Gentlemen:

In response to a Resolution to establish a crossing guard post at Pleasant and Hope Streets, a survey was made and it was learned that seven children used this crossing. It is not recommended, therefore, that a crossing guard be assigned to this location.

A survey was also conducted at the intersection of Ontario and Niagara Streets where there are 555 crossings during the day, and, despite the fact that there is "boulevard stop" control, the children disregard the flow of traffic and definitely need supervision. It is recommended, therefore, that a crossing guard be assigned to this location; and it will be necessary to increase the number of crossing guards authorized from 94 to 95.



Subject: Your memorandum, dated July 21, 1967, re: Roosevelt Street School being transferred back to the City Administration

At the meeting of the School Committee on September 25, 1967, your memorandum of July 21, 1967, and the accompanying resolution were read to the members.

The following statement met with their approval:

On November 27, 1961 Resolution 615, approving the ~~disposal of the~~ disposal of the Roosevelt Street Elementary School was passed by the Providence School Committee; and turned over to the City Council for any disposition that the said body would deem advisable. *expense please*

On November 16, 1962, the Providence City Council passed its Resolution 593, approving and authorizing the continued use of Roosevelt Street Elementary School by the Providence School Department.

The building was refurbished and prepared for use for a maintenance headquarters, and is presently housing a variety of maintenance shops.

When the Vocational building is built, the vocational shops at Bough Street will be moved, and the maintenance shops, now housed at Roosevelt Street Elementary School building, will be moved to Bough Street.

Gentlemen:

At your request, this Department has made an inspection of the Merino School located at 181 Glenbridge Avenue, on February 7, 1968, and the following are our findings:

1. Building is a two-story and basement frame structure containing four classrooms, two on each floor.
2. Building is completely sprinklered, including loft space.
3. Exits consist of unprotected wooden stairs from the basement to the second floor.
4. Classrooms on each floor open out directly onto front and rear stairways. Stairways at the first floor level terminate into front and rear entrance vestibules which in turn open out directly to front and rear yards.
5. Exits from basement consist of two stairways to the first floor and two bulkheads leading directly to side yards. Stairways and bulkheads are so laid out that boys and girls toilet rooms have ready access to both stairways and bulkheads.
6. All exterior doors including bulkhead doors are equipped with panic hardware as required.
7. Ceiling of basement completely exposed. Boiler room has no protective ceiling and no protective wall enclosure. Boiler is oil fired.

8. Building equipped with fire alarm stations on each floor and main fire alarm call box connected with Fire Department on the first floor in front entrance vestibule.

9. Doors opening from classrooms to stairways are wood with glass transoms over same. Doors not self-closing.

10. Each floor provided with fire extinguisher.

11. No fire escape on building.

12. Noticed wet spots in second floor plaster ceilings.

13. Stairway treads covered with steel anti-slip treads.

14. Stairways open at basement level. Stairway soffits from basement to second floor unprotected.

15. Exterior of building:

Following noted:—

(a) Loose and missing clapboards.

(b) Missing rain conductors at two corner of building.

(c) Dangerous condition of exterior stairs from grade to first floor.

Recommendations:

General overall structural condition of building satisfactory. However, the following repairs and improvements should be made in order to provide maximum safety for those who occupy the building:

1. Repair exterior walls—nail tight all loose clapboards and replace those fallen off.

2. Replace two rain conductors.

3. Replace missing rails on front entrance steps and repair stair platform.

4. Renew completely rear exterior stair platform - present platform patched up and not level.

5. Block up all transoms over doors opening into stairways and install closers on all stairway doors.

6. Enclose boiler room with cement blocks, protect ceiling with fire proof wall board or lath and plaster, and install fire door on opening.

7. Cover stairway soffits from basement to second floor with fire-resistive covering.

8. Boiler room not to be used for storage of any kind of combustible materials or items.

9. Replace all broken glass.

10. Check roof for leaks which are the cause of wet spots in second floor plaster ceilings.

11. Exterior of building badly in need of painting.



Dear Sir:

At a meeting of the Zoning Board of Review held on Tuesday, March 5, 1960, the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, Vincent Duva, owner of Lot 16 on Assessor's Plat 126 (435 Mt. Pleasant Avenue) in a Residence R-1 Zone, on January 17, 1960, filed an application for permission to be relieved from Section 41-A of the Zoning Ordinance in the proposed installation of an additional 8,000 gallon underground gasoline storage tank, making a total storage of 18,000 gallons in all and the replacing of two single pumps with three dual pumps on the above described premises, and

WHEREAS, on February 13, 1960, the members of the Zoning Board of Review made an inspection of the above described premises and also of the surrounding properties and noted that property was very well kept, and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held on this application by the Zoning Board of Review at its meeting held on Tuesday, February 13, 1960, after public notice as provided by the Zoning Ordinance, at which time it was held for further consideration,

RESOLVED: That the Zoning Board of Review does hereby make the variance of Section 41-A under the Zoning Ordinance and does hereby grant the application of Vincent Duva, substantially in accordance with the plans and plot plans filed with said Board, provided that the use of the existing 4,000 gallon tank located on the southern property line be discontinued and tank either be removed or dry-filled and a new 4,000 gallon tank be installed on the north, northwesterly side of said premises and further provided that all remote fills and vents be relocated to the north side of premises subject to the approval of the Department of Building Inspection. A copy of said plans and plot plan are hereby made a part of this resolution and filed with the Director of the Department of Building Inspection.
