MINUTE

Raymond P. McElroy was born in the City of Providence on May 26, 1899, the son of the late Owen and Sarah (McKenna) McElroy.

Following his formal education in Parochial Schools, Classical High School, and Sweeney Business College, he was appointed Secretary to the then Congressman Jeremiah E. O'Connell in Washington.

Fortified with the experience of this association on the National level, he returned to the City of Providence and was elected by the City Council as its City Clerk in 1931. During his tenure of office many outstanding and worthwhile legislative reforms were adopted.

In recognition of his accomplishments as Providence City Clerk, he was elected President of the New England Town and City Clerk's Association.

Mr. McElroy's administrative ability was recognized subsequently by his appointment as Deputy State Racing Administrator, which position he held with distinction until his death.

His happy faculty of making friends and holding them was evidenced by his membership in the Fraternal Order of Eagles, of which he was an enthusiastic official until his death. In this organization he rose to National prominence by being chosen Worthy Grand President. Prior to that time he held several important offices in the local and State level.

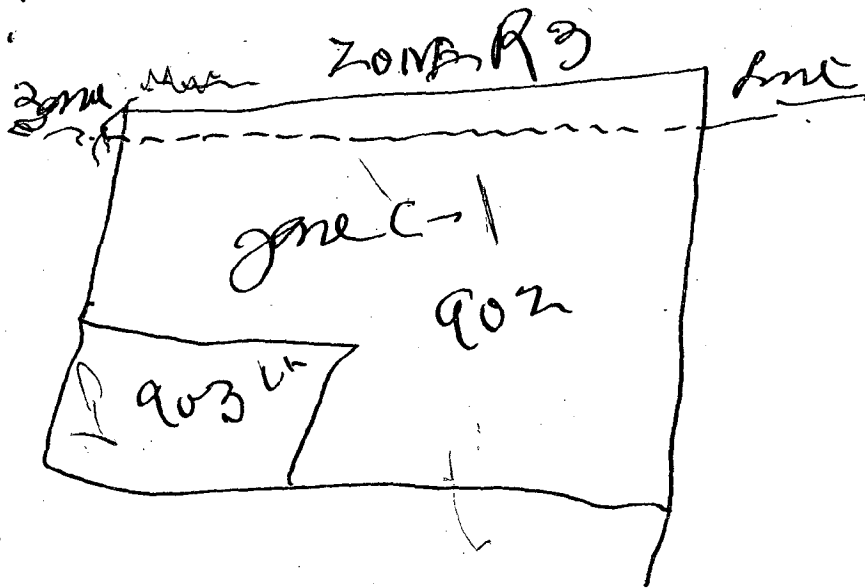
