Gentlemen:

This year we have expanded our facilities for older youth and young adults by installing flood-lights at five basketball courts at the following locations: Gano St. Playground, Dudley St. Playground (next to South Providence Pool), Camp-Cypress Playground, and two courts at Richardson Park (in the Roger Williams Housing Project).


The ice-skating area at Merino Park was flood-lighted, affording an opportunity for increased family use by adults as well as their children. The popular free indoor ice-skating program at the Ice Bowl at which the Recreation Department rented the ice was continued in 1970. Each Monday afternoon for twelve weeks, different groups of children were transported to the Ice Bowl by the Recreation Department. In addition, the skates were offered for rent at half price, while the recreation personnel provided free instructions for beginners. An Ice-skating Carnival was held at the Rhode Island Auditorium during the school winter vacation. In 1971, we look ahead to an increased use of the Rhode Island Auditorium for free ice-skating sessions during the late afternoon and/or early evening.

A new recreation program for young children was started at the Lexington Ave. Elementary School. The program operates Monday through Friday during the school year for boys and girls and includes many recreation activities such as indoor and outdoor games, sports, simple arts and crafts, table games, and holiday parties.

Last year, a new model cities program for model cities boys and girls called "Best Friend" was started. The Recreation Department is the delegate agency, or administrator, of this program which operates similar to Big Brothers. Chaperones, "big brothers" and "big sisters", take groups of South Providence youths to educational, recreational, athletic and musical activities such as plays, professional athletic contests, roller skating parties, Ice Capades and Edaville Railroad's Christmas display. The price of admission, transportation and refreshments are paid for the children and chaperones under this program. We have been refunded for another year which will enable us to continue this great service to our inner city youth.

As in previous years, a vote of thanks is in order to Mayor Joseph A. Doorley, Jr., and to you gentlemen of the Providence City Council and the Recreation Advisory Committee for your continued leadership and support of our programs to provide the best in recreation for the people of our City of Providence.

Recreation for The Retarded

The Providence Recreation Department operates a recreation program for the retarded at the John E. Fogarty Center in Providence. The program includes weekly teenage socials, "small fry" socials, Saturday bowling club--at alleys away from the center--and a club night of games, rhythm activities, contests and free play. Special events such as holiday parties, attending Ice Capades, Boston Cinerama, and other recreational and educational field trips were held. Many parents participated in these activities.

There are approximately 100 retardates, 15 years of age and older, enrolled in this program which also includes dramatics, music, dancing and dance instruction, outside entertainment, group singing, band, cards, nok-hockey, and arts and crafts.

During the summer, picnics were held each Sunday at Goddard and Pulaski Parks. Parents and other family members also attended and assisted the recreation staff in these trips.

In 1967, the Recreation Department took a dynamic step in its program by adding one week of camping for 20 retarded boys at the Recreation Department's camp at Point Judith.

In 1968, girls were included in the camping program. Each day, approximately 20 boys and 20 girls were transported back and forth to the camp by the Recreation Department's bus for a day camping program.

In the summers of 1969 and 1970, this program was expanded to two weeks. Approximately 40 to 50 retarded boys and girls participated in this day camping program at the seaside Point Judith Camp.

The day camp program includes individual and group instructions in recreational games and outdoor activities. The campers are also transported to neighboring beaches for swimming. Field trips are taken to Galilee, the University of Rhode Island dairy farm, Fort Nathanael Greene for picnics, and to Block Island which includes a ferry ride.

Resident Boys Camp at Point Judith

The Providence Recreation Department operates a resident boys camp at Point Judith which can accommodate 100 boys at the same time. The camping season is divided into four two-week periods. The program includes swimming, fishing, field trips, basketball, over-night hikes, arts and crafts, music, archery, movies, softball, cook-outs, football, and low-organized games.

John P. Cronin, Providence Recreation Director, is the administrative director of the Boys Camp at Point Judith. There are 27 full time employees who are summer workers for the camping season. Mrs. John P. Cronin volunteers her services as the camp secretary.

The camp owns a bus to transport campers to the camp. There is no bus service or any other public conveyances available. The bus takes campers swimming daily, to other camps, ball parks for program, field trips, and any place for special activities and educational trips.

Every Sunday there are visiting hours at camp at which time the campers are free to visit with friends and family, make use of camp picnicking facilities including tables, benches, and parking areas.

In 1967, one additional week was added in June, before the regular season began, so that 20 retarded boys could spend a week at the camp.

In 1968, girls were included in this week at camp for the retardates. The program was then changed to day camping, and approximately 20 boys and 20 girls participated each day. They were transported back and forth to the camp from Providence by the Recreation Department bus. In 1969 and 1970, this program was expanded to two weeks.

In the summer of 1967, 1,200 disadvantaged Providence children were transported to the state's beach for swimming every afternoon and then to the camp for a hot dinner and supervised recreation until 9:00 p.m. This program was operated in cooperation with the city's anti-poverty agency, Progress for Providence.

In 1968, 1969, and 1970, for ten weeks during the summer, approximately 50 disadvantaged city youth were transported daily, Monday through Friday, to the camp for recreation, swimming, and a hot meal.

Other than the regular camping program, many organizations use the camp facilities. Boys and their families use the camp for weekend outings. Boy scout troops use the area for overnight camping and water front activities.

Approximately 11,000 fishermen use the water front during the year. Skin divers numbering more than 1,500 camp on the area. At least 2,000 adults and children have used the camp for outings during the year.

Plans for a Recreation Program for Children In Special Education

During the summer of 1971, the Providence Recreation Department is planning to begin a playground program for children in special education. At present, there are two people employed by the Recreation Department in its programs for the mentally retarded who also have special training in working with children in special education. These two people, a man and a woman, will be assigned to one playground during the 1971 summer season where they will operate a special program for these children. Wherever and whenever possible, these particular children will be included in the regular summer playground program which includes nine weeks of activities such as arts and crafts, games, sewing, dancing, and sports on approximately 38 Providence playgrounds--as well as weekly special events such as a Pet Show, Bicycle Meet, Doll and Carriage Parade, Hula Hoop, Yo-Yo, and Frisbee Tournaments.

Also, when the school for special education is opened in Providence, some time this year, an after school recreation program for these children is presently being developed by Recreation Director, John P. Cronin, and members of a recreation planning committee for special education.
