89th Report from the Providence Public Library

## LIBRARY SUPPORT NEARS MINIMUM GOALS


This 89th report deals with three major areas of challenge and change for the Providence Public Library:

- The challenge of meeting minimum financial needs ..... page 1
- The trend toward library-sponsored community activities ..... page 2
- The growing pattern of service to the entire state ..... page 3

The financial review of the past 15 years published in the annual report for 1965 indicated that to meet its minimum needs and obligations the library must operate at an annual budget increase of almost 10%. The chart at left shows this operating cycle for the past 15 years and projects it to the next 10 years. Because of the deficit reported in 1965, the library limited its operating expenses in 1966 to a 3.76% increase over the previous year. The budget was balanced with books not purchased, and with salary scales that were less than competitive with other major libraries in the continuing search for professional talent. However, the encouraging note of this report is that the city's grant and the endowment income did increase and did meet the minimum needs established for 1966. Now that the library has been able to achieve a balance in 1966, it can be hoped that continuing increases in grants and endowment earnings in the future will keep the library on a par with its minimum needs and obligations.

The people of Providence can be grateful to Mayor Doorley for his appreciation and added support of the library's role in the community. It is also understood that the Department of State Library Services has recommended an increase in federal and state grants effective in July. This also is to be commended.

This is the second year in which the library has published its report in the Providence Journal, a method which brings the report to more people at less cost.

# REACHING OUT WITH HUNDREDS OF EVENTS AFFECTING THOUSANDS OF PEOPLE

### Library Emerging in New Role

The library is an urban institution and 55% of its business is with children under 18.

The library's urban environment is changing and therefore the library must also change. Already, one child of every six under 18 in Providence is receiving relief assistance. Indeed, the predictions made by Frank Riessman in his book *"The Culturally Deprived Child,"* may be conservative. He wrote:

*"In 1950 approximately one child out of every 10 in the fourteen largest cities was 'culturally deprived'. By 1960 the figure had risen to one in three . . . By 1970 it is estimated that there may be one deprived child for every two enrolled in schools in these large cities."*

To cope with the growing challenge of a changing city the library has enlarged its role of being a community center focused upon learning. In facilities located in all types of neighborhoods, dedicated librarians act together with local clubs, schools, societies and other groups to create activities such as:

Apparel design lectures	Story hours	Photo club	Reading instruction
Chess club	Creative writing group	Career club	Needlecraft
Babysitting instruction	Mother's round tables	Folk singing	Conversational Italian
Puppet shows	Senior citizens club	Consumer education	Creative drama

During 1966, more than 8,000 people attended some 300 of these meetings. In addition, 692 persons were assisted in their studies for High School Equivalency. Although the library has not been formally included in the effort to build a great society through grants or other such aid, the dedicated people on its staff do not intend to remain apart from the opportunity to assist. After all, as has been said, ". . . the Library, writ large, is the mind of society."

The purpose of these activities is to provide a dynamic vehicle through which the ideas found on library shelves can reach the minds of the people who need them. The activities break down resistance to using library facilities. The value of the library to these people can never be measured by circulation statistics alone.

## SERVING THE BUSINESS COMMUNITY

### "Information Unlimited" for Businessmen

Good business information helps Rhode Island companies grow. In February, it sponsored an "Information Unlimited" Luncheon in cooperation with the Greater Providence Chamber of Commerce which was attended by 350 people who learned how to make better use of library facilities. The library has also published a booklet showing businessmen how to obtain instant information. More recently, the library has installed a tele-

typewriter link so that all firms in Rhode Island using TWX can obtain rapid, printed information. In addition, the teletypewriter link has joined Providence to ten of Connecticut's libraries and to other libraries throughout the world.

During 1966, the Business-Industry-Science Department circulated nearly 40,000 books and answered 30,000 requests for information.



## SERVING OTHER LIBRARIES IN THE STATE

### Principal and Regional Library Roles Expand

There has been steady growth of library resources throughout the state since the establishment of the Department of State Library Services. As a Principal Library and a Regional Library in the state wide program the Providence Public Library has made its staff services and its printed materials available to other libraries throughout the state. Some of these activities included:

- 5,162 calls for books and information from other libraries.
- Rapid information exchange through teletypewriter links to Westerly, Barrington, Brown and to ten Connecticut libraries and all major libraries in the world.
- Numerous rotating book collections and displays to assist smaller libraries.
- Seminars for libraries to exchange professional ideas.
- Distribution of thousands of booklists, bibliographies and other printed matter.
- Exact copies of printed matter.

## A RICH AND VARIED CHILDREN'S PROGRAM

Young children below high school age account for nearly one third of the library's million service transactions. In addition, 346 story hours attracted some 6,000 children, and librarians visited 1,057 classrooms. Through these activities, specially trained children's librarians helped to bring books actively into the lives of the city's young people. The library's program for children continues to be a meaningful part of the city's total educational pattern.


