ORDINANCES SECOND READING

The following Ordinances were in City
Council June 24, 1982, Read and Passed
the First Time and are Returned for

An Ordinance Providing for the Assessment and Collection of 1982 Taxes in a Sum Not Less than Ninety-Three Million, Four Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$93,400,000.00) and Not More than ninety-Six Million Dollars (\$96,000,000.00) being based on One Hundred Percent (100%) of the 1982-1983 Fiscal Year Tax Collection.

Be it ordained by the City of Providence:

Section 1. The City Council of the City of Providence hereby orders the assessment and collection of a tax on the ratable real estate and tangible personal property as well as orders the assessment and collection of an excise tax on all Registered Motor Vehicles, in a sum not less than Ninety-Three Million Four Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$93,400,000.00) and not more than Ninety Six Million Dollars (\$96,000,000.00) being based on One Hundred Percent (100%) of the 1982-1983

Now, Therefore, Be It Ordained By the City of Providence:

Section 1. To defray the expenses of the City of Providence for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1983, the sums of money or so much thereof, as are authorized by law, indicated in the accompanying schedule, are hereby appropriated for the objects and purposes, and in amounts expressed therein provided that payments thereunder shall be subject to the provisions of the Charter of the City of Providence, Chapter 832 of the Public Laws of 1940, enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Rhode Island at its January Session, A.D., 1940 and approved April 26, 1940, as amended, and subject to the provisions of the City Ordinances relative to the expenditures of money from the City Treasury. Title I Revenue Sharing, Fiscal Assistance to State and Local Government rules and regulations shall govern the portion of this Budget so designated.

Sec. 2. All moneys appropriated are to be expended under the direction of the respective Department Heads unless otherwise provided subject to the approval of the Director of Finance. All moneys specifically earmarked with Federal Revenue Sharing Funds shall be so provided unless amended. Any unused Federal Revenue Sharing moneys not appropriated or not used shall not revert to surplus; but shall be reappropriated in the following fiscal year.

Sec. 3. The payments to the School Fund of the following estimated receipts included in the appropriation of \$59,925,456.00 for the support of the Public Schools for the City of Providence fiscal period 1982-1983, will be increased or decreased to conform with the actual amounts received from such sources during the City of Providence fiscal year 1982-1983.

Sec. 66. Chapter 1981-40 of the Ordinances of the City of Providence effective July 20, 1981, with all amendments and addition thereto, is hereby repealed and all other Ordinances or parts thereof inconsistent herewith, are likewise repealed.

Sec. 67. PERSONNEL CONTROL PROCEDURE. All personnel transactions in the City of Providence regarding the hiring, reinstatement, transfer, and/or adjustments in compensation and benefits shall be carried out in accordance with the following procedures:

1. Department Heads may submit requests only to the Director of Finance along with written justification.

2. The Director of Finance shall certify whether or not:

a. Funds are included in the budget;

b. The position is authorized.

3. If funds are not available and/or the position is not authorized, the Director of Finance shall automatically reject the requested personnel change unless an emergency exists as to the filling of the position and the Mayor so certifies in writing to the Director of Finance.

4. The Director of Finance shall also recommend rejection of any requests for hiring; reinstatement, transfer, etc., if in his opinion such requests are not justified in view of the City's current financial emergency.

5. The Director of Finance shall make such recommendations directly to the Mayor, who shall either personally approve or reject (in writing) the recommendations of the Finance Director consistent with the Mayor's Executive Order of February 6, 1981.

6. Concurrently with the making of any

certification under paragraph (3), above and concurrently with any approval or rejection under paragraph (5), above, the Mayor shall cause a true copy of any such certification, approval or rejection to be properly forwarded to the Chairperson of the Finance Committee of the Providence City Council and to the Providence Fiscal Commission.

Sec. 68. Chapter 17 of Article III of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Providence is hereby amended by adding Section 17-27, which will read as follows:

"Section 17-27. PROVIDING FOR RATIFICATION OF COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENTS. No Collective Bargaining Agreement between the City of Providence and any other labor organization shall become effective unless and until ratified by the Providence City Council. Each contract, before submission to the City Council, shall contain a fiscal note.

At least one Public Hearing shall be held prior to City Council ratification of any contract.

Sec. 69. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage, except that any position abolished by adoption of this Ordinance shall not take effect unless there is compliance with the State Labor Relations Act and/or any valid collective bargaining agreement between the City of Providence and Laborers International Union on behalf of Public Employees Local Union 1033.

An Ordinance in Amendment of Chapter 4 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Providence, Adding Provision for the Destruction and Disposal of Canines.

Be it ordained by the City of Providence:

Section 1. Chapter 4 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Providence is hereby amended by

adding thereto a section to be enumerated, Section 4-33.1, which shall read as follows:

Sec. 2. Section 4-33.1.

The Dog Officer may upon the application and request of the owner, who shall file an Affidavit that he or she is the true owner of such animal, humanely destroy and dispose of any dog.

The Dog Officer shall charge a fee of not less than Five (\$5.00) Dollars for such services.

Sec. 3. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

An Ordinance amending Chapter 544 of 1951, by Changing from a C-2 General Commercial Zone, to a C-4 Heavy Commercial Zone, Lot 53, as Set Out and delineated on City Assessor's Plat 35, said lot being located at 1950 Westminster Street.

Be it ordained by the City of Providence:

Section 1. The Zoning Map accompanying and made a part of Chapter 544 of the Ordinances of the City of Providence, approved September 21, 1951, as heretofore amended, and entitled: "An Ordinance Zoning the City of Providence and Establishing Use, Height and Area Regulations", as amended, is hereby further amended by changing from a C-2 General Commercial Zone to a C-4 Heavy Commercial Zone, Lot 53, as set out and delineated on City Assessor's Plat 35, said lot being located at 1950 Westminster Street bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the southerly line of Westminster Street at the northwesterly corner of Lot 53 on the City of Providence Assessor's Plat 35; thence easterly along the southerly line of Westminster Street to the northeasterly corner of Lot 53; thence southerly, bounded easterly by Lots 354, 358 and portion of Lot 355, to the southeasterly corner of Lot 53; thence westerly,

bounded southerly by Lot 54, to a point on the easterly line of Stokes Street; thence northerly along the easterly line of Stokes Street to the southwesterly corner of Lot 359; thence easterly, bounded northerly by Lot 359, and continuing to the southeasterly corner of Lot 359; thence northerly, bounded westerly by Lot 359 and continuing to the easterly line of Westminster Street and the northwesterly corner of Lot 53; said point is further described as being point and place of beginning, said parcel is further described as being Lot 53 on City of Providence Assessor's Plat 35.

Sec. 2. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

An Ordinance Approving and Adopting the Official Redevelopment Plan for the Eagle Park Renewal Project.

Be It Ordained By The City Of Providence:

Whereas, The Providence Redevelopment Agency (hereinafter sometimes called "Local Public Agency") pursuant to the provisions of Title 45, Chapters 31-33 (inclusive) of the General Laws of Rhode Island, 1956, as amended, entitled, "Redevelopment Act of 1956", has formulated and submitted to the City Council on April 1, 1982 for its consideration, as Urban Renewal Plan approved by the Local Public Agency, for an Urban Renewal Area, which said Urban Renewal Plan is entitled, "Eagle Park Renewal Project" and comprises a report consisting of approximately 41 pages of text including exhibit and maps; and

Whereas, A general plan has been prepared by the City Plan Commission and is recognized and used as a guide for the general development of the City of Providence as a whole; and

Whereas, The said Urban Renewal Plan concerns itself with areas which have been

designated Redevelopment Areas by the City Council of the City of Providence by Chapter 103 of the Ordinances of the City of Providence, approved July 6, 1948, as amended by Chapter 69-44 of the Ordinances of the City of Providence, approved November 28, 1969, in conformity with the provisions of Section 22 of Chapter 1802 of the Public Laws of Rhode Island 1946, as amended and Title 45, Chapter 32, Section 4 of the General Laws of Rhode Island, 1956, as amended.

Whereas, A copy of said Urban Renewal Plan was transmitted to the City Plan Commission on April 14, 1982.

Whereas, The City Plan Commission, which is the duly designated and acting official planning body for the City, has submitted to the City Council its report and recommendations respecting the Urban Renewal Plan for Eagle Park Renewal Project and has certified that said Urban Renewal Plan conforms to the said general plan for the City as a whole, and the City Council has duly considered said report, recommendations and certification of the planning body; and

Whereas, The plan as submitted contains a finding that the area included in the proposed Urban Renewal Plan qualified as a deteriorated blighted area within the meaning of the "Redevelopment Act of 1956," as amended to date, because there exist in the area buildings or improvements, used or intended to be used for living, commercial, industrial or other purposes, which by reason of (1) dilapidation, deterioration, age or obsolescence, (2) inadequate provisions for ventilation, light, sanitation, open spaces and recreation facilities, (3) defective design or unsanitary or unsafe character of condition or physical construction, (4) defective or inadequate street and lot layout, (5) mixed character, deterioration or shifting of uses to which they are put, or any combination of such factors and characteristics are conducive to the further deterioration and decline of the area and injuriously affect the entire area.

Whereas, A structural quality survey was conducted by the City of Providence, Department of Planning and Urban Development and the results of that survey as set forth in the Urban Renewal Plan indicated that 21% of the structures have deficiencies that include serious deterioration; lack of sanitary facilities; and serious inadequacies in lighting and ventilation. The Eagle Park Renewal Project Area is not restricted to, nor does it consist entirely of lands, buildings, or improvements which of themselves are detrimental, but is an area in which such conditions exist and injuriously affect the entire area.

Whereas, There has also been presented to the City Council information and data respecting Urban Renewal Plans for the Urban Renewal Areas in the City of Providence including the following: Capital Improvement Programs for 1950-1956, 1951-1957, 1952-1958, 1953-1959, 1954-1960, 1955-1961, 1956-1962, 1957-1963, 1958-1964, 1959-1965, 1960-1966, and 1961-1967, 1962-1968, 1963-1969, 1964-1970, 1965-1971, 1966-1972, 1967-1973, 1968-1974, 1979-1985, 1980-1986 and the Annual Report of the Providence Redevelopment Agency for 1949 through 1980 (inclusive); and

Whereas, At a public hearing held on..... following notice of the date, time, place and purpose of such hearing, the City Council Committee on Urban Redevelopment, Renewal and Planning duly considered the Urban Renewal Plan, and all evidence and testimony for and against the adoption of such Plan, in accordance with the provisions of the "Redevelopment Act of 1956," and

Whereas, Said Urban Renewal Plan for the Project Area prescribes certain land uses for the Eagle Park Renewal Project and will require, among other things, but not by way of limitation, property acquisition, clearance and demolition, rehabilitation, and reconstruction of certain streets, curbs and sidewalks, grading and other public improvements and other public actions; and

Now, Therefore, Be It Ordained By the City of Providence:

1. The Project is hereby designated as "Eagle Park Renewal Project".

2. It is hereby found and determined that for the purpose of Urban Renewal Plan, the Eagle Park Renewal Project comprises that certain tract of land situated in the City of Providence and State of Rhode Island, which is bounded as described in Exhibit 1, which is attached hereto and made a part hereof as if more fully set forth herein.

3. It be and hereby is found and determined in relation to the Eagle Park Renewal Project on the basis of the facts set forth in the report and documents mentioned in the Preamble of this Ordinance and upon the basis of evidence and testimony presented at the public hearing on said Plan;

(a) That within the Eagle Park Renewal Project area 2% of the structures are substandard or seriously deficient or unsafe in that these structures contain serious deterioration, and

(b) Within the Eagle Park Renewal Project Area there exists the following environmental deficiencies:

a. Defective or Inadequate Street and/or Lot Layout.

b. Incompatible or shifting Uses.

c. Obsolete or Aged Buildings, Not Suitable for Improvement or Conversion.

d. Inadequate Provision for Ventilation, Light, Sanitation, Open Space and Recreation Facilities.

e. Defective Design or Unsanitary or Unsafe Character or Condition of Physical Construction.

4. It be and hereby is found and determined

that because of a predominance of conditions of dilapidation, deterioration, obsolescence, inadequate provision for light and sanitation, unsanitary and unsafe character and condition of physical construction, mixed character of uses injuriously affect the entire Area and constitute a menace to the public health, safety and welfare of the inhabitants of the Area and of the community generally, said Urban Renewal Area is a deteriorated and blighted area within the meaning of Sections 2-8 inclusive of Chapter 31 of the "Redevelopment Act of 1956", as amended, and that said Eagle Park Renewal Project Area is hereby determined to be a deteriorated blighted area.

5. It be and hereby is found that the Eagle Park Review Project area requires clearance, replanning, redevelopment, and improvement and rehabilitation under the provisions of the "Redevelopment Act of 1956".

6. It be and hereby is declared to be the purpose and intent of this Body to eliminate the deteriorated and substandard conditions existing in the Eagle Park Renewal Project Area and the replacement of such conditions by a well-planned area in accordance with and by the means provided in the "Redevelopment Act of 1956".

7. It is hereby found, declared and determined that:

(a) The Urban Renewal Plan for the Eagle Park Renewal Project Area will redevelop said Urban Renewal Area in conformity with the provisions of the "Redevelopment Act of 1956"; will effectuate the purposes and policy of said Act; and will promote the public health, safety, morals and welfare of the City of Providence.

(b) The Urban Renewal Plan for said Urban Renewal Area conforms to the general or master plan for the City of Providence as a whole.

(c) The acquisition of the real property in accordance with the said Plan for the Eagle Park Renewal Project Area is in the public interest.

(d) Adequate provision for payment for property which may be acquired by the exercise of eminent domain has been made in the Urban Renewal Plan.

(e) The Urban Renewal Plan contains adequate safeguards to assure the carrying out of the work of redevelopment in accordance with the Urban Renewal Plan.

(f) The Urban Renewal Plan provides for the retention of controls and the establishment of restrictions and covenants which may run with the land.

8. The Providence Redevelopment Agency shall sell, lease or dispose of land in the Eagle Park Renewal Project Area only in accordance with the terms of the Redevelopment Plan and subject to the restrictions, covenants and conditions set forth therein and which are hereby found and declared to be necessary to effectuate the purposes of the "Redevelopment Act of 1956".

9. In enacting this Ordinance, the City Council intends to comply with the provisions of the "Redevelopment Act of 1956" which relate to adoption of an Urban Renewal Plan for an approved urban Renewal Area so that the blighted and substandard conditions in this Urban Renewal Area can be eliminated and the Urban Renewal Area can be redeveloped in accordance with the Urban Renewal Plan to attain the public purposes and policy of the "Redevelopment Act of 1956" and thereby to protect and promote and be in the interest of the public health, safety, morals and general welfare of the people in the State as a whole and particularly the people of this City.

10. The Urban Renewal Plan for the Eagle Park Renewal Project consisting of a booklet containing a table of contents, approximately 41 pages of text, including exhibit and maps, is hereby approved, adopted and designated as the Official Redevelopment Plan for the Eagle Park Renewal Project and is herein incorporated by reference, and made a part hereof.

11. The Providence Redevelopment Agency is hereby fully authorized to carry out this Official Redevelopment Plan, provided, however, that the Agency shall not enter into any contracts for disposition of property in the Urban Renewal Project Area until at least ten days after the City Council of the City of Providence has received at a regular or special meeting a report from the Providence Redevelopment Agency concerning the proposed sale of lease.

12. In order to implement and facilitate the effectuation of the Urban Renewal Plan hereby approved, it is found and determined that certain official action must be taken by this body.

(a) Pledges its cooperation in helping to carry out said Official Urban Renewal Plan;

(b) Requests the various officials, departments, boards and agencies of the City of Providence having administrative responsibilities in the premises likewise to cooperate to such end and to exercise their respective functions and powers in a manner consistent with said Urban Renewal Plan;

(c) Declares that it will provide the cost of the redevelopment of the Eagle Park Renewal Project Area and hereby allocates a cash contribution of \$478,000 representing the estimated amount of the Project Cost;

(d) That the City Treasurer, acting under the direction of the Committee on Finance, be and hereby is authorized and directed to borrow from time to time, in such sums as may be necessary, not exceeding Four Hundred Seventy Eight Thousand (\$478,000) Dollars in accordance with the provisions of Title 45, Chapter 32, Section 42, and Title 45, Chapter 33, Sections 1, 2, 4 and 17 of the General Laws of Rhode Island 1956, entitled, "Redevelopment Act of 1956," and to issue the City's notes therefor, signed by him and countersigned by the Mayor and the Chairman of the Committee on Finance and to renew any such notes from time to time as the same become due. The money thus obtained shall be used exclu-

sively for carrying out the Official Redevelopment Plan for Eagle Park Renewal Project.

(e) Stands ready to consider and take appropriate action upon any other proposals and measures designed to effectuate said Urban Renewal Plan.

13. This Ordinance shall take effect on its passage and shall be filed with the City Clerk who is hereby authorized and directed to forward a certified copy of this Ordinance to the Providence Redevelopment Agency.

An Ordinance Approving and Adopting the Official Redevelopment Plan for the Washington Park Revitalization Project.

Be it ordained by the City of Providence:

Whereas, said Urban Renewal Plan for the Project Area prescribes certain land uses for the Washington Park Revitalization Project Area and will require, among other things, but not by way of limitation, property acquisition clearance and demolition, rehabilitation and reconstruction of certain street, curbs and sidewalks, grading and other public improvements and other public actions; and

Now, therefore, be it ordained by the City of Providence:

1. The Project is hereby designated as "Washington Park Revitalization Project".

2. It is hereby found and determined that for the purpose of the Urban Renewal Plan, the Washington Park Revitalization Project comprises that certain tract of land situated in the City of Providence and State of Rhode Island, which is bounded as described in Exhibit A, which is attached hereto and made a part hereof as if more fully set forth herein.

3. It be and hereby is found and determined in relation to the Washington Park Revitalization Project on the basis of the facts set forth in the report and documents mentioned in the Preamble of this Ordinance and upon the basis of evidence and testimony presented at the public hearing on said Plan:

(a) That within the Washington Park Revitalization Project Area 9.70% of the structures are substandard or seriously deficient or unsafe in that these structures contain serious deterioration, and

(b) Within the Washington Park Revitalization Project Area there exists the following environmental deficiencies:

a. Defective or Inadequate Street and/or Lot layout.

b. Incompatible or Shifting Uses.

c. Obsolete or Aged Buildings, Not Suitable for Improvement or Conversion.

d. Inadequate Provision for Ventilation, Light, Sanitation, Open Space and Recreation Facilities.

e. Defective Design or Unsanitary or Unsafe Character or Condition of Physical Construction.

4. It be and hereby is found and determined that because of a predominance of conditions of dilapidation, deterioration, obsolescence, inade-

quate provision for light and sanitation, unsanitary and unsafe character and condition of physical construction, mixed character of uses injuriously affect the entire area and constitute a menace to the public health, safety and welfare of the inhabitants of the area and of the community generally, said Urban Renewal Area is a deteriorated and blighted area within the meaning of Sections 2-8 inclusive of Chapter 31 of the "Redevelopment Act of 1956", as amended, and that said Washington Park Revitalization Project Area is hereby determined to be deteriorated blighted area.

5. It be and hereby is found that the Washington Park Revitalization Project Area requires clearance, replanning, redevelopment and improvement and rehabilitation under the provisions of the "Redevelopment Act of 1956".

6. It be and hereby is declared to be the purpose and intent of this Body to eliminate the deteriorated and substandard conditions existing in the Washington Park Revitalization Project Area and the replacement of such conditions by a well-planned area in accordance with and by the means provided in the "Redevelopment Act of 1956".

7. It is hereby found, declared and determined that:

(a) The Urban Renewal Plan for the Washington Park Revitalization Project Area will redevelop said Urban Renewal Area in conformity with the provisions of the "Redevelopment Act of 1956"; will effectuate the purposes and policy of said Act; and will promote the public health, safety, morals and welfare of the City of Providence.

(b) The Urban Renewal Plan for said Urban Renewal Area conforms to the general or master plan for the City of Providence as a whole.

(c) The acquisition of the real property in accordance with the said Plan for the Washing-

ton Park Revitalization Project Area is in the public interest.

(d) Adequate provision for payment for property which may be acquired by the exercise of eminent domain has been made in the Urban Renewal Plan.

(e) The Urban Renewal Plan contains adequate safe guards to assure the carrying out of the work of redevelopment in accordance with the Urban Renewal Plan.

(f) The Urban Renewal Plan provides for the retention of controls and the establishment of restrictions and covenants which may run with the land.

8. The Providence Redevelopment Agency shall sell, lease or dispose of land in the Washington Park Revitalization Project Area only in accordance with the terms of the Redevelopment Plan and subject to the restrictions, covenants and conditions set forth therein and which are hereby found and declared to be necessary to effectuate the purposes of the "Redevelopment Act of 1956".

9. In enacting this Ordinance, the City Council intends to comply with the provisions of the "Redevelopment Act of 1956" which relates to adoption of an Urban Renewal Plan for an approved Urban Renewal Area so that the blighted and substandard conditions in this Urban Renewal Area can be eliminated and the Urban Renewal Area can be redeveloped in accordance with the Urban Renewal Plan to attain the public purposes and policy of the "Redevelopment Act of 1956" and thereby to protect and promote and be in the interest of the public health, safety, morals and general welfare of the people in the State as a whole and particularly the people of this City.

10. The Urban Renewal Plan for the Washington Park Revitalization Project consisting of a booklet containing a table of contents, approximately 33 pages of text, exhibit and maps, is

hereby approved, adopted and designated as the Official Redevelopment Plan for the Washington Park Revitalization Project and is herein incorporated by reference, and made a part hereof.

11. The Providence Redevelopment Agency is hereby fully authorized to carry out this Official Redevelopment Plan, however, that the Agency shall not enter into any contracts for disposition of property in the Urban Renewal Project Area until at least ten days after the City Council of the City of Providence has received at a regular or special meeting a report from the Providence Redevelopment Agency concerning the proposed sale or lease.

12. In order to implement and facilitate the effectuation of the Urban Renewal Plan hereby approved, it is found and determined that certain official action must be taken by this Body.

(a) Pledges its cooperation in helping to carry out said Official Urban Renewal Plan;

(b) Requests the various officials, departments boards and agencies of the City of Providence having administrative responsibilities in the premises likewise to cooperate to such end and to exercise their respective functions and powers in a manner consistent with said Urban Renewal Plan;

(c) Declares that it will provide the cost of the redevelopment of the Urban Renewal Project Area, and hereby allocates a cash contribution of \$1,200,000 representing the estimated amount of the Project Cost;

(d) That the City Treasurer, acting under the direction of the Committee on Finance, be and hereby is authorized and directed to borrow from time to time, in such sums as may be necessary, not exceeding One Million Two Hundred Thousand (\$1,200,000.00) Dollars in accordance with the provisions of Title 45, Chapter 32, Section 42, and Title 45, Chapter 33, Sections 1, 2, 4, and 17 of the General Laws of Rhode Island, 1956, entitled, "Redevelopment Act of 1956", and to issue the

City's notes therefor, signed by him and countersigned by the Mayor and the Chairman of the Committee on Finance and to renew any such notes from time to time as the same become due. The money thus obtained shall be used exclusively for carrying out the Official Redevelopment Plan for the Washington Park Revitalization Project.

(e) Stands ready to consider and take appropriate action upon any other proposals and measures designed to effectuate said Urban Renewal Plan.

13. This Ordinance shall take effect on its passage and shall be filed with the City Clerk who is hereby authorized and directed to forward a certified copy of this Ordinance to the Providence Redevelopment Agency.
