## ORDINANCES SECOND READING

The following Ordinance was in City Council September 18, 1997, Read and Passed the First Time and is returned for Passage the Second Time:

An Ordinance in amendment of Chapter 1996-27 of the Ordinances of the City of Providence making an appropriation of three hundred forty-nine million, two hundred thirty-eight thousand, seven hundred twelve dollars (\$349,238,712) for the Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 1998, as amended, relative to the Public Works Department.

*Be it ordained by the City of Providence:*

*Now, therefore, be it ordained by the City of Providence:*

*Section 1.* To defray the expenses of the City of Providence for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1998, the sums of money or so much thereof, as are authorized by law, indicated in the accompanying schedule, are hereby appropriated for the objects and purposes, and in amounts expressed therein provided that payments thereunder shall be subject to the provisions of the Home Rule Charter of 1980, validated by the General Assembly of the State of Rhode Island at its January Session, A.D., 1981 and approved November 4, 1980, and subject to the provisions of the City Ordinances relative to the expenditures of money from the City Treasury. Fiscal Assistance to State and Local Government rules and regulations shall govern the portion of this Budget so designated.

*Section 2.* The payments to the School Fund of the following estimated receipts included in the appropriation of \$175,615,024.00 for the support of the Public Schools for the City of Providence fiscal period 1997-1998, will be increased or decreased to conform with the actual amounts received from such sources during the City of Providence fiscal year 1997-1998.

*Section 3.* Any transfer to the General Fund from Expendable Trust Funds shall be restricted to and deemed to be utilized for the payment of debt obligations of the City of Providence.

*Section 4.* The provisions included in this

ordinance supersede any prior ordinances or any provisions thereof.

*Section 5.* Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 17-185 and Section 17-186 of the Code of Ordinances, the amount of sixteen million, eight hundred ninety-eight thousand, thirty four dollars (\$16,898,034) is hereby appropriated to the Pension Accumulation Fund.

*Section 6.* This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

**Section 61.** The number of employees in the Office of the Mayor shall not be limited. The Mayor may appoint without reference to civil service provisions and without the necessity for approval by the City Council a Chief of Staff and such Deputies, Assistant's, Aides, Secretaries, Stenographers, Clerks and other personnel as he may deem necessary.

**Section 62.** No person shall be appointed to, and the City Treasurer shall not pay, nor shall any officer or employee of the city issue a check for the payment of, nor pay any salary or compensations to a person holding or claiming to hold a position in the classified service in any department which is in excess of the total number of positions or the number of any individual class of positions provided herein for the particular department; provided, however, that with the approval of the department head and the Director of Finance, said maximum may be exceeded temporarily when regular employees are absent on vacation and the excess employees do not aggregate more than the number on vacation or during the absence of employees, due to injuries received while discharging their duties as employees or during absences of employees on sick leave and it is necessary to employ temporary employees for the duration of the employees sick leave, or during the absence of employees who have been granted temporary leave of absence or when in the opinion of the Director of Finance, a temporary emergency exists.

**Section 63.** Where no maximum limit is fixed on the total number of positions or the number of any individual class of positions in a department, the number of persons appointed and employees shall be determined by the unexpended appropriation available.

**Section 64.** Chapter 1996-29 of the Ordinances of the City of Providence approved July 23, 1996, with all amendments and additions thereto, is hereby repealed and all other Ordinances or parts thereof inconsistent herewith are likewise repealed.

**Section 65.** The provisions of this ordinance shall not be construed as a ratification of any collective bargaining agreement.

*Section 4.* Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Ordinance, all employees including personnel whose salaries are governed by the Salary Review Commission as provided in Section 415 of the Providence Home Rule Charter shall not receive any increase in salary in excess of 3.75% of the salary in effect for said personnel on June 30, 1997.

*Section 5.* The provisions of this ordinance shall not be construed as a ratification of any collective bargaining agreement.

*Section 6.* This Ordinance shall take effect upon its Passage.

## PERSONAL EXPRESSION

**COUNCILMAN JACKSON requests the privilege of the floor to speak on a point of personal expression and states:**

"I'd like to comment on some disturbing facts that read in the newspaper through the week in

regards to the School Department, our Providence School Department. Many might of seen in the beginning part of the week, we're only school system in the State of Rhode Island that spends less per pupil then Central Falls and we all know where they get their money from and that's from

the State. And that State doesn't know how to finance the cities and towns appropriately in regards to school appropriation as it is. It's disturbing to me also doing the week that we read that we bring back administrators, retired administrators and I know Councilwoman Nolan spoke on this in the newspaper. We bring back retired administrators at outrageous figures, but we can only spend only \$2,300 per pupil in our schools. And it is also disturbing to me that we, again, when the School Department originally came in front us, they were taking out those Zone Coordinators. But, when they went back to their School Board, they decided to keep those in because that's going to help with the total redeployment of the school department. How does that effect kids? It doesn't effect kids whatsoever. What effect kids is making sure they have the proper books, the proper pens, the proper pencils and the proper enrichment programs, such as music programs, art programs, physical education programs and those types of programs; not because a new zone administrator is going to be going to conferences all over the United State of American and coming back with these grand ideas that he or she picked up on these conferences. And not because we have to hire back retired school administrators just so they can live their life in retirement fully as they please. It is very disturbing to me, again, that our budget does not reflect what are schools are supposed to reflect and that is the needs and the means to educate our students. Finally, on the school department, not in regards to the budget, I also found it very

disturbing, though the school is not in my ward, it's in Councilwoman Williams' ward, in today's paper, a letter by six teachers to Dr. Zarrella. Saying who they feel should be principal of Hope High School, not who came out to the public forum and who the people in the public forum supported and who should be principal of Hope High School and not who, again, the parents of the students who go to Hope High School think should be principal of Hope High School, but who they feel, six of them feel . . . and then two of them saying "Oh, no, we want to take our names off that letter now because the Journal Bulletin." Well, why do they want to take their names off because their reacting to what could be possible reactions within the school. If they cared about the kids they were educating and they were good educators, they wouldn't have to care about how the kids reacted. The point of the matter is, again, certain people, a minority of people in some of our school systems, some of our teachers, feel that they should be the ones who pick and choose who should be their administrators and the point of the fact is, they don't want a minority administrator in Hope High School. And you know what the point is, we know that we're not going to get minority administrators in non-minority schools. So, we better make dam sure that we have minority administrators in minority schools. Thank you."

And a large portion of that citizenry are people of different racial, gender and ethnic diversity. And related to this whole matter of this appointment is the issue of something that's pending before this council and many of us have already received letters on it from candidates and that being the Municipal Court judgeship. This Council unanimously passed a resolution honoring the honorable William Grande and who left a great legacy to the citizens of this great City. In addition to that now we have the responsibility to appoint or elect another judge to replace the Honorable Judge Grande. That being said, Madam Chair and Members of this Body, I think we have a responsibility to look at appointing somebody of the minority community. The Municipal Court judges are two white males. If we want to send a message, if we really want to say that this City is a city of inclusion, as opposed to exclusion. Then we have a responsibility to find — to be affirmative in our action in terms of finding a minority candidate or a woman candidate or a candidate other than a white male to send to this honorable body. So, I would hope that

as we begin to politic to support candidates that we will be mindful of the fact that this court is an important court. It deals with many of the citizens of our great City and I think we have a responsibility to show that we're proactive in our affirmative action and I would hope that this Council at the appropriate time will appoint a minority candidate to that position. Thank you, Madam Chair."

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**COUNCILWOMAN YOUNG requests the privilege of the floor to speak on a point of personal expression and states:**

"I just want to echo that I certainly whole heartily agree with my colleague.
