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## PRESENTATION OF RESOLUTIONS

### COUNCILOR SALVATORE

Resolution Establishing a Ceremonial Designation Along Admiral Street from Italy Street to Douglas Avenue as “Lafazia Way.”

**WHEREAS**, Private First-Class Carlo Lafazia, of Providence was born in 1897 to Italian immigrants Domenico and Filomena Lafazia; and

**WHEREAS**, Mr. Lafazia was part of the 16<sup>th</sup> infantry regiment, one of the first American battalions to land on French soil in June of 1917; and

**WHEREAS**, A national hero, Mr., Lafazia was killed in France during World War I serving his country; and

**WHEREAS**, Although his body was never recovered, his name is engraved on the Tablets of the Missing at the Meuse-Argonne American Cemetery, the final resting place of more than 14,000 Americans who gave their lives in WWI; and

**WHEREAS**, Mr. Lafazia was called an “Emblem of Italian loyalty to the Stars and Stripes,” and was honored by the Providence Board of Alderman on August 3, 1933, when they dedicated the Lafazia square in his honor; and

**WHEREAS**, Mr. Lafazia represents the dedication and selflessness that have come to define the men and women of our armed services, and is truly a Providence hero.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, That the City Council of the City of Providence does hereby honor the life and legacy of Carlo Lafazia by establishing a ceremonial designation along Admiral Street running from Italy Street to Douglas Avenue as “Lafazia Way”.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, That the City Council requests that the Department of Public Works work to manufacture, install, and maintain one or more honorary signs at prominent and appropriate locations, which shall reflect the “Lafazia Way” honorary designation.

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**COUNCILWOMAN RYAN AND COUNCIL PRESIDENT IGLIOZZI**

Resolution Regarding ATV and Recreational Vehicle Enforcement.

**WHEREAS**, Pursuant to Chapter 15, Article VII, Section 15-103 of the Providence Code of Ordinances, it is illegal to operate a recreational off-road vehicle, which includes all-terrain vehicles (ATVs) and dirt bikes, within the limits of the City; and

**WHEREAS**, In 2015 the City Council passed the ordinance outlawing the operation of snowmobiles, ATVs, and other recreational vehicles from operating within the City limits in direct response to an increase in ATV and recreational vehicle activity; and

**WHEREAS**, In 2017 the Council passed an amendment to the same ordinance to provide the Providence Police Department with the power to confiscate and destroy ATVs and recreational vehicles caught operating within the City’s limits; and

**WHEREAS**, Recreational off-road vehicles are banned from operating on city streets as they were not designed for that use which creates significant safety hazards for the public as well as the operators of the vehicles; and

**WHEREAS**, The illegal operation of all-terrain vehicles (ATVs) and dirt bikes in Providence over the past few years has created significant public safety concerns for motorists, pedestrians, and residents alike; and

**WHEREAS**, The reckless operation of these vehicles on city streets and sidewalks can result in collisions with pedestrians and other motorists, confusion and fear for other motorists trying to safely use city streets, and significant noise pollution and degradation of the quality of life for residents in the surrounding area; and

**WHEREAS**, As the elected representatives of the people of Providence, the Providence City Council has an obligation to ensure the safety of our residents; and
