Dear City Clerk:

We would appreciate it very much if you would place this communication before your municipal governing board at its next meeting.

Dear Municipal Official:

On behalf of the officers and the Executive Committee of the National League of Cities, it is my pleasure and honor to invite the officials of your municipality to attend the Congress of Cities, the largest annual, national municipal conference of its kind in the world, to be held this year, December 2-7, Las Vegas, Nevada.

The theme of this year's Congress, "City of Man", as selected by the NLC Executive Committee, is in recognition of the fact that the City of Man will be built by people — by leaders and followers, by politicians, by the thoughtful and unthinking and by the neglect of the apathetic. To shape the City of Man requires understanding of its environment and its many problems of growth, change and decline — its social, physical, political, financial, economic, technological, educational, and other aspects. In addition to considering these forces, the 1966 Congress of Cities will discuss: the important goals of cities and the need for excellence in those whose decisions affect them; the emergence of The City as an entrepreneur; the barriers to growth of vested interests, attitudes, fiscal policies; and the growing potential of "systems analysis" and program budgeting. These are among the challenges that confront men if they are to shape the City of Man.

It is hoped that your municipality will be well represented at this important conference. We invite your delegates to actively participate in the conference sessions as well as the discussions which will surround the development of the 1966 National Municipal Policy. Officials of the City of Las Vegas and the cities of Nevada, acting through the Nevada Municipal Association, have arranged between session activities for delegates and the members of their families. I sincerely hope that your Honorable Body authorizes representatives to attend this conference.

Gentlemen:

The Providence Redevelopment Agency in accordance with the provisions of Paragraph 11 of Chapter 1575 of the Ordinances of the City of Providence, approved October 18, 1963, and Title 45, Chapters 31-33 (inclusive) of the General Laws of Rhode Island, 1956, hereby reports concerning the proposed sale of real property within the Weybosset Hill Project No. R.I. R-7.

The Agency proposes to sell a certain parcel of land situated within the Weybosset Hill Project to the Roman Catholic Bishop of Providence. Said parcel of land has been delineated on the attached map and is comprised of 9,234 square feet, which is to be sold for a total sales price of \$10,200.

Site plans submitted by the Diocesan Office indicate that parcel 21 will be used as a parking area to support the auditorium facility and new office building to be constructed on parcel 19.

The sale of parcel 21 to the Roman Catholic Bishop of Providence for use as a parking area is in accordance with the Redevelopment Plan and will ensure adequate off-street parking for the new office building and cathedral.



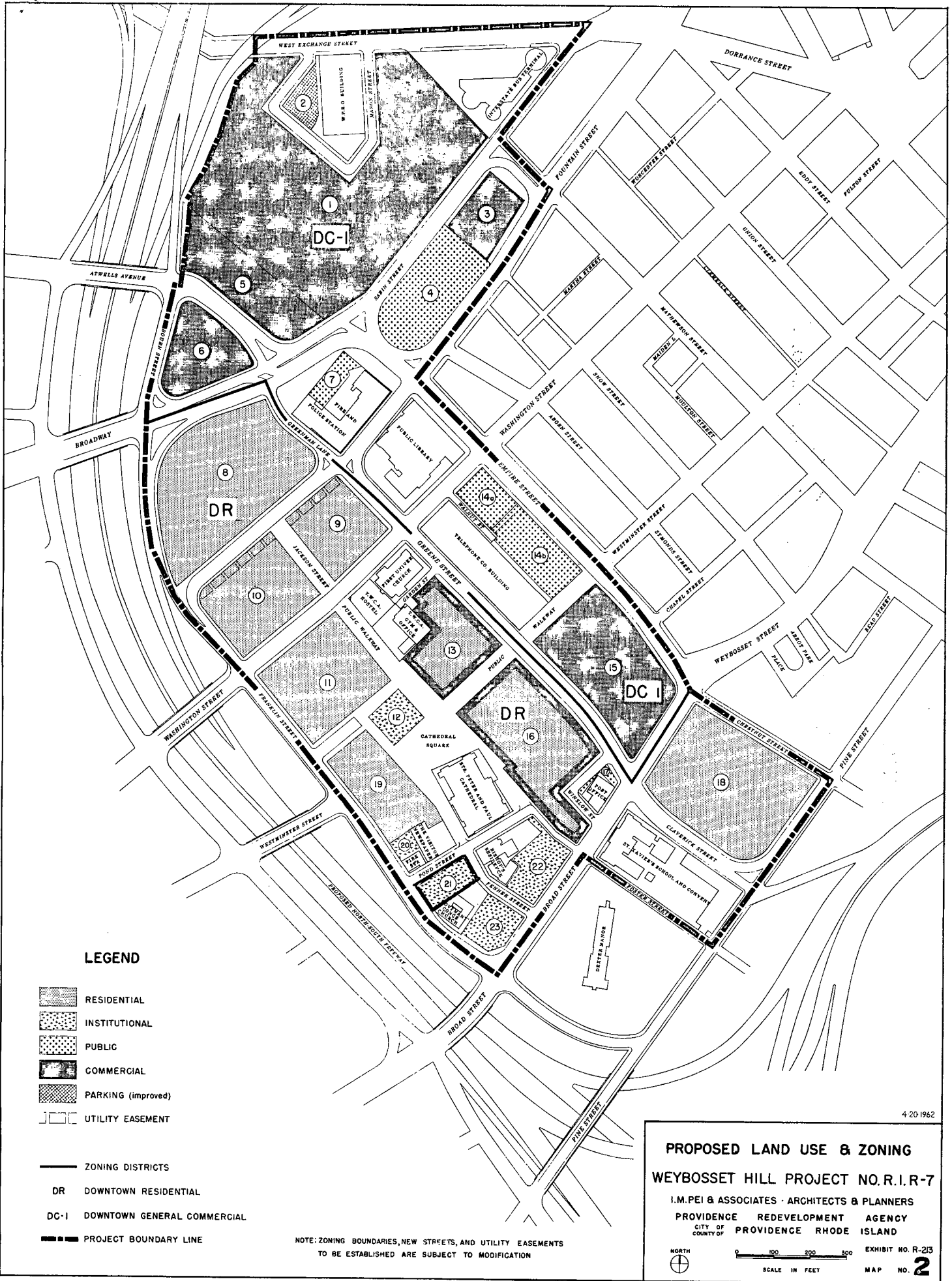


Gentlemen:

The Providence Redevelopment Agency in accordance with the provisions of Paragraph 11 of Chapter 1575 of the Ordinances of the City of Providence, approved October 18, 1963, and Title 45, Chapters 31-33 (inclusive) of the General Laws of Rhode Island, 1956, hereby reports concerning the proposed sale of real property within the Weybosset Hill Project No. R.I. R-7.

The City of Providence wishes to purchase Parcel No. 3 within the Weybosset Hill Project. Said parcel of land is bounded by Sabin, Mathewson and Fountain Streets and is comprised of ~~13,000~~ square feet of land which will be sold for a total sales price of \$167,000 as established by the Federal Government.

This parcel of land will be the site of the new Welfare Building to be constructed by the City of Providence. The new building is designed to be an integral part of the Weybosset Hill Project and will be a welcome addition to the Weybosset Hill Project.

Gentlemen:

The Providence Redevelopment Agency in accordance with the provisions of Paragraph 12 of Chapter 1375, as amended, of the Ordinances of the City of Providence, Approved December 2, 1960; and Title 45, Chapter 32, Section 5 of the General Laws of Rhode Island, 1956, hereby reports concerning the proposed sale of real property within the Huntington Expressway Industrial Park.

D & A Electroplating Company proposes to purchase a certain parcel of land situated within the Huntington Expressway Industrial Park. Said parcel of land contains 65,673 square feet and will be sold for a total sales price of \$37,403.80.

The Redeveloper is a local concern engaged in the electroplating of costume jewelry, industrial plating and plating of electronic circuit boards. Present employment is approximately 25 and is expected to increase to 50 at the new plant. Preliminary site plans submitted by D & A Electroplating Co. indicate that the developer intends to construct a 10,000 square foot building with provisions for expansion to 15,000 square feet in the future. The cost of the new construction is estimated in excess of \$100,000.

The sale of land to D & A Electroplating Company will permit the retention of one of our smaller industries who wish to expand and yet remain in the City of Providence and will also increase the tax base of the City.
