

To the Honorable City Council of Providence

Honorable Gentlemen:

As requested by Resolution of your Honorable Body on October 15th, a study was initiated to determine the advisability of installing radar speed detection devices for the purpose of regulating moving vehicular traffic. Findings are not conclusive, and cannot be until radar equipment is actually tested in Providence under peculiarly local field conditions for a period of several weeks.

The Commissioner, accompanied by Chief Murphy and Captain Comer, inspected the Warwick installation on Friday, November 6th. This equipment is completely portable and requires a minimum of maintenance. Under the conditions of the test, which were ideal, the equipment functioned in a spectacular manner. The machine was set up in a school zone on a four lane highway. Traffic was very light, probably in the density of 40 cars per hour. In the hour when we were observing, four violators were cited and several were warned.

The experience in Warwick shows the machine to be ideal for controlling speed in uncongested areas. Heavy traffic does not permit effective use of the equipment. The psychological effect of radar on the motorist seems to produce its best effects. After the installation of signs on all approaches to the city, a six months educational period was allowed before rigid enforcement. The District Court Judges were given demonstrations of the capabilities of the equipment before it was purchased.

Oddly enough, Warwick has not had a measurable reduction in speeding cases since the introduction of radar. However, an annual increase of seven per cent in car registrations is accepted in Warwick as showing an actual reduction.

Chief Fouchecourt of Cranston reports that radar's chief value is psychological and that it is not effective in heavy traffic.

Roger Chandler, Providence Traffic Engineer, feels that there are certain streets in Providence where radar could be very effective. The Traffic Engineering Department has a radar unit which is about four years old. Mr. Chandler will gladly make this unit available for police experimentation.

The findings up to this point are:

1. Radar has a definite psychological effect on speeders.
2. There are streets in Providence where it could be very effective. These streets comprise those which are not heavily traveled, or which have not been placed under signal light control for long stretches, such as Mt. Pleasant Avenue, Cathedral Avenue, parts of Smith Street, etc..
3. It is quite ineffective on heavily traveled streets.
4. The Judges of the District Court must be definitely convinced of its feasibility in Providence before radar control is adopted.
5. It has not enabled Warwick to reduce its police manpower. The machine must have a policeman in control while it is in use.

No attempt, as yet, has been made to assess the value of radar in cities comparable to Providence. It is felt that the problems of Providence, while not unique, are not readily evaluable in the light of other cities' experiences.

The Police Department will arrange to use the Traffic Department's radar for a period of time sufficiently long to provide us with a firm base for future policy. The Commissioner of Public Safety will submit additional reports to the Honorable Council as the project develops.
