representative has suggested fingerprinting all drivers as a means of cutting down on stolen cars and as another means of identifying drivers.

Rep. Walter A. Quinn Jr., of Providence, D-Dist. 8, made the proposals as part of a three-point program of dealing with juvenile delinquency and vandalism.

The measure dealing with fingerprinting would require fingerprints to appear on driver's licenses, with copies to be maintained by the registrar of motor vehicles for the life of the license.

The great preponderance of stolen cars can be laid to the door of juveniles who take them for a joy ride and then abandon them," Mr. Quinn said. "In the event a car was stolen by a juvenile holder of a license, the fingerprints might lead to his arrest, and hopefully his rehabilitation, before he is led into paths of crime from which there is no escape."

pose that welfare rent supplements be paid directly to landlords.

Rep. Jacob Harpootian of East Providence, R-Dist. 86, said he would introduce a bill in the General Assembly calling for direct payment to landlords of the supplements now supplied to tenants.

Mr. Harpootian said that often the tenants do not spend the supplemental money for rent, but for non-essentials, and families then go without food and other necessities.

He said his proposal would "go a long way toward eliminating the heartless eviction practices so widely publicized recently while at the same time assuring the landlord of payment to which he is entitled."


Mr. Harpootian said the tenants would be protected from violations of minimum housing provisions by current laws that allow local directors of welfare to withhold

Dear Councillor Philip F. Addisson, Jr.:

I wish to formally request that public hearings be held on William G. Bradshaw's proposal to fingerprint all city children.

If enacted, this mass fingerprinting would be a significant invasion of civil liberties. Such mass fingerprinting is probably unconstitutional as a violation of the rights secured by the First, Fourth, Ninth and Fourteenth Amendments of the Constitution. The implications of the practice are obviously dangerous and authoritarian.

It is important that citizens be allowed to express their opinions against this proposal in a public hearing.
