CHRONOLOGICAL TABLE OF EVENTS CONNECTED
WITH THE HISTORY OF PROVIDENCE.

1636. The first settlement of the Town was made by Roger Williams and five others; the land having been purchased of the Indians for a valuable consideration.

1640. A town government was this year organized by the appointment of five "Disposers."

1643. Roger Williams sailed from New York to England, to procure a Charter of Incorporation for the colonies of Rhode Island and Providence.

1644. Mr. Williams having obtained a Charter, returned with it by the way of Boston.

1647. The first General Assembly, or "General Court," was held at Portsmouth, May 16th of this year.

1650. The General Assembly, anticipating trouble from the Indians, passed an order for the towns to furnish themselves with arms and warlike stores.

1651. During this year Mr. Coddington returned from England with a commission appointing him Governor for life, which put an end to the then existing government; but the inhabitants being dissatisfied with his conduct, appointed Roger Williams and Dr. John Clark to visit England, to procure a new Charter.

1652. Mr. Williams and Dr. Clark having fulfilled their appointment, returned with the orders of the Council, vacating Coddington's commission, and re-uniting all the towns under the Charter.

1654. All the towns having re-united, under the Charter, a General Election took place at Warwick, September 12.—The first recorded military election took place in Providence this year; laws were passed regulating the sale of liquors; a prison and a pair of stocks were ordered to be built in Providence. All the inhabitants were required by the Court of Commissioners to sign a submission to the Protector and the Parliament. The number of freemen in Providence, this year, was forty-two.

1656. A law was passed regulating the publication of marriages. At a town meeting this year, a fort was authorized to be erected on Stamper's hill.

1657. Mr. Williams having charged William Harris with high treason, he was put under bonds for £500—but was never tried.

1658. The town, though strongly urged by the Commissioners of the united colonies, steadfastly refused to banish such Quakers as were here, or to prohibit others from coming; and consequently became a city of refuge for that persecuted class.

1659. On the accession of Charles II. a commission was

ordered by the General Assembly to be sent to Mr. Clark in England, to procure a renewal of the Charter from that monarch.

1662. Regulations were made respecting the conveyances of land in writing, which had hitherto been generally neglected. A bridge was ordered to be built over the Moshassuck river, probably at or near what is now called Randall's bridge.

1663. The Charter from King Charles II. having arrived, great preparations were made to celebrate its reception in due form. Commissioners from all the towns met at Newport for that purpose, and the Charter was read and exhibited to the vast assembly present.

1664. At the October session of the General Assembly, a tax of £600 was ordered, of which £100 was on Providence.

1665. Roger Williams was authorized to receive tolls for passing Weybosset bridge, he having engaged to keep it in repair.—Toll was exacted from strangers, and "of townsmen what they are free to give."

1666. Nothing was paid from, or received in the Town Treasury.

1672. Roger Williams held a public disputation with three Friends or Quakers, which continued for three days at Newport, and one in Providence. Members of the General Assembly were, for the first time, required to take an oath or affirmation on commencing their official duties.

1676. Thirty houses in Providence were burnt by the Indians. King Philip, who was the master spirit among all the tribes, was killed in battle this year, and peace restored.

1678. A ferry was established across Seekonk river, where Central bridge now is.

1681. Riding on the gallop in "Providence-street," between what is now Canal market and Transit-street, was prohibited this year.

1686. Sir Edmund Andross arrived in New England as Governor of all the colonies. This was the most gloomy period in the history of New England.

1695. The General Assembly ordered a prison to be built in Providence.

1700. The burial ground at the north end of the city was established.

1703. The colony was divided into two counties,—Providence Plantations and Rhode-Island.

1710. The emission of paper money was authorized by the General Assembly, for the first time in this state.

1716. The town was visited this year by the small pox.

1727. Governor Cranston died this year, having been elected Governor twenty-nine years in succession. Governor Jenekes having been chosen his successor, moved with his family to Newport, as all his predecessors had resided there. George II. was proclaimed king in this town, from the balcony of the late Manufacturers' hotel.

1730. The population of Providence this year was 3,916.

1739. A public ferry was established where Washington bridge now is.

1744. The General Assembly granted a lottery to raise funds for building a bridge at Weybosset, which was built the next year, being eighteen feet wide.

1748. The population of the town this year was 3,452.

1754. The inhabitants of Providence petitioned the town for power to purchase a "large water engine."

1758. About two thousand of the king's troops were quartered in Providence during the months of April and May of this year. The old Court-house, together with the books of the Providence Library were destroyed by fire this year.

1761. Weybosset bridge was destroyed by a gale of wind, on October 24, and caused the highest tide "in the memory of man."

1762. The first printing office in this town was established by William Goddard; and the first play performed in New England was in Providence this same year.

1765. Spirited instructions were given by the town to its representatives, in the General Assembly, against the rights of Great Britain to impose taxes on the colony without their consent.

1766. Rhode-Island College established at Warren, but soon after removed to Providence.

1768. A large Elm tree near Olney-street, was dedicated as a tree of Liberty, and an address made by Silas Downer.

1772. The armed schooner Gaspee was destroyed in Providence river, early in the spring of this year; being the first open and armed opposition to British authority.

1774. Population of the town, 4,321. Number of dwellings 421. Families, 655.

1781. Gen. Washington visited Providence, and a formal address was delivered him by a committee.

1782. Population of the town, 4,306.

1783. The news of the restoration of peace was celebrated with great pomp in this town.

1787. The ship General Washington was the first that sailed from this state to Canton. The number of vessels (110) in this port exceeded that of New York.

1789. The anniversary of Independence and the adoption of the Constitution by nine states, were jointly celebrated on the 4th July. The festivities of the occasion were marred by the exhibition of strong disapprobation by certain individuals, to celebrating the adoption of the constitution to which they were opposed.

1790. The Federal Constitution was adopted by a state convention at Newport, in May, being the last of the thirteen States; which event was celebrated with great public demonstrations of joy. President Washington again visited Providence, and took lodgings at what is now called the "Mansion House."

1791. The Providence Bank was incorporated, being the first in the State.

1792. The Weybosset bridge was re-built, with a draw to admit vessels to the Cove.

1797. The yellow fever visited the town. Business of all kinds was suspended. President John Adams visited the town in August, stopping at what is now Washington Hotel.

1800. The death of Washington was solemnized with a great display of funeral ceremonies, on 7th January, which was intensely cold. The General Assembly passed an Act establishing Free Schools.

1801. The south part of the town was ravaged by a disastrous fire, January 21.

1807. A great freshet occurred in February, destroying many bridges, mills, and dams.

1812. The news of the declaration of war against Great Britain, was received the 24th June, and was noticed by the tolling of bells, and displaying flags half-mast.

1815. Tidings of peace were announced here February 12, and the town was brilliantly illuminated. This year was signalized by the "great storm," unprecedented in its violence and destructiveness; it occurred on the 23d September.

1817. President Munroe visited the town, June 30, and put up at the now Mansion House.

1820. Population of the town 11,745. The streets furnished with lamps, and a public spirit awakened to improvements.

" James Burrill, jun., United States Senator from this State, died at Washington in December.

1824. The intelligence of the arrival of General La Fayette once more in this country, was received with great rejoicing. He visited Providence in August, and was received with the strongest testimonials of affection and regard.

1827. A Committee was appointed by the town to build the Dexter Asylum, who completed their work in 1830.

1828. Cove street was completed and a new bridge built by the Providence Washington Insurance Company.

1830. Population of the town was 16,842.

1831. A riot of four days continuance commenced September 21, during which time four men were killed.

" At a town meeting, November 22d, more than three-fifths of the votes polled were in favor of a City Charter.

1832. The City Government was organized, and Samuel W. Bridgman was elected Mayor. He retained his office till his death in December, 1839, and was succeeded by the present mayor, Thomas M. Burgess. The Asiatic Cholera made its appearance here in August.

1835. Boston & Providence Rail-Road completed.

1839. The public schools were re-organized under a new system.

1842. The Constitution, called "The People's Constitution,"

was adopted by a suffrage convention, January 12. The legislature, under this constitution, never held but one session.—Another constitution called "The Landholders' Constitution," formed by a convention, assembled under the authority of the legislature, was rejected April 21.

1843. The present Constitution, formed by a convention called by authority of the General Assembly, was declared to be established by a proclamation of the Governor, Jan. 23.

1846. April 1. Providence and Worcester Rail Road commenced; completed in the fall of 1847. Cost about \$1,950,000.

1849. The Cholera this year caused the death of 156 persons in this city, while thousands were swept off by this fearful malady in other places.

1850. June 10. Public meeting called to consult on building the Plainfield Rail-Road.

LIBRARIES.

The College Library is in Manning Hall, and contains at present upwards of 23,000 bound volumes. A part of it was selected with great pains, and with excellent judgment by Professor C. C. Jewett, now Librarian of the Smithsonian Institution, who devoted a large part of several years to the purchase of books in several

countries of Europe. At the time the catalogue was printed in 1843, the Library contained 10,235 bound volumes. The Library fund yields \$1500 per annum, \$1200 of which are devoted to the purchase of books. A new catalogue is in the process of formation. In addition to the College Library, the Libraries of the Philermenian and the United Brothers' Societies comprise together upwards of 6000 volumes, making in all upwards of 23,000 volumes, accessible to all the students of the University.

Friends' Yearly Meeting Boarding School,

Established in 1819.

This Institution is under the direction of a committee of the New England Yearly Meeting, who appoint Superintendents and teachers. The number of teachers varies with the number of scholars, who are taught in the various branches of an English education, including the Mathematics, and the Latin, Greek and French languages. Lectures are regularly delivered in Natural Philosophy and Chemistry, illustrated by experiments, and occasionally upon other subjects embraced in the course of study in the school. Through the liberality of a number of its friends, the Institution has recently received a valuable Mineralogical Cabinet.

The present Superintendents are Silas and Sarah Cornell; teachers in the male department, Charles Atherton and Moses C. Stevens. In the female department, Anna B. Paige and Anna Inman. Teacher of Latin and Greek in both departments, Geo. A. Pierce. Teacher of Drawing, Elizabeth Prosser.

The present number of volumes in the Library is more than 15,000. From the first Monday in April to the first Monday in October, the Library is open from 9, A. M. until sunset. During the remainder of the year, from 10, A. M. until 9 in the evening. The price of a share in this Institution is only \$15, and the annual tax cannot exceed \$5.

Public Schools,

The Public Schools in the city of Providence are placed by the laws of the State under the management of the School Committee, consisting of thirty members, who are annually elected by the City Council, and serve *without any compensation*. The experience of many years has shown, that the members of this Committee, each one feeling more or less heavily the pressure of his own private or professional business, cannot give that amount of time to the Public Schools, which an economical and successful management of them requires.

For ten years past the Committee have annually elected Nathan

Bishop, A. M. Superintendent of Public Schools, who also acts as Principal of the High School. He spends all his time in visiting the different Schools, exercising a careful supervision over them, and while passing from school to school, he aims to remove existing defects in the modes of teaching and management, and to introduce such improvements as his own observation and the progress of popular education may have shown to be useful. He also furnishes all necessary supplies, superintends all repairs, and in every practicable way promotes the improvement of the Public Schools.

There are at present established in the City forty-six Public Schools, in which are engaged one hundred and one Teachers; twelve gentlemen and eighty-nine ladies, who devote themselves faithfully to the instruction and government of their respective schools, which together contain about six thousand six hundred pupils.

These Public Schools are divided into four grades, viz:

FIRST GRADE.—There are now established in the City *twenty-two Primary Schools*. These schools are designed for pupils from four years of age to six or seven, according to their advancement in learning. Each school is under the immediate government and instruction of two female teachers—a Preceptress and an Assistant, and usually contains about one hundred and thirty pupils. The teachers in these schools, besides teaching the elements of *Reading, Spelling* and *Arithmetic*, give their pupils much oral instruction of a familiar kind, suited to their age, with daily exercises in *Vocal Music*.

SECOND GRADE.—There are *Eleven Intermediate Schools* established for children from six to eight or nine years of age, including those that were formerly in the first classes in the Primary Schools, and those in the lowest classes in the Grammar Schools. Each of these schools usually contains about one hundred and twenty pupils, who are under the instruction and management of two female teachers—a Preceptress and an Assistant. The scholars in these schools advance progressively to more difficult lessons in *Reading, Spelling* and *Arithmetic*, and begin to take lessons in *Writing* and *Geography*. *Vocal Music*, in these schools, is taught by a *professional Teacher*, employed by the School Committee.

THIRD GRADE.—*Seven Grammar Schools* are now established in the City, for the instruction of scholars from eight or nine years old to twelve or fourteen. Each Grammar School, except the one for colored children, usually contains two hundred and thirty pupils, who are under the government and instruction of a Master and three Female Assistants.

In these schools the scholars use a new set of text books, which present more enlarged and accurate views of the branches they have already begun, and in these books continue their exercises in *Reading, Spelling, Writing, Arithmetic* and *Geography*, and commence *English Grammar, the History of the United States* and *General History*. Instruction in *Vocal Music* is given in these schools, and also in the High School, by a professional Teacher.

FOURTH GRADE.—One High School with two departments—one for boys and one for girls. Each department will accommodate one hundred and twenty pupils—making two hundred and forty in the school. The full course of studies in this school occupies *three years*, and in accordance with this arrangement, the boys are divided into three classes of forty each, and placed in separate rooms, under the government and instruction of a Master. The girls are also divided into three classes, and each class placed in a separate room, under the care and instruction of a Mistress. The course of studies in each department is adapted to the conditions of the pupils in after life; each sex pursuing all the common branches alike, but the boys taking the more scientific course, and the girls the more literary.

Besides these Day Schools, there are now established for four months in the winter, two *Evening Schools* for males only. Each of these schools contains on an average about one hundred scholars, between fourteen and thirty years of age, who are under the instruction of three male Teachers, a Principal and two Assistants. The course of studies in these Schools is the same as in the Grammar Schools.

Dexter Asylum.

The general superintendence of this Institution is placed in charge of the Mayor and Aldermen, who act as a Board of Overseers. They hold quarterly meetings at the Asylum on the first Saturday of August, November, February and May. They also appoint one from their body weekly, to act as a Visiting Committee for that period, who reports the next succeeding Monday, to the Board of Aldermen, the state of the establishment during his tour of duty. The immediate charge of the house is in care of a Master and Matron, annually appointed by the Board of Aldermen. The present incumbents are Hollis Chaffin and wife. Divine service is performed at the chapel every Sabbath.

The medical department is entrusted to a Board of Physicians appointed annually by the Mayor and Aldermen. This Board at present consists of Drs. Collins and Parsons, who attend the sick quarterly in succession. In all cases of peculiar interest or difficulty, they meet in consultation—keep a record of sickness, a report of which is made to the Board of Overseers at their quarterly meetings; and also, an annual report of the sick during the year, at the meeting of the Board on the 1st Saturday in August. A Free Chapel has been erected on Benefit-street, a considerable Sunday School has been gathered, and by evening Schools, conferences and visiting, the Minister and his Assistants exert an important influence. Rev. Edwin M. Stone is the Minister at Large. He is at his office in the Chapel from 11 to 12, A. M. daily, and his residence is No. 22 Halsey-street. This Institution is supported by voluntary contributions, chiefly from the First Congregational and Westminster Churches, and its direction is entrusted to the care of 12 managers from those congregations.

By an Ordinance of the City, all the Engine Houses and Fire Apparatus belonging to the same, are placed under the immediate control of the Board of Firewards, subject to such rules and regulations as a majority of them may deem most expedient for the interest of the city.

The Department, at present, consists of 13 Engines, 15 Forcing Stationary Engines, 2 Hook and Ladder Companies, 2 Rotary Engines propelled by steam, and from 20 to 25 Reservoirs. There are about 950 active firemen; about 9,000 feet of hose. The annual expenses are about \$8,000. In connection with this Department, is the Firemen's Association, which has paid from its funds, the last year, \$700, for the relief of members who have been injured at fires.

Pioneer Fire Company.

The Pioneer Fire Company was incorporated in 1836, and became independent in 1846. Their location is at Nos. 166 and 168 South Main-st.

PROVIDENCE POST-OFFICE.

HENRY L. BOWEN, POST MASTER.

The Post-Office is very centrally and conveniently located in Union Buildings.

This is a distributing office for all of this State, and a considerable portion of Massachusetts and Connecticut. The business has become large, having very much increased of late, not only from the prosperity and rapid growth of our city, but from the great reduction in the rates of postage. The remarkable increase in the business is fully seen in the fact, that, notwithstanding the reduction in the rates of postage, equal to three-fifths of the former rates, still the receipts are now larger than during the last years of the high rates of postage.

About two hundred mails are received and dispatched daily.

Office hours from May 15th to September 15th, 6 1-2 o'clock, A. M. to 8 P. M.; from September 15th to May 15th, 7 A. M. to 8 P. M. Sundays from 8 to 9 A. M., and from 12 to 1 P. M.

RATES OF POSTAGE.

Letters composed of one or more pieces of paper, but not exceeding half an ounce in weight, sent any distance not exceeding three hundred miles, 5 cents.

Any distance over three hundred miles, 10 cents.

On every additional weight of half an ounce, or any fractional excess of half an ounce, an additional postage according to the distance.

Circulars, handbills and advertisements, printed or lithographed on paper not larger than quarto post or single cap, folded and directed, but unsealed, 3 cents per sheet, and must be prepaid; when sealed, same as letters. Circulars on sheets larger than cap are rated as pamphlets.

On pamphlets, magazines and periodicals, weighing one ounce or less, 2 1-2 cents per copy, for any distance; and for every additional ounce, 1 cent.

Newspapers, when sent from the office of publication, for any distance not over one hundred miles, or any distance not out of the State, 1 cent; exceeding one hundred miles, 1 1-2 cents.

On transient newspapers, or those not sent regularly from the office of publication, 3 cents must be prepaid before they are put in the mail.

When a circular, pamphlet or newspaper is mailed, it should be so enveloped as to be opened at one end.

## MANUFACTORIES, MACHINE SHOPS, &amp;c.

The city of Providence is not so celebrated for the extent of any one branch of manufacturing, as for the variety and quality of the articles manufactured.

The manufacture of Screws is carried on more extensively in this city, than in any other in the United States, the quality of which is superior to any in the market, for which there is such a large demand, it becomes necessary to run their machinery day and night, to supply it.

There are two large establishments in operation in this city, for the manufacture of screws; one located on Stevens-street, owned by the Eagle Screw Co., of which William G. Angell is agent, to which a large addition was built during the last year. It gives employment to three hundred hands, male and female. Two large engines are required to run the machinery, which turns out a large quantity of screws of different kinds. Orders are received from all parts of the country.

The other is on Eddy-street, and is owned by the New-England Screw Co. It gives employment to 250 hands, male and female, and turns out a large quantity of screws each week, for which they have an extensive demand.

There are now four establishments in the city, for the manufacture of Butts. One on Pearl-street, owned by the New-England Butt Co. which gives employment to 70 men and boys, and turns out 30,769 lbs. of butts per week. The American Co. employ about the same number of hands, and probably turn out about the same quantity. Those on High and Carpenter streets are doing less business.

The manufacture of jewelry is an extensive and important branch of business in this city. There are about seventy men engaged in the business, who give employment to 1200 men and boys. There is a very large amount of capital invested, which yields a liberal profit to the investors, enabling them to pay a high rate of wages. There is probably no mechanical business that commands a higher rate of wages, when that business is prosperous, than the manufacture of jewelry, although it is subject to more revulsions than many other trades.

There are two establishments in this city for the manufacture of Steam Engines and Boilers, both of which are doing a large amount of business. One is owned by Thurston, Greene & Co. S. Main-st. which gives employment to 170 hands, and has invested \$40,000. The engines and boilers manufactured at this establishment have gained a favorable notoriety in all parts of the country. The other establishment which has been recently erected by Corlis, Nightingale & Co., is situated near the Railroad Crossing on Charles-st. a short distance North from Randall's Bridge. It is less than two years since the site on which it now stands was a sand hill some 50 feet high, cov-

cred with a growth of Norway Pines. Our Western pioneers, who build up cities in a few years, would consider the change which has taken place in that vicinity, a specimen of Yankee enterprise exceeding anything with which they are familiar.—The erection of the buildings was commenced about the 1st of September, 1848, and carried forward with energy and perseverance, under the immediate direction of Mr. Corlis, who is admitted to be one of the most scientific machinists and draftsmen in New-England. The adaptedness of every part of each building for the particular purpose for which it was designed, is evidence of architectural talent seldom exhibited.

The main building is 608 feet long, with an average width of 78 feet, covering over an acre of ground. This building is occupied as a machine shop, and for putting up engines. When in full operation, this establishment is capable of giving employment to 400 men. The counting-room is near the center, from which every part of the shop can be seen. The engine and boiler room is 134 feet by 54. The foundry building is 131 by 111 feet, well lighted and ventilated by a continuous tier of windows all around the building. Boiler shop 134 feet by 35. Store-room 110 feet by 40. The building used for a pattern-shop and drawing-room is 124 feet by 54, two stories high, and a blacksmith's shop 100 feet by 64.

This is the largest machine shop in the United States, and the facilities for the manufacture of steam engines are equal, at least, to that of any other establishment within the knowledge of our best informed machinists. Several new machines have been introduced, which are not in use in any of the States, among which is one for cutting cog-wheels, which is capable of cutting a wheel 25 feet in diameter and 20 tons weight, and the conveniences for moving these massive castings such as to enable the workmen to manage them with the utmost ease; a machine for boring large castings; a planing machine which has a bed 95 feet long, and the table for holding the work to be planed weighs about 30 tons.

**COTTON MANUFACTURING.**—There are but two establishments within the limits of the city, engaged in the manufacture of cotton cloth; the Eagle Cotton Mill, Olneyville, owned by J. O. Waterman & Co. and the Steam Cotton Mill on Eddy-street. The latter is one of the oldest establishments in the city, having been in operation nearly twenty-five years. It was originally owned, and we think erected, by Mr. Samuel Slater, whose name is connected with the early history of cotton manufacturing in this State.

The main building is 260 feet in length and 50 in width, five stories high. A boiler and picker house, detached from the main building, 45 by 50 feet. The steam is conveyed to the engine, which is in the main building, by pipes under ground. A cotton house 106 by 45, and a small blacksmith's shop and cloth room compose the buildings.

The machinery is carried by a large and powerful engine of

140 horse power, and a small one of about 16 horse power. About 1400 tons of coal is annually consumed in the different departments of this establishment. It is employed in the manufacture of fine shirtings, turning out about 1,800,000 yards per year, of various widths. It has 14,000 spindles, and 350 looms, and employs rising 300 hands, two thirds of whom are females and about one-sixth children. It consumes about 1000 bales of cotton annually.

Notwithstanding the length of time which a large proportion of this mill has been built, such has been the care taken of it, that it has the appearance of a building recently erected. About one third has been added to its length since it was originally built. Mr. J. M. Fisher, its present Treasurer and Agent, has occupied that position about six years, and has secured the respect and esteem of all in his employ. Mr. Samuel Bailey is principal clerk.

**RUBBER MANUFACTURING.**—There are two establishments in the city for the manufacture of India rubber shoes, coats, travelling bags, &c.; one on Dorrance street, owned and occupied by Messrs. Bourn & Brown, has been in operation for about six years, and gives employment to about from 50 to 60 hands, two thirds of whom are females. The building is about 80 feet long by 40 wide, three stories high, besides the basement.

Messrs. Bourn & Brown have manufactured from 200 to 300 pairs of shoes in a day. Capital employed about \$20,000.

California travelling bags are manufactured by them, which serve the double purpose of keeping the clothes from getting wet, and of a life preserver in case of necessity. This establishment is operated by steam, having an engine of about 15 horse power.

Another is on Eddy-street, owned and occupied by I. Harts-horn & Co. This establishment has been in operation about ten years and employs from 150 to 200 hands, male and female.

**PLANING WORKS AND BOX MANUFACTORIES.**—Mason's planing works, situated on the corner of Page and Friendship-sts. has been in operation about ten years. It turns out 40,000 feet of planed boards a week, and 300 boxes. It employs five men in planing and three in the box making department. It is run by a small engine of 20 horse power. This establishment is now improved by Sprague and Luther. W. B. Dean, on Dorrance-st., W. H. Turner, India-st., and Tallman & Bucklin, on Dyer-st., are also carrying on Planing and Box Manufacturing extensively. Medicine and other small boxes are manufactured by Thomas Seekel on Stewart-st.

**LAMP WICK AND BRAID MANUFACTORY.**—There is one large establishment situated on Charles-st., and owned by Fletcher & Brother, for the manufacture of Lamp Wicking and Braid. The business is carried on quite extensively, giving employment to a large number of hands.



**MACHINE MANUFACTORIES.**—There are several establishments in this city for the manufacture of machinery. The most extensive now in operation, is that of Mr. T. J. Hill, known as the Providence Machine Company. It is situated near the junction of Eddy and Hospital-streets, about a mile from the Weybosset bridge. The establishment has been in operation about three years and a half, and has gained a reputation in that time of which older establishments might justly be proud.

The buildings are of brick, and combine permanency and beauty in their structure. The main building is 260 feet in length, 60 feet in width, and three stories high. The building is occupied as an iron and wood machine shop, &c. The foundry is 80 feet long and 60 wide, with an addition 24 by 34 feet. Another building 200 feet long 36 wide, used for a smith shop, &c. Pattern house 96 feet by 36; counting-room 46 by 36 feet. Mr. Hill has devoted his attention more particularly to the manufacture of geared speeders, slubbers and fly-frames, and being himself a practical mechanic of twenty years experience, is enabled to furnish either of those articles, which will compare in beauty and exactness with those manufactured in any part of the world. He also manufactures looms, spinning-frames, dressers, warpers, mules, and machinery and tools of various kinds. He employs from 150 to 200 hands, and turns out about \$150,000 worth of machinery in a year.

The "Phenix Company," completed last year, a large and substantial machine shop 200 feet long, extending from Elm to South-st., and 60 feet wide. It is built of heavy stone, and the beams are of large size, hard pine timber. It is two stories high, and has an ell 60 by 30 feet. An engine of 40 horse power has been put in by Corlis & Nightingale, which is exceeded in power by but few in the city. This Company intend to manufacture all the heavy machinery connected with cotton and woolen manufactories, bleach-houses, calico-printing establishments, &c. It is estimated that, when in full operation, 300 hands will be employed in it. They design to commence with all the improvements that have been introduced in machinery, and keep pace with the progress of the age. The Company is composed of some of the most wealthy men in the city, and therefore the fluctuations in business will effect but little the permanent and steady operations of this shop. It is at present under the superintendence of Mr. Elisha Harris, who is one of the right kind of men to secure the respect and esteem of those in his employ.

**FRANKLIN FOUNDRY AND MACHINE MANUFACTORY.** This establishment is situated on Charles-street, a short distance above Randall-street. It is one of the oldest establishments of the kind in the State, progressing gradually and keeping pace with the march of improvement, until 1836, when the "Franklin Foundry and Machine Co.," was incorporated.

It is employed in the manufacture of all kinds of Cotton Machinery, Calico Printing Machines, Iron and Brass Castings, &c.

It has turned out a large number of Ring Spindle Frames, which are considered of the first quality, as well as every other article of machinery manufactured at this establishment.

The main building is 125 feet by 34, to which they have found it necessary to make an addition of brick, 146 feet by 46, two stories high, with an attic and basement.—The Furnace is 140 feet by 50; Blacksmith and Spindle shop, 80 feet by 28, and another building used for putting up machinery, 100 feet by 30.

There are from 125 to 150 hands employed in the different departments, the most of whom have the reputation of being first rate mechanics, and all of whom must be necessarily industrious and temperate, to be employed by that company.

The mechanical department is under the superintendence and direction of Mr. Albert Briggs, who served a regular apprenticeship at that establishment and has been steadily gaining in the confidence and esteem of the company, as well as all employed.

Mr. Cyril Babcock is Agent for this Company, and Edward Thurber, Treasurer.

**FURNACES, FOUNDRIES, &c.**—The City Furnace, owned by A. C. Barstow & Co. the buildings of which were entirely destroyed by fire about three years ago, have been rebuilt in a neat and durable manner. It is situated on the corner of Point and Chestnut-streets. A large amount of business is carried on at this establishment, and about 125 hands constantly employed.

The Phenix Iron Foundry, corner of Eddy and Elm-street, G. B. Holmes, Agent, is one of the oldest in our city, and is now connected with the Elm-street Machine Shop.

Fuller's Foundry and Machine Shop, F. Fuller, Agent, is an extensive establishment, and in a very flourishing condition. It is situated at 334 South Main, near India-street.

There is also a Machine Shop on Dorrance-street, T. F. Cook, Agent, a Furnace on High-street, Isaac H. Holden, Agent, besides a large number of smaller Furnaces, for iron, brass and copper castings.

**BLEACHERIES.**—The Providence Dying, Bleaching and Calendering Co.'s establishment on Sabin-street, the oldest in the city, is large and flourishing, giving employment to a large number of hands. Wm. C. Snow, Agent.

The Canal Bleaching Co.'s establishment on Charles-street is one of the oldest in the city, having been in operation about 18 years. It is bleaching and finishing weekly about 147,000 yards, and calendering and baling about 3500 pieces of brown goods, and about 750 pieces are colored and finished in the same time. About 60 hands are employed, and an engine of 60 horse power required. John Jenks, Agent.

The Valley Bleachery, Olneyville, is a branch of the Providence Dying, Bleaching and Calendering establishment.

**NAIL AND WIRE MANUFACTORY.**—This establishment is situated on India-street, and employs about 80 hands. It supplies

the wire from which the screws are manufactured in this city, and also turns out a large quantity of wrought nails and spikes, of a superior quality. It is owned by the Providence Iron Co., T. J. Stead, Agent.

**CALICO PRINT WORKS.**—The establishment of Philip Allen & Son, for bleaching, calendering, dyeing and printing cotton goods, is situated at the north end of North Main-street. It is one of the most extensive Printeries in New-England, giving employment to many hands, and printing about — yds. a day. There is probably no establishment in this country more judiciously and systematically managed than this, or one so little affected by the revulsions of business.

The Woonasquatucket Print Works, near Olneyville, formerly owned by Richmond & Carr, and which originally cost about \$175,000, were sold at auction on the 15th of June, for \$30,200. They will probably be put in operation in a short time.

**WOOLEN MANUFACTORY.**—The only establishment in this city for the manufacture of woollen goods, is that of the Elm-street Manufacturing Co. situated on Elm-st. It employs a considerable number of hands, in the manufacture of tweeds.

Besides those already enumerated, there are employed in this city, most of the time, about 50 Printers, 12 Copper-plate do. and Engravers; 12 Book-Binders; 200 Boot and Shoe Makers; 3 master Boat Builders; 3 Britannia Ware Manufactories; 40 Cabinet Makers; from 300 to 500 Carpenters; 100 Carriage Makers, Smiths and Trimmers; 50 Cigar Makers; 60 Clock and Watch Makers; 10 Comb Makers; 20 Copper-smiths; 20 File Makers; 4 Soap and Candle Manufactories; 60 Pattern Makers; 2 Plane Making establishments; 2 Reed Manufactories; 50 Saddle, Harness and Trunk Makers; 20 Sail Makers; 4 master Ship Builders; 200 do. Tailors and Drapers; 50 Tin Plate and Sheet Iron Workers; 10 Umbrella Makers; 10 Upholsterers; 20 Wheelwrights; 1 Broom Manufactory; 1 Brush Factory; 1 Distiller; 2 Iron Door and Fence Manufactories; 1 Japan Ware Manufactory; 2 Plough Manufactories; 1 Pump and Block Manufactory; and a large number of Patent Medicine Manufactories.

N. B. Since the above was in type, the American Butt Factory has been destroyed by fire; but preparations are being made to rebuild it, and more durable and convenient buildings will soon occupy the place of those consumed.
