



This report is a summary of the activities of the Providence Recreation Department during this past year. Included in this letter are a few of the highlights.

During the past year this department continued an extensive outreach program in all neighborhoods attempting to bring together as many community agencies as possible to plan and provide the best recreation programs possible for our youth, young adults and the elderly. We demonstrated with success, that this department is committed to sharing with them some of our programs, facilities, finances, and transportation capability. As a result several events were planned which involved more than one agency.


One of the major accomplishments of the 1986-1987 year was the tremendous success of the Summer of 87. The number of youth that we serviced this past summer surpassed all our expectations. The pools, trips, clinics and special events were all successes beyond our expectations. The credit here should be given to the Director of our year round staff and an excellent workmanship job function by our seasonal workers. Based upon this we look forward to reaching new goals in leisure time activity in 1988-1989. We have provided and will expand our services again to assist all recreational programs in this great city.

We continued a new policy in our recreation centers of setting aside the hours from 5 to 7 PM each night for the exclusive use of neighborhood groups in need of a gymnasium. It was very popular, and most of our centers were "booked" across the board.

The Federal Summer Food Service Program for Children was an unqualified success again this year. We provided 310,000 nutritious meals to city youngsters up to and including the age of eighteen. In addition, summer employment opportunities were created for city residents, including 37 senior citizens and 44 youths. We would like to thank the Providence School Department, the Park Department and the Purchasing Department for helping to make this program a success.

We will continue our effort in 1988 to work with all agencies to attract more people and acquaint them with the many programs offered, along with developing new ones to meet their needs.

WINTER PROGRAMS

RECREATION CENTERS

We operated in six recreation centers, (four full time centers and two part time centers), from October 27, 1986 to April 30, 1987, which were located throughout the City of Providence. The centers were open Monday through Saturday and featured activities of interest to both boys and girls between the ages of eight to fifteen. After school programs were offered in the broad areas of active, passive and cultural pursuits. Such activities as basketball, kickball, soccer, street hockey and many others were offered to the younger group. Instructional sessions were held to expose this group to many new and traditional types of table and floor games. A few of them were pocket billiards, table tennis, checkers, nok-hockey and many, many others. Arts and crafts projects were offered to the younger group in certain centers on a regular basis.

Our older teen age group attended the centers in the evenings and on Saturday afternoons. They were afforded the same activities as the younger group. They, however, participated in more sophisticated activities which included intra-mural leagues and formal competition in city wide leagues and special activities. Included in this were such leagues as soccer, basketball and volleyball.

Additionally, centers offered their own unique programs in addition to those prescribed by the central staff.

A typical weekly program activity report is attached.

BASKETBALL PROGRAM

Basketball, traditionally, has been one of our most popular games throughout the city. All youth centers conduct leagues for both boys and girls in several age groups as part of their winter program. Additionally, "pick up" games are played almost daily. One may stop by any of our gymnasiums or our many outdoor courts and observe people of all ages involved in many varied types of games.

Recognizing this, the Recreation Department conducts formal programs city wide throughout the calendar year. At this time, we would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge the valuable financial assistance provided to this program by private business and corporate sponsors.

In the summer a daily basketball clinic is conducted by a highly qualified staff of coaches. City youngsters are introduced to the basic fundamentals plus affording them the opportunity to participate in formal games, most of them, for the very first time. We also administer a league for high school players two evenings per week on our lighted courts. Using qualified Interscholastic League officials, teams play a fourteen game schedule plus a play-off. The games are highly competitive and attract a good many spectators.

During the winter season several city wide leagues are operated by the Recreation Department. Leagues include a Midget Division for boys 9 to 13 years of age, and Providence Community League for ages 13 to 15. Both are operated as doubleheaders on Saturday mornings. An adult league plays on Sunday evenings. Weekdays there is an interesting league in operation for boys 14 to 17 years of age who have passing grades in their academic courses. This league was started by staff people of the Washington Park Community Center several years ago. It has since grown to include teams from many Providence neighborhoods. The Providence Recreation Department is happy to assist the Washington Park Community Center in

administering this fine league.

Interest in girl's basketball is growing every year. It is one of our major goals in the 1987-88 season to involve more girls in our Middle School Program and attempt to organize two additional leagues for ages 9 to 12 and ages 13 to 16.

LEARN TO SWIM PROGRAM

The Learn to Swim Program sponsored by the Recreation Department provides an opportunity for the Providence School Department to schedule swim classes for their students as part of their physical education program. Daily classes are scheduled at our South Providence Recreation Center indoor pool located on Dudley Street. The Recreation Department provides transportation and instruction. Appropriate certificates of achievement are awarded each student at the conclusion of the program. Our daily attendance records show that transportation, instruction and supervision was provided to 6,750 public school students during the past 1986-1987 academic year.

In addition to instruction to public school students this past year, we provided city residents, sixteen years of age and older, an opportunity to train as lifeguards. Those who took advantage of this program were offered summer employment and all lesson fees were reimbursed by the department. As a result of this, we were successful in training and hiring over twenty lifeguards.

MIDDLE SCHOOL RECREATION PROGRAM

The Recreation Department and School Department combined resources to conduct an after school program in six middle schools located in our city neighborhoods. Teachers were hired as recreation supervisors to conduct a program four afternoons per week for a period of twenty-five weeks during the school year.

A varied schedule of activities was introduced for boys and girls which included basketball, soccer, volleyball and softball. All school members were invited to participate.

Boys and girls teams were formed in each school at the conclusion of the program and inter-school tournaments were held in basketball and volleyball. The Recreation Department drew up the schedules, hired and assigned officials, provided transportation and awarded team trophies. In addition to team awards, individual award certificates were presented to all team members. We feel this will become a valued keepsake in later years.

It is our plan to expand significantly this program in 1988. We will introduce inter-school varsity leagues for both boys and girls for the first time in many years. This is being made possible through the efforts of the Recreation and School Departments along with private corporate sponsors. Each school will be asked to field teams in basketball and co-ed soccer and co-ed volleyball.

NEIGHBORHOOD SOCCER LEAGUE

The Providence Recreation Department administered an indoor soccer program comprising eight teams representing various youth agencies located throughout the City of Providence. Each team played a 14 game schedule and all were involved in a league play off. Games were played twice weekly starting on January 8th and continuing to March 20, 1987. Approximately 160 players and 100 spectators were involved with the league on game days.

The Recreation Department, in addition to drawing up the league schedule, assisted in providing transportation and paying for all league officials. We would like to acknowledge the fine cooperation we received from the Rhode Island Soccer Officials Association.

Appropriate team and individual awards were provided to all teams at the conclusion of the season by this department.

SPECIAL EVENTS

Various special events were held throughout the year for our city's residents. These were usually a "one time only" event and were city wide in scope. For example, the Annual Easter Egg Hunt was held this year on Saturday, April 18th at the Temple to Music in Roger Williams Park in conjunction with the city Parks Department. This event was for the enjoyment of youngsters between the ages of three to eleven. Transportation was provided by the Recreation Department from all neighborhood centers to and from the event. Many parents brought their children directly to the park and enjoyed the day along with their off spring.

Other events were planned and conducted throughout the year. As an example of an on going event, each neighborhood center was transported at least once during the season to conduct a roller skating party exclusively for their center. Some neighborhoods enjoyed this event so much that they repeated it several times during the year.

Additional events conducted by the Recreation Department included the Hershey Track and Field meet, Special Olympics Track meet, NBA Hot Shot contest, Halloween, Christmas, and Valentine Day parties. Also, transportation and admission was arranged for city youngsters to attend the circus, Ice Capades, Pawtucket Red Sox games, Looking Glass Theatre, Trinity Summer Theatre, College and local high school basketball games to list just a few.

We are constantly adding to this list, for we believe that this provides a valuable and enjoyable service to inner-city people.

YOUTH TRANSPORTATION

The City of Providence Recreation Department provides transportation for agencies that service young people. This cooperative effort enables young people to enjoy programs at sites other than their own. These sites included, Boy's Clubs, Community College of Rhode Island, Lincoln Woods, McCoy Stadium, Spring Lake, Sand Hill Cove, Neutaconkanut Park, Basketball, soccer, volleyball, softball and baseball clinics.

Other transportation services were provided during the school year. Halloween parties in October and vacation shows at the Roger Williams Park Museum were provided for a total of 950 children. After school programs included skating at United Skates of America in East Providence in which 228 youngsters participated.

OUTDOOR SWIMMING POOLS

The Recreation Department operated six neighborhood swimming pools during this past summer season. They were programmed for a nine week period operating from July 1 to September 2, 1987 for city residents of all ages. Open every day for five uninterrupted hours of fun, these pools accommodated between 275 and 400 people at one time during the peak afternoon hours. It was estimated that from 500 to 700 different people used the pools daily in each neighborhood.

Swimming lessons were offered in the mornings at several locations for anyone desiring to take advantage of this opportunity at no charge. While popular in some areas, we continue to attempt to induce more non swimmers to attend these classes each summer. Hopefully, the summer lessons will prove to be as effective in the future, as our very successful winter indoor Learn to Swim Program which we operate with the Providence School Physical Education Department.

The Fox Point Pool was closed for major repairs in 1987. We plan to be operating this facility in 1988.

THE SUMMER FOOD SERVICE PROGRAM FOR CHILDREN

The Summer Food Service Program for Children is an extension of the School Lunch Program. It is sponsored by the Providence Recreation Department, funded by the federal government through the Department of Agriculture and monitored by the Rhode Island Department of Education, Food Services Division. Each resident of the City of Providence, up to and including the age of eighteen, is eligible to receive, at no cost, a breakfast and lunch during the summer months. Starting on June 24 and running through August 28, 1987, meals were served at over seventy locations in all neighborhoods in the Providence area. City youngsters taking day trips which took them outside the city to visit various camp sites, points of interest, lakes and beaches located in Rhode Island, and adjacent states were allowed to take meals with them as part of this program.

Over 310,000 well balanced, highly nutritional meals were served to city youngsters this past summer. More than half the city residents eligible participated in the program. This was achieved through an extensive outreach effort conducted earlier in the year prior to the start of the summer.

Operating with a budget in excess of five hundred thousand dollars, summer employment was provided to over one hundred and thirty city residents. The work force was comprised of seniors, young adults, and teenagers with females and minorities well represented.

ATHLETIC CLINICS

Athletic clinics were offered for a period of seven weeks as part of our summer program. They were conducted at five athletic complexes located in various neighborhoods throughout the city. Professionally trained specialists, with the assistance of recreation leaders, provided instruction to youngsters from eight through seventeen years of age. They were taught basic skills and techniques in basketball, baseball, soccer, softball, and volleyball. The clinics were offered Monday through Friday featuring instruction in the morning and games in the afternoon. Transportation was provided to all city youngsters to and from the clinics by the Recreation Department.

We feel that this was one of our most successful summer programs. Not only were our sessions well attended involving the more popular sports such as baseball and basketball, but there also was a great deal of interest generated in soccer and volleyball. The large numbers of girls attending was also noted.

As a follow up to this activity, winter leagues for boys and girls are being planned with participation by our own recreation centers, boys and girls clubs, and neighborhood community centers.


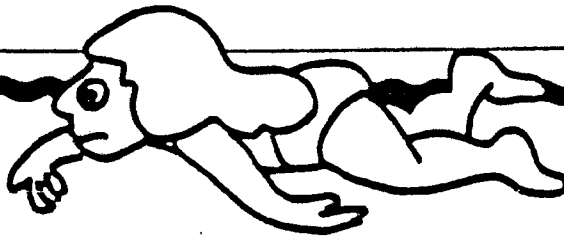
