c. Portion of Treasea Street between Stella Street to Middleton Street.

To Park Side Site and Utilities Construction Co., Inc.:

a. Portion of Stella Street located between lot 398-399 and lot 4 to Johnston Town lines shown on plat 114.

b. Portion of Right-of-Way running east to west from Stella Street to Middleton Street

And it is further

Ordered, That the Traffic Engineer be and he is hereby directed to cause a sign to be place on the above-named highway abandoned as afore-said, having thereon the words, "Not a Public Highway", and it is further

Ordered, That after the entry of this order or decree the City Clerk shall cause a notice thereof to be published in a newspaper, published in the County of Providence at least once a week for three successive weeks and a further and personal notice shall be served by the City Sergeant upon every owner of land abutting the above-named highway which has been abanoned, who is known to reside within the State.

Read and Passed, on motion of COUNCIL-

MAN IGLIOZZI, seconded by COUNCILWOMAN DiRIZZO, by the following Roll Call Vote:

Ayes: Council President Fagnoli, Councilmen Allen, Clarkin, DeLuca, Councilwoman DiRuzzo, Councilmen Glavin, Igliazzi, Jackson, Lombardi, Mancini, Councilwoman Nolan, Councilman Rollins, Councilwomen Williams and Young—14.

Noes: None.

Absent: None.

The motion for Passage, is Unanimously Sustained.

COUNCILWOMAN EVELYN V. FARGNOLI, Chairwoman COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

Transmits the following with recommendation the Same be Severally Adopted, as Amended:

An Ordinance making an Appropriation of Three Hundred Twenty-Two Million, Three Hundred Twenty-Five Thousand One Hundred Sixty-Eight Dollars (\$322,125,168.00) for for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1997, as amended.

COUNCILMAN DeLUCA: I think that a point of order is needed. The procedure of the next four items, it seems to me that since No. 46 is the vote on the Tax Increase that should be the first order of business with regards to tonight's discussion on the budget because if we pass the budget first, which has a tax increase in it and then No. 46 fails, it seems to me it would be a little bit out of order, so I would move to consider No. 46 prior to No. 43.

This motion is seconded by COUNCILMAN CLARKIN.

COUNCILMAN IGLIOZZI: Madam President, my only concern is and I understand the concept that Councilman DeLuca has enunciated for the floor, my only concern is that the levy as the Internal Auditor will attest is within range and obviously, someone who is not willing to vote for that range until after they set the appropriation budget, someone like myself would be in a difficult position to vote on that matter but, I just want to put that on the floor that the Levy, there is a range, it could be 234 as proposed by the Administration or it could be less, as I hope to propose and convince other

members of the Council. But, that number, although I may amend the Appropriation Budget, I won't amend the Levy. The Levy is amended by action of the Appropriation Budget.

I'll have the Internal Auditor here to speak on that issue because when that issue was raised by Councilman DeLuca, I questioned the Internal Auditor on that and that is my only concern.

COUNCILMAN DeLUCA: Just very briefly, there is no hidden agenda here I just can't see passing a budget that has a specific number in it as a tax increase and then passing a tax increase later, the tax increase may thaw and then you just passed a budget that cannot be supported because the tax increase failed so I think that establishing the figure on the tax increase should take place and then when we have that we should pass the Appropriation Ordinance.

CITY COUNCIL INTERNAL AUDITOR WOERNER: The Levy Ordinance has always been a tradition, the range between 95% of the projected Levy to 105%. This year we are projecting taxes, the tax levy to be approximately \$185 Million Dollars, so the Levy Ordinance simply put the range between 175 million to 195 million. We adjusted this for the Council's action to bring the tax increase from 2.98 down to 2.34 so we took about 3 million off it, but it is a very broad range, but by approving the Levy, as long as you are not going to reduce taxes by a huge amount, you're safe. The reason I asked the City Clerk to put the Levy at the end, was that I knew there was a possibility of some motions to amend the Budget tonight, so I thought that the conservative approach would be to put it at the end so that in case there was a radical change in the Budget, we would have time to amend the tax levy ordinance. But, I think you're safe if you want to vote on the Levy Ordinance first I don't think that it really

makes a difference or if you want to vote on the Appropriation Ordinance first. I don't think it really matters.

COUNCILMAN DeLUCA: Under the rules of the City Council which this body passed, Rule No. 16 requires every committee action to be submitted to the City Council at the next meeting, to be finalized and presented to the Clerk in its final form 78 hours prior to the Council Meeting. If my math is correct, for us to follow that direction, this appropriation ordinance, this budget, would have had to have been submitted to the City Clerk by Monday afternoon at around 1:30 and as we know the Finance Committee's action did not come until later that evening on Monday night and therefore, it does not follow Rule No. 16 establishing the procedure by which things can be submitted to the City Clerk for consideration of the next Council meeting. Another objection that I have with considering this issue tonight besides Rule No. 16 is that there is no Auditor's Report before us, also according to the Home Rule Charter Section 412, it calls for "at the same time and if that sounds like an echo . . . it's the same exact thing that I said last year when we were doing this . . . at the same time that the Mayor submits the Operating Budget to the City Council the Mayor, based upon us and the recommendations of the City Planning Commission as provided for in Article 10, Section 1013, shall report and submit to the City Council a Capital Improvement Budget, or a Capital Budget. That did not happen last year, the year before and it certainly didn't happen this year. I want to know . . . If we are going to be following the Charter that we all swore to uphold and we are all going to follow the rules of which we all voted on, then I think we ought to take a look at the next meeting or call a special meeting when the Capital Improvement Budget is here and when the time frame as established is there. At this point then I would withdraw my motion to change the order of the docket and I would make

a motion to Refer Nos. 43, 44, 45 and 46 back to the Finance Committee at this time.

This motion is seconded by COUNCILMAN CLARKIN.

COUNCILMAN IGLIOZZI: Madam President, I have a simpler solution, if any one has a problem with the 4 hour difference between the efforts of the Finance Committee which I commend, I make a motion that we Suspend Rule 16 with regards to 78 hours notice for this particular issue, so that we may get on with the budget and not have another meeting just for the budget, we are all here and prepared to vote on it. I move that we suspend the time line on Rule 16 tonight.

This motion is seconded by COUNCILWOMAN NOLAN and COUNCILMAN ROLLINS.

The motion to Refer Back to Committee, having precedence over the main motion is taken at this time and Councilman DeLuca requests a Roll Call Vote:

Ayes: Councilmen Clarkin and DeLuca—2.

Noes: Council President Fargnoli, Councilman Allen, Councilwoman DiRuzzo, Councilmen Glavin, Iglionzi, Jackson, Lombardi, Mancini, Councilwoman Nolan, Councilman Rollins, Councilwomen Williams and Young—12.

The motion to Refer the Several Ordinances Back to the Committee on Finance is Not Sustained.

COUNCILMAN IGLIOZZI: Now my motion to suspend the time frame of Rule 16 for the purpose of considering these items tonight on a vote.

This motion is seconded by COUNCILWOMAN DIRUZZO.

All members in favor with the exception of COUNCILMAN DeLUCA and COUNCILMAN CLARKIN who desire to be recorded as voted "No".

COUNCILMAN IGLIOZZI further moves to amend the Appropriation Ordinance to reduce the pension benefit from 2% percent to 2% with a savings of \$480 thousand dollars and would apply to only Non Vested Employees of the City of Providence — reducing the proposed tax rate from \$2.34 to \$2.25.

This motion is seconded by COUNCILWOMAN NOLAN.

All members in favor with the exception of COUNCILMAN JACKSON, COUNCILMAN ALLEN, COUNCILMAN LOMBARDI, and COUNCILWOMAN DIRUZZO who desire to be recorded as voting "No".

COUNCILMAN IGLIOZZI: Since that motion has passed, I would make another motion to make a 1% across the line cut and I have that amendment it will reduce the proposed tax rate to \$2.08 and I not only have that amendment in Ordinance form but I also have a sheet that tells you what the effect in each department would be, it does not, I repeat does not, go into contractual items so at this time I would make a motion to amend to make a One Percent (1%) across the line item reduction which would save the City . . . bringing the proposed tax rate down to \$2.08.

This motion is seconded by COUNCILWOMAN DIRUZZO.

COUNCILMAN JACKSON requests a Roll Call Vote on the 1 percent across the Board reduction reducing the Budget by \$910,674.00 resulting in a tax rate of \$2.08:

The Clerk calls the Roll as follows:

Ayes: Council President Fagnoli, Councilmen Clarkin, DeLuca, Igliozi, and Councilwoman Williams—5.

Noes: Councilman Allen, Councilwoman DiRuzzo, Councilmen Glavin, Jackson, Lombardi, Mancini, Councilwoman Nolan, Councilman Rollins and Councilwoman Young—9.

The motion for a 1% across the Board Reduction is Not Sustained.

COUNCILMAN DeLUCA at this time Moves to amend the Appropriation Ordinance as follows:

"To reduce the Business and Non Business Licenses from \$3,525,250.00 to \$2,325,250.00 thereby creating a Special Revenue Fund in this Ordinance entitled: "Providence Sidewalk Program" in the amount of \$1.2 million dollars".

This motion being seconded by **COUNCILWOMAN YOUNG** is put to vote and Not Passed, by the following Roll Call Vote:

Ayes: Councilmen DeLuca, Jackson, Lombardi, Mancini, Councilwomen Williams and Young—6.

Noes: Council President Fagnoli, Councilmen Allen, Clarkin, Councilwoman DiRuzzo, Councilmen Glavin, Igliozi, Councilwoman Nolan and Councilman Rollins—8.

The motion to amend the Appropriation Ordinance is Not Sustained.

Now, therefore, be it ordained by the City of Providence:

Section 1. To defray the expenses of the City of Providence for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1997, the sums of money or so much thereof, as are authorized by law, indicated in the accompanying schedule, are hereby appropriated for the objects and purposes, and in amounts expressed

PERSONAL EXPRESSION

COUNCILMAN IGLIOZZI requests the privilege of the floor to speak on a point of personal express and states:

"Madam President, I want to raise a point of personal expression on item No. 25, and I just want the record to reflect why I put No. 25 on

the record. You should all be aware that the Providence Civic Center has asked this Council for an \$800,000.00 subsidy and the Finance Committee through its hard work, reduced that to level funding which was \$600,000.00. You should also be aware that they originally came before this Council 3 years ago asking for a

\$300,000.00 loan and then the year after they came before the Finance Committee and said that they would never need more than 4 or 450,000.00 of a subsidy. We listened with open ears and open hearts and felt that sorry for them we helped them. The year after they came in with \$600,000.00 and this year they were \$600,000.00. But, you should also, most importantly be aware, that the Providence Civic Center owes the City of Providence \$210,000.00 for its Providence Detail Account and \$221,000.00 for its premium for Blue Cross and of that \$600,000.00 subsidy, it is not going to pay those premiums or those amounts to the City, that is why we are so adamant against the Civic Center's subsidy this year. So, actually what the Civic Center was asking for was \$1 Million 2 for a subsidy. That's what they were actually asking for, and they actually got a 1

Million Dollar subsidy, so be aware of that. We subsidized the Civic Center a Million Dollars, there is no hope that our detail account is going to get paid, there is no hope that our premium is going to get paid. I'll tell you why, because the same auditing report that showed them owing us 421 Thousand Dollars, shows that they owe the Electric Company and other creditors over 300 Thousand Dollars, so be prepared, be aware, it's on the record, the Civic Center is headed for a very serious problem and it's a subsidy with 15 percent of your . . . 15 cents of this tax raise went to pay for the Civic Center. So, be aware of that. I'm sorry to raise that point but it is a very important point, we raised it in Committee, and you should be aware of that."
