



Pablo Rodriguez, a prominent Rhode Island doctor and political activist, remained in serious condition yesterday in a Dallas hospital after a Sunday morning car accident that also critically injured one of his sons and killed his 13-year-old niece.

Rodriguez, his wife, Diane, and their two sons, were traveling in an airport shuttle van with Mrs. Rodriguez's twin sister and her family when a pickup truck driven by a woman arrested two weeks ago on a drunken driving charge rammed the shuttle van, the police said.

The families had vacationed together in Belize and flew into Dallas on Saturday. They stayed overnight in an Irving, Texas, hotel and were on their way to Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport for a morning flight when the accident occurred.

Irving police spokesman David Tull said yesterday the pickup truck, which had traveled at least two miles in the wrong direction in the westbound lanes of Texas 183, a state highway, struck the van along the passenger side.

The 6 a.m. accident occurred at a dip in the highway, Tull said, and but for the split-second reaction of the van's driver who swerved to avoid a head-on collision, would likely have been more deadly.

"It was a very tragic situation," said Tull. "But I've seen several head-on collisions like that, and I think it could have been much worse."

The force of the impact ejected 13-year-old Brianna Titcomb from the van. She died at the scene, the police said.

Pablo Rodriguez's son, Raphael, 13, remained in critical condition yesterday at Children's Medical Center in Dallas. Brett Titcomb, the doctor's nephew, was listed in good condition at Children's.

Diane Rodriguez was not injured in the accident, but her sister, Dawn Titcomb, was listed in serious condition at Parkland Memorial Hospital in Dallas, and Titcomb's husband, John, was in good condition.

Pablo Rodriguez, 49, spent much of Sunday in surgery at Parkland Memorial for broken bones and other injuries, said his secretary at Women's Care Inc., Lynn Barcelos.

Pablo Rodriguez Jr., 16, was initially taken to Parkland Memorial but later discharged, said Barcelos.

The driver of the pickup, Kayla Rae Proffitt, 20, of Grapevine, Texas, received only minor injuries, said Tull.

The police charged Proffitt with one count of intoxication manslaughter and five charges of intoxicated assault. She was being held yesterday on \$175,000 bond.

Rodriguez, one of the most influential Latinos in Rhode Island, has for years been an outspoken supporter for abortion rights and one of the few doctors in the state who perform the procedure.

In 2001, Rodriguez found himself at the center of controversy when the Warwick Country Club refused him membership for a second time because he performs abortions.

A professor at Brown University's Medical School, Rodriguez was a founder and first president of the Rhode Island Latino Political Action Committee. He holds an executive seat on the state Democratic Party Committee.

News of the accident and Rodriguez's condition swept through Rhode Island's Latino community yesterday.

"Socially, politically, he's one of the loved ones here," said Zoilo Garcia, program director at WPMZ Radio 1110. At the end of his Spanish radio show yesterday, Garcia said "We told the whole community to pray for him."

"We cannot afford to lose someone like him," Garcia said. "Let's hope he gets well."
