

ORDINANCE(S) SECOND READING

The Following Ordinances were in City Council April 5, 2018, Read and Passed the First Time and are Severally Returned for Passage the Second Time:

COUNCILMAN PRINCIPE

An Ordinance in Amendment of Chapter 27 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Providence Entitled "The City of Providence Zoning Ordinance" Approved November 24, 2014, as Amended, to Change Certain Text in Article 5.

SECTION 1: Chapter 27 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Providence, entitled "The City of Providence Zoning Ordinance," approved November 24, 2014, as amended, is hereby further amended by making the following changes, with additions underlined:

ARTICLE 5. COMMERCIAL DISTRICTS

503 DESIGN STANDARDS

A. C-1 and C-2 District Design Standards

8. Ground Floor Uses

For a building that fronts on a Main Street in a C-1 or C-2 District, residential and parking uses are prohibited on the ground floor of the building within 20 feet of the Main Street. Lobbies and common spaces associated with residences are permitted within this area. This requirement shall be considered a design standard, and not a use regulation. The following streets are Main Streets: Atwells Ave, Broadway, Westminster St, Washington St., Cranston St., Elmwood Ave., Broad St., North Main St., South Main St., Wickenden St., Thayer St., Hope St., Wayland Ave., Branch Ave., Charles St., and Chalkstone Ave.

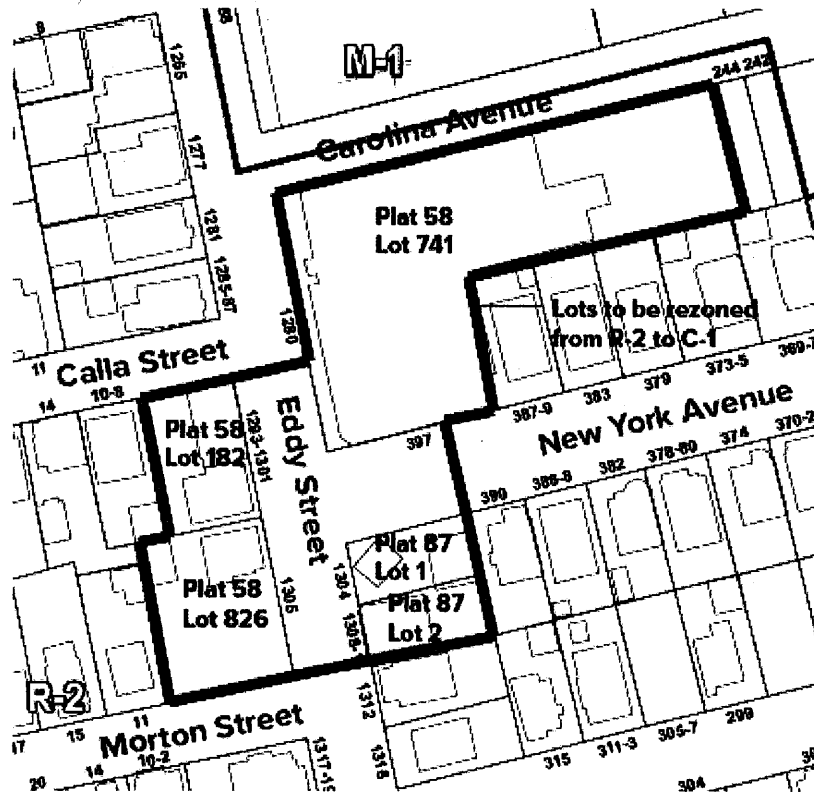
SECTION 2: This ordinance shall take effect upon passage.

COUNCILMAN APONTE, (By Request):

An Ordinance in Amendment of Chapter 27 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Providence Entitled: "The City of Providence Zoning Ordinance" Approved November 24, 2014, as Amended, to change the Official Zoning Map for Plat 58, Lots 182, 741, and 826 as well as Plat 87, Lots 1 and 2 from R-2 to C-1.

SECTION 1: Chapter 27 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Providence, entitled "The City of Providence Zoning Ordinance," approved November 24, 2014, as amended, is hereby further amended by changing the zoning for plat 58, lots 182, 741, and 826 as well as plat 87, lots 1-2 from R-2 to C-1, as shown on the accompanying map.

SECTION 2: This Ordinance shall take effect upon passage.

WHEREAS, Thanks to DACA, these 800,000 young people have advanced their education, started businesses, served our country, and more fully established themselves as integral members of American society; and

WHEREAS, An estimated 1,200 Rhode Islanders are DACA recipients; and

WHEREAS, On September 5th, 2017, President Trump rescinded the executive order establishing DACA, putting all 800,000 Dreamers at risk of deportation and leaving their legal status in limbo with no plan for how to move forward; and

Resolution Endorsing and Urging Passage by the General Assembly of Senate Bill 2018 S-2354 and House Bill 2018 H-7851, An Act Relating to Health and Safety - Plastic Waste Reduction Act.

WHEREAS, On February 15, 2018, Rhode Island Senator Joshua Miller (D) introduced SB 2354; and

WHEREAS, On February 28, 2018, Rhode Island Representative Carol Hagan McEntee (D) introduced HB 7851; and

WHEREAS, Passage of these bills would amend Rhode Island General Laws and prohibit large retail establishments from providing plastic checkout bags in the State of Rhode Island; and

WHEREAS, Introduction of this legislation comes after numerous municipalities in Rhode Island have passed and implemented their own plastic bag reduction bills; and

WHEREAS, Plastic bags have significant adverse impacts on our environment, contributing to waste and marine pollution, and greenhouse gas, among other public health concerns; and

WHEREAS, The production of single-use plastic bags produces over 2.5K metric tons of CO₂ (carbon dioxide) annually, contributing to the greenhouse effect and global warming; and

WHEREAS, Single-use plastic bags are used on average for 12 minutes and live for about one thousand years; and

WHEREAS, These bags end up in the oceans, breaking down into micro plastics, which are then consumed by marine life, thus entering our food chain; and

WHEREAS, According to the Center for Biological Diversity Americans use 100 billion single-use plastic bags a year, which in turn kills 100,000 marine animals every year; and

WHEREAS, Since 2013, Clean Ocean Access has removed twelve thousand single-use plastic bags from Rhode Island beaches; and

WHEREAS, As the Ocean State with residents who earn their livelihood from Rhode Island's forty million dollar fishing industry, we have an obligation to protect our natural resources; and

WHEREAS, Additionally, plastic bags cost the cities across Rhode Island millions annually in recycling contamination fees; and

WHEREAS, The Rhode Island Resource Recovery Corporation (RIRRC) sees nearly 60 tons of plastic bags in their facility every year; and

WHEREAS, In Providence alone, over ninety-five million single-use plastic bags are used annually; and

WHEREAS, These plastic bags end up contaminating recycling loads and costing the City of Providence at least one million dollars in fees each year; and

WHEREAS, Cities and countries across the world have long been banning and/or charging fees for plastic bags; and

WHEREAS, In the United States, California and Hawaii have statewide bans and cities in Texas, Massachusetts, and Rhode Island, along with 12 other states, have enacted legislation to reduce single-use plastic bags; and

WHEREAS, Twenty four African nations have banned plastic bags, as well as the country of China; and

WHEREAS, The City of Providence desires to conserve resources, reduce greenhouse gas emissions, waste, and marine pollution, and to protect the public health and welfare of its residents; and

WHEREAS, As public servants and the elected representatives of the people of Providence, the City Council has an obligation to ensure that our residents' livelihoods and life are not threatened, our natural resources are protected, and financial losses continue to not be incurred due to plastic bags.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Providence City Council strongly supports Rhode Island Senate Bill 2354 and House Bill 7851 to reduce plastic bag usage in the State of Rhode Island.

Resolution Establishing the Special Commission to Study Affordable Housing.

WHEREAS, The quality and affordability of housing has a major impact on the health, growth, and prosperity of our city; and

WHEREAS, According to HousingWorksRI, from 2000 to 2015, the proportion of cost-burdened renters in Rhode Island grew from 37% to 51%; and

WHEREAS, According to Rhode Island Housing, from 2000 to 2013, the proportion of cost-burdened households increased at every income level and grew 32.4% overall; and

WHEREAS, In 2017, HousingWorksRI estimated that a household earning the state's median household income would only be able to afford a median priced single-family home in three of Rhode Island's 39 cities and towns; and

WHEREAS, The same study found that a household earning the state's median renter household income cannot affordably rent an average priced two-bedroom apartment in any of Rhode Island's cities and towns; and

WHEREAS, According to a recent Providence Journal article, in 2016, there were 1,580 evictions in Providence, an average of more than 4 evictions per day; and

WHEREAS, The National Housing Conference reported that, in 2014, nearly one quarter of renters in the Providence metro area spent at least half of their income on housing; and

WHEREAS, It is projected that Rhode Island will need to construct between 34,000 and 40,000 new housing units over the next ten years to keep pace with demand; and

WHEREAS, Despite the growing need for housing, Rhode Island had the lowest per capita spending on housing in New England in FY2015 and FY2016; and

WHEREAS, According to HousingWorksRI's 2017 Fact Book, Rhode Island is tied with Massachusetts for the third-oldest housing stock in the nation, and nearly 80% of rental units statewide were built before 1980; and

WHEREAS, Current research across the community development and public health sectors shows growing evidence of the interconnectedness of environmental conditions, including housing, and health outcomes; and

WHEREAS, Affordable housing can allow households more resources to pay for healthcare and healthy food, and high quality housing limits exposure to environmental toxins, such as lead and asthma triggers; and

WHEREAS, A special commission of subject matter experts and local stakeholders to research and make recommendations for improving housing quality and affordability in Providence would be an invaluable resource to the City.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Providence City Council does hereby establish the Special Commission to Study Affordable Housing in order to study issues affecting the quality and affordability of housing in Providence.


