Dear Council President Easton and Honorable Members:

This letter is to formally request you, the members of the Providence City Council, to pass the attached resolution requesting that those City employees affected by C.A. 84-1499 be given until September 1, 1987 to become City residents.

As you know, Judge John Bourcier determined that the Providence City Charter superceded State law, and as such, those Providence Policemen, Firemen, and Teachers who were hired after the City Charter was implemented are required to be residents of the City. And, last week the Supreme Court upheld his decision.

The City stood firm in its belief that employees of the City of Providence should be residents. By having employees as residents, there is a greater loyalty and sense of pride in an individual to his City. It keeps our neighborhoods, the fabric of our community, strong.


I believe Providence has some of the finest, most dedicated teachers and the best fire department in the country. The loss of these individuals would, in my opinion, not be in the best interest of the City of Providence. The fire department would be at a significant downstaffing: there are no individuals available for an immediate replacement. The loss to the students in the Providence system would be immeasurable.

In summary, I believe it would be too disruptive to the delivery of City services to insist at this point in time that the twenty-one firefighters and nineteen teachers abide by the terms of the charter.

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In fairness to all, the City of Providence and those who relied upon State statute which said they did not have to be residents, I am asking that they be given this additional time to satisfy the City's residency requirements.
