Whereas, The Providence City Charter directs that a Comprehensive Plan for the City be prepared and adopted; and the Rhode Island Comprehensive Planning and Land Use Regulation Act (RIGL 45-22.2) mandates that every community shall prepare a comprehensive plan every five (5) years that provides a basis for rational decision making regarding the long-term physical development of the municipality.

Whereas, The Providence City Plan Commission, pursuant to Article X, Section 1013 (A) of the Providence Home Rule Charter, has approved Providence 2000: The Comprehensive Plan which contains goals and policies relating to land use, housing, economic development, natural and cultural resources, community services and facilities, open space and recreation, traffic and circulation, and an implementation program.

Whereas, Providence 2000: The Comprehensive Plan recommends that a series of citywide issue-specific plans and area-specific plans be created to implement the goals and policies of the comprehensive plan.

Whereas, The City of Providence and others sponsored the preparation of the I-195 Old Harbor Plan, which contains goals, policies and an implementation plan for the development of land

in the Old Harbor area which will become available after the relocation of Interstate 195.

Whereas, The Providence City Plan Commission approved the I-195 Old Harbor Plan on January 19, 1994 after a public hearing, and authorized the Director of the Department of Planning and Development to submit said plan to the City Council for its review and approval.

It is ordained by the City of Providence that:

- 1. The I-195 Old Harbor Plan has been prepared in accordance with the provisions of the Providence Home Rule Charter and the Rhode Island Comprehensive Planning and Land Use Regulation Act.*
- 2. The I-195 Old Harbor Plan, a document consisting of text, figures, charts, tables, appendix and maps, is hereby approved, adopted and designated as part of the Official Comprehensive Plan for the city and all city officials, departments, boards, commissions, authorities and agencies are hereby directed to carry out this plan.*
- 3. In enacting this Ordinance and in adopting The I-195 Old Harbor Plan, the City Council intends to establish general policies and specific recommendations for the development of the Old Harbor area in conformance with this plan.*
- 4. In order to implement The I-195 Old Harbor Plan, the City Council pledges its cooperation in helping to carry out said plan and all city officials, departments, boards, commissions, authorities and agencies of the City of Providence are directed to exercise their functions and powers in a manner consistent with said plan.*

5. This Ordinance shall take effect and become enforceable upon adoption by the City Council and approval of the Mayor. The City Clerk is hereby directed to forward a certified copy of this Ordinance to the City Plan Commission upon its approval. *The I-195 Old Harbor Plan* shall not become official until its approval by the state of Rhode Island pursuant to RIGL 45-22.2 and any rules and regulations adopted thereto.

An Ordinance Adopting Providence 2000: The Comprehensive Plan as the City's Comprehensive Plan to direct the Development of the City, as Amended.

Be it ordained by the City of Providence:

Whereas, The Providence City Charter directs that a Comprehensive Plan for the City be prepared and adopted; and

Whereas, The Rhode Island Comprehensive Planning and Land Use Regulation Act (RIGL 45-22.2) mandates that every community shall prepare a Comprehensive Plan every five (5) years that provides a basis for rational decision making regarding the long term physical development of the municipality.

Whereas, The Providence City Plan Commission, pursuant to Article X, Section 1013 (A) of the Providence Home Rule Charter, has prepared *Providence 2000: The Comprehensive Plan*, which contains goals and policies relating to land use, housing, economic development, natural and cultural resources, community services and facilities, open space and recreation, traffic and circulation, and an implementation program.

Whereas, The Providence City Plan Commission, after a public hearing, approved December 3, 1992 *Providence 2000: The Comprehensive Plan* as the City's comprehensive plan and official planning document, and authorized the Director of the Department of Planning and Development

to submit said plan to the City Council for its review and approval.

It is ordained by the City of Providence that:

1. *Providence 2000: The Comprehensive Plan* has been prepared in accordance with the provisions of the Providence Home Rule Charter and the Rhode Island Comprehensive Planning and Land Use Regulation Act (RIGL 45-22.2).

2. *Providence 2000: The Comprehensive Plan*, a document consisting of text, figures, charts, tables, appendix and maps, is hereby approved, adopted and designated as the Official Comprehensive Plan for the city and all city officials, departments, boards, commissions, authorities and agencies are hereby directed to carry out this plan.

3. In enacting this Ordinance and in adopting *Providence 2000: The Comprehensive Plan*, the City Council intends to establish general citywide policies for the development and renewal of the city and its neighborhoods in conformance with this Plan.

4. In order to implement *Providence 2000: The Comprehensive Plan*, the City Council pledges its cooperation in helping to carry out said Plan and city officials, departments, boards, commissions, authorities and agencies of the City of Providence are directed to exercise their functions and powers in a manner consistent with said Plan.

5. This Ordinance shall take effect and become enforceable upon adoption of the City Council and approval of the Mayor. The City Clerk is hereby directed to forward a certified copy of this Ordinance to the City Plan Commission upon adoption. *Providence 2000: The Comprehensive Plan* shall not become official until its approval by the State of Rhode Island pursuant to RIGL 45-22.2 and any rules and regulations adopted thereto.

An Ordinance Adopting the Park, Recreation and Open Space Plan, 1991-1995 as Plan No. 1 of the Comprehensive Plan Series of Providence 2000: The Comprehensive Plan, as Amended.

Be it ordained by the City of Providence:

Whereas, The City Plan Commission (hereinafter called the "Commission"), pursuant to Article X, Section 1013 (A) of the Providence Home Rule Charter, has formulated and has submitted to the City Council for its consideration a plan entitled the *Park, Recreation and Open Space Plan 1991-1995*; and

Whereas, The Commission, which is the duly designated and acting official planning body for the City of Providence, pursuant to Article X, Sections 1013 (A) (1) and 1014 (A) and (B), has reviewed, evaluated and approved the said, *Park, Recreation and Open Space Plan 1991-1995* on the 17th day of April, 1991, and authorized the Director of the Department of Planning and Development to submit said Plan to the City Council for its review and approval; and

Whereas, The *Park, Recreation and Open Space Plan 1991-1995* is recognized by the Commission as Plan Number 1 of the Comprehensive Plan Series of *Providence 2000: The Comprehensive Plan* as an adopted policy guide concerning the general development of parks, recreation and open space in the community as a whole.

It is ordained by the City of Providence that:

1. The *Park, Recreation and Open Space Plan 1991-1995* is Plan Number 1 of the Comprehensive Plan Series of *Providence 2000: The Comprehensive Plan*.

2. In enacting this Ordinance, the City Council intends to establish general city-wide policies for development and renewal of City Parks and Open Space in conformance with said Plan.

3. Implementation of Said Plan and such policies shall promote and protect the neighborhoods of the City of Providence and its citizenry.

4. The *Park, Recreation and Open Space Plan 1991-1995* is hereby adopted and designated as the Official Park, Recreation and Open Space Plan 1991-1995 for the City. The Commission and other appropriate Boards, Commissions and City Departments are hereby authorized to carry out this Plan.

5. In order to implement said approved Plan, the City Council pledges its cooperation in helping carry out said Plan and requests the Board of Park Commissioners, the Department of Public Parks, the Department of Recreation, and the Department of Planning and Development, and the various officials, departments, boards and agencies of the City of Providence having administrative responsibilities in the premises likewise to cooperate to such end and to exercise their functions and powers in a manner consistent with said Plan.

6. This Ordinance shall take effect and become enforceable upon adoption by the City Council and approval of the Mayor. The City Clerk is hereby directed to forward a certified copy of this Ordinance to the City Plan Commission upon approval. *The Park, Recreation and Open Space Plan 1991-1995* shall not become official until its approval by the state of Rhode Island pursuant to RIGL Chapter 45-22.2 and any rules and regulations adopted thereto.

An Ordinance Adopting a Plan for Preservation as Plan No. 2 of the Comprehensive Plan Series of Providence 2000: The Comprehensive Plan to direct the Preservation of Historic Resources in Providence, as Amended.

Be it ordained by the City of Providence:

Whereas, The Providence City Charter directs that a Comprehensive Plan for the City be prepared and adopted; and the Rhode Island Comprehensive Planning and Land Use Regulation Act (RIGL 45-22.2) mandates that every community shall prepare a comprehensive plan

every five (5) years that provides a basis for rational decision making regarding the long-term physical development of the municipality.

Whereas, The Providence City Plan Commission, pursuant to Article X, Section 1013 (A) of the Providence Home Rule Charter, has approved *Providence 2000: The Comprehensive Plan* which contains goals and policies relating to land use, housing, economic development, natural and cultural resources, community services and facilities, open space and recreation, traffic and circulation, and an implementation program.

2. *A Plan for Preservation*, a document consisting of text, figures, charts, tables, appendix and maps, is hereby approved, adopted and designated as part of the Official Comprehensive Plan for the city and all city officials, departments, boards commissions, authorities and agencies are hereby directed to carry out this plan.

3. In enacting this Ordinance and adopting *A Plan for Preservation*, the City Council intends to establish general policies and specific recommendations for the preservation of historic resources throughout Providence in conformance with this plan.

4. In order to implement *A Plan for Preservation*, the City Council pledges its cooperation in helping carry out said plan and all city officials, departments, boards, commissions, authorities and agencies of the City of Providence are directed to exercise their functions and powers in a manner consistent with said plan.

5. This Ordinance shall take effect and become enforceable upon adoption of the City Council and approval of the Mayor. The City Clerk is hereby directed to forward a certified copy of this Ordinance to the City Plan Commission upon its approval. *A Plan for Preservation* shall not become official until its approval by the state of Rhode Island pursuant to RIGL 45-22.2 and any rules and regulations adopted thereto.

An Ordinance Adopting Downcity Providence Master Plan and Implementation Plan as Plans No. 1A and No. 1B of the Area Plan Series of Providence 2000: The Comprehensive Plan to Direct the Development of Downtown, as Amended.

Be it ordained by the City of Providence:

Whereas, The Providence City Charter directs that a Comprehensive Plan for the City be prepared and adopted; and the Rhode Island Comprehensive Planning and Land Use Regulation Act (RIGL 45-22.2) mandates that every community shall prepare a basis for rational decision making regarding the long-term physical development of the municipality.

Whereas, The Providence City Plan Commission, pursuant to Article X, Section 1013 (A) of

the Providence Home Rule Charter, has approved *Providence 2000: The Comprehensive Plan* which contains goals and policies relating to land use, housing, economic development, natural and cultural resources, community services and facilities, open space and recreation, traffic and circulation, and an implementation program.

Whereas, Providence 2000: The Comprehensive Plan recommends that a series of citywide issue-specific plans and area-specific plans be created to implement the goals and policies of the comprehensive plan.

Whereas, The Providence City Plan Commission approved Downcity Providence: Master Plan and Implementation Plan, on January 19, 1994 after a public hearing, and authorized the Director of the Department of Planning and Development to submit said plan to the City Council for its review and approval.

It is ordained by the City of Providence that:

1. *Downcity Providence: Master Plan and Implementation Plan* has been prepared in accordance with the provisions of the Providence Home Rule Charter and the Rhode Island Comprehensive Planning and Land Use Regulation Act (RIGL 45-22.2)

2. *Downcity Providence: Master Plan and Implementation Plan*, a document consisting of text, illustrations, tables, appendix and maps, is hereby approved, adopted and designated as part of the Official Comprehensive Plan for the city and all city officials, departments, boards, commissions, authorities and agencies are hereby directed to carry out this plan.

3. In enacting this Ordinance and in adopting *Downcity Providence: Master Plan and Implementation Plan*, the City Council intends to establish general policies and specific recommendations for the development and renewal of the old retail core of downtown in conformance with this Plan.

4. In order to implement *Downcity Providence: Master Plan and Implementation Plan*, the City Council pledges its cooperation in helping to carry out said plan and all city officials, departments, boards, commissions, authorities and agencies of the City of Providence are directed to exercise their functions and powers in a manner consistent with said Plan.

5. This Ordinance shall take effect and become enforceable upon adoption by the City Council and approval of the Mayor. The City Clerk is hereby directed to forward a certified copy of this Ordinance to the City Plan Commission upon its approval. *Downcity Providence: Master Plan and Implementation Plan* shall not become official until its approval by the state of Rhode Island pursuant to RIGL 45-22.2 and any rules and regulations adopted thereto.

Transmits the following with Recommendation the Same be Severally Adopted:

An Ordinance in Amendment of and in Addition to Chapter 1979-26 of the Ordinances of the City of Providence, approved June 22, 1979, entitled: "An Ordinance Approving and Adopting
