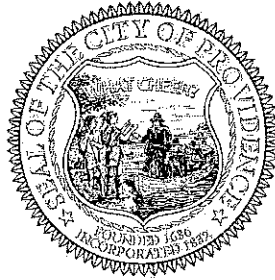

ORDINANCE SECOND READING

The Following Ordinance was in City Council January 21, 2016, Read and Passed the First Time and is Returned for Passage the Second Time:

An Ordinance in Amendment of Chapter 23, "Streets, Sidewalks and Public Places," Section 23-13, "Removal of Snow-Required"

SECTION 1. The Code of Ordinances of the City of Providence, Chapter 23, "Streets, Sidewalks and Public Places," Section 13, of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended as follows:

Sec. 23-13. Removal of snow and ice-Required.

(a) All owners or persons having care of any property bordering any street, highway or public place within the city, shall, within the first eight (8) hours of daylight after the end of any snowfall, or the fall or deposit of snow or ice on the sidewalk of said property, from any cause whatsoever:

- (1) Remove or cause to be removed all snow or ice from a path not less than three (3) feet in width the length of the sidewalk of the entire border in or on said street, highway, or public place, including from any pedestrian access ramps cut into street curbs bordering said property and, for corner lots, from the portion(s) of the sidewalk extending past the property to and including the street curb, and provide for the treatment of any snow or ice remaining on any shoveled sidewalk, with sand, salt or other suitable material;
- (2) Remove or cause to be removed all snow or ice from around any fire hydrant on the sidewalk bordering said property; and
- (3) Remove or cause to be removed all snow or ice from the opening of any catch basin bordering the sidewalk of said property.

(b) Any person found guilty of violating this section shall be fined not less than twenty-five dollars (\$25.00), nor more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00), for each calendar day upon which such snow or ice is not removed or treated as herein provided. The police department and/or an inspector or supervisor of the public works department shall be authorized to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance. Failure to pay the fine within thirty (30) days will result in the creation of a special lien against the property, which lien shall be removed only upon payment of the fine in addition to an administrative penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100.00). The imposition of such fine and/or administrative penalty may be appealed to municipal court within ten (10) days of the issuance of a written citation for the violation.

Upon the issuance of a violation by the police or public works department, the department of public works may, in its discretion, remove or cause such snow or ice to be removed or treated. The owner shall reimburse the city for the expenses incurred for such removal or treatment, in addition to any fine or administrative penalty imposed hereunder. The city may also impose a municipal charges lien on the property.

(c) The city shall devise a policy to inform property owners of their responsibilities under section 23-13, and to inform the public of the importance of clearing sidewalks for pedestrian access, and safe travel for pedestrians, especially children walking to school, the elderly, and persons with disabilities. The city also shall make every effort to create and/or support programs to provide assistance to elderly property owners, and property owners with disabilities in meeting the requirements of section 23-13.

SECTION 2. The Code of Ordinances of the City of Providence, Chapter 23, "Streets, Sidewalks and Public Places," Section 16, of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended as follows:

SECTION 3. The Code of Ordinances of the City of Providence, Chapter 23, "Streets, Sidewalks and Public Places," Section 17, of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended as follows:

Sec. 23-17 - Removal of snow and ice on sidewalks adjoining city property.

- (a) Sidewalks adjoining property belonging to or occupied by the city shall be cleared of snow under the direction of the department, committee or officer of the city having by ordinance or statute the care, custody or use of such property. Whenever the sidewalk or any part thereof adjoining any property belonging to or occupied by the city shall be encumbered with ice, the department, committee or officer of the city having by ordinance or statute the care, custody or use of such property, shall cause such sidewalk to be made safe and convenient by removing the ice therefrom or by covering the same with sand, salt or some other suitable substance. For corner lots, this requirement will include the portion(s) of the sidewalk extending past the building or lot to and including the street curb.
- (b) The expense of any such work shall be paid from the appropriation for the support of such department. In case any such department, committee or officer has no janitors or employees available to do said work, the superintendent of public buildings may, upon request of such department, committee or officer, cause said work to be done, the expense thereof to be charged to the appropriation for such department, committee or officer.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall take effect upon passage.

Resolution Reflecting upon the life and character of the late **Vincent A. “Buddy” Cianci, Jr.**, Mayor of the City of Providence from January 7, 1975 to April 25, 1984 and January 7, 1991 to September 6, 2002.

RESOLVED, That the following Minute of the life and character of the late Vincent A. Cianci, Jr., Mayor of the City of Providence from January 7, 1975 to April 25, 1984 and January 7, 1991 to September 6, 2002, is hereby adopted, ordered, and inscribed on the records of the City Council and a duly certified copy be transmitted to the family of the deceased.

MINUTE

Vincent A. “Buddy” Cianci, Jr., was born on April 30, 1941 to Vincent A. Cianci, Sr., and Esther (Capobianco) Cianci in Cranston, Rhode Island.

After graduating from the Moses Brown School in Providence, Cianci earned a bachelor’s degree in government from Fairfield University, a master’s degree in political science from Villanova University, and a law degree from Marquette University School of Law.

On November 29, 1966, Cianci enlisted in the United States Army, and was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant in the Military Police Corps in 1967. He served on active duty until 1969, and then in the United States Army Reserve as a civil affairs officer until 1972.

In 1969, Cianci became a Special Assistant Attorney General for the State of Rhode Island and, in 1973, he became the prosecutor for the Rhode Island Attorney General’s Anti-Corruption Strike Force.

In November of 1974, at the age of 33, Cianci was elected Mayor of the City of Providence, defeating incumbent Mayor Joseph Doorley to become the youngest person ever elected mayor, the first Italian-American mayor, and the first Republican mayor in more than three decades.

An incredibly charismatic figure, as mayor, Cianci’s wide smile was a regular sight at events and large gatherings. Moreover, his legendary wit quickly endeared him to the people of Providence, helping him win re-election in 1978 and 1982, as well as the Republican nomination for Governor in 1980.

After resigning from office in 1984, Cianci became a popular and successful local radio show host, but chose to re-enter politics in 1990. Running as an independent candidate, he defeated both Democratic and Republican candidates in November of 1990 and was, once again, sworn in as Mayor of the City of Providence on January 7, 1991.

During Cianci's second tenure as mayor, Providence experienced a period of renewal. Cianci tirelessly promoted his city and encouraged major revitalization efforts, such as the River Relocation Project, the Capital Center Project, the construction of Waterplace Park, the Rhode Island Convention Center, and the Providence Place Mall, and the creation of WaterFire, all of which helped Providence earn the nickname, "the Renaissance City." He was re-elected in both 1994 and 1998.

In September 2002, Cianci resigned as mayor amid a federal investigation. In 2007, he returned to public life as a radio talk show host and television political commentator. In 2014, he once again ran for mayor as an independent candidate. Despite receiving a majority of the vote in eight out of the city's fifteen wards and 45% overall, Cianci lost the three-way election. It was his first defeat in a mayoral election and only the second electoral defeat of his political career.

Throughout his life, Cianci was honored many times for his work on behalf of the people of Providence. He received the Robert "Cy" Killian Humanitarian Award from Big Brothers of Rhode Island, the Tree of Life Award from the Jewish National Fund, the "Safety in the City" award from the Women's Center of Rhode Island, and the Genesis Center Award for service to Providence's refugee and immigrant population. Additionally, he received the West End Community Center Award, the Providence Recreation Department Leadership Award, and the Elmwood Foundation Revitalization Award. In 1996, he was granted the title of Grand Ufficiale in the Order Al Merito della Repubblica Italiana by Italian President Oscar Luigi Scalfaro and, in 1998, he received the prestigious Saint Joseph's Day Merit Award from the Piave Lodge (#364) of the Order of the Sons of Italy in America.

Cianci was the recipient of numerous honorary degrees, including an honorary Doctorate in Public Service from Fairfield University, an honorary Doctorate of Business Administration from Johnson & Wales University, an honorary Doctorate of Law from Roger Williams University, and an honorary Doctorate of Jurisprudence from the New England School of Law.

A devoted father and grandfather, Cianci dedicated much of his final years to raising and supporting his three grandchildren, Olivia, Joseph and Julius, after the tragic and premature death of his beloved daughter, Nicole.

With his passing on January 28, 2016, Vincent A. "Buddy" Cianci will be missed and mourned by countless friends, family, and associates to whom he bequeathed a wealth of fond and wonderful memories. May God, in His Wisdom, bestow upon Vincent A. Cianci, Eternal Rest and, to his family and loved ones, peace and tranquility.


