





Resolution Approving the Filing of
Applications for Federal Advance of Funds by the
Providence Redevelopment Agency

Whereas, it is necessary and in the public interest that the Providence Redevelopment Agency avail itself of the financial assistance provided by Title I of the Housing Act of 1949 to assist local slum clearance and urban redevelopment projects; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary that surveys be made and other activities be performed preparatory to undertaking such projects; and

WHEREAS, it is recognized that Title I of the Housing Act of 1949 requires that contracts for financial assistance thereunder impose certain obligations and responsibilities upon local public agencies availing themselves of such financial assistance, including among other things: (1) the approval of the redevelopment plan by the governing body of the locality in which the project is situated, with appropriate findings (a) that financial aid by the Federal Government is necessary, (b) that the redevelopment plans for the redevelopment areas in the locality will afford maximum opportunity, consistent with the sound needs of the locality as a whole, for the redevelopment of such areas by private enterprise, and (c) that the redevelopment plan conforms to a general plan for the development of the locality as a whole; (2) the provision of local grants-in-aid; (3) the development of a feasible method for the relocation of families displaced from the project area; and (4) the several other local obligations and responsibilities that are imposed pursuant to Title I of the Housing Act of 1949 in connection with the undertaking and carrying out of slum clearance and urban redevelopment projects; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Title I every contract for a Federal capital grant will require local grants-in-aid in connection with the project which, together with the local grants-in-aid to be provided in connection with all other projects of the local public agency on which contracts for Federal capital grants have been made, will be at least equal to one-third of the aggregate net project costs involved in such projects; and

WHEREAS, such local grants-in-aid may be provided by a state, municipality or other public body, or by any other entity, and may consist of donations of cash, land, demolition, or removal work, and streets, utilities, or other site

improvements, and the provision of parks, playgrounds, and other public buildings or facilities which (1) are primarily of direct benefit to the project and are necessary to serve or support the new uses of land in the project area or (2) are of direct and substantial benefit both to the project and to other areas in the community.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE City Council of the City of Providence as follows:

Section 1. That the financial assistance provided by Title I of the Housing Act of 1949 to assist local slum clearance and urban redevelopment projects is necessary; and

Section 2. That it is fully cognizant of the foregoing obligations and responsibilities that are imposed under contracts for financial assistance pursuant to Title I and it is the sense of this body that such obligations and responsibilities can and will be fulfilled; and

Section 3. That the filing of Applications by the Providence Redevelopment Agency for financial assistance from the Housing and Home Finance Administrator under Title I for surveys and plans for the following general area or areas: Constitution Hill, Project Area D7-A; and Lippitt Hill, Project Area D7-B; be and is hereby approved.



BRIEF EXPLANATION OF PURPOSE OF RESOLUTION REQUESTED BY PROVIDENCE REDEVELOPMENT AGENCY

The Providence Redevelopment Agency is filing two applications with the Division of Slum Clearance and Urban Redevelopment of the United States Housing and Home Finance Agency for planning loans of \$42,700.00 and \$55,730.00. These Federal funds will be used to study the possibility of providing better housing through the redevelopment and rehabilitation of two sections of the Third Ward: Constitution Hill and Lippitt Hill. These areas are described below.

The advance of funds will allow the Agency to make preliminary surveys and plans for the replacement of small pockets of the poorest housing within these areas by new housing and new neighborhood facilities designed to improve the livability of these areas.

Large-scale clearance of existing dwelling units is not proposed. The selective clearance of some substandard dwellings in these areas is contemplated, however, in order to provide for the new housing investment which is necessary to stimulate the rehabilitation of the whole neighborhood.

Passage of the resolution now before the City Council will not constitute approval of any specific plans for these survey areas. It will not commit the City of Providence to any expenditures of money or the redevelopment of either area. Whenever tentative plans for redevelopment projects within these survey areas have been prepared, it will then be the responsibility of the City Council to accept or reject the projects. When and if such a project receives local and Federal approval, the planning advance will become a part of the gross project cost to be repaid from local and Federal funds appropriated at that time.

The Constitution Hill survey area is bounded by the Moshassuck river, Stevens Street, Davis Boulevard, Olney Street, Brown Street, Hidden Street, Congdon Street, Jenckes Street, Benefit Street, Star Street, and Mill Street.

The Lippitt Hill survey area is bounded by Davis Boulevard, Doyle Avenue, Hope Street, and Olney Street.

A neighborhood improvement program is now being developed for the larger Mount Hope neighborhood of which these survey areas are only a part. These redevelopment plans will constitute only a single element of this program, for many dwelling units in the neighborhood are in excellent condition and should be protected from blight. Many of them are in basically sound condition and can be restored to acceptable standards of health and safety through the active interest of property owners and tenants. The neighborhood area itself must be improved to provide its people with facilities and services. Pride in the neighborhood must be maintained. These are the larger objectives.
