Addenda to Minority Report dated March 18, 1971

From William G. Bradshaw, R. Ward 2.

If it is decided that Classical is to remain a special purpose high school, that is, college preparatory, then herewith an alternate proposal:

9 Enrollment figure set by School Department and admission determined by city-wide competitive examination given in June. (A roster will give the School Department a cut-off point as maximum capacity is approached.) Hopefully the entering class will have 8% blacks, and, in any event, recruitment should be intensified in an effort to achieve this. Classical students provide their own transportation. No 9th grade tuition students this fall.

Remaining 9th grade blacks are assigned as follows:

Central	- 28%	of entering 9th grade class
Hope	- 28%	" " " "
Mt. P.	- 8%	(or as many more as required to keep the other two schools under the 28%)

9th grade whites:

Central	- 72%
Hope	- 72%
Mt. P.	- 92% (or less, as required)

These school enrollment figures follow pretty closely those of the Durant Plan, but I suggest a different approach in the method of assigning the students, to avoid the objections raised by those residents who are most seriously affected as the desegregation plan is implemented.

Map #4 is the basic school district map.

Its design is permanent, however, each June, when figures are in, the lines are manipulated to achieve the above percents. Each year there will be two overlapping school district maps - one for blacks, one for whites.

Conclusion. Admission to Classical should be on a basis of merit. The best way to prove this is by competitive exam. Admission by transcript has its drawbacks. Three of the high schools would comply with legal guidelines, and the fourth is heading in that direction.

Students travel the shortest possible distance to school, and there is the barest minimum of bussing.

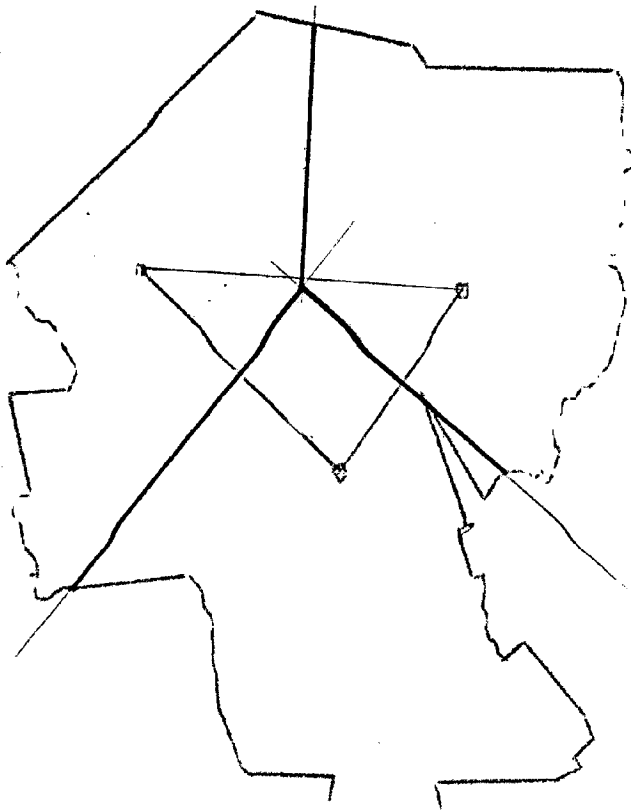

This office has under consideration the application of New England Telephone Co., 100 New England Way, Warwick, R. I.

for a State of Rhode Island assent to lay and maintain an additional armored telephone submarine cable (4.3 inches outside diameter) to the south of the Washington Bridge between Providence and East Providence, R. I., proposed cable to be placed at a depth of 23 ft. below mean low water between fenders and 50 ft. on each side of fenders; from each shore cable to be buried 3 ft. below natural bottom; cable to be 6 ft. south of and parallel to existing set of cables. The purpose of this cable is to provide additional circuits between Providence and East Providence, R. I.



NOTICE FOR APPROVAL OF PLANS

This office has under consideration the application of Providence Broadcasting Company (Radio Station WICE), 193 Dyer Street, Providence, R.I. for approval of plans to alter the concrete dam (R. I. Dam No. 89) at Geneva Mill Pond Dam at Douglas Avenue in Providence, R.I. by cutting a notch 5 ft. 6 inches long by 3 feet deep in said dam, thereby lowering the normal operating water level in the pond by 3 feet.

The applicant states that the present pond level is too high and results in "severe flooding conditions on our property during any heavy rainfall, causing land erosion and several thousands of dollars damage to our transmitting equipment."

Geneva Mill Pond, located partly in the City of Providence and partly in the Town of North Providence, is fed by Geneva Brook.
