Subject: Report upon the advisability of causing to be condemned for Highway purposes that property, together with improvements thereon, located at the junction of Federal Street with Kenyon Street and designated as Lot 286 as set out and delineated on City Assessor's Plat 28.

To The Honorable, The City Council
of the City of Providence.

Gentlemen:

The above subject matter in Resolution form was referred by the City Council on November 5, 1959 to the Director of Public Works.

A report to the City Council, dated February 15, 1955, on an identical Resolution, stated that the Director of Public Works and Mr. Roger T. Chandler, Traffic Engineer, agreed that no appreciable benefit would be derived by the use of this property for highway purposes and the degree of benefit would not justify the expenditure necessary to acquire the property.

A further study of this matter was made recently by this Department and also by the Traffic Engineer, at our request, and the Traffic Engineer agrees with the undersigned that it would be inadvisable to condemn this property for highway purposes, as the benefit derived from the use of the land would not warrant the expenditure required for the acquisition of the property.

Attached hereto is a communication from the City Traffic Engineer relative to the above subject matter.



Dear Jack:

As you requested, we have reviewed our opinion concerning the desirability of the City's acquiring lot 286, plat 28 for highway purposes by eminent domain.

In consideration of the geometry of the street layout at this intersection and the traffic volumes using the several streets--namely, Ringgold, Kenyon and Federal-- it is the recommendation of this department that the City should not acquire this property for highway purposes because the benefits to be derived do not justify the required expenditure.

Gentlemen:

The Traffic Engineering Department has studied the advisability of installing a two- or three-hour vehicle parking period in the surrounding downtown shopping district in substitution of the present one-hour limit, as requested by City Council Resolution No. 557, dated November 6, 1959.

The problem of the length of parking time to be permitted in any given area is one that is of concern to a number of different people. Each of these interested groups have conflicting interests insofar as parking time is concerned. The four major categories are:

- 1) The employee who wants all-day parking
- 2) The shopper who wants two- to four-hour parking
- 3) The business-errand person who wants from five minutes to one hour
- 4) The owner, operator or tenant of small retail establishments or residents of the area who want parking for themselves or their people for as long as they desire it, but do not want long-term parking by others.

This department has attempted to balance the requirements of these four groups with respect to the available supply of both on- and off-street space in relation to the demand for such space. This has been studied both in terms of time limit and relative location with respect to the various land uses within and surrounding the Central Business District.

The one-hour time limits that now prevail in many sections surrounding the Central Business District have been established, to a large extent, on the needs of the immediate area involved, rather than the Central Business District. For the most part these areas are too far removed from the heart of the Central Business District to be very attractive to the downtown shopper. At the same time there are many people in these fringe areas who would usurp such space, thereby removing it from service to the group for which it was intended.

In view of these various conditions, it is the recommendation of this department that no broad substitution of a two- or three-hour limit for the present one-hour limit surrounding the downtown shopping district be considered at this time.


This letter is to express my thanks for Resolution No. 559 passed by you on November 5, 1959.




At a meeting of the School Committee held on November 18, 1959, the following resolution was adopted:


