

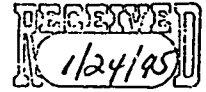

RESOLUTION OF THE

RICHMOND TOWN COUNCIL

- WHEREAS, primary and secondary education is a constitutional responsibility of the State Government; and
- WHEREAS, over the past five years the proportion of primary and secondary education expenditures paid for from local funds (as opposed to State Aid) has increased; and
- WHEREAS, it is essential that local communities have knowledge of state aid to education figures at the time they construct their local budgets; and
- WHEREAS, a secondary and primary education is the largest expense of all or virtually all cities and towns in the State of Rhode Island; and
- WHEREAS, the ability to appropriately plan Town and City budgets is essential to the taxpayers of this state.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town of Richmond requests its legislators to re-introduce and support legislation as speedily as possible that provides for the following:

EDUCATIONAL FINANCIAL SUPPORT

The general assembly finds that primary and secondary education is a constitutional responsibility of the state government; and

That over the past five years the proportion of primary and secondary education expenditures paid for from local funds (as opposed to state aid) has increased; and

That it is essential that local communities have knowledge of state aid to education figures at the time they construct their local budgets; and

That a secondary and primary education is the largest expense of all or virtually all cities and towns in the state of Rhode Island; and

That the ability to appropriately plan town and city budgets is essential to the taxpayers of this state.


Timetable established for appropriation to municipalities for support for education. Notwithstanding any provision of the general laws to the contrary, the governor shall submit to the general assembly by February 1 of each year his proposed state aid

fiscal year starting July 1 subsequent. Further, the general assembly shall pass by March 1 the appropriate bills delineating state aid to education for each city, town, and school district for the fiscal year starting July 1 subsequent. Further, should the governor choose to veto this state aid bill, it will be the joint responsibility of the general assembly and the governor to enact the appropriate general laws by March 15 which delineates state aid to education for each city, town, and school district for the fiscal year starting July 1 subsequent. Finally, notwithstanding any other provisions of the general laws or this chapter nothing herein shall be construed to prevent the government from increasing aid to education after the effective date of this act but in so doing state aid to any community may not be decreased from the level determined by the general law which was enacted by March 15.

This act shall take effect upon passage.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution, be sent to the City and Town Clerks of the other 38 cities and towns in the State of Rhode Island and the clerk of each school committee in the State of Rhode Island, along with a request that these bodies endorse this resolution and request their legislators support it.
