LIBRARIES.

The University Library is in Manning Hall, and contains at present, upwards of 24,000 well selected volumes. A large proportion of these have been purchased within the last few years, with special reference to the wants of gentlemen engaged in literary and scientific pursuits. It is constantly increasing from the proceeds of a permanent fund of \$25,000, established for this purpose in 1839. The Library is open four hours daily, from 9 A. M. till 1 P. M. In addition to the University Library, the Libraries of the Philermenian and the United Brothers' Societies comprise together nearly 7000 volumes, accessible to all the students of the University.

The present number of volumes in the Library is more than 16,000. From the first Monday in April to the first Monday in October, the Library is open from 9, A. M. until sunset. During the remainder of the year, from 10, A. M. until 9 in the evening. The price of a share in this Institution is only \$15, and the annual tax cannot exceed \$5.

Public Schools.

The Public Schools in the city of Providence are placed by the laws of the State under the management of the School Committee, consisting of thirty members, who are annually elected by the City Council, and serve *without any compensation*. The experience of many years has shown, that the members of this Committee, each one feeling more or less heavily the pressure of his own private or professional business, cannot give that amount of time to the Public Schools, which an economical and successful management of them requires.

For about eleven years, Nathan Bishop, Esq., was annually elected Superintendent of the Public Schools. He resigned a few months since, when Samuel S. Greene Esq. was chosen in his place. Mr. G. acts as Principal of the High School. He spends all his time in visiting the different Schools, exercising a careful supervision over them, and while passing from school to school, he aims to remove existing defects in the modes of teaching and management, and to introduce such improvements as his own observation and the progress of popular education may have shown to be useful. He also furnishes all necessary supplies, superintends all repairs, and in every practicable way promotes the improvement of the Public Schools.

There are at present established in the City forty-six Public Schools, in which are engaged one hundred and five Teachers; twelve gentlemen and eighty-nine ladies, who devote themselves faithfully to the instruction and government of their respective schools, which together contain about six thousand six hundred pupils.

These Public Schools are divided into four grades, viz:

1st. Primary Schools,	3d. Grammar Schools,
2d. Intermediate do.	4th. High School.

FIRST GRADE. There are now established in the City *twenty-two Primary Schools*. These schools are designed for pupils from four years of age to six or seven, according to their advancement in learning. Each school is under the immediate government and instruction of two female teachers—a Preceptress and an Assistant, and usually contains about one hundred and thirty pupils. The teachers in these schools, besides teaching the elements of *Reading, Spelling,* and *Arithmetic,* give their pupils much oral instruction of a familiar kind, suited to their age, with daily exercises in *Vocal Music.*

SECOND GRADE. There are *sixteen Intermediate Schools* established for children from six to eight or nine years of age, including those that were formerly in the first classes in the Primary Schools, and those in the lowest classes in the Grammar Schools. Each of these schools usually contains about one hundred and twenty pupils, who are under the instruction and management of two female teachers—a Preceptress and an Assistant. The scholars in these schools advance progressively to more difficult lessons in *Reading, Spelling* and *Arithmetic,* and begin to take lessons in *Writing* and *Geography.* *Vocal Music,* in these schools, is taught by a *professional Teacher,* employed by the School Committee.

THIRD GRADE. *Seven Grammar Schools* are now established in the City, for the instruction of scholars from eight or nine years old to twelve or fourteen. Each Grammar School, except, the one for colored children, usually contains two hundred and thirty pupils, who are under the government and instruction of a Master and three Female Assistants.

In these schools the scholars use a new set of text books, which present more enlarged and accurate views of the branches they have already begun, and in these books continue their exercises in *Reading, Spelling, Writing, Arithmetic* and *Geography,* and commence *English Grammar,* the *History of the United States* and *General History.* Instruction in *Vocal Music* is given in these schools, and also in the High School, by a professional Teacher.

FOURTH GRADE. One High School with two departments—one for boys and one for girls. Each department will accommodate one hundred and twenty pupils—making two hundred and forty in the school. The full course of studies in this school occupies *three years,* and in accordance with this arrangement, the boys are divided into three classes of forty each, and placed in separate rooms, under the government and instruction of a Master. The girls are also divided into three classes, and each class placed in a separate room, under the care and instruction of a Mistress. The course of studies in each department is adapted to the conditions of the pupils in after life; each sex pursuing all the common branches alike, but the boys taking the more scientific course, and the girls the more literary. The art of drawing is taught in both departments by a professional Teacher.

Besides these Day Schools, there are now established for four months in the winter, two *Evening Schools* for males only. Each of these schools contains on an average about one hundred scholars, between fourteen and thirty years of age, who are under the instruction of three male Teachers, a Principal and two Assistants. The course of studies in these Schools is the same as in the Grammar Schools.

Friends' Yearly Meeting Boarding School,

Established in 1819.

This Institution is under the direction of a committee of the New England Yearly Meeting, who appoint Superintendents and teachers. The number of teachers varies with the number of scholars, who are taught in the various branches of an English education,

including the Mathematics, and the Latin, Greek and French languages. Lectures are regularly delivered in Natural Philosophy and Chemistry, illustrated by experiments, and occasionally upon other subjects embraced in the course of study in the school. Through the liberality of a number of its friends, the Institution has recently received a valuable Mineralogical Cabinet.

The whole number of teachers is 8; of scholars, about 115.

Dexter Asylum.

The general superintendence of this Institution is placed in charge of the Mayor and Aldermen, who act as a Board of Overseers. They hold quarterly meetings at the Asylum on the first Saturday of August, November, February and May. They also appoint one from their body weekly, to act as a visiting committee for that period, who reports the next succeeding Monday, to the Board of Aldermen, the state of the establishment during his tour of duty. The immediate charge of the house is in care of a Master and Matron, annually appointed by the Board of Aldermen. The present incumbents are Hollis Chaffin and wife. Divine service is performed at the chapel every Sabbath.

The medical department is entrusted to a Board of Physicians, appointed annually by the Mayor and Aldermen. This board at present consists of Drs. Collins and Ely, who attend the sick quarterly in succession. In all cases of peculiar interest or difficulty, they meet in consultation—keep a record of sickness, a report of which is made to the Board of Overseers at their quarterly meetings; and also, an annual report of the sick during the year, at the meeting of the Board on the first Saturday in August. The number of inmates in the Institution is between one and two hundred.

Providence Reform School.

This Institution went into operation Nov. 1, 1850. It is located at the lower end of East street, at what was formerly called the Tookwotten house. It is designed for the confinement, instruction and reformation of idle and vicious children. The government of the School is vested in a Board of seven Trustees, of whom the Mayor is always to be one.

The number of persons employed in the Institution at the present time, is as follows: James M. Talcott, Superintendent; Edwin Talcott, first Assistant and Teacher; Edwin C. Church, second Assistant and Instructor in the shoe shop; Maria L. Morrison, Matron and Mary K. Stanwood, Assistant Matron. An interest-

ing Report has been published by the Trustees of the institution, Messrs. S. G. Arnold and William S. Potter, by which it appears that the total number of children received during the year was 52. In view of the value and importance of this Institution, we copy the concluding portion of the Report of the Trustees, presented to the City Council:

"The Trustees would briefly commend the Reform School, as worthy of the favorable consideration of your Honorable Body; as having thus far realized the wishes and expectations of those by whose influence it was established; and as reflecting credit upon the enlightened legislation which gave it birth. About one in every thousand of our population, has, within the past year, been subjected to its wholesome discipline—a larger proportion than even the sanguine friends of the measure expected for the first year of its existence. Ignorance has been instructed and vice reformed. Many of the present inmates have already acquired the rudiments of an education which before they had not, and others have increased their stock of knowledge previously acquired. The progress of the pupils in the school room has been a source of satisfaction to the Board, which they desire on this occasion to express. In the work shop, under the direction of competent artizans, they have made considerable progress, as the statistics given in the Superintendent's Report will show. Many boys have thus begun to acquire a practical knowledge of useful trades, which hereafter may be the means of preserving them from a career of crime, by providing them with the means of an honest livelihood. Religious and moral instruction is blended with intellectual culture, and no means are left untried to carry out the benevolent designs contemplated by the originators of the movement.

These remarks are made in reference to the male department of the Institution, which has progressed far enough already to enable us to form an opinion of its usefulness. Of the female department, the Board are as yet unable to speak with a similar degree of confidence. The number is yet too limited, and the time too short, for us to pronounce with certainty as to the beneficial operation of the Institution upon this class of inmates. Another year, and a greatly increased number of commitments will be necessary before the Board can report definitely upon this branch of their trust. But of the male department there can be no doubt, that many will go forth from the Providence Reform School, wiser and better men for having passed through it, and that in a few years, the sound policy as well as liberal philanthropy which suggested it, will be justified in the decrease of juvenile crime in our city, may be confidently expected."

The religious instruction of the convicts in the State Prison, has been conducted by the Rev. A. Woods, who has gratuitously attended divine service every Sunday morning.

An additional wing to the prison is now being erected, which it is expected can be completed in the course of the present season.

PROVIDENCE COUNTY JAIL.

The number of persons on the 1st day of October, 1850, confined by the State laws, was 66;—223 have been committed during the year on sentence, and 214 in default of bail, and not sentenced, making the whole number at the suit of the State, 503.

The ages of those committed were as follows, viz. Over 10 years and under 20, 123; over 20 and under 30, 204; over 30 and under 40, 105; over 40 and under 50, 56; over 50 and under 60, 14; over 60 years, 1. Total, 503. Males, 452; females, 51. Whites, 473; colored, 30. Natives, 293; foreigners, 210. Average number for the year, 53.

Of the 223 committed as above stated on sentence, 192 were known to be or reported themselves as being intemperate in their habits.

There have also been committed to the jail, as a House of Correction for the city of Providence, during the year, 177 persons, viz. on sentence, 116; in default of bail, 61. Their ages were as follows: Over 10 years and under 20, 19; over 20 and under 30, 61; over 30 and under 40, 56; over 40 and under 50, 25; over 50

and under 60, 11; over 60, 5. Total, 177. Males, 133; females, 44. Whites, 170; colored, 7. Natives, 86; foreigners, 91. Temperate, 14; intemperate, 163. Average number under the city laws, during the year, 11.

The number of commitments for debt has been 397; making, with the foregoing numbers committed under the State and City laws, a total of 1133 commitments to the Jail, during the year ending Sept. 30, 1851.

There were remaining on the 30th Sept., at the suit of the State, 57; at the suit of the city, 11; for civil suits for damages, 2; for common debt, 2; total, 72.

The prisoners in the jail labor at closing boots. The women are employed in sewing. The buildings are clean and comfortable as the crowded state of the cells will allow.

The Rev. William Douglas, with the assistance of other clergymen in the city, has performed religious services on Sunday noons. He has also, at other times, visited the prisoners, for the sake of imparting to them religious instruction. These services are gratuitous.

A library of about 200 volumes has recently been procured for the benefit of the prisoners in the jail and in the State prison.

Expense of jail over income, for the year ending Sept. 30, 1851, was \$4060 12. This expense, it is hoped, will be less in future.

Amount of property destroyed as far as could be ascertained, \$106,940. Insurance, \$86,831. In many instances the owners were insured more than their loss, and other cases where they lost everything.

Among the most destructive fires were those of August 5, where-by Cleveland's turning establishment and some fourteen surrounding buildings were destroyed or badly injured. At one time there were 11 buildings on fire, and great fears were expressed that an extensive conflagration must be the result, but our gallant firemen were victorious, and kept command. Engines from Pawtucket were present.

Oct. 13. Richmond street Church and surrounding buildings.

Fortunately a violent rain storm had been raging, otherwise it is hard to tell what would have been the result.

Dec. 1st. Barstow & Co.'s Lumber Yard. The wind at the time blowing a gale, it required all the energy of the department to confine it to the yard.

Jan. 13. Bragg & Edgar, Hoppin's building. Tedious fire, building completely flooded before extinguished.

At the burning of a house August 7, one or two children were so badly burnt as to die during the day. Some of the occupants saved themselves by jumping from the 2d story windows.

FIREMEN'S ASSOCIATION.

This association for relief of injured firemen, has had many claims upon its funds during the last two years, owing to the increase of accidents, by the unusual number of fires; so much so that its payments have been greater than the receipts. We are pleased to observe by a vote of the City Council, that they have allowed \$1 per man instead of 50 cents as heretofore. Our citizens should keep an eye to this truly deserving association, and not let its capital diminish, but increase yearly, as their fund is yet small and a few severe accidents to some of its members would soon use it up.

CITY ORDINANCES.

AN ORDINANCE establishing the Fire Department.

It is ordained by the City Council of the city of Providence as follows, viz:

Section 1. The Fire Department of this city shall consist of seven Firewards and as many Hose, Hook and Ladder and Engine companies as the City Council may from time to time elect, so that the number of firemen (twelve hundred) prescribed by law be not exceeded by the whole Fire Department. The seven Firewards shall be designated as First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth and Seventh Firewards, and take rank accordingly—the first holding rank by election, the others determining their rank among themselves. They shall be elected by the City Council; the first, from the city at large; the other six, one from each ward; and from the number of Firewards so elected the City Council shall elect three Presidents of Firewards. The City Council shall also elect the members of the different companies; but each company shall elect its own officers.

The whole number of Firewards shall constitute a board for the purpose of making regulations for the government of the Fire Department, trying cases of insubordination or violation of said regulations, and transacting such other business belonging to the Department as may come before them.

Section 2. Each company shall be commanded by a Foreman and such other officers as they may choose, who shall have special charge of the companies, engine houses and apparatus under their command; report any deficiency, defect or want of repairs, to the first Fireward; see that all the regulations of the Department, relating thereto, are strictly observed; and cause all orders emanating from the Firewards, directed to their companies, to be carried into immediate execution.

The whole Fire Department shall be under the command of the First Fireward; or, in his absence or inability to act, of the highest Fireward present.—It shall be the duty of the Firewards to repair immediately to all fires within the limits of the city; and their orders shall be promptly obeyed in all matters pertaining to the preservation of property, to the location and use of engines, to the extinguishing of fires, and in all other things belonging to the Fire Department. All disputes and controversies that may arise in matters relating to the Fire Department between any of its officers, members or companies, shall be summarily decided by the Fireward in command, whose decision shall be for the time obeyed; but if any party be aggrieved or injured by such decision, he or they may appeal to the Board of Firewards, whose decision shall be final.

Section 3. The First fireward shall have the general supervision of all repairs; he shall see that the engine houses and the reservoirs of water for extinguishing fires, the engines, (stationary or otherwise,) the hose, hooks and ladders, and their carts or trucks, and all the fire apparatus, are kept in good order and ready for immediate use. He shall make himself familiar with the location of the reservoirs, the depth of water in them, and the length of hose necessary to reach it, and furnish a list of the same, with this information annexed, to the Foreman of each company; and he shall make arrangements to secure the ringing of bells in different sections of the city, in alarms of fire; and report monthly to the City Council the amount of all the expenditures of the Fire Department. Any application to the Board of Firewards for the purpose of building engine houses or reservoirs, or buying lots for the same, or purchasing engines, shall be considered by them and reported to the City Council. All bills against the Fire Department before being audited by the City Auditor. The Board of Firewards shall annually report to the City Council the state of the Fire Department, with a list of fires in the city during the year just passed, and such statistics in relation to losses, insurance and causes of fire as they may be able to procure, and suggest such alterations and improvements as they may deem advisable.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the whole Fire Department, unless specially excused, to proceed, as soon as practicable, with their engines and apparatus, to every fire that breaks out within the city. No company shall take its engine out of the city without the consent of the First Fireward. Not more than two companies with their engines shall be absent from the city at any one time on a pleasure excursion, nor shall more than one-third of the whole number of engines leave the city at any one time, on any pretence whatever. No company shall beat its gong, ring its bell, or use any musical instrument while returning from a fire. In case of any breach of the peace or other violation of good order, on the part of any fireman, while on duty, it shall be the duty of the officers in command at the time to report the name or names of the person or persons so offending to the Board of Firewards, who shall inquire into the matter, and shall have power to expel the offender or offenders from the Fire Department.

Section 5. No cards or other gaming implements shall be used in any engine house, nor shall any disorderly conduct be permitted, nor spirituous liquors be used therein; and no engine house shall be opened on Sunday, except in case of alarm of fire.

Section 6. In case any Foreman, Assistant Foreman, or any other Foreman, having command of any company, when on duty, shall disobey or refuse to obey any order or direction given by any Fireward, he shall for such offence, be suspended or expelled from the Fire Department, at the discretion of the Board of Firewards.

Section 7. If any company shall become inefficient for want of members, it shall be the duty of the Board of Firewards to notify the Foreman of such company, that, unless within a reasonable time they recruit their company to an efficient number, they will be disbanded, and their Engine taken from them; and if such company shall fail to recruit their numbers as to answer the requirement of the Fire Department, the Board of firewards shall disband the company, and take possession of the Engine.

Section 8. Whereas, the practice of permitting volunteer associations, not belonging to the Fire Department, to mingle in the duties thereof, has been found pernicious in its results, it shall be the duty of the Firewards in command, to order from the ground, at fires, all such companies.

Section 9. No Fire Engine or Hook and Ladder Truck, or Hose Cart, shall, in going to, or returning from any fire or at any other time, be run, driven, wheeled, drawn or placed upon any sidewalk, except by the special order of a Fireward, under a penalty of ten dollars for each offence, to be forfeited and paid by every person aiding or assisting in the violation of this ordinance.

Section 10. No person shall be eligible to the office of Fireward, after he shall have arrived at the age of sixty years.

Section 11. This Ordinance shall go into effect on the first Monday in June, 1852; at which time all ordinances, resolutions and votes of the city or town of Providence, in relation to the Fire Department, shall be repealed.

We would call the attention of strangers, and also of our own citizens, to the above table, by which it will be seen that Providence ranks the fourteenth on the list in population. If estimated by its wealth, according to its numbers, it would stand second

only. We have often regretted that so little has been done, by the publication of statistics, and in other ways to make our own countrymen at least, better acquainted with the relative importance of this growing city; for so numerous have been the instances, that have come to our knowledge of the ignorance of our own countrymen, in regard to this city, that we have ceased to be surprised at, or to find fault with, the blunders of foreigners, who, after having travelled in this country a few months, have published their books relative to our people, our institutions, &c., abounding with the most singular mistakes.

It is not generally known, even to our own citizens, that the increase of our population, in the last ten years has been equal to SEVENTY per cent., which was the case. Many, no doubt, have supposed the proportionate increase of the population of Boston, in the same time to be greater than our own, but their's was only forty-one per cent.

BRIEF HISTORY OF THE RAILROADS LEADING INTO PROVIDENCE.

Prepared from authentic materials, for Brown's Directory.
BOSTON AND PROVIDENCE RAILROAD.

This is one of the first Railroads constructed in the United States. It was commenced in 1834, and the first trip over the entire road was made in 1836.

The receipts of this road for 11 months, ending Dec. 1, 1851, were, for passengers, \$182,993 89; for freight, \$99,688 12. Three trips each way are now made every day except Sunday, winter and summer. The Boston and Providence Depot was formerly located at India Point, where it is now to be seen, and from which a train of cars leave and arrive simultaneously with that from the new Depot, for the accommodation of passengers in that section of the city.

One of the greatest public improvements ever made in this city, was the filling in of a portion of the cove, from the waters of which the most obnoxious stench was constantly arising at low water, and making a tract of land, sufficiently large to accommodate the different Railroad companies, and furnishing a beautiful promenade, surrounded with grass plots and trees, for the recreation of our citizens. In a few years, when the trees which have been set out shall have attained a respectable size, it is believed it will present an appearance unsurpassed by any portion of New-England. The ellipse of the cove comprises a wall of solid mason work, which will in time receive a substantial iron fence, which is greatly needed, both for ornament and safety.

The work was commenced by the Boston and Providence and Providence and Worcester Railroad Companies, about six years ago, and it was nearly three years before the numerous and spacious buildings now occupied by them, were completed. The passenger Depots for the two companies are united in one building, which is about 600 feet long, and about — feet wide, and was considered at the time it was erected, inferior to no building of the kind in New-England. The freight depots, cars and engine houses, are spacious and beautiful.

OFFICERS—C. H. Warren, President; Wm. Raymond Lee, Superintendent; Henry Dutton, Treasurer; E. Pickering, Clerk.

At the annual meeting of the Company, in Boston, June 2, 1852, the financial condition of the road was presented. "The receipts for the year ending June 30, 1852 (estimating for May and June) will be \$411,468 54, and the expenditures, \$223,325 82. The receipts and expenditures are both larger than any former year. In the latter are \$17,750 interest on the funded debt. During the year, four miles of the road have been laid with new rails, which is an extraordinary charge to the expense account.

"The report alluded to the proposition to build a road from Bristol, R. I., to connect with the Providence at Seekonk. Upon this question the Directors advise no definite action, and submit the question to the stockholders.

"No accident has taken place the last year, and nothing has been paid for damage to any person injured upon the road.

"Charles H. Warren, Wm. Appleton, Joseph Grinnell, John Barstow, Wm. Amory, George R. Russell and Samuel T. Dana, were unanimously elected Directors

"The President then presented the subject of accepting the act of the last Legislature, authorizing the Company to build the road from Bristol to Seekonk. After some discussion upon the general subject, the act was accepted.

"The expenses during the next two or three years will be larger than ever before, as a large portion of the track must be relaid with new iron, at an expense of some \$1700 a mile. At the same time the business is increasing. The result of this year shows that it has fallen but from \$1200 to \$1500 short of paying six per cent. on the capital stock. The buildings on the road are in good repair.

"The Company has no floating debt. After the subscription to the Plainfield road, \$90,000, is paid, the Company will have a funded debt of \$400,000, including the above \$90,000."

PROVIDENCE AND WORCESTER RAILROAD.

This road was commenced in the spring of 1846, and was completed so that cars could pass over the entire road on the 20th of October, 1847. It passes through the villages of Paw-

tucket, Central Falls, Valley Falls, Lonsdale, Albion, Manville, Hamlet, Woonsocket, Waterford, Blackstone, Millville, Uxbridge, Whitin's, Northbridge, Farnum's, Grafton, Sutton, Grand Junction, to Worcester, 43 miles, where it intersects with Albany, New-York, Norwich, Nashua, and Fitchburg roads, connecting also at Waterford with the Norfolk County road, for Boston and intermediate places.

Three through trains run each way, every day except Sundays. A special train as far as Lonsdale, running seven times a day, each way, was commenced about a year ago, as an experiment, which has far exceeded, in patronage, the expectations of its projectors. This train stops at Corliss & Nightingale's and Horton's Grove, in addition to the stopping places of the through trains.

The receipts of this road for the first entire year after its construction (1849) was, for passengers, \$118,219; freight, \$93,192. For 11 months, ending Nov. 30, 1851, for passengers, \$117,043; for merchandise, \$82,122. The stock in this road, which has been depressed for years past, is now above par.

The passenger depot of this Railroad is a large and beautiful building, east of the Boston depot, which for elegance and convenience is rarely excelled. The freight depot, a little north, is also large and commodious.

PROVIDENCE AND STONINGTON RAILROAD.

This road was constructed in 1837, for the purpose of forming an inland route from Boston to New-York, by railroad and steamboat. Previous to the establishment of the depot on the

cove, the passengers and freight were carried across the river at Fox Point, by a steamboat, which frequently caused delay, as well as being attended with much expense and inconvenience. Since the establishment of the new depot, passengers go from Boston to Stonington without change of cars, where they arrive about 9 o'clock in the evening, taking one of those splendid Sound boats, and arrive at New-York the next morning.

This road passes through or near the villages of Olneyville, Apponaug, East-Greenwich, Wickford, Kingston, Usquepaug, Shamrock Mills, Carolina Mills, Dorrville, Westerly, to Stonington, 50 miles. Two accommodation trains run daily except Sunday, each way, in addition to the steamboat train.

The passenger depot of this railroad is in the same building as that of the Boston and Providence road.

PROVIDENCE AND PLAINFIELD RAILROAD.

The Providence and Plainfield Railroad Company was chartered in 1846. On the 4th day of July 1850 it was united with and became part of the Hartford, Providence & Fishkill Rail Road Company, by which name it is now designated. The road commences in Providence, thence westerly along the valley of the Pawtuxet river, passing near Olneyville, Gov. Sprague's Print Works, through the villages of Natick, Greenville, Wakefield, Centreville, Quidnick, Anthony, Washington, and Central Village to the Connecticut line, follows the valley of the Moosup river through Sterling, and intersects the Norwich & Worcester Railroad at Plainfield, 34 miles from Providence. From Plainfield to Willimantic 23 miles; from Plainfield, crossing the Willimantic river, the route proceeds through Coventry, Bolton, Bolton Quarries and the Notch into Vernon, near Rockville; thence through Manchester, and East Hartford, crosses the Connecticut river into Hartford, 31 miles from Willimantic, and intersects the New Haven & Hartford Railroad, thence to the Naugatuck valley, 32 miles beyond Hartford.

The road is built and running from Willimantic to Hartford, and 19 miles beyond Hartford, to Bristol, making about 50 miles of the road completed and now running. The road is now all under contract, and the work commenced, and it is anticipated that the road will be completed and in running order by the middle of October 1853. The road will probably be continued from the Naugatuck valley to Fishkill, on the Hudson river, as there has been quite a spirited meeting at Fishkill recently, and a strong movement in the matter.

The distance from Hartford to Fishkill is 95 miles, and when the road is completed to Fishkill, it will form a connection with the Erie Railroad, thus opening a direct communication with the great West. This road, passing as it will through so many

flourishing manufacturing villages, and a rich farming district, must of necessity be of great advantage to this city in point of trade. This road also intersects with eight transverse railroads, viz: the Norwich & Worcester, Springfield & New Haven, Housatonic, Hudson River, Harlem, New London, Palmer and the Naugatuck Railroads, besides making a new and very desirable route to New York.

Abstract of statistics connected with the route and within a few miles of its connection with the Norwich & Worcester Railroad on the line of that road.

About 70 man'g villages, 120 cotton mills, about 10,000 looms, and about 300,000 spindles, 11 woolen mills, 29 sets of machinery, 8 print works and bleacheries, and about 150 stores. About 8000 persons are employed in manufacturing. About 450 passengers pass daily from said villages and Providence, by stages and other conveyances, and the number is increasing. From 13,000,000 to 15,000,000 pounds, equal to 35,000 bales of cotton used per ann. From 55,000,000 to 60,000,000 yards of cotton goods per ann. From 750,000 to 800,000 pounds of wool used per ann. 800,000 to 900,000 yards of woolen goods manufactured. 500,000 to 600,000 pieces of cotton goods printed per annum. 450,000 to 500,000 do. do. bleached do. Estimated amount of transportation between said villages and Providence and other places, which would probably be received by this road, about 43,000 tons per ann.

Estimated value of cotton and woolen goods and machinery manufactured on said route, equal to 5 or \$6,000,000 per ann.

It is also estimated that there is unoccupied water power sufficient for the capacity of 500,000 spindles.

The officers of the road are, James M. Bunce, President; William W. Hoppin, Treasurer; Samuel Ashburner, Chief Engineer.

PROVIDENCE AND BRISTOL RAILROAD.

Charters for a Railroad connecting Providence with Warren and Bristol, have been obtained in this State and in Massachusetts, and a survey of the route recently made, under the direction of George S. Greene, Esq. Civil Engineer. The proposed route commences near India Bridge, in Seekonk, extends along

the shore of the Providence river, to N. C. Lewis's, crosses the State line near O. K. Vial's house, thence in a line crossing Barrington river near Martin's house, to Warren. Two routes have been surveyed through Warren; one passing to the east of Warren village, crossing the river above the bridge; the other passing along the shore of Warren harbor, through Water-street, and crossing the river below the bridge. From Warren to Bristol, the route lies along the bay shore, and passes along, west of the Poor House, to Oliver-street, in Bristol. The whole distance is 12.86 miles. The estimated cost of construction and equipment is \$292,039. There can be no question that the road can be built within the estimates; indeed a written proposal by responsible parties, has been made to do so.

The amount of money, ascertained by committees composed of the most respectable citizens of Warren and Bristol, to be now paid for freight and travel between these places and Providence, is \$48,536 45. Allowing the running expenses of the road to be fifty per cent. of its income, the present business would pay a dividend upon the estimated cost of nearly nine per cent. The amount of stock proposed to be raised, is three hundred thousand dollars, of which about one half has already been subscribed. The balance will undoubtedly be soon taken up, and we expect to be able to place this road, in our next number, in the class of those built and in operation. This road will complete the immediate Railroad enterprise of Providence, and if the stock of the company shall bear any proportion to the beauty and pleasantness of the route, it will be unsurpassed by any road in the country.

The last Directory, published in 1850, contained about 8700 names. The present one contains upwards of 10,000; and the changes are probably more than 5000.
