any and every sacrifice that should benefit the great whole. But very few such at this time; now the most eminent men are those who sacrifice the general good to the interest of selected individuals. The arch deceiver did not in former days receive such polite addresses as they now do. The fair, plain, honest man, although in moderate circumstances, was then the most eminent.

At a time, I saw an old lady walking over the great bridge, with a cane in her hand. I asked a bystander who she was. He said old Mrs. Eddy, that she is now more than one hundred years old. After which, I heard that she died, at about one hundred and five. A Mr. Miller died about the same time, at about the same age. I was at Newport not long since; there I saw a man who said he was one hundred years and one month old that day; he was very intelligent, and has since died. John Sayles is said to have lived more than one hundred years. Mr. Richard Brown, who lived in the north-east corner of this town, and died some twenty years since, on his century day was so cheery, that his family presented him with a violin, which in his young days he had been somewhat attached to; he had not lost the use of it. He died before the year expired.

September, 1828, I visited the asylum in New-York, with one of their aldermen; there I saw many old people; among them, one who it was said would be one hundred and eight years of age, should he live until the December following. From his appearance, I thought him to be the youngest of those who it was said were over seventy. As I doubted, I questioned him. He was so intelligent and correct in all his answers, that I more doubted, and said to the keeper that it was impossible. He said that he, with their chaplain, who was an aged Englishman, had been of my opinion, which had occasioned a close interrogation, after which they were obliged to believe that he was correct. I afterwards saw the same alderman, and enquired concerning the

old man. He told me, that in the spring following, he desired to go to his son, who lived in or near to Canada; that if they would set him on as far as Albany, he would then find his way to his son's. He was set on, as requested.

I think that you will be able to collect more particular information on war affairs from others, than I can give on that subject. I will do what I can, though you must not expect any thing of consequence from me.

On a review, I must scribble out a little more.—Business and occupation was similar to what it now is, except machine manufacturing. Furniture in general was very plain, mahogany was but little known. Almost every article of wood was straight, without much paint or polish. But little crockery, and that of a coarse kind. Pewter and wood were the principal table furniture. Two would be often eating out of the same dish, and perhaps a dozen drinking out of the same pewter quart pot or earthen mug.

In my younger days, there were but few carriages besides carts, consequently, when women wanted to go abroad, it was very common for them to go on horseback, sitting on a pillion behind a man. Women would often be at market on horseback, with a pair of panniers, selling butter, cheese, eggs, &c.

The time hath been when an abundance of bass and perch, particularly bass, were taken through the ice on Seekonk river, in the night season. About fifty years since, I was there, with perhaps a dozen or twenty others. That night there were several tons taken, the most that was ever known to be taken in one night. Since then, some would be taken every winter, until lately; that business seems to be about done. It is supposed that the filth washing from the abundance of cotton mills, prevents their coming into the river.

[The following graphic sketch, first published in the Providence Journal of July 19, 1847, was written immediately after the celebration of American Independence at Tiverton Heights, by a gentleman of distinction in this community; and as it brings vividly to view important scenes which transpired in the distant past, we think it well worthy of republication.]

SCENES FROM TIVERTON HEIGHTS.

On the 5th inst. I climbed the Heights of Tiverton, not for the first, and I hope not for the last time. Apart from the throng that filled the fortifications which their fathers erected in the war of the revolution, I sank in reverie, and scenes long past rose vividly in my mind.

Looking toward the South, I saw dimly, as through tradition and song, the Northmen cautiously ascending the East river which washes the foot of the heights. They land at Fogland; there they are scattered through the forests, as if searching for fruit or fresh water. See, one has discovered Fogland spring. How earnest y he calls and beckons to his companions, and how eagerly they hasten to taste its cool, refreshing waters. Just below them, is a party on the ledge of rocks, busily engaged in making there a memorandum of their adventures. Now, they embark—again they are on their way. They pass directly in front of me, and enter the broad bay at the foot of Mount Hope. Again they are on shore, and again they leave on the rocks a memorial of their presence. Now, they hoist their sails, pursue their course Northward and are lost to my sight.

Adventurous men! The language of your memorials is lost—they are powerless to convey to these distant ages the information they contain. They proclaim the presence here of civilized men, but the who and the when, are secrets too securely kept by them.

The mists of centuries obscure the view. As they rise, I see as far down as the eye can reach, on the west of Rhode-Island, the cross of England waving from the topmast of a gallant ship. I would not detract from your just fame, adventurous Cabot, but ye are ploughing anew the bosom of that beautiful bay, whose waves centuries before, were ploughed by the Northmen's keel. They go, but there rides there, another ship, as gallant as the former, under the banner of France. Verrazano, thou art not even second in the race of discovery. This is followed by the persevering Dutchman. Ship after ship enters the waters in full view. The

natives, in their light canoes crowd around them, exchanging their rich beaver and peltry, for tinsel ornaments and strong water. Oh! Christian men, had ye no better boon to bestow on these simple children of nature? Not content with distilling poison for yourselves, from the best gifts of a good God, will ye carry it among his children here, who, if they have not the virtues, are, at least, free from the vices of civilization?

A far different prospect meets the eye at the Northwest. There is a small pinnacle, sailing slowly southward, under ashen sails.—Its appearance proves it of English origin. It is filled with men, eighteen I can count, and some females. It is attended by several Indian canoes, filled with natives. There is old Canonicus, the hoary headed sachem, with the pipe of peace in his hands—and there, too, the brave, the magnanimous, the unfortunate Miantonomi. All weapons are laid aside. Sure it is a meeting of friends. On closer examination, I see in the pinnacle, Coddington, one of the leading men of Boston; Aspinwall, who had been Secretary there; Clarke, Hutchinson, Coggeshall, Savage, men who had been disarmed because their creeds were not right. There, too, in the midst, is Williams, their forerunner in the conflict for soul liberty. How calm, how serene their countenances. Hatred, revenge, anger, have no lodgment in those breasts. I almost hear the sacred song which they raise to God, keeping time with their oars. They turn their course eastwardly, and rapidly approach the North end of Aquetneck. There they land, and on bended knees, from bended hearts, unite in thanksgiving to God. Thanks to the God of Israel, who protected them across the Atlantic, through the wilderness and among false brethren; thanks for that free grace, a belief in which, has made them twice pilgrims. They rise from their devotions and unite in their labors. The natives assist them in taking actual possession of the beautiful island they had sold them; they offer to hunt and fish for their new friends. God will continue to protect you, fearless pilgrims, for ye do justice, love mercy and walk humbly before him.

The scene has changed. The forests of the island have in part disappeared, and log huts and neat cottages are rising in every clearing, and fields of grain wave in frequent succession. Afar off, in the West, and the North, and the East, many of these monuments of civilization have been swept from existence. The smoke of their smouldering ruins rises to heaven. The ever hostile powers, savage and civilized life, are in open con-

flict. A little south of where I sit, I see a small band of colonists, with arms in their hands, stealthily proceeding along the margin of the East river. Who would not recognize their leader to be Col. Church? They are watched by those who move more stealthily than themselves. See among the trees, what a countless number of Indians. Hark!—it is the war whoop.—They have nearly surrounded their unsuspecting victims. The brush fence of Capt. Almy's peas field affords but a slight protection. They call for assistance to their friends on the opposite island. They are heard, but not aided. The calmness and confidence of Church are infused into every breast, and that confidence is rewarded by an escape unlooked for, by Capt. Golding's sloop, just nearing them from the North. Brave men, ye wavered not, when human aid seemed hopeless. Ye trusted in God, and he saved you.

At the North, rises Mount Hope, high above surrounding lands. How many sad reminiscences cluster around the seat of King Philip—one of the wisest, boldest of his race. He saw his tribe wasting away by the vices of civilization; this was sufficient to arouse his patriotism. He believed his brother had been poisoned by the English—that was more than enough to arouse his revenge. Not aware of that unchanging law, that civilization shall triumph over savage life; to save his tribe, to avenge his brother, to preserve his countrymen, he raised the war cry against the English. He lived to see his confederates dispersed, his tribe broken up and scattered, but he was blessed to die, ere his infant sons were made captives and sold for slaves to West India masters.

The war whoop has ceased; the sharp sound of the musket is heard no more. Civilization has achieved another triumph. Alas, that such triumphs are so often based on the destruction of a whole people, that they are watered by the tears of humanity, and ensanguined with its blood.

Cultivated fields have chased the forests from the shores of the island, and flocks and herds crown the hills with civilized life. Peace is again driven from this scene of happiness; the noise of battle again is heard. But it is war between civilized and Christian men, brethren of the same stock. O, what could tempt you, ye followers of the Prince of Peace, to imbue your hands in each other's blood. The parent state exacts unconditional submission from the colonies that her cruelty and intolerance had planted. Maddened to desperation, they have hurled

defiance at the unnatural parent. The beautiful island has become a military depot for the invaders. The cross of St. George waves there, over the faded prospects of the sons of liberty, and armed vessels control the passages of the bay.

Through the mists of the night I see at the Northwest, in the opening of the bay above Rhode-Island, a fleet of whale boats, rowed by strong arms and guided by stronger hearts.—What means this movement, so silent, so careful? Ere the morning watch is called, thou, Prescott, shalt form an acquaintance with Barton, which shall not ripen into friendship. They pass the armed ships unnoticed, and when passed, silently and heartily respond amen, to the watchman's cry, "All's well." See, they are returning in haste. The alarm is sounded on the island, light after light flares up in the vessels, but they escape unscathed. Their number is increased, the invaders have lost their General. They carry him a prisoner to the "hornets' nest."

Near the mouth of the East river I see a galley at anchor near the island shore. The red cross in her colors discloses her character; her position defines her object. In the darkness of midnight there comes a petty sloop down the river, "an egg-shell" compared with the galley, but her hull is swollen with gallant spirits. The Pigot yields to the eggshell; the British commander is the amphibious Talbat.

Again the scene is changed. The armed vessels move majestically up the bay. Would that their object was as noble as their bearing. Their iron mouths respond to the greetings they receive from the cannon of freemen on every point that juts into the bay. See, Bristol is in flames. They have refused to purchase safety by treason to their country. The air is filled with shrieks of women and children, but the sound is drowned by the gathering tramp of citizen soldiery. The minions of despotism seek safety behind their wooden walls.

What means this mighty gathering of armed men beneath the stars and stripes, on these heights? The State has sent all her male population to the shambles of war. They are preparing to reassert with force their rights to the island. Already their flag floats on Butts' Hill, their tents extend down the island farther than the eye can reach. See, far in the Southwest two gallant fleets meet in fight; the lilies of France against the cross of St. George. The roar of their cannon mimics heaven's artillery.—

They part at heaven's bidding"; neither is conqueror or conquered. The winds force them asunder, and each seeks a refuge from their common foe. Sullivan views with astonishment his allies leave the bay; there, they pass Seaconnet, on their way to Boston. The good Lafayette hastens after them, to persuade them to return. Bootless errand. Had D'Estaing thy devotedness to the cause of freedom, its flag would ere long wave in triumph over all the island. But that could not be.—Heaven gives but one Lafayette to any age. Now see, the sons of freedom are retreating before their enemy. Many a lingering look is cast behind. Many a stout heart fears that no attempt will be made to overtake and stop them. Their fears are over; they are pursued in force, and dearly do their pursuers pay for their temerity. Blood is poured out like water, as it ever was and will be when Saxon meets Saxon in fight. On the Northern declivity of Quaker Hill, I see a regiment of another race. They fight for freedom, personal as well as national. At the word, they advance upon the approaching legions of England, and stay their progress till the ferry is gained and passed by their former masters. Now their work is done, and they sullenly and slowly cross to these heights. Be not disheartened, brave men, ye shall finally succeed. Britain cannot conquer America; one of her own prophet statesmen has said it.

See again—the legions of Britain are leaving the shores of Eden. The glad tidings of peace—peace with liberty and independence, are announced. The stars and stripes float proudly on every hill top, and cannon are roaring a requiem to war. Yon bay is crowded with merchant ships, bound to and returning from every clime. Industry is pursuing unmolested the acquisition of wealth, and competency and happiness have strewed smiles over the land with an abundant hand.

Be it yours, ye gay throng who are now on these heights, to ponder on these scenes. They furnish lessons of experience, which should not be unheeded. Sooner or later, honor will be accorded to enterprising spirits. The deeds of the Northmen lay for centuries unknown. Time obscures, but cannot conceal the successful voyages of Cabot and his successors to the forgotten coasts of America. You are reaping a rich harvest from the toils and sufferings of the second pilgrims of New-England. Drop a tear for the fate of the red man. He was the fast, unshaken friend of your ancestors. Honor the memories of those who in the hour of peril on the tented field, made good the declaration promulgated on the anniversary of this day.

 Arsenal lane, from 136 Benefit to North Main street.
 Ashburton street, runs parallel with west side of Charles street,

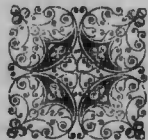

A View of the Manufactures, Wealth, and Enterprise of Providence.

We copy from the "Census of Providence in 1855" by Dr. EDWIN M. SNOW, City Registrar, the following valuable statistical information. This information was collected with great care, and is published in connection with the report on the Census ordered by the City Council in April, 1855. The statements are very valuable and will be carefully preserved and consulted by all who feel an interest in the growth and prosperity of the city.

MANUFACTURES OF PROVIDENCE.

When a census is taken, it is always comparatively easy to obtain other information besides that relating to the population, and it is to be hoped that in the arrangement of the schedules for future censuses of the city, the collection of other statistics will be provided for. It is the opinion of many of our citizens, that the collection and publication of full statistics, relating to the manufactures, trade, commerce, and other interests of the city, would repay a hundred-fold the expense, in the increase of trade and reputation it would give us, both at home and abroad.

In accordance with this opinion, the following statistics have been obtained by the direction and personal exertions of Hon. James Y. Smith, Mayor of the city. These facts have been obtained by personal application to the establishments to which they refer, and they have also been submitted to the judgment of persons well acquainted with the particular branches of business, of which the statistics are given, as well as with the general business of the city.

There are probably some omissions, and in many instances the aggregates are actually more than those given; but so far as given, the statement may be relied upon as correct.

Many additions, and a few slight corrections have been made since the first edition of this pamphlet was printed. Though incomplete, the result already published have surprised many, even of our own citizens, and it is hoped that their publication will continue to excite an increased interest in the prosperity of the city.

These returns comprise only the manufactures in the city, and those of three establishments within a few rods of the city limits. There is a large number of manufacturing establishments in the vicinity of Providence, and owned in the city, which are not included.

STEAM ENGINES.

The whole number of stationary steam engines in operation within the limits of the city is 73. There are 12 to 15 more within 100 rods of the city, which are not included. The power of each engine is given, and varies from that of 3 to that of 400 horses. The whole amount of power given is that of 4,332 horses, which is the average power used; but the power of each engine may be greatly increased when necessary.

The amount of coal used in the city for making steam is 34,160 tons, or 76,518,400 pounds annually.

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The first steam engine in Providence was made by "Evans" in Philadelphia, and was brought from that city and put in operation in 1812. This engine was of about 36 horse power, and was put in operation on the present site of Messrs. P. Allen & Sons' Print Works, by the "Providence Woolen Company," consisting of Messrs. Samuel G. Arnold, Sullivan Dorr, Joseph S. Martin and Daniel Lyman.

A steam engine of 24 horse power, from the same maker, was brought by land from Philadelphia in 1814, and put in operation by Messrs. Whitney and Hoppin; in one of the buildings still standing, of the "Providence Dyeing, Bleaching and Calendering Company." The cost of this engine was \$17,000, a large portion of which was for transportation.

JEWELRY AND SILVER WARE.

At the present time there are within the limits of the city 56 establishments engaged in the manufacture of Jewelry and Silver Ware. The articles manufactured comprise every kind and variety of Jewelry, and of artistic, ornamental and useful silver ware. The average number of hands employed is about 1,400, and the value of articles manufactured amounts to the sum of \$2,696,000 annually. This amount is larger than has been supposed; but the manner in which the facts were obtained renders it certain that it is not larger than the truth, and the judgment of persons well acquainted with the business confirms this opinion.

I am indebted to Josiah Whitaker, Esq., for the following facts relating to the early history of the manufacture of Jewelry in Providence:

Messrs. Sanders Pitman and Cyril Dodge were among the earliest manufacturers of silver ware in the town, and commenced business not long after the close of the revolutionary war.

In 1805, there were four establishments in the town, owned by Mr. Nehemiah Dodge, Mr. Ezekiel Burr, Mr. John C. Jenckes, and Messrs. Pitman and Dorrance, which were mostly engaged in the manufacture of silver spoons, gold beads and finger rings; but their business was not extensive. About this time the manufacture of jewelry was commenced by the same firms, and about 30 workmen were employed in the manufacture of breast-pins, ear-rings, watch-keys, and other articles.

Between 1805 and 1810, other firms were formed and did considerable business, and in the latter year the number of workmen employed in this manufacture in Providence, was about 100, and the value of their products for the year was about \$100,000. In 1812 and 1813, the business increased very rapidly, and some large establishments commenced operations, so that in 1815, there were about 175 workmen employed, and the value of the products was \$300,000 during the year. In 1816 and 1817, the business was mostly abandoned; but it revived in 1818, and increased so rapidly, that in 1820 there were 300 workmen employed, producing \$600,000 worth of jewelry during the year.

Since 1820, there have been great fluctuations in the business—at times being almost entirely abandoned; at other periods being very extensive.

PRINTS.

There are two Print Works in the city, which manufacture every variety of printed goods. The products of the two Print Works are as follows: 20,500 pieces of Prints, equal to 697,000 yards, manufactured each week. This will amount to 1,066,000 pieces, or 36,244,000 yards annually. The value of Prints manufactured in the city is \$3,771,600 annually. Each piece of prints is estimated at 34 yards, and valued at \$2 60, which is the average length and value.

The amount of Prints, including the above, manufactured in the vicinity of Providence, and mostly owned in the city, is about 60,000 pieces per week.

The engraving is an important item in the manufacture of Prints. The

figures are engraved on copper rolls, and one roll is used for each color in the Print. The average number of rolls used for each pattern of Prints is about four. When a pattern is prepared, an average of about 1000 pieces of Prints is printed from it, when the engraving is destroyed.

The average cost of engraving each roll, for labor alone, is about \$12.50. Four rolls to each pattern, will give \$50 for the cost of engraving a single pattern, from which 1000 pieces are printed. We have then \$3,000 per week, or \$156,000 per annum, as the cost, simply for the labor of the engraving, for the manufacture of 60,000 pieces of Prints per week.

Hon. Philip Allen informs me that in the year 1795, there resided in Providence a French gentleman by the name of Dubosque, who had been attached to the French navy, and had married a Rhode Island lady. In early life this gentleman had learned the art of calico printing as it was then practised at Alsace, in France. He commenced the printing of calicoes in Providence, in 1795, in a mill which was occupied as a chocolate mill and stood on the present site of the Franklin Foundry. The cloth printed was imported from Calcutta, the printing was done with blocks, and the calendering by friction on a hard surface with flint stone; the present system of printing and calendering with metal rollers being then unknown. The printing with copper rollers is of quite recent date.

The printing of cotton goods at the old chocolate mill, was the first calico printing in Providence, and the first to any extent in Rhode Island.

COTTON GOODS.

There are in the city six mills for the manufacture of Cotton Goods; and one within a few rods of the city limits. Three of these manufacture Printing Cloths; one Cotton Warp; two Sheetings and Shirtings; and one Lamp Wicks, Boot Laces, and Braids. The amount of cotton used is 5,906 bales, or, at 500 lbs. each, 2,953,000 pounds, annually. The number of hands employed is 1,315.

The quantity manufactured annually is as follows: Printing Cloths, 8,901,000 yards; Sheetings and Shirtings, 2,400,000 yards; Cotton Warp, 150,000 pounds; besides Lamp Wicks and Boot Laces. The total value of articles manufactured annually is \$920,000.

BLEACHERIES.

There are in the city three establishments for bleaching and dyeing cotton goods. The number of hands employed in this business is 350. The quantity of cloth bleached is 3,880 tons, or 1,270,000 pieces, of 34 yards each, equal to 43,180,000 yards per annum. The quantity dyed is about 260,000 pieces annually.

The value of the bleaching and dyeing business is about \$350,000 per annum. There are several bleacheries in the immediate vicinity of the city, which are not included in the above.

WOOLEN GOODS.

There are two manufactories of woolen goods in the city. One manufactures Fancy Cassimeres, the other Worsted Yarn. The value of the articles manufactured is \$340,000 per annum.

MANUFACTURES OF IRON.

There are twenty-two establishments in the city, and within a few rods of the city limits, engaged in the manufacture of Machinery of every kind. Steam Engines and Boilers, Castings of every description, nails, nuts, washers and tools. These establishments employ, on an average, 2,062 workmen. The amount of coal used for melting iron for the manufacture of castings and nail plate, is 9,450 tons, or 21,168,000 pounds annually.

The same establishments consume annually 11,095 tons, or 24,852,800 pounds of pig-iron, and 9,801 tons or 21,954,240 pounds of bar, sheet and scrap iron, besides cast steel, the amount of which is not given.

The articles manufactured annually are as follows: 30,800 Stoves and

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Furnaces; 90,000 casks or 9,000,000 pounds of Nails and Spikes. 80 Steam Engines, and 220 Boilers of all sizes; and 1,600 tons, or 3,584,000 pounds of Nuts, Washers, Plane Irons and other tools; besides heavy castings, gearing, rubber machines, fly-frames, speeders and other machinery, horse nails, fancy castings, and numerous other articles, the numbers of which are not given. The value of the above products, manufactured in the city is \$2,661,000 per annum.

The manufactures of screws, butts, files and rivets, are not included in the above statistics; but will be given separately.

The consumption of pig and bar iron, including that used for screws and butts, in the city of Providence, is 201,756 pounds, or 90 tons gross weight each day.

SCREWS.

There are two extensive establishments for the manufacture of Wood Screws, both iron and brass, in the city of Providence, which employ 1000 hands.

The value of the materials used by these establishments, annually, is as follows: iron, \$320,000; brass wire, \$36,000; coal, \$22,000; paper and twine, \$17,000; steel, \$3,500; lumber, \$5,000; sulphuric acid, \$5,000.

The number of Screws made, is as follows: 14,000 gross each day, or 4,200,000 gross per annum. They also manufacture for market 1,500 lbs. of iron wire daily, or 450,000 pounds annually. They also make 11,000 boxes annually, though this is but a portion of the number used for packing screws.

The value of articles manufactured annually, is as follows: Screws, \$1,044,000; Wire for market, \$36,000; Boxes, \$6,600. Total annual value of products, \$1,086,000.

If we estimate the iron at \$100 per ton, the quantity consumed in the manufacture of screws will be 25,840 pounds, or nearly 12 tons per day; equal to 3,200 tons, or 7,168,000 pounds annually.

Three tons and a half of iron turnings or chips, are made each day in the manufacture of screws, in the two establishments in this city.

Screws were first made by machinery, in Providence, about the year 1834. The establishments now in the city, commenced operations in 1839, and have been constantly increasing their capacity, and improving their machinery since that time. The machines used by different companies are not entirely alike, each company using, to a considerable extent, machines of its own design.

In one of the establishments in this city, there are three machines used to complete the screws. The first cuts the wire of the proper length, and forms the head of the blanks, as they are called. This machine makes on an average ninety blanks per minute. The second machine shaves the head of the screw, cuts the groove, and trims the burr which is formed in cutting the groove, at the rate of 14 per minute. The third machine finishes five screws per minute, by cutting the thread of the screw. These numbers are the average of all sizes of screws. In the second and third machines, the blanks are thrown promiscuously into a hopper, and the machine picks up one at a time, puts it into its proper place, finishes its portion of the process, and drops the screw into a box prepared for it.

There are over 600 different sizes and kinds of screws made. The smallest are made from wire No. 0, (screw gauge,) are one fourth of an inch in length, and weigh seven sixteenths of an ounce per gross; the largest screws are made from wire No. 28, (screw gauge,) are six inches in length, and weigh twenty-five and three-fourths pounds per gross. The smallest are finished in every particular, as perfectly as the largest.

All the screws now made, are what are termed the gimlet screws, and these have entirely banished the blunt point screws from the market, during the last five years.

The screws are counted by weighing one gross, and allowing the same weight to others of the same size, and 150 hands are constantly employed in counting, sorting and preparing screws in this city.

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No screws of any consequence are imported at the present time; but all that are used in the United States, are made in the country, and of all the screws made in the United States, 87-100ths are made in Providence.

BUTTS.

The manufacture of Butt Hinges in Providence was commenced in 1842, and was the first manufacture of butts, to any extent, in the United States. This was also nearly the first manufacture of Loose Joint Butts in the world. The business has constantly increased, and at the present time the greater portion of the loose joint butts made in the world, are made in Providence.

There are at the present time, two manufactories of butts in the city, and one within a few rods of the city limits, which employ 290 workmen. They manufacture butts, sad irons, laundry and tailors' irons, tea scales and weights, gate hinges and other articles.

The smallest butts made are one inch square when open, and weigh three fourths of an ounce per pair; the largest are 7 by 12 inches in size, and weigh eleven pounds per pair.

These establishments consume annually 2,640 tons or 5,913,600 pounds of pig iron. The articles manufactured are 1,419 dozen pairs of butts daily, or 425,700 dozen pairs annually. They also make about 525 tons of sad irons and other articles annually.

The annual value of the products is about \$235,000.

FILES.

The number of establishments in the city for the manufacture of Files, is three, and the number of workmen 38.

This business consumes 92 tons, or 206,080 pounds of cast steel, annually, and produces, 4,800 groce, or 57,600 dozen Files per ann. Besides this, some 15,000 Files are re-cut at the above establishments annually.

The annual value of the products of this business is \$26,500.

RIVETS.

The manufacture of rivets employs 10 hands, and produces 300,000 pounds of Rivets annually. Value, \$35,000 annually.

PLOUGHS.

One establishment employs three hands, uses, 50 tons of castings, and manufactures 800 Ploughs annually. Value of products, \$6,000.

GAS, STEAM AND WATER PIPE.

Two companies in the city, employ 80 hands in the business. The annual value of the products is \$66,000.

PLUMBERS AND BRASS FOUNDERS.

We have returns from five establishments engaged in this business in the city, which employ 50 workmen, and use annually 10,000 pounds of brass, 42,000 pounds of copper, and 50,000 pounds of lead. Annual value of products, \$89,520.

SASHES AND BLINDS.

Four establishments are returned, employing 39 hands. They manufacture about 14,000 pairs of blinds, besides sashes, doors and other articles. Value of products, \$71,904 annually.

BOX MAKING.

There are six establishments in the city engaged in the manufacture of wooden boxes of all sizes. The number of hands employed is about 65 the number of boxes made annually, is about 140,000, valued at \$86,400.

NAIL KEGS.

One establishment in the city employs 10 hands, and manufactures 104,800 nail kegs annually. The annual value of the products is \$15,080

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PLANING MILLS.

The number of planing mills in the city, is five: Hands employed, 63. They plane 7,691,000 feet of boards, and more than 300,000 clapboards annually. The annual value of the business is \$75,500.

DYE WOOD GRINDING.

Two mills in Providence for grinding dye woods and drugs, employ 10 hands, and grind 1,063 tons of dye woods and 150 tons of drugs annually. Amount of business, \$61,000 annually.

COCOANUT DIPPERS.

Two establishments in the city, employ 9 hands, and manufacture 110,000 cocoanut dippers, valued at \$17,415, annually.

INDIA RUBBER GOODS.

There are two establishments in the city, for the manufacture of India rubber boots and shoes. They consume about 1,600 tons of coal annually, employ 300 hands, and make 750,000 pairs of rubber boots and shoes per annum. The annual value of the product is \$500,000.

SOAP AND CANDLES.

There are in Providence, five manufactories of soap and candles. The number of workmen in this business is 56. The quantity manufactured annually, is as follows:—4,080,000 pounds of soap of all kinds; 600,000 pounds of candles; and 50,000 gallons of lard oil. The annual value of the products is \$451,200.

There is a manufactory of oil in the city, from which we have no returns.

STARCH.

There are two establishments in the city for the re-manufacture of starch for family use, and for making "gum substitute." They manufacture 450 tons of starch, annually, besides the gum substitute. The annual value of the products is \$100,000.

DISTILLERY.

One distillery consumes 400,000 gallons of molasses, and makes 400,000 gallons of alcohol annually. Annual value manufactured, \$150,000.

BAKERIES.

We have returns from eight bakeries in Providence. They employ about 64 hands, and use 11,780 barrels of flour annually. The annual value of their products is \$220,968.

FLOUR AND GRIST MILLS.

There are five grist mills in the city, which grind 215,241 bushels of corn and rye, and 25,000 bushels of salt, annually. The annual receipts for grinding, and for meal and salt sold, are \$42,065. There is also one flour mill, which manufactures \$100,000 worth of flour annually. Total annual value of products, \$142,065.

FURNITURE.

Five firms in Providence employ about 95 workmen, and manufacture furniture of the value of \$137,000 annually.

MARBLE AND FREE STONE.

This business employs about 100 workmen in Providence, and produces \$75,000 annually.

LEATHER AND LEATHER BELTS.

Three establishments manufacture about 8,000 hides, 11,000 calf skins, and 110,000 sheep skins annually. Value of the business, \$140,000 per annum. Two firms make about \$45,000 worth of leather belts annually.

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REEDS AND HARNESSES.

There are four manufactories of weavers' reeds and harnesses in the city. They employ about 60 hands, and make about \$60,000 worth of reeds and harnesses annually.

LOOM PICKERS.

Two firms employ about 25 workmen, and make 45,000 dozen loom pickers annually. Value of products, \$45,000 per annum.

CIGARS.

About 125 workmen in the city, manufacture 6,000,000 cigars annually, valued at \$100,000.

PATENT MEDICINES.

Two establishments in the city, employing 36 workmen, furnish the following statements of this business:—One makes 1,000 barrels, the other, 432,000 bottles of medicine annually. Annual value of the products, \$700,000.

CARPENTERS' AND MASONS' WORK.

There are in the city, about 860 carpenters, and 375 masons, and the amount of their products is, \$1,160,000 annually. This includes the cost of repairs, as well as of new buildings.

TIN AND SHEET IRON WORK.

About 80 workmen are employed in this business in the city, and the annual value of the products is \$144,900.

BLACKSMITHS.

There are 110 blacksmiths in the city, producing \$93,500 annually. This is exclusive of blacksmiths employed in machine and tool shops, the products of which have been previously given.

BOOT AND SHOEMAKING.

There are 205 boot and shoemakers in the city, and the annual value of their products is more than \$118,000.

CLOTHING, AND TAILORS' WORK.

This business employs about 1000 workmen, male and female, constantly, and at times, as many as 2,000 are employed. Their products are estimated, from reliable data, at \$846,000 per annum.

SADDLE, HARNESS AND TRUNK MAKING.

About 95 workmen are engaged in this business, in the city, and they produce \$105,000 annually.

BOOK BINDING.

Two book binderies in Providence, employ on an average, about 36 workmen, male and female, and the annual value of the products is \$25,000.

CARRIAGE MAKING AND TRIMMING.

This business employs about 125 workmen, and produces \$150,000 annually. Besides this, about \$5,000 worth of rail road cars are made in the city, annually.

PAINTING AND GLAZING.

This business employs about 130 men in Providence, and produces about \$70,000 annually.

TORTOISE SHELL COMBS.

The number of workmen in this manufacture, in the city, is 25, and they make \$30,000 worth of tortoise shell combs, annually.

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CONFECTIONERY.

The manufacture of confectionery in the city employs 40 workmen, and produces \$45,000 annually.

SPINDLES.

One manufactory employs 10 hands, and produces \$6,000 worth of spindles annually.

VARIOUS MANUFACTURES.

Besides those given, statistics and estimates have been obtained of the manufacture of the following articles, viz.—boats and sails, pumps, coffins, planes, brushes and brooms, picture frames, hobby horses, willow ware, and also of the brewing, and bonnet bleaching business. The aggregate annual value of these productions is given as \$146,297; but this is probably less than the actual amount.

The annual value of the manufactures of Providence, as given in the preceding pages, is \$17,415,849.

TRADE OF PROVIDENCE.

We have not attempted to collect the statistics of all the various branches of trade in Providence, for want of time. The following facts in relation to the trade in a few articles, have been obtained from good authority, and may be relied upon as correct.

PRINTED GOODS.

The amount of prints sold and exported from Providence, during the year 1855, was on an average, 60,000 pieces per week, or 3,120,000 pieces, of 34 yards each, during the year. Of these, 51,000 pieces per week were printed in Rhode-Island, and 9,000 pieces per week in Massachusetts, all in the immediate vicinity of Providence.

The average price of the prints sold was about \$2 60 per piece, and the amount of sales of prints for the year, was \$8,112,000.

PRINTING CLOTHS.

The trade in printing cloths, in Providence, during the past year, amounted to 75,000 pieces per week, or 3,900,000 pieces during the year. Of these, 45,000 pieces per week were made in Rhode-Island, and 30,000 pieces per week were made out of the State.

At \$1 70, the average price per piece for printing cloths, the sales amounted to \$6,630,000 during the year 1855.

SHEETINGS AND SHIRTINGS.

The sale of sheetings and shirtings from Providence, during the year 1855, was 60,000 pieces per week, or 3,120,000 pieces during the year. Of these, 36,000 pieces per week were made in Rhode-Island, and 24,000 pieces out of the State.

The average value of sheetings and shirtings was \$3 00 per piece, and the sales from Providence, during the year 1855, amounted to \$9,360,000.

The aggregate trade of Providence, in prints, printing cloths, and sheetings and shirtings, during the year 1855, was 195,000 pieces per week, or 10,140,000 pieces, of 34 yards each, during the year, which is equal to 344,760,000 yards, or one hundred and ninety-five thousand, eight hundred and eighty-six miles of cloth.

The aggregate value of prints, printing cloths, sheetings and shirtings, sold and exported from Providence during the year 1855, was \$24,102,000.

WOOL.

The amount of wool sold in Providence, during the past year, was 1,200,000 pounds, at an estimated value of \$1,680,000.

OIL.

We have the following statement of the Oil sold in Providence during the past year, from those well acquainted with the business.

The sperm oil is wholly used for lubricating; the lard oil is used for burning, oiling wool, soap making, and lubricating; the whale oil is used for burning.

DRUGS, DYE STUFFS AND CHEMICALS.

The numerous manufactories in Providence and in the vicinity create a large trade in dye stuffs and chemicals. The value of these articles, including drugs and medicines, sold during the past year, by four of the principal wholesale establishments, was about \$2,040,000.

GAS.

There is one gas company in the city. During the year 1855, this company used 3,722 tons of coal, and made 33,853,836 cubic feet of gas. The length of street main gas pipes in the city, is 141,074 feet.

There are numerous other branches of trade in the city, of which the annual aggregates amount to a large sum. Nearly all the business connected with the manufacturing establishments is done here; but these are only a portion of the manufactories in the State and vicinity, which contribute to the business of the city.

To show fully the business of Providence, it would be necessary to give a list of all the manufactories in the State, and in a portion of the adjoining States. This we are unable to do; but a gentleman well acquainted with the subject has kindly furnished the following statement of the manufacture of woolen goods in Providence, and within about thirty miles of the city:—

The number of woolen mills is about 75, and they are running 327 sets of woolen machinery. Of these, 196 sets are employed in the manufacture of fancy cassimeres, 38 on satinets, 29 on plaid linseys, 25 on negro kerseys, 16 on Kentucky jeans, 7 on flannels, 6 on shawls, 7 on stocking yarn, and 3 on worsted yarn.

An effort to obtain complete statistics of the manufacturing and other interests of the State, is contemplated, and it is hoped will prove successful.

COMMERCE OF PROVIDENCE.

The following particulars of the commerce of Providence have been obtained from the Custom House, with the exception of the amount of lumber, which was furnished by the Surveyor General of lumber. The facts are all for the year 1855:

The amount of foreign pig iron received was 1,328 tons. The amount of iron received coastwise, and the number of vessels which sailed coastwise cannot be ascertained from the Custom House.

During ten years, from 1843 to 1852, inclusive, the whole number of vessels which arrived at the port of Providence, was, coastwise 44,220; from foreign ports 653; the value of merchandise imported from foreign countries, was \$2,222,170; and the value of domestic products exported to foreign countries, was \$825,220. See Prov. Journal, March 1, 1853. During twelve years, from 1843 to 1854 inclusive, the quantity of a few articles of merchandise received coastwise, was as follows: Cotton, 855,654 bales; Flour, 1,329,060 barrels; Grain, 9,569,066 bushels; Coal, 1,072,563 tons.

The interesting pamphlet from which we have taken the above extracts, gives a list of 77 cotton mills, 4 print works, 3 woolen mills, and two bleacheries, which are situated in different parts of this State, and in Massachusetts and Connecticut, which are owned in this city. There are 75 woolen mills in the vicinity of Providence, of which only three are owned in the city.

The 77 cotton mills enumerated, have in operation 610,800 spindles, and besides these, there are 33,000 spindles in operation in the city.

The value of the 86 establishments above spoken of, is estimated by persons well acquainted with them, and competent to judge, at 9,965,000 dollars. This is probably much below the cost of construction; but is deemed a near approximation to their present value. Similar mills in other States are generally estimated at a much higher rate than has been adopted in this estimate.

The value of other property, consisting of houses and lands, and some large establishments for iron and other manufactures, not included in the preceding, situated in the immediate vicinity of Providence, and which are owned in the city, is estimated by good judges, at 10,000,000 dollars.

Besides this, considerable property in Maine and other New-England States, and in the Western States, is owned in Providence. This is estimated at \$4,000,000. If, then, we add to the assessed value of the real and personal estate of the city, the property owned by its citizens and invested outside of the city limits, we shall have, in addition to public property and property devoted to religious and educational purposes, not less than \$9,000,000 dollars as the aggregate wealth of the citizens of Providence.

This is equal to 1,674 dollars for each inhabitant of the city, a result which will compare favorably with that of any city in the United States, and is, I presume, second to none.

In the above returns, all kinds of schools are included. The returns show that there are in this city 423 natives and 273 foreigners, between 10 and 20 years of age, who can neither read nor write.

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PROVIDENCE DIRECTORY.

Societies and Institutions in Providence.

BROWN UNIVERSITY.

This Institution of learning was founded by the Baptists in 1764, and incorporated in February, of the same year. It was at first located in Warren, where, on the 7th of September, 1769, the first Commencement was celebrated. In 1770 the College was removed to Providence, where its exercises have since been held, with a temporary suspension of some few years during the revolutionary war. The Institution received its present name in honor of its most liberal benefactor, the late Hon. NICHOLAS BROWN, by a vote of the Corporation, passed September 6, 1804.

The Charter which is now the "Constitution of Brown University," secures to the Baptists forever the government of the College. Some of its provisions are as follows:—"That into this liberal and Catholic institution shall never be admitted any religious tests; but on the contrary, all the members hereof shall forever enjoy full, free, absolute and uninterrupted liberty of conscience:— And that the places of Professors, Tutors, and all other officers, the President alone excepted, shall be free and open for all denominations of Protestants: And that youth of all religious denominations shall and may be freely admitted to the equal advantages, emoluments, and honors of the College or University."

The Corporation for the regulation and government of the University, consists of two branches: "That of the Trustees, and that of the Fellowship." There are thirty-six Trustees, and twelve of the Fellowship, including the President. Of the Trustees, twenty-two by the Charter, are to be Baptists, five of the denomination called Friends, or Quakers, four Congregationalists, and five Episcopalians. Of the Fellows, eight are to be Baptists, "and the rest indifferently of any or all denominations." The President must be a Baptist. "The instruction and immediate government of the College," says the Charter, "shall forever be and rest in the President and Fellows, or Fellowship."

In 1850 material changes were made in the system of instruction given at the Institution; the range of studies was greatly extended and the sum of \$131,000 (raised by subscription) mostly among the citizens of Providence, was added to the College funds, thus augmenting them to about \$200,000.

LIBRARIES.

The University Library is in Manning Hall, and now contains 23,000 vols. A large proportion of these have been purchased within the last few years, with special reference to the wants of students and gentlemen engaged in literary and scientific pursuits. It is constantly increasing from the proceeds of a permanent fund of \$25,000, established for this purpose in 1839. The Library is open four hours daily, from 9 A. M. till 1 P. M. In addition to University Library, the Libraries of the Philermenian and the United Brothers' Societies comprise together 6000 volumes, accessible to all the students of the University.

The annual Commencement is on the first Wednesday in September. The first Exhibition is on the third Saturday in November, and the second Exhibition on the second Saturday in May. The week of the annual Thanksgiving is given as a recess, and no other recess is given during the year.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

The Public Schools of the city of Providence are placed by the ordinances of the city, under the management of the School Committee, consisting of forty-four members; twenty-one are elected by the people, three in each of the seven wards; so that in future, one will be chosen annually in each of the wards, to hold office three years. Twenty members are chosen by the City Council annually. The Mayor, the President of the Common Council and the Chairman of the Committee on Education are ex-officio members of the School Committee, making the whole number forty-four, who serve *without any compensation*. The experience of many years has shown, that the members of this Committee, each one feeling more or less heavily the pressure of his own private or professional business, cannot give that amount of time to the Public Schools, which an economical and successful management of them requires. For this reason, they have wisely entrusted much of the executive duty of the Committee to a Superintendent.

Rev. Daniel Leach is the present Superintendent of the Public Schools, and also acts as Principal of the High School. He spends

all his time in visiting the different schools, exercising a careful supervision over them, and while passing from school to school, he aims to remove existing defects in the modes of teaching and management, and to introduce such improvements as his own observation and the progress of popular education may have shown to be useful. He also furnishes all necessary supplies, superintends all repairs, and in every practical way promotes the improvement of the Public Schools.

There are at present established in this city, fifty-two Public Schools, in which are engaged one hundred and twenty-five teachers; ten gentlemen and the remainder ladies, who devote themselves faithfully to the instruction and government of their respective Schools, which together contain about 6,800 pupils.

These Schools are divided into four grades, viz:—

FIRST GRADE. There are now established in the city *twenty-four Primary Schools*. These schools are designed for pupils from five years of age to six or seven, according to their advancement in learning. Each school is under the immediate government and instruction of two female teachers, a Principal and an Assistant, and usually contains about one hundred and thirty pupils. The teachers in these schools, besides teaching the elements of *Reading, Spelling and Arithmetic*, give their pupils much oral instruction of a familiar kind, suited to their age, with daily exercises in *Vocal Music*.

SECOND GRADE. There are *twenty Intermediate Schools* established for children from six to eight or nine years of age, including those who were formerly in the first classes in the Primary Schools, and those in the lowest classes in the Grammar Schools. Each of these schools usually contains about one hundred and twenty pupils, who are under the instruction and management of two female teachers, a Principal and an Assistant. The scholars in these schools advance progressively to more difficult lessons in *Reading, Spelling and Arithmetic*, and begin to take lessons in *Writing and Geography*. *Vocal Music* in these schools is taught by a *professional Teacher*, employed by the School Committee.

THIRD GRADE. *Seven Grammar Schools* are now established in the city, for the instruction of scholars from eight or nine years old to twelve or fourteen. Each Grammar School, except the one for colored children, usually contains upwards of two hundred Pupils, who are under the government and instruction of a male Principal and three female Assistants.

In these schools the scholars use a new set of text books, which present more enlarged and accurate views of the branches they have already begun, and in these books continue their exercises in *Reading, Spelling, Writing, Arithmetic and Geography*, and commence *English Grammar, the History of the United States, and General History*. Instruction in *Vocal Music* is given in these schools, and also in the High School, by a professional teacher.

FOURTH GRADE. One High school with two departments—one for boys and one for girls. Each department will now accommodate one hundred and fifty pupils—making three hundred in the school. The full course of studies in this school occupies *four*

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years, and in accordance with this arrangement, the boys are divided into three classes of forty each, and placed in separate rooms, under the government and instruction of a male Teacher. The girls are divided into four classes, and each placed in a separate room, under the care and instruction of a female Teacher. The course of studies in each department is adapted to the conditions of the pupils in after life; each sex pursuing all the common branches alike, but the boys taking the more scientific course, and the girls the more literary. The art of drawing is taught in both departments, by a professional Teacher.

FRIENDS' YEARLY MEETING BOARDING SCHOOL, Established in 1819.

This Institution is under the direction of a committee of the New England Yearly Meeting, who appoint Principals and teachers. The number of teachers varies with the number of scholars, who are taught in the various branches of an English education, including the Mathematics, and the Latin, Greek and French languages. Lectures are regularly delivered on Natural Philosophy and Chemistry, illustrated by experiments, and occasionally upon other subjects embraced in the course of study in the school.

The school is furnished with a valuable Philosophical and Chemical apparatus. There is also a valuable Cabinet of Minerals belonging to the Institution. The pupils have access to a library of about 1200 volumes.

The number of scholars of both sexes averages about 130.

RHODE-ISLAND STATE NORMAL SCHOOL

(Rooms No. 129 Broad-street, nearly opposite the City Hotel.)

This school is supported by the State of Rhode-Island as a professional one for the training of teachers of both sexes for the public schools of the State, and is under the supervision of the Commissioner of Public Schools. It went into operation in May, 1854, and has been in a high degree successful. There are now in attendance about 75 pupils, from all parts of the State.

During the first three weeks of April, a special session was held, designed particularly for the teachers of the Summer District schools. Over 150 were in attendance. In addition to the instructions of the regular teachers of the school, lectures and addresses were given by Rev. Robert Allyn, Commissioner of Public Schools, by Rev. B. Sears, D. D., President of Brown University, by Professors Chace, Caswell, Gammell, Dunn, Harkness and Angell, of the University, by Rev. Dr. Hall, Rev. T. D. Cook, Rev. E. M. Stone and by Gen. Joseph S. Pitman and S. A. Potter, Esq. of this city; by Rev. Mr. Day, of Olneyville; Rev. Mr. Vail, of Westerly; Rev. John Boyden, jun. of Woonsocket; Rev. Dr. Crane, of East-Greenwich; Rev. G. A. Willard, of Warwick; Rev. Mr. Beman, of Scituate; Herman Krusi, Esq. of Lancaster, Mass.; and Mr. Burleigh, of the Plainfield Academy, Con.

As an indication of the interest felt in this movement, we will add that these gentlemen rendered their services gratuitously, expressing themselves glad of the opportunity of showing their appreciation of the teacher's work, and their interest in the Normal School, and of doing something for the cause of education in the State.

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Candidates for admission should be, if females, at least 16, and if males, at least 17 years of age. They should be present at the school-room at 9 o'clock on the first day of the term. No applicants will be admitted after the commencement of the term, or unless they intend to remain in the school at least two terms.

Applicants must present to the Principal a certificate of good moral character, and must undergo an examination in Reading, Writing, Spelling, Geography, Grammar and Arithmetic, and (with the exception named below) must, if admitted to the school, sign a declaration that they intend to teach in the State. To all such, the tuition will be free.

By a special arrangement, persons not intending to teach in the State may be admitted to the school by paying a tuition fee of \$5 per term. The Board of Instruction consists of Dana P. Colburn, Principal; Miss H. W. Goodwin, Miss E. T. Brown, Miss A. F. Saunders, Assistants; R. S. Fielden, Teacher of Vocal Music.

Prof. S. S. Greene gives lessons or lectures regularly during each term. The terms for 1856 will commence as follows:

The Spring and Summer Term of 14 weeks, on April 7th.

The Fall Term of 11 weeks, on September 8th.

The Winter Term on December 1st.

TEACHERS' INSTITUTES.

DEXTER ASYLUM.

The general superintendence of this Institution is placed in charge of the Mayor and Aldermen, who act as a Board of Overseers. They hold quarterly meetings at the Asylum on the first Saturdays of August, November, February and May. They also appoint one from their body, weekly, to act as a visiting committee for that period, who reports the next succeeding Monday, to the Board of Aldermen, the state of the establishment during his tour of duty. The immediate charge of the house is in care of a Master and Matron, annually appointed by the Board of Aldermen. The present incumbents are Hollis Chaffin and wife. Divine service is performed in the chapel every Sabbath.

The medical department is entrusted to a Board of Physicians, appointed annually by the Mayor and Aldermen. This Board at present consists of Drs. Collins and Ely, who attend the sick quarterly in succession. Dr. Joseph Mauran is the consulting physician. In all cases of peculiar interest or difficulty, they meet in consultation, keep a record of sickness, a report of which is made to the Board of Overseers, at their quarterly meetings. The number of inmates in the institution is between one and two hundred.

BUTLER HOSPITAL FOR THE INSANE.

Annual meeting of the Corporation, 4th Wednesday in January. Every person who has already contributed or shall hereafter contribute the sum of \$100 to the funds of the Corporation, is thereby constituted a member of the same.

The Hospital can accommodate about 145 patients. It is in a flourishing condition, under the able management of Dr. Ray. The institution is situated in the north-east part of the city. The grounds embrace 114 acres of land, pleasantly situated upon the Seekonk river. The expenditures of the institution during the last year amounted to \$26,879 77. Average number of patients, 136. Average cost of each patient, \$3 91 per week, allowing for bad debts. Lowest price for admission of patients, \$4 00 per week. The condition of the farm has materially improved during the past year. Its produce is estimated at \$2,238 97.

Since the opening of the institution, in 1847, 719 patients have been admitted; 582 discharged; 231 recovered; 183 improved; 36 unimproved; and 132 have died.

Application for the admission of patients may be made to one of the trustees, or to Dr. Ray. Letters and small parcels for the officers or patients, may be left at Abner Gay's, 50 North Main street.

PROVIDENCE REFORM SCHOOL.

This excellent institution went into operation Nov. 1, 1850. It is located at the lower end of East-street, at what was formerly called the Tockwotten house. It is designed for the confinement, instruction and reformation of idle and vicious children.

During the last year, a new workshop has been erected, at a cost of a little over \$5000, to the great advantage of the institution. The expenses the last year have been \$16,309 69. The number of inmates of the school, at the date of the last annual report, was, Boys, 111; Girls, 31; total, 142.

MINISTRY AT LARGE.

This institution was established at the close of 1841. Its object is to provide moral and religious instruction for persons whose wants have not been met by the regular churches of the city. A Free Chapel has been erected on Benefit street, a considerable Sunday school has been gathered, and by evening schools, conferences and visiting, the Minister and his assistants exert an important influence. Rev. Edwin M. Stone is the Minister at large. He is at his office in the Chapel, from 11 to 12 A. M., daily. His residence is No. 22 Halsey-street. This institution is supported by voluntary contributions, chiefly from the First Congregational and Westminster churches, and its direction is entrusted to the care of twelve Managers from these congregations.

RHODE-ISLAND STATE PRISON

The last report of the Board of Inspectors presents an encouraging view of its present condition. A new wing, comprising additional cells for male, and ample and suitable accommodations for female prisoners, has been completed. A large and commodious workshop has been erected, and will be finished early in the spring. A boiler-house has been built, and the engine contracted for. The wall has been extended so as to greatly enlarge the premises of the prison.

The amount required for these improvements will exceed the estimates obtained. The Inspectors, however, believe that they have all been accomplished at a reasonable cost, and that nothing has been spent that has not been for the best interest of the State. An account of the receipts and expenditures in this department will accompany this report.

The disciplinary condition of the prison throughout the year has been satisfactory. The health of the prisoners has been good, and the amount of work accomplished in the State Prison has been large. The library has received large additions, and is has been used extensively by all those who are able to read. The religious exercises have been for some time interrupted in consequence of the extensive alterations which have been in progress in that part of the building appropriated to religious services. This difficulty is now removed by the completion of a chapel of sufficient size to contain all the prisoners, male and female, both of the prison and jail.

The new portions of the prison building have all been constructed after the most approved plans. They contain hospital apartments, for both males and females, and afford every convenience required for the health and reasonable comfort of the prisoners.

The Inspectors believe that the State Prison is now what such an institution ever should be—a house of reformation. The convicts are enured to habits of industry. They are comfortably fed, clothed and lodged, separated from each other, when not under the eye of their officers, and are well supplied with instructive and interesting books. If some additional means for intellectual and moral cultivation were provided, the State will have done all for their reformation that humanity could desire. Nor have these efforts of the State been wanting in important results. The charac.

ter of the prisoners has been for some years decidedly improving. Within the last year several convicts have left the prison at the expiration of their sentences, who have immediately found work in the city and vicinity, and now give good evidence of having become worthy and respectable members of society.

It will thus be seen that the State Prison, besides supporting itself, has paid \$1,430 09 towards the support of the Jail.

The Board of Inspectors bear testimony to the capacity, skill and fidelity of the Warden, Samuel L. Blaisdell, Esq. In addition to the management of the Prison, a large share of responsibility has devolved upon him, in consequence of the great amount of building and alterations now in progress. He has proved himself equal to every emergency; and it is to his energy, humanity and intelligence, that we mainly ascribe the present prosperous condition of the Prison.

REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT, FOR THE YEAR ENDING MAY 31, 1856.

TO THE HONORABLE THE CITY COUNCIL:

The undersigned a Committee of the Board of Engineers, respectfully present to the Council, their Report for the year ending May 31, 1856, as required by the fourth section of the Fire Ordinance. Also a list of the officers and members attached to the Department, with their ages and residences, together with the apparatus under their charge and its condition: the location of Reservoirs, and other sources for obtaining water connected with the Department; an abstract of the expenditures for the past year and a list of fires, alarms and the causes thereof, together with the

amount of loss and insurance, as well as could be ascertained; to all of which they would invite your attention.

The Department has been called out during the year sixty-two times; from fires in the City forty-nine times, from other causes thirteen times. The amount of loss by fire has been \$54,590, and the insurance upon the same \$29,215.

Three Reservoirs have been built on Thayer, Angell and North Main streets and the one on Dorrance street completed.

About three thousand feet of Iron pipe has been purchased and laid at the Steam Mill and on High and Fenner streets.

One New Engine and Hose Carriage of L. Button & Co.'s manufacture, have been added to the department.

A Hose Company, carrying five hundred feet Hose, with a force of four men, has been organized. The necessity of having a supply of extra hose always at command, to meet the various exigencies which often arise, has been too apparent to the Board, to delay applying the proper remedy, any longer.

The inefficiency of our present system of Fire Alarm, has from time to time received the attention of the Board, and they expected to have embodied in this Report a plan for a Fire Alarm Telegraph, which they have had under consideration. The attention of your Honorable Body will soon be called to this important subject again, and under such circumstances as will, they trust, ensure its adoption.

In conclusion, the Board beg leave to call the attention of your Honorable Body, to the Resolution ordering the erection of a ward room for the seventh Ward. This Department has already been charged with the sum of 1200 dollars, paid for the lot on Pallas street, and it is intended to place the cost of the erection of the building to the same account. The present company of No. 9, have not petitioned for, nor do they desire the change of location, neither has this Board recommended it. It was under the old system that the petition for a new house was presented and recommended, and the present Department should not be charged with this large outlay, any more than in the purchase of the building of the Pioneer Fire Company, which has been made since the organization of the present system. In no view of the case should the appropriation for the Department bear more than its proportion of the whole expense, and the Board having failed to get any redress after explaining the matter to your committee, would now appeal to your Honorable Body, for their opinion, as they do not understand that by the Resolution itself, the expenditure was to be placed to the account of this Department. Regarding themselves as in a great measure responsible for the disposal of the appropriation for the Department, the Board do not think that with the exercise of due vigilance and economy, there will in ordinary circumstances, be any necessity for an increase of that appropriation.
