Gentlemen:

The Traffic Engineering Department has investigated the petition of Mr. Anthony Balkum, 74 Julian Street, regarding the nuisance existing at 73 Julian Street involving the use of the above property by A. Arpin & Sons.

An investigation of the site indicates that a moving and storage business is being conducted at the above address and that a certain amount of moving van and other parking is created on Julian Street near this location. It is of course impossible to install any restrictive parking regulations which would apply only to the moving van equipment and still leave the street available for the free and unrestricted use of the adjoining residents.

In view of the small amount of traffic as well as the small demand for on-street parking during the normal working day, it is not considered necessary to establish any parking restrictions at this time.

With respect to the more specific item of zoning referred to in the petition, this is not of course within the jurisdiction of the Traffic Engineering Department; and therefore, we can make no recommendations involving such matters.

Dear Sir:

An investigation has been made concerning the matter of the petition against A. Arpin & Sons, 73 Julian Street and all of the persons on the petition have been contacted and found to be either tenants or owners. One is a 14 year old boy and Stanley Kloza, who gave an address of 80 Julian St., which is an automobile garage, actually lives at 62 Putnam Street.

The salient complaint concerned the noise made by the trucks starting in the morning, as early at 4:30 A.M., and some complained about the noise during the day. A major complaint was the parking of large trucks all day on Julian St. and in the early evening hours, making it difficult for the home owners and tenants to find space to park their own cars. Some reported that on occasions trailers are left on the street all day, disconnected from the tractors. Business owners mentioned that because of the trucks parked on the street all day, their customers were deprived of parking space. Others complained of the huge trucks causing their houses to shake.

Most of the people interviewed were very bitter about the situation and were in hope that something could be done to correct it.

From the police investigation, it was learned that the complaints made about the excessive noise and the parking of the trucks were substantiated.

A complete report is on file in my office and is available for your inspection.
