ORDINANCES SECOND READING

The Following Ordinances were in City Council
June 19, 1975, Read and Passed the First Time
and are Returned for Passage the Second
Time:

An Ordinance In Amendment of and In Addi-
tion to Chapter 1575 of the Ordinances of the
City of Providence Entitled, "An Ordinance
Approving and Adopting the Official Redevel-
opment Plan for the Weybosset Hill Project, No.
R.I. R-7."

Be it ordained by the City of Providence:

1. That Chapter 1575 of the Ordinance of the
City of Providence, entitled "An Ordinance Ap-

proving and Adopting the Official Redevelopment
Plan for the Weybosset Hill Project No. R. I.
R-7" as heretofore amended, be and is hereby
further amended, as follows:

A. Parcel No. 16 — *Building Controls* (Pages
27 and 28 of the Official Redevelopment Plan)

(a) Floor Area Ratio, Building Coverage, Den-
sity, Building Height, Building Setback, Off-
Street Parking and Loading shall be gov-

erned by the applicable provisions of the Zoning Ordinance as amended to date.

- (b) Building Envelope: Ground floor along entire frontage of the Westminster Street public walkway must be uniformly arcaded for pedestrian traffic.
- (c) Vehicle Access: Access for parking or loading shall not be permitted along either the Cathedral Square or Westminster Street public walkway frontage.
- (d) Planning and Design Objectives: Firstly, the creation of an enclosed pedestrian and urban civic space — Cathedral Square — and the channeling of that space down the Jackson Street and Westminster Street Public Walkways. Secondly, the provision of convenient and protected retail shopping facilities which will bring activity to Cathedral Square without being inharmonious with the dignity and composure of the Square. To achieve these objectives, pedestrian arcades must be provided along Westminster walkway. The arcade as well as the building facades fronting on Cathedral Square, Westminster and Jackson Street Public Walkways of this Parcel as well as Parcel No. 13 should be uniformly designed and built.

2. That said Chapter 1575 of the Ordinance of the City of Providence as adopted and as heretofore amended, be and the same is hereby ratified and affirmed in all other respects.

3. That the ordinance shall take effect on its passage and shall be filed with the City Clerk who is hereby authorized and directed to forward a certified copy thereof to the Providence Redevelopment Agency.

An Ordinance in Amendment of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Providence, R. I., Chapter 14, Section 14-8 of the Code Entitled "Petroleum Products; Permit Fees for Bulk Storage."

Be it ordained by the City of Providence:

Section 1. Sec. 14-8. Petroleum Products; permit fees for bulk storage, is hereby revised as follows:

14-8. Petroleum products; permit fees for bulk storage.

Any person or other legal entity storing petroleum products in bulk shall pay to the Bureau of Licenses of the City of Providence the following annual fees for permits granted by the City Council:

- (A.) For premises with a storage capacity up to 500 gallons No fees
- (B.) For premises with a storage capacity of 251 to 21,000 gallons \$ 10.00
- (C.) For premises with a storage capacity of 21,001 gallons to 50,000 gallons 50.00
- (D.) For premises with a storage capacity of 50,001 to 100,000 gallons 300.00
- (E.) For premises with a storage capacity of 100,001 to 1,000,000 gallons 500.00
- (F.) For premises with a storage capacity of 1,000,001 to 5,000,000 gallons 1,000.00

(G.) For premises with a storage capacity of 5,000,001 gallons or over 2,000.00

(H.) Transfer of licenses, each 10.00

(I.) Products stored for own consumption and not for resale No fees

Sec. 2. This Ordinance shall take effect on January 1, 1976.

COUNCILMAN LYNCH moves the Ordinance be Passed, the Second Time, and this Motion is Seconded by **COUNCILMEN ADDISON** and **GARAN**.

COUNCILMAN GORODETSKY notes that the subject Ordinance is inconsistent and cites the following:

(A) For premises with a storage capacity of up to 500 gallons.....No Fees

and that under section (B) the figure of "251" should be corrected to the figure "501".

COUNCILMAN LYNCH moves that the Ordinance be amended by deleting the figure "251" under section (B) and inserting in lieu thereof the figure "501".

Now, Therefore, Be It Ordained by the City of Providence:

Section 1. To defray the expenses of the City of Providence for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1976, the sums of money, or so much thereof, as are authorized by law, indicated in the accompanying schedule, are hereby appropriated for the objects and purposes, and in the amounts expressed therein, provided that payments thereunder shall be subject to the provisions of the Charter of the City of Providence, Chapter 832 of the Public Laws of 1940, enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Rhode Island at its January Session, A.D. 1940, and approved April 26, 1940, as amended, and subject to the provisions of the City Ordinances relative to the expenditures of money from the City Treasury. Title I Revenue Sharing, Fiscal Assistance to State and Local Government rules and regulations shall govern the portion of this Budget so designated.

Sec. 2. All moneys appropriated are to be expended under the direction of the respective department heads unless otherwise provided, subject to the approval of the Director of Finance. All moneys specifically earmarked with Federal Revenue Sharing Funds shall be so provided unless amended. Any unused Federal Revenue Sharing moneys not appropriated or not used shall not revert to surplus; but shall be reappropriated in the following fiscal year.

Sec. 3. The payments to the School Fund of the following estimated receipts, included in the appropriation of \$32,479,492.00 for the support of the Public Schools for the City of Providence fiscal period 1975-1976, will be increased or decreased to conform with the actual amounts received from such sources during the City of Providence fiscal year 1975-1976.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

This hiring freeze shall expire at the Conclusion of the 1975-76 fiscal year unless otherwise amended by Ordinance of the City Council.

Sec. 70. The limitations imposed by this Ordinance as to the total number of persons or number of any individual class of positions in a department shall not apply to those members of the armed forces of the United States of America and of the Merchant Marine who have been honorably discharged therefrom and who at the time of their induction or enlistment were employees of the City of Providence, and request within forty (40) days after discharge to return to the employ of the City, if the positions occupied or held by such persons at the time of their entrance into the service of the United States of America have not been included in the total number of positions or number of any individual class of position in a department, as fixed by this Ordinance.

Sec. 71. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Sec. 2. The minimum rate of pay for any class of position shall be payable to any person on his first appointment to the position allocated to the class, provided however, that with the recommendation of the Director of Finance and approval of the Mayor, he may enter the position at any other step in the "Pay Grade" and provided further, that if a person already in the service is transferred, he may with the recommendation of the Director of Finance and approval of the Mayor, enter the new position at the same rate of pay as he had previously received.

Sec. 3. Any employees employed in a position allocated to a class carrying minimum and maximum pay rates may be granted a pay increase from one step to the next higher step within established grade, subject to the following:

1. One "Pay Grade" step per year.
2. Recommendations for step increases shall

be made by department heads or the Chairman of Bureaus or Commissioners at the time of submission of annual budget estimates, and at no other time. Such recommendations shall be made on the basis of the quality of work and the seniority of individual employees.

3. The Director of Finance shall review such proposed step increases for availability of funds and conformity to the provisions of this Ordinance, and shall recommend approval or disapproval of the increase to the Mayor.

4. An employee entering the city service shall be eligible for a step increase on the first day of the succeeding January, April, July or October next following the completion of twelve months of service by said employee in accordance with the provisions of sub-sections 1, 2, 3, and 5 of this Section.

5. Any employee who is transferred from a position not carrying a minimum and maximum pay rate to one that carries a minimum and maximum pay rate shall receive either his present salary or the minimum salary of the new position, whichever is greater, but in no case shall the new salary exceed the maximum salary of his new position.

6. Increased compensation received by an individual as the result of promotion from a lower to a higher class shall not be deemed a step increase in the sense of the term as used in this section and in the event of promotion shall automatically receive the minimum salary for the class to which he has been promoted. If such minimum salary is the same or less than the salary he received prior to his promotion, he may receive a salary which shall be one full increment higher than his prior salary, but in no case to exceed the maximum.

Sec. 4. A given rate of pay as expressed in the compensation plan may be commuted to weekly, daily or hourly rate and established by a department head or Chairman of a Bureau or Commission with the approval of the Mayor and the Director of Finance, as the rate of pay for

employees of a particular class: provided, however, that all employees of a given class in a given unit of a department shall be paid on the same basis, excepting part-time and temporary employees.

Sec. 5 No Officer or employee of the City shall issue a check for payment of, or pay any salary or compensation to any person holding, or claiming to hold a position in the classified service, unless the Personnel Director shall have first certified that the persons named on the payroll or account of such compensation have been appointed and are employed in accordance with this Ordinance.

Sec. 6. Chapter 1975-54 of the Ordinance approved December 20, 1974 with all amendments thereto is hereby repealed.

Sec. 7. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.
