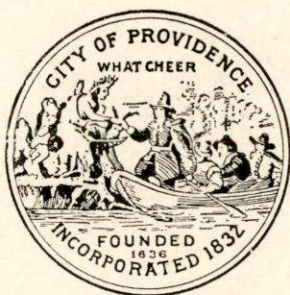


No. 8. RESOLUTION RELATIVE TO PRINTING, INDEXING

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of the City of Providence:

GENTLEMEN:

It has been very difficult for me to determine just what course to pursue in the appointment of a Commissioner of Public Works.

At the present time our City Government is overwhelmingly Democratic. The Board of Aldermen which has a membership of thirteen is composed of nine Democrats and four Republicans. The Common Council consists of thirty-nine members, composed of twenty-six Democrats and thirteen Republicans.

It is essential under existing circumstances to have harmonious relationship between the Legislative and Executive branches of City Government. For the purpose of municipal efficiency the same relationship should exist between the Legislative Branch and the heads of City Departments.

Knowing as I do that there is a widespread demand that a Democrat be appointed to this position, I believe it to be incumbent upon me as Mayor of Providence, to appoint a man whose ability is unquestioned and one whom I believe will be satisfactory to the majority of the members of the Board of Aldermen as well as a man who will meet with the approval of the majority of our citizens.

After a careful study of the qualifications of all candidates, I have selected Charles A. Maguire as my appointee.

Mr. Maguire was educated in the public schools of Providence, Holy Cross College and Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He was for many years President and Treasurer of the Charles B. Maguire Company. This company constructed large building enterprises, the most notable of which was the Telephone Building, the United States Naval Training Station at Coddington Point, the Benedict Memorial to Music, several buildings at Brown University, the Lying-In-

Hospital, the Jane Brown Memorial Hospital and Providence College. In building the Naval Training Station, a project costing over \$4,000,000.00, it was necessary to construct streets, sewage disposal and water maintenance to take care of fifteen thousand troops. This work had to be finished in the shortest space of time under United States Government supervision.

Mr. Maguire served as a member of the Retirement Board from the time of its inception in 1924 until 1931, and is now Vice-Chairman of the Building Board of Review.

In asking Your Honorable Body to approve the appointment of Mr. Charles A. Maguire to the position of Commissioner of Public Works, I feel that I am serving the best interests of the tax-payers of Providence.

Therefore, in accordance with Section 1 of Chapter 869 of the Public Laws, passed May 1, 1890, I have this day appointed Charles A. Maguire to be Commissioner of Public Works for the City of Providence, to hold office for the term of three years from the first Monday in March next and until his successor is appointed and qualified.

The City Treasurer, with the advice and consent of the Joint Standing Committee on Finance, shall sell and dispose of such bonds, and shall receive the proceeds arising from such sale, and said proceeds shall be applied for the purposes named in said Chapters 1811 and 1973 of said Public Laws, or for payment and cancellation of any notes issued thereunder as provided in Chapter 1017 of said Public Laws, passed at the January Session, A. D. 1902, and for no other purpose.

SEC. 3. Said bonds shall be issued in serial form and eighty thousand dollars (\$80,000.00) of such issue shall be payable each year on the first day of April, beginning with the first day of April, 1934, until final payment is made on the first day of April, 1948, with interest at the rate of three and one-half per centum per annum, payable on the first days of October and April in each year.

SEC. 4. Said bonds shall bear date as of April 1, 1933, and shall be payable yearly as provided in Section 3, and both principal and interest shall be payable in gold coin of the United States of America, equal to the present standard of fineness and weight, at the fiscal agency of the City of Providence in New York City, and all premiums received from the sale of said bonds, if any, shall be applied to the payment of the principal of said bonds in the order of their maturity. Said bonds shall be signed by the City Treasurer, countersigned by the Mayor and City Clerk, and registered by the City Auditor, who shall certify the registry of each bond, and the certificate of the

City Auditor that said bonds have been registered by him shall be conclusive evidence that said bonds have been issued as hereinbefore provided. Interest warrants or coupons shall be signed by the City Treasurer only. The holders of said coupon bonds may at any time exchange the same for registered bonds payable at the office of the City Treasurer.

No. 37. An Ordinance Providing for the Issue of Sewer Bonds.

(Approved February 17, 1933.)

It is ordained by the City Council of the City of Providence as follows:

SECTION 1. The City of Providence will issue the bonds of said City to the amount of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000.00) designated as "Sewer Loan" under and by virtue of the authority granted by Chapter 1812 of the Public Laws of Rhode Island, approved April 14, 1931.

SEC. 2. The City Treasurer, with the advice and consent of the Joint Standing Committee on Finance, shall sell and dispose of such bonds, and shall receive the proceeds arising from such sale, and said proceeds shall be applied for the purposes named in said Chapter 1812 of said Public Laws, or for payment and cancellation of any notes issued thereunder as provided in Chapter 1017 of said Public Laws, passed at the January Session, A. D. 1902, and for no other purpose.

SEC. 3. Said bonds shall be issued in serial form and twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00) of such issue shall be payable each year on the first day of April, beginning with the first day of April, 1934, until final payment is made on the first day of

April, 1958, with interest at the rate of three and one-half per centum per annum, payable on the first days of October and April in each year.

SEC. 4. Said bonds shall bear date as of April 1, 1933, and shall be payable yearly as provided in Section 3, and both principal and interest shall be payable in gold coin of the United States of America equal to the present standard of fineness and weight, at the fiscal agency of the City of Providence in New York City, and all premiums received from the sale of said bonds, if any, shall be applied to the payment of the principal of said bonds in the order of their maturity. Said bonds shall be signed by the City Treasurer, countersigned by the Mayor and City Clerk, and registered by the City Auditor, who shall certify the registry of each bond, and the certificate of the City Auditor that said bonds have been registered by him shall be conclusive evidence that said bonds have been issued as hereinbefore provided. SEC. 2. The City Treasurer, with the advice and consent of the Joint Standing Committee on Finance, shall sell and dispose of such bonds, and shall receive the proceeds arising from such sale, and said proceeds shall be applied for the purposes named in said Chapter 1440 of said Public Laws, or for payment and cancellation of any notes issued thereunder as provided in Chapter 1017 of said Public Laws, passed at the January Session, A. D. 1902, and for no other purpose.

SEC. 3. Said bonds shall be issued in serial form and twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00) of such issue shall be payable each year on the first day of April, beginning with the first day of April, 1934, until final payment is made on the first day of April, 1953, with interest at the rate of three and one-half per centum per annum, payable on the first days of October and April in each year.

SEC. 4. Said bonds shall bear date as of April 1, 1933, and shall be payable yearly as provided in Section 3, and both principal and interest shall be payable in gold coin of the United States of America, equal to the present standard of fineness and weight, at the fiscal agency of the City of Providence in New York City, and all premiums received from the sale of said bonds, if any, shall be applied to the payment of the principal of said bonds in the order of their maturity. Said bonds shall be signed by the City Treasurer, countersigned by the Mayor and the City Clerk, and registered by the City Auditor, who shall certify the registry of each bond, and the certificate of the City Auditor that said bonds have been registered by him shall be conclusive evidence that said bonds have been issued as hereinbefore provided. Interest warrants or coupons shall be signed by the City Treasurer only. The holders of said coupon bonds may at any time exchange the same for registered bonds payable at the office of the City Treasurer.

(Approved February 17, 1933.)

SEC. 3. Said bonds shall be issued in serial form and twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00) of such issue shall be payable each year on the first day of April, beginning with the first day of April, 1934, until final payment is made on the first day

of April, 1973, with interest at the rate of three and one-half per centum per annum, payable on the first days of October and April in each year.

SEC. 4. Said bonds shall bear date as of April 1, 1933, and shall be payable yearly as provided in Section 3, and both principal and interest shall be payable in gold coin of the United States of America, equal to the present standard of fineness and weight, at the fiscal agency of the City of Providence in New York City, and all premiums received from the sale of said bonds, if any, shall be applied to the payment of the principal of said bonds in the order of their maturity. Said bonds shall be signed by the City Treasurer, countersigned by the Mayor and the City Clerk, and registered by the City Auditor, who shall certify the registry of each bond, and the certificate of the City Auditor that said bonds have been registered by him shall be conclusive evidence that said bonds have been issued as hereinbefore provided. No. 40. Resolution Appropriating the Sum of \$2,500.00 for the Use of the City Plan Commission.

(Approved February 17, 1933.)

RESOLVED, That the sum of twenty-five hundred (\$2,500.00) or so much thereof as may be necessary, be and is hereby appropriated for the use of the City Plan Commission, said sum to include all costs to the City of Providence for the year 1933 for the preparation and compilation of a Comprehensive City Plan, clerical help and assistance. All monies spent under this authority shall be charged to the appropriation for Contingencies.

No. 77. Resolution Authorizing the City Treasurer to Apply Certain Payments Made to the City of Providence by the State of Rhode Island to Payment of Notes Already Issued in Anticipation of Taxes for Unemployment Relief.

(Approved March 8, 1933.)

RESOLVED, That the City Treasurer be, and he is hereby authorized to apply such first payments as may be made to the City of Providence under the terms and provisions of Section 11, of Chapter 2011 of the Public Laws of the State of Rhode Island, passed at the January Session, A. THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That we the members of the City Council of the City of Providence desirous of acknowledging the long and devoted service of the Honorable Thomas J. Walsh on behalf of the people of the State of Montana and the United States hereby extend to his bereaved widow our most sincere and heartfelt sympathy and;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City Clerk be and he is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Resolution promptly to Mrs. Thomas J. Walsh and that the same be inscribed on the records of the City Council of the City of Providence.

No. 81. Resolution Adopting a Minute on the Life and Character of the Late Joseph E. C. Farnham.

(Approved March 8, 1933.)

RESOLVED, That the following Minute on the life and character of the late Joseph E. C. Farnham, Park Commissioner, who died February 10, 1933, be and the same is hereby adopted, ordered inscribed on the records of the City Council and a copy transmitted to the family of the late Park Commissioner.

MINUTE

Joseph E. C. Farnham was born in Nantucket, Massachusetts, on January 18, 1849, the son of William H. and Lydia Hussey (Parker) Farnham.

He entered the trade of compositor on the Nantucket Mirror in March, 1863, and came to Providence in 1864. During his business career he was engaged in the printing business and in 1888 formed the firm of Snow and Farnham of which he became president and treasurer.


He was a member of the Providence School Committee from 1877 to 1883 when he removed to East Providence where he was a member of the School Board for six years. During four years of his service on the School Committee he was Superintendent of Schools. He returned to Providence in 1889. He was a member of the Board for the Expenditure of the Firemen's Relief Fund of Rhode Island from 1907 to 1911 declining reappointment. He was a Past Grand Master of the Rhode Island Odd Fellows and Past Grand Representative to the Sovereign Grand Lodge; a Past President of the Providence Central Club, and a trustee of the Mathewson Street Methodist Episcopal Church and East Greenwich Academy.

Elected a member of the Park Commission in 1907, Mr. Farnham served on that Board for more than twenty-five years, serving as Chairman more than five years.

On October 11, 1871, Mr. Farnham married Laura S. Greene, who died several years ago. One son, William, survives him.

During his years of service as Park Commissioner Mr. Farnham developed a keen interest in the park and recreational services of the City and materially aided in establishing them in the front rank of the various park systems throughout the country.

His personality was distinguished by a quiet courtesy and an ability to make and hold the friendship of all with whom he came in contact. He gave unselfish and devoted service to the community and the City of Providence has lost one of its most valued citizens and the City Government a most useful public servant and advisor.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the City Council of the

City of Providence urge upon the General Assembly of the State of Rhode Island to enact such legislation with reference to the City of Providence as will make possible the turning over of revenue from the legal sale of beer to the City Treasury, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City Solicitor of the City of Providence is hereby authorized and directed to appear before the General Assembly or any Committee thereof and urge that the regulations governing the sale of legal beer in the City of Providence shall be placed in the hands of the City Council through the operation of a Joint Special Committee on the sale of legal beer.

RESOLVED, That permission be and hereby is granted to American Silk Spinning Company, a corporation created under the laws of the State of Rhode Island and located and doing business in said City of Providence, its successors and assigns, in accordance with and pursuant to the provisions of an act of the General Assembly, passed at the January Session, A. D. 1933, entitled "An Act in amendment of an Act entitled 'An Act to Enable the American Silk Spinning Company to Build and Maintain a Steam Pipe Line Over and Across Whipple street in the City of Providence,'" passed at the January Session, A. D. 1927, and in accordance with the accompanying plan and petition as approved by the Commissioner of Public Works and the City Engineer, to build and maintain pipe lines and an adequate supporting structure therefor for conveying

steam and water over and across Whipple street in said City, between the properties of said company located on each side of said Whipple street.

The permission hereby granted is upon the following conditions, namely: (1) That said pipe lines and said supporting structure shall be so constructed and maintained as not to interfere with the use of said Whipple street by the public, shall be built and maintained under the supervision and control and to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Public Works and the City Engineer, and shall be removed upon six months' written notice from the City Council, whenever in the opinion of the City Council the public interest may require their removal; (2) that in case the City of Providence shall at any time hereafter be authorized to assess the abutting owners for the private use and occupation of the public highways, the passage of this Resolution shall not in any way prevent the City from charging and collecting rent from American Silk Spinning Company, its successors and assigns, for the use of said Whipple street and/or for maintaining said pipe lines and/or said supporting structure thereover; (3) that said American Silk Spinning Company, its successors and assigns, shall hold and keep said City of Providence harmless, safe and indemnified from and against loss, cost, damage, payment and expense on account of any injuries to persons or damage to property for which said City may become liable on account of the construction, maintenance, use or repair or neglect to properly maintain or repair or any defect of said pipe lines and/or said supporting structure over and across said Whipple street, unless the wrongful act or negligence of said City, its officers or employees, shall cause such injury or damage as mentioned aforesaid, and that said American Silk Spinning Company, its successors and assigns, before availing itself of the provisions hereof, shall file a bond in the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) in form satisfactory to the City Solicitor, to hold and keep said City harmless, safe and indemnified as aforesaid (and it is agreed by the acceptance thereof that the amount of said bond shall not be construed or held to limit the general

obligation of said American Silk Spinning Company, to hold and keep said City harmless, safe and indemnified as aforesaid and that said bond shall take the place of and render null and void the bond heretofore filed by said Company, dated May 12, 1927); (4) that said American Silk Spinning Company, its successors and assigns, shall repair and keep in repair so much of said Whipple street and the sidewalks thereof at and near where said pipe lines and said supporting structure cross the same as shall be required by the Commissioner of Public Works and to his satisfaction; and (5) that said American Silk Spinning Company, its successors and assigns, before availing itself of the provisions hereof, shall file with the City Clerk a written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this Resolution and an agreement to perform and observe all of said terms and conditions.

No. 114. Resolution Authorizing the Commissioner of Public Works to Renew a Lease to the Rhoda Briggs Property.

(Approved April 7, 1933.)

RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized in the name and behalf of the City to execute, acknowledge and deliver to Frank L. Hinckley a renewal of the lease of the so-called Rhoda Briggs property in the Town of Foster for a period of two years from December 1, 1932, in accordance with the accompanying draft lease.

THIS INDENTURE OF LEASE, entered into on the first day of December, A. D. 1932, by and between the City of Providence, a municipal corporation of the State of Rhode Island, acting by and through Charles A. Maguire, its Commissioner of Public Works, party of the first part, and Frank L. Hinckley, of said City of Providence, party of the second part.

WITNESSETH, That the party of the first part hereby demises and leases unto the said party of the second part that certain parcel of land numbered 894, formerly known as the Rhoda E. Briggs farm, with the buildings and improvements thereon, and located in the Town of Foster, County of Providence and State of Rhode Island, as shown on plan accession number 26 entitled "City of Providence Department Public Works Scituate Reservoir Division Parcel 894 leased to Frank L. Hinckley—December 1, 1932," blue print copy of which is attached hereto; said parcel of land including a portion of that certain area condemned by the City of Providence for water supply purposes, etc., under the provisions of Chapter 1278 of the Public Laws entitled "An Act to Furnish the City of Providence with a Supply of Pure Water," passed by the General Assembly, A. D. 1915, and by and in accordance with the Resolution of the City Council of said City of Providence numbered 397, approved December fourth, 1916, and entitled "Resolution of the City Council Taking Certain Lands and Waters for Water Supply Purposes."

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD the same with the appurtenances thereof unto the said party of the second part, his executors and administrators, for and during the term of two years from the first day of December, A. D. 1932, to the first day of December, A. D. 1934, yielding and paying therefor during said term the annual rent of one hundred and twenty dollars (\$120.00), and in the same proportion for any less time in equal quarterly payments of thirty dollars (\$30.00) each in advance until said rent is paid in full.

And the said party of the second part, for himself and his executors and administrators, covenants with the said party of the first part and its successors and assigns, that he will pay said rent at the times and in the manner aforesaid; and that in case of failure on his part to pay the same within fifteen days subsequent to the time above specified (and it shall not be required that demand be made for the same), or in case of failure to perform all the covenants and agreements con-

tained in this lease on his part to be kept and performed, the said party of the first part, its successors and assigns, shall be at liberty to enter upon the said demised premises and declare this lease at an end and take immediate possession of the premises.

Said party of the second part agrees, for himself and his executors and administrators, that during said period he will keep said premises and improvements thereon in good order and condition and will at his own expense make all repairs necessary to make said premises habitable or suitable and safe for occupation, and at the expiration of said period will quietly and peaceably deliver possession of the same to said party of the first part, and that he will not assign this lease nor underlet the whole or any part of the premises, nor make or suffer to be made any alterations in the premises, nor permit any of the buildings thereon to be used as a boarding house, nor keep or suffer to be kept any live-stock of any kind upon the premises except by permission of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Said party of the second part further agrees, for himself his executors and administrators, that he will obey all present and future regulations which the said party of the first part may adopt for the protection of its water supply. In this connection, no boating will be allowed on the Barden Reservoir or other use made of the land within a distance of 500 feet of the normal flow line of said reservoir, which may constitute a sanitary menace.

It is further understood and agreed and this lease is upon the express condition that if any occupation or any manner of use by the said party of the second part of said premises or any buildings or improvements thereon, conflicts with any of the present or future regulations adopted by the City for the protection of its water supply, or in the opinion of the Commissioner of Public Works of said City of Providence, or other authorized representative or representatives of the City or of the City Council of said City, is in any man-

ner detrimental to the purity of the water supply of said City, such representative or representatives of said City Council may at any time terminate this lease by giving said party of the second part thirty days' prior notice of such termination in writing, and said party of the second part shall quit said premises at the time fixed in such notice.

AN ACT

AUTHORIZING THE CITY OF PROVIDENCE TO ISSUE BONDS FOR FUNDING PURPOSES.

It is enacted by the General Assembly as follows:

SECTION 1. The City of Providence is hereby authorized and empowered in addition to authority previously granted, to issue, under its corporate name and seal, bonds in serial form to an amount not exceeding three hundred thousand dollars. Said bonds shall be of any denomination not exceeding twenty thousand dollars each, shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding four and one-half per centum per annum payable semi-annually, the principal thereof and the interest thereon shall be payable in gold coin of the United States of America of the present standard of weight and fineness, and the debt secured by said bonds shall be obligatory on said City in the same manner and to the same extent as other debts lawfully contracted by said City. The dates of maturity of said bonds shall in no case be more than five years after the date of issue and not more than sixty thousand dollars of said bonds shall become due and payable in any one year. Provided, however, that no bonds issued under the provisions of this act shall mature later than the year 1938.

SEC. 2. Said bonds shall be signed by the city treasurer and countersigned by the mayor of the City of Providence, and shall be issued and sold by said City at such times and in such amounts as the City Council of said City shall determine. Provided, however, that the premiums, if any, arising from the sale of said bonds shall be applied to the payment of the principal of said bonds in the order of their maturity. The proceeds arising from the sale of the bonds authorized by this act shall be delivered to the city treasurer, and such proceeds, except as hereinbefore provided in respect to the premiums arising from the sale thereof, shall be expended for the payment or funding of the indebtedness of said City evidenced by notes now outstanding and heretofore issued in anticipation of taxes. No purchaser of any of said bonds however, shall be in any way responsible for the proper application of the proceeds derived from the sale thereof.

SEC. 3. The City of Providence shall annually appropriate

a sum sufficient to pay the interest upon the bonds issued and outstanding under authority of this act, and also to pay the principal of the bonds maturing in any such year, until said bonds are paid in full. All obligations of said City which are incurred under authority of this act shall be excepted from the operation of Section 22 of Chapter 47 of the General Laws, as amended.

SEC. 4. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

Said tax shall be due and payable on and between the second day of October next and the twenty-fourth day of October, A. D. 1933 next, and all taxes remaining unpaid on said last named day, shall carry until collected a penalty at the rate of eight per centum per annum upon such unpaid taxes. The City Treasurer shall by advertisement in the public newspapers of the city, notify all persons assessed to pay their respective taxes at his office on and between said second and twenty-fourth days of October, A. RESOLVED, That Chapter 7 of the rules of the Board of Aldermen is hereby amended to read as follows:

CHAPTER 7

"Of the Sale of Milk and Cream"

Rule 1.....No person, firm or corporation as principal, servant or agent shall sell, exchange or deliver or have in his possession, care, custody or control with intent to sell, exchange or deliver in any manner whatsoever milk or cream within the City of Providence unless such milk or cream has been pasteurized by heating to a temperature of not less than 142° Fahrenheit and maintained at that temperature continuously for not less than thirty minutes, and unless such milk shall have less than 1,500,000 bacteria per cubic centimeter at all times before pasteurization and less than 100,000 bacteria per cubic centimeter at all times after pasteurization and before delivery to the consumer; *Provided, however,* that this rule shall not apply to milk and cream which has been certified according to the rules and regulations of the American Association of Medical Milk Commissions, dated June 25th and 26th, 1923, nor to milk and cream which is produced from tuberculosis-free herds of cows which are under the supervision of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry and a State Board of Agriculture, and which milk contains less than

100,000 bacteria, and which cream with the exception of sour cream contains less than 500,000 bacteria, per cubic centimeter at all times before delivery to the consumer, nor to any milk or cream which is being transported to a pasteurization plant for pasteurization.

Rule 2. The term "cream" for the purpose of this Chapter shall mean that portion of milk which rises to the top of unagitated and unadulterated milk while standing, or is separated from unadulterated milk by centrifugal force, and which cream contains not less than eighteen per centum of butter fat, whether or not such cream has been condensed, evaporated, concentrated, powdered, dried or desiccated.

Rule 3. No cream shall be sold or offered for sale within the City of Providence, to which any foreign substance has been added.

Rule 4. All containers in which cream is sold or offered for sale within the City of Providence, shall be plainly marked with a cap, or label, stating in legible bold faced letters not less than twelve point plain Gothic type, the minimum per centum of butter-fat contained in such cream, except that it shall be permissible to mark a cream "Light Cream" provided it contains not less than eighteen per centum of butter-fat, or "Medium Cream" provided it contains not less than twenty-five per centum of butterfat, or "Heavy Cream" provided it contains not less than thirty-eight per centum of butter-fat.

Rule 5. Condensed, evaporated, concentrated, powdered, dried, desiccated, or sour cream when offered for sale within the City of Providence shall be plainly labeled as such. All other cream shall be offered for sale in containers plainly marked with a cap or label bearing one and only one of the following designations, in legible bold faced letters not less than twelve point plain Gothic type; "Certified," "Certified-Pasteurized," "Grade A Pasteurized," "Pasteurized," "Grade A Raw," "Raw," and cream marked with any one of the above named designations shall have been obtained only from milk

of equal quality to that required for that grade as defined in Section 22, Chapter 203 of the Public Laws of Rhode Island, 1923, and also complying with Rule 1 of this Chapter.

Rule 6. No cream that does not comply with the definition of cream in Rule 2 of this Chapter shall be sold, or offered for sale within the City of Providence under any of the grades designated in Rule 5 of this Chapter.

Rule 7. No cream other than sour cream, shall be sold or offered for sale within the City of Providence that contains more than 500,000 bacteria per cubic centimeter, nor that has a temperature of more than 60° Fahrenheit at any time before delivery to the consumer.

Rule 8. No bottles or other containers shall be filled with cream within the City of Providence except in a licensed dairy, unless such cream is to be consumed on the premises.

Rule 9. The inspector of milk shall send written notice to any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this chapter, and upon the third and each subsequent violation such person, firm or corporation shall be fined twenty dollars.

Rule 10. It shall be the duty of the Inspector of Milk or his deputy or duly authorized agent to visit from time to time and at frequent intervals all places where milk or cream shall be kept for the purpose of pasteurization, sale, exchange or delivery in the City of Providence, and if he, his deputy or duly authorized agent shall find any such milk or cream with a temperature above 60° Fahrenheit he shall in the presence of a witness again determine such temperature and if it is above 60° Fahrenheit he shall forthwith seize, destroy or ship back to the producer such milk or cream and he shall keep a record of the time, temperature, and amount of such milk or cream in the office of the Inspector of Milk.

MINUTE

Frederic Poole Gorham was born in Providence, April 29, 1871, receiving his education in the public schools of this City. He entered Brown University where he received an A. B. degree in 1893 and an A. M. degree in 1894. He later entered Harvard University to take up the study of Cultures and upon the completion of this course he became an instructor in the Biology Department of Brown University, serving as an Assistant Professor in Biology and later as Associate Professor. In 1913 Professor Gorham was named Professor of Bacteriology and held this position until the time of his death. For thirty-four years Professor Gorham served as a member of the Providence Health Department as a Bacteriologist and rendered devoted service to this City in his efforts to purify Rhode Island milk, serving for many years as Deputy Inspector of Milk for the City of Providence. He was also active in campaigns for the eradication of mosquito nuisances and the elimination of pollution of Narragansett Bay. Professor Gorham also served as a member of the Park Commission of the City of Providence and for twenty-one years was Bacteriologist for

the Rhode Island Shell Fish Commission. It was due to his efforts that the certification of shell fish was inaugurated which methods later were adopted by the United States Government and are now in force.

His devoted service in behalf of the people of his native City and State won for him national recognition as a leader in laboratory work in the United States and for several years he served as Chairman of the Laboratory Work Committee of the American Public Health Association.

Professor Gorham's life was one of unselfish and devoted service to the people of his City and State in whose behalf he had labored so earnestly for many years. In his passing the City has lost a conscientious and faithful public servant.

The members of the City Council of the City of Providence deplore the death of Professor Gorham and extend to his family this expression of profound sympathy in its bereavement.

CHAPTER 857.

No. 195. An Ordinance Providing for the Issue of Unemployment Relief Bonds.

(Approved July 7, 1933.)

It is ordained by the City Council of the City of Providence as follows:

SECTION 1. The City of Providence will issue the bonds of said city to the amount of \$300,000.00 designated as "Unemployment Relief Loan" under and by virtue of the authority granted by Chapter 2067 of the Public Laws of Rhode Island, approved April 13, 1933.

SEC. 2. The City Treasurer, with the advice and consent of the Joint Standing Committee on Finance, shall sell and dispose of such bonds, and shall receive the proceeds arising from such sale, and said proceeds shall be applied for the purposes named in said Chapter 2067 of the Public Laws of 1933, for the payment and cancellation of any notes issued under the authority of Chapter 1617 of the Public Laws of 1930, for the payment or funding of the indebtedness of said city evidenced by notes now outstanding, and heretofore issued in anticipation of taxes, and for no other purpose.

SEC. 3. Said bonds shall be issued in serial form and \$60,000.00 of such issue shall be payable each year on the first day of July, beginning with the first day of July, A. D. 1934, until final payment is made on the first day of July, A. D. 1938, with interest at the rate of three and one-half per centum per annum, payable on the first days of July and January in each year.

SEC. 4. Said bonds shall bear date as of July 1, 1933, and shall be payable yearly as provided in Section 3, and both principal and interest shall be payable in gold coin of the United States of America, of the present standard of weight and fineness, at the fiscal agency of the City of Providence in New York City, and all premiums received from the sale of said bonds, if any, shall be applied to the payment of the principal of said bonds in the order of their maturity. Said bonds shall be signed by the City Treasurer, countersigned by the Mayor, and registered by the City Auditor, who shall certify the registry of each bond, and the certificate of the City Auditor that said bonds have been registered by him shall be conclusive evidence that said bonds have been issued as hereinbefore provided. Interest

warrants or coupons shall be signed by the City Treasurer only. The holders of said coupon bonds may at any time exchange the same for registered bonds payable at the office of the City Treasurer.

SEC. 11. The owner, lessee or agent of any dwelling house, lodging-house, tenement-house, factory, shop, store, hall, or public building, shall provide an adequate supply of wholesome drinking-water therein, which shall, at all times, be available for the use of the persons therein.

SEC. 15. The owner, lessee or agent of any premises on which is situated any water-closet, urinal, set-bowl, tub, wash-tray, bath-tub, or other plumbing fixture, shall provide the same with a trap situated as near as possible to the same and approved by the Inspector of Plumbing.

SEC. 16. The owner, lessee or agent of any land or building shall keep in such repair and sanitary condition as is satisfactory to the superintendent of health every water-closet, urinal, privy, privy-vault, cesspool, drain, waste-pipe, soil-pipe, and catch-basin, situated on or in such land or building.

SEC. 2. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Latham, March '07, Corrected to Nov. 16, 1917", hereunto annexed, in, by and through the sewer pipe from the works of said Narragansett Brewing Company to the connecting sewer system of said City of Providence, substantially upon the terms and conditions specified in the annexed draft contract.

And the Mayor is hereby authorized to execute and deliver in the name and behalf of the City of Providence such contract in such form as shall be satisfactory to the City Solicitor.

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into this
 day of _____, A. D. 1933, under the
 authority conferred by Chapter 1383 of the Public Laws entitled "An Act to authorize the City of Providence and the Town of Cranston to contract for the disposition of the sewage of said Cranston by means of the sewer system of said Providence," passed at the January Session, A. D. 1906, by and between the City of Providence, a municipal corporation in the County of Providence and State of Rhode Island, created by the General Assembly of said State, pursuant to Joint Resolution of the City Council of said City authorizing the making of a contract between the City of Providence and the City of Cranston for the disposition of a portion of said sewage by means of the sewer system of said City of Providence, approved the _____ day of _____ 1933, said City of Providence being hereinafter called the "party of the first part," and the City of Cranston, a municipal corporation in said County and State, created by said General Assembly, pursuant to a Resolution of the City Council of said City of Cranston authorizing the Mayor of said Cranston to enter into this agree-

ment, approved the 22nd day of June, 1933, said City of Cranston being hereinafter called the "party of the second part,"

WITNESSETH :

That said City of Providence, party of the first part, in consideration of the agreements of said City of Cranston, party of the second part, herein contained, hereby agrees with said party of the second part to dispose of the sewage from those estates in said City of Cranston now owned by the Narragansett Brewing Company and comprising thirteen and 41/100 (13.41) acres of land, being lots numbered 90 (ninety), 91 (ninety-one), 96 (ninety-six), 711 (seven hundred and eleven) and 2263 (twenty-two hundred and sixty-three) on that plat entitled "Sketch showing location of land and buildings belonging to the Narragansett Brewing Co., by J. A. Latham, March, '07, Corrected to Nov. 16, 1917," hereunto annexed, in, by and through that sewer pipe or main from said premises of the said Narragansett Brewing Company through and along New Depot avenue in said City of Cranston from said premises of the said Narragansett Brewing Company to the boundary line between said City of Providence and said City of Cranston, thence through a ten-inch sewer pipe belonging to said City of Providence in Burrington street to its present place of connection with the sewer system of said City of Providence at a manhole at or near Sampson avenue, upon the following terms, conditions and limitations:

First: The term during which connection may be made and maintained and said sewage may be so disposed of shall be ten years from and after the first day of June, A. D. 1933, or until such time within said period as said City of Cranston shall have a sewage system adequate to handle the sewage of said Narragansett Brewing Company.

Second: The amount of said sewage which shall be turned and conducted into the sewer and sewer system of said City of Providence shall not exceed five hundred thousand (500,000) gallons per day as the same shall be measured by a meter satisfactory to the City Engineer of said Providence, which is set

and shall continue to be set and maintained without expense to said City of Providence on said lot number 2263 (twenty-two hundred and sixty-three) or at such other place on said lands of said Narragansett Brewing Company as shall be determined by said City Engineer, and as such meter shall be read by said City of Providence, its officers, servants or agents. In case such meter shall fail to register at any time or times any such sewage on account of the small amount of such sewage passing through such meter at any time or times, or for any other cause, the amount thereof shall be estimated by said City Engineer.

Third: Said City of Cranston shall pay to the City Treasurer of said City of Providence the annual sum of six hundred and fifty-eight dollars (\$658.00) for each and every year that this agreement shall continue in force, payable quarterly in equal quarterly payments of one hundred sixty-four and 50/100 dollars (\$164.50) each and at the same proportionate rate for any period less than a year that this agreement shall continue in force.

Fourth: Said City of Cranston shall also pay to the City Treasurer of said Providence for all such sewage turned and conducted into said sewer and connecting sewer system at the minimum rate of ten dollars (\$10) for each one million gallons thereof as measured by said meter according to the readings thereof made by said City of Providence, its officers, servants or agents and as estimated by said City Engineer in case of any failure of such meter at any time to register as aforesaid. Bills therefor shall be sent to the City Treasurer of said City of Cranston quarterly for each next preceding quarter year or part thereof that this agreement shall continue in force, and the same shall be paid to the City Treasurer of said City of Providence: Provided, however, that once each and every year that this agreement shall continue in force, said party of the first part may figure the cost to said City of Providence of the handling and treatment of the sewage turned and conducted into its said sewer system, and if it is ascertained that such cost exceeds the said sum of ten dollars (\$10) for each million gallons thereof,

then any such additional cost shall be paid by said party of the second part.

Fifth: Said disposition of said sewage and use of said sewer and connecting sewer system shall be subject to and in conformity with all laws of said State and all general laws, ordinances and regulations of said City of Providence, and all regulations of any officer of said city duly authorized to make the same now or hereafter in force during the continuance of this agreement, and no live steam or gasoline or other explosive or other matter injurious to the sewer or sewer system or the use thereof shall be allowed to be turned or conducted into said sewer or sewer system.

Sixth: All expenses of repairing, rebuilding and maintaining the said sewer pipe from said premises of the Narragansett Brewing Company to its point of connection with the manhole of the sewer system of the City of Providence at or near Sampson avenue shall be defrayed by said City of Cranston, and said City of Providence shall be put to no expense relative thereto, and the same shall be located and the work of doing the same shall be done subject to the control and direction and to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Public Works and City Engineer of said City of Providence, and said City of Cranston shall keep and save said City of Providence harmless from any and all damages resulting from any negligence in the prosecution of said work or by reason of not properly guarding or giving warning of the same, and free of all cost and expense by reason of any claim or liens relative to any materials furnished or work done relative thereto.

Seventh: No person or persons shall be allowed by said City of Cranston or any other person or persons to make any connection or connections with said sewer in said City of Cranston and no estates in the said City of Cranston shall be connected therewith excepting only the owners or occupants of and the estates hereinbefore specified now owned by said Narragansett Brewing Company, the consideration in part of this agreement being based upon said definite area of land.

Eighth: Said City of Providence, its officers, servants and agents, shall be granted every reasonable facility at any and all reasonable times to examine said meter and its condition and to take the readings of said meter as often as said City of Providence, its officers, servants or agents shall desire so to do. In case at any time or from time to time said meter or its condition shall not be satisfactory to the Engineer of said City of Providence, it shall be put in such condition or replaced by such other meter as shall be satisfactory to said City Engineer and within such time as directed by said City Engineer.

Ninth: In case said City of Cranston shall fail to make any of said payments to said City Treasurer of Providence within thirty days after the bills therefor shall be sent to said City Treasurer of the City of Cranston, or in case of any breach by said City of Cranston or by any person or persons of any of the terms, conditions, limitations or provisions herein on the part of said City of Cranston to be kept and performed or in favor of said City of Providence, said City of Providence acting by its City Council or its Commissioner of Public Works, may at any time terminate this agreement and any or all rights of said City of Cranston or any person or persons to connect or continue to connect with said sewer and sewer system of said City of Providence and do dispose or continue to dispose of said sewage as aforesaid, by giving at least thirty (30) days' previous notice in writing to the City Council of said Cranston, the waiver of any such prior failure or breach shall in no wise affect the right of said City of Providence to so terminate the same in case of any such subsequent failure or breach.

Tenth: Said limitation of five hundred thousand (500,000) gallons of sewage per day is of the essence of this agreement, as said City of Providence cannot dispose of a greater amount of sewage from said City of Cranston through its said sewer and sewer system without relatively large increased cost and expense to said City of Providence.

Eleventh: No claim for damages shall be made against said City of Providence, nor shall said City of Providence be held

liable for any damages which may be occasioned to said certain estates or any property thereon or to the owners thereof in any manner by the construction, existence or use of said sewer and connecting sewer system of said City of Providence, including particularly any damages caused by any failure of said sewer and sewer system of said City of Providence to properly carry off said sewage or any back flow therefrom, and said City of Cranston and not said City of Providence shall be liable for and shall pay any and all expenses caused by any negligence in any manner relative to said sewer in said New Depot avenue, or said sewer pipe in said Burrington street, or the use of **either** or both of the same.

And that said City of Cranston, party of the second part, in consideration of the agreements of said City of Providence herein contained, hereby agrees with said City of Providence to all the terms, conditions, limitations and provisions hereinbefore contained, and agrees to make all the payments specified here and to keep, perform and execute all said other terms, conditions, limitations and provisions herein on its part to be kept, performed and executed, and agrees that all the same to be kept, performed or executed by any other person or persons in favor of said City of Providence shall be duly kept, performed and executed,

GENTLEMEN:—

I have called Your Honorable Body together in Special Session today for the purpose of taking action on the provisions of the National Industrial Recovery Act which was passed by the last Session of Congress.

The purpose of this act is to place people in employment as soon as possible on necessary public works and construction projects. It provides that when projects have been properly approved by the City, State and Federal authorities that the

Federal Government can make a direct grant up to 30% of the cost of the projects—the other 70% to be loaned upon terms fixed by the Federal Government and the financing of same to be determined by the members of City Government—after the costs and terms are known. This can only be found out after projects have been filed and approved.

The Highway Committee also has a Resolution by which Providence may benefit through a direct grant from the Federal Government—the same to be spent under the direction of the State Board of Public Roads.

I believe that it is advisable that the Board of Aldermen sit with Your Honorable Body in an Informal Executive Session in order to determine what the best course is to pursue regarding these matters.

I have called Your Honorable Body together in special session to take action on the foregoing and on any other matters which may legally come before you for consideration.

First: To pay to the Board of Park Commissioners as rent for said demised premises, the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) per annum, payable semi-annually in advance on the first day of July, and the first day of January of each and every year during said term.

Second: That said party of the second part will keep said premises and appurtenances in good repair, replacing all broken glass with glass of the same size and quality as that broken and will keep said premises, and appurtenances including catch basins, vaults and adjoining alleys in a clean and healthy condition, according to the City Ordinances, and Rules of the Board of Aldermen, and the direction of the Board of Park Commissioners or other proper public officers during the term of this lease, at its own expense; and will, without injury to the roof, remove the snow and ice from the same when necessary, and clean the snow and ice from the sidewalks in front of said premises; and upon the termination of this lease, in any way, will yield up said premises to said party of the first part in good condition and repair, (loss by fire, and ordinary wear excepted), and deliver the keys at the office of the Board of Park Commissioners, Roger Williams Park, Providence, Rhode Island.

Third: That the party of the first part shall not be liable for any damages occasioned by failure to keep said premises in repair, and shall not be liable for any damage done or occasioned by or from plumbing, gas, water, steam, or other pipes, or sewerage or the bursting, leaking or running of any cistern, tank, washstand, water closet or waste pipe in, above, upon or about said building or premises, nor for damage occasioned by water, snow or ice being upon or coming through the roof, sky-light, trap door or otherwise, nor for any damages arising from acts or neglect of co-tenants or other occupants of the same building, or of any owners or occupants of adjacent or contiguous property. And the said first party shall have the right to enter said premises at any and all times, by itself or its employees, for the purpose of making any alterations, additions and improvements it may deem desirable, and the second party shall not be entitled to or claim from the party of the first part any damages or rebate resulting from the making of any alterations, additions or enlargements to said building, but said party of the second part shall pay all expenses of necessary repairs made by said party of the first part. It is hereby agreed that the party of the first part shall not be held liable to the party of the second part for any loss or damage caused by the City of Providence failing to provide adequate water, drainage or sewerage service, and that this lease is made subject thereto. It is hereby expressly agreed, by and between the parties hereto, that the party of the first part shall not be liable for any damage for injury or inconvenience caused by the impairment or cessation of the heating, lighting, gas, electricity, water, or janitor service, which said party of the second part agrees to furnish and maintain at its own risk and expense.

Fourth: That said party of the second part will not allow said premises to be used for any purpose other than that herein specified, nor to be occupied, in whole or in part, by any other organizations, or any other person, partnership, or corporation, and will not sub-let the same, nor any part thereof, nor assign this lease, without in each case the written consent

of the party of the first part first had, and will not permit any transfer, by operation of law, of the interest in said premises acquired through this lease; and will not permit said premises to be used for any unlawful purpose or purposes, that will disturb the tenants of adjoining buildings or the neighborhood; and will not permit the same to remain vacant or unoccupied for more than ten consecutive days; and will not permit any alteration of or upon any part of said demised premises, nor allow any signs or placards posted or placed thereon, except by written consent of the first party; all alterations and additions to said premises shall remain for the benefit of the lessor unless otherwise provided in said consent as aforesaid.

Fifth: To pay to the Board of Park Commissioners in addition to the rents above specified; all water bills as determined by said Board of Park Commissioners for and during the time for which this lease is granted; and in case said water bills shall not be paid when due, said party of the first part shall have the right to collect the same together with any sums paid by said party of the first part to keep said premises and their appurtenances in a clean and healthy condition, and for cutting the grass and watering the same, and maintaining the yards adjoining said premises; and said bills and charges shall be due and payable with the next installment of rent due thereafter under this lease.

Sixth: That said party of the second part shall keep the rooms and improvements upon the said demised premises insured against loss or damage by fire in the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00), in companies satisfactory to the Board of Park Commissioners; to pay all premiums necessary for this purpose, immediately as they become due and to deliver to said Board of Park Commissioners the receipts therefor; and to make said insurance payable to the Board of Park Commissioners of said City of Providence, and deposit said policy or policies with said Board of Park Commissioners not later than one week prior to taking possession of said premises. In case of damage or destruction by fire this lease may be

terminated immediately in the sole discretion of said Board of Park Commissioners for the time being, and the Board of Park Commissioners of said City of Providence shall be under no obligation to repair, restore or rebuild the building and improvements on the demised premises. In case said premises shall be rendered untenable by fire or other casualty, the lessor may, at its option, terminate this lease, or repair said premises within thirty days, and failing so to do, or upon the destruction of said premises by fire, the term hereby created shall cease and determine.

Seventh: To permit and allow the use of said building by the School Department or the Board of Canvassers and Registration, or any other officer or department of said city upon twenty-four hours' notice from said Board of Park Commissioners, *Provided, however,* that for such use a pro rata abatement of the rent shall be made for any period exceeding one week.

Eighth: To allow the party of the first part free access to the premises hereby leased for the purpose of examining or exhibiting the same, or to make any needful repairs or alterations in said premises, which said party of the first part may see fit to make; but this permission shall in no wise impair the obligation of said party of the second part to keep the building painted and repaired, both interior and exterior in accordance with the directions of said Board of Park Commissioners, at its own cost and expense.

Ninth: If said party of the second part shall abandon or vacate said premises for a period exceeding ten days, the said party of the first part may re-enter and take possession of the premises, and this lease shall thereupon terminate and end.

Tenth: IT IS FURTHER COVENANTED AND AGREED, by said party of the second part that there shall not be kept for sale, or kept or used on said premises any intoxicating beverages in violation of the laws of this State, or of the United States, or

of any of the Ordinances of the City of Providence; that said party of the second part will not permit any gaming or gambling upon the premises, and will not permit any person to occupy any part of the premises for gambling purposes; that said party will not permit any person to occupy any part of the premises above described, who is reputed to be of immoral character, or permit any person or persons to sing, dance, use any musical instrument after 12 o'clock at night, or do or permit anything to be done which can in any wise molest or annoy other tenants in the neighborhood, or prevent other persons from having their nightly rest, or which in any wise may injure the good reputation of the above described premises. And in case said party of the second part shall violate said covenant or agreement, said party of the first part, by its Board of Park Commissioners, shall have the right and power and is hereby authorized by said party of the second part so to do, to at once declare said lease ended without notice to said party of the second part, and with all necessary force to repossess itself of the premises demised as above stated, and expel, oust and remove all parties who may occupy any part of said premises and any and all goods and chattels that may be therein contained, and said party of the first part shall not be liable for any damage or damages that may be occasioned to either person or persons by reason of such removal, expulsion or ousting; nor for any damage or damages to or loss of any goods or chattels belonging to any party occupying said premises or any part thereof by any cause whatsoever by reason of such removal, or ousting from the premises aforesaid or the building in which they are situated.

Eleventh: Said party of the second part in consideration of said demise and one dollar in hand paid it this day, hereby agrees to assume and does hereby assume all risk of and liability for damages to person or property and damages of any and all kinds arising from present and future defective conditions of said premises, both latent and manifest, and to save said party of the first part harmless therefrom during the

period of this lease and all extensions of same, and hereby releases said party of the first part therefrom.

Twelfth: IT IS EXPRESSLY AGREED, between the parties hereto that this lease may be terminated by not less than thirty days' notice in writing by either party, and that if default be made in the payment of the rent above reserved or any part thereof, or in any of the covenants and agreements herein contained, to be kept by the party of the second part, it shall be lawful for the party of the first part (or its Board of Park Commissioners), at any time thereafter, (at the election of said first party, or its Board of Park Commissioners), without notice, to declare said term ended, and to re-enter said demised premises or any part thereof, either with or without process of law, and said party of the second part or any person or persons occupying the same, to expel, remove and put out, using such force as may be necessary so to do, and the said premises again to repossess and enjoy, as before this demise without prejudice to any remedies which might otherwise be used for arrears of rent or preceding breach of covenants, and said party of the second part further covenants and agrees, that said party of the first part or the representatives or assigns of said party, shall have, at all times, the right to distrain for rent due, and shall have a valid and first lien upon all property of said party of the second part, which it now has or owns or may hereafter acquire or have an interest in, whether exempt by law or not, as security for the payment of the rent herein reserved.

GENTLEMEN :

On the 13th of July there was presented to me for signature a Resolution of the City Council regarding the provisions of Section 12 of the Act entitled the "Emergency Public Works Act" passed by the Rhode Island General Assembly.

There are serious objections to this Resolution as passed in the City Council last Wednesday. It entirely eliminates the Board of Contract and Supply as far as all Federal Aid projects are concerned. Further, the powers delegated to this committee, as set forth in the Resolution, are of the widest latitude and to my mind are too great for any committee to be permitted to exercise. I believe that all projects should be approved by the City Council before being submitted to the State Commission for consideration. This is not permitted by the Resolution referred to.

Further, I believe that a mistake was made when the City Council did not approve the program submitted by me, which had been carefully determined and checked by the heads of Departments under whose jurisdiction the work would be done. This action has caused a delay and has thrown the purposes and aims of the Federal and State Emergency Public Works Acts into a maelstrom of politics in our City.

For the foregoing reason I am obliged to return this Resolution to Your Honorable Body without my approval.

RESOLVED, That permission be and hereby is granted to "Mexican Petroleum Corporation" a corporation existing under the laws of the State of Maine and authorized to do business in the State of Rhode Island and located in the City of Providence, Lessee, by virtue of two certain leases, one from the State of Rhode Island to said corporation and one from Mittie H. Arnold to said corporation, its successors and assigns in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 1418 of the Public Laws of 1916, and in accordance with the accompanying plan attached hereto, as approved by the City Engineer to construct, lay and maintain two eight-inch pipe lines through ten-inch sleeves under and across Public street, from land owned by the State of Rhode Island and leased "Mexican Petroleum Corporation" on the south side of Public street to land owned by Mittie H. Arnold and leased to said "Mexican Petroleum Corporation" on the north side of Public street.

The permission hereby granted is upon the condition that said pipe lines shall be so constructed as not to interfere with the use of said Public street by the public or by any person or

corporation having the right to maintain pipes or conduits under or in said street, and it is further provided that the permission hereby granted is upon the condition that said pipe lines shall be constructed under the supervision and control, and to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Public Works, and upon the condition that said pipe lines shall be removed upon 90 days' previous notice from the City Council, whenever in the opinion of said City Council the public interest may require its removal; and upon the condition that in case the City of Providence shall at any time hereafter be authorized to assess abutting owners for the private use and occupation of the public highways, the passage of this Resolution shall not in any manner affect the right of the City to charge and collect rent for the use of said Public street by said "Mexican Petroleum Corporation" its successors and assigns or for maintaining thereunder said pipe lines, and upon condition that said "Mexican Petroleum Corporation" its successors and assigns, shall hold and keep said City of Providence harmless, safe and indemnified from and against loss, cost, damage, payment and expense on account of any injuries to persons, or damage to property for which said City may become liable on account of the construction, maintenance use, or repair, or neglect to properly maintain or repair, or any defect of said pipe lines under and across said Public street, unless the wrongful act or negligence of said City, its officers or employees, shall cause such injury or damage as mentioned aforesaid; and upon condition that said "Mexican Petroleum Corporation" its successors and assigns, before commencing the work of constructing said conduit shall file a bond in the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00), in form satisfactory to the City Solicitor to hold and keep said City harmless, safe and indemnified as aforesaid, and it is agreed by the acceptance hereof that the amount of said bond shall not be construed or held to limit their general application to hold and keep said City harmless, safe and indemnified as aforesaid; and upon the condition that said "Mexican Petroleum Corporation" its successors and assigns, shall repair and keep in

repair so much of said Public street and the sidewalks of said Public street at and near where said pipe lines cross the same as shall be required by the Commissioner of Public Works and to his satisfaction, and also upon the condition that said "Mexican Petroleum Corporation" its successors and assigns, shall before commencing the construction of said pipe lines, file with the City Clerk a written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this Resolution and an agreement to perform and observe all of said terms and conditions.

No. 272. Resolution Appropriating the Sum of \$14,-
512,658.47 for the Support of the City Govern-
ment.

(Approved September 29, 1933.)

RESOLVED, That to defray the expenditures of the City of Providence for the financial year commencing October 1, 1933, and ending September 30, 1934, the following sums of money, or so much thereof as are authorized by law, be and they are hereby appropriated for the objects and purposes herein expressed, *provided*, that payments hereunder shall be subject to the provisions of the city ordinances relative to expenditures of money from the city treasury.

I. GENERAL GOVERNMENT.

CITY COUNCIL. (1) For salaries of the aldermen and councilmen, \$26,325.00, (2) for expenses of the city council and of the committees of the city council or either branch thereof, including the expense of expert examination of accounts, and for printing and binding the resolutions of the city council, the small city manual, the sinking fund reports, ordinances and State Laws, \$10,725.00, (3) for the proper reception and entertainment of official representatives of other cities visiting this city, to be expended upon the approval of the head of the department or chairman of the committee supervis-

ing such reception and entertainment and for such floral tributes as may be required to be made on behalf of the City of Providence, payments to be made upon the approval of the Mayor, \$50.00; thirty-seven thousand one hundred dollars.

CITY CLERK'S DEPARTMENT. (1) For salaries of the city clerk, his deputies and assistants, \$23,312.70; (2) for expense of the office, \$1,922.94; twenty-five thousand two hundred thirty-five dollars and sixty-four cents.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT. (1) For salaries of the mayor, mayor's secretary and clerk, \$12,623.40; (2) for expenses of office, including the sum of one thousand dollars which the mayor is authorized to expend and which shall be allowed for payment upon the order of said mayor, and also including the sum of thirty-one hundred fifty dollars which is allowed for automobile hire, \$4,674.00; seventeen thousand two hundred ninety-seven dollars and forty cents.

AUDITING DEPARTMENT. NORTH END DISPENSARY. For aid to the North End Dispensary of the Providence Section Council of Jewish Women, payable in November; five hundred dollars.

PROVIDENCE LYING-IN HOSPITAL. For aid to the Providence Lying-In Hospital, payable in equal quarterly installments on the twentieth day of October, January, April and July next ensuing; twenty-five thousand dollars.

PROVIDENCE ANIMAL RESCUE LEAGUE. For aid to the Providence Animal Rescue League for the disposal of diseased and homeless animals, payable on the twentieth day of October; five hundred dollars.

GENTLEMEN:

I have carefully considered from all angles the advisability of accepting the grant of \$171,000.00 offered by the Public Works Administration to apply against the proposed expenditure of \$703,541.00 for the extension to the Water Supply System, as submitted to Your Honorable Body on August 17, 1933.

The Public Works Administration offers the City of Providence a grant of \$171,000.00, provided that all work contemplated in the proposed water extension project shall be done by contractors after a competitive form of bidding satisfactory to both the Public Works Administration and to the City of Providence.

My opinion is that we should reject the grant under the conditions proposed by the Public Works Administration for the following reasons:

First:—The water supply system of Providence is a most vital service, both for the health and protection of the City, and any extensions to it should be done by the City's own

Water Department under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works. This has been the policy of the Providence Water Works for sixty years and that it has been an excellent one is attested to by the record of the Department.

The Providence Water Works has never allowed work of the kind contemplated in this project to be done otherwise than with its own forces. The reason for this is that it is absolutely vital for the Providence Water Works to maintain at all times and under all conditions the most rigid control possible. If outside contractors did any water works extensions they would affect the rigid control always assumed by the department, to whom this rigid control properly belongs, and this would, in my opinion, be a source of potential danger to the system and a menace to public health.

Second:—It may be asserted that we are refusing an outright gift of \$171,000.00. This is not a fact. I am reliably informed that if this work were to be done by outside contractors, it would cost the City approximately \$200,000.00 more than if the City did it with its own forces. If this work were done by outside contractors, the wage rate to be paid, as set up by the Public Works Administration, is approximately 8% higher than the rate now paid to City forces for this same kind of work. City employees working along the same line with contractors' men, would of necessity, ask the same wages as paid to the contractors' forces. It is easy to visualize a condition where if this increase were granted them, it would necessarily follow to all City departments to the end that the 10% decrease in City Employees' pay which is now in effect, would have to be restored. The City is unable to do this at this time without a tax increase.

For these two reasons, that are somewhat more elaborated upon in the report of the Joint Special Committee on Emergency Public Works, it is my judgment that the department of Public Works should do its water extension work with its own

forces and respectfully decline the grant of the Public Works Administration.

RESOLVED, That the City of Providence do, and it hereby does, submit in writing to the Emergency Public Works Commission, in accordance with the provisions of Section 6 of the Act entitled the "Emergency Public Works Act," passed at the Special Session of the General Assembly of the State of Rhode Island, June 29th, A. D. 1933, certain projects which the said City of Providence wishes to have carried out with Federal Aid, with a full description of such projects and itemized estimates of the construction and maintenance accompanying this Resolution, namely:

Construction of two Senior High Schools, \$3,000,000.00 to enable the said City of Providence, for the relief of the prevailing condition of unemployment, to take prompt advantage of the benefit of the said "Emergency Public Works Act," passed by the General Assembly of the State of Rhode Island in cooperative action with the Congress of the United States in its passage of the act entitled, "An Act to encourage national industrial recovery, to foster fair competition, and to provide for the construction of certain useful public works, and for other purposes," passed by the Congress of the United States, June 13, A. D. 1933.

No. 367. Resolution Recommending the Appropriation of \$300,000.00 for the Purpose of Covering Cost of Materials, Supplies, Transportation and Supervision of Projects Under the Civil Works Administration.

(Approved December 14, 1933.)

RESOLVED, That the City Treasurer, acting under the direction of the Joint Standing Committee on Finance, be and he is hereby authorized and directed to borrow under the authority of and in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 47 of the General Laws of the State of Rhode Island, as amended by Chapter 1617 of the Public Laws of 1930 and Chapter

1861 of the Public Laws of 1932, during the present financial year, in anticipation of the receipt of the proceeds of the annual tax to be assessed in said present financial year, from time to time and in such amounts as he may be directed to borrow by the Joint Standing Committee on Finance, a sum not to exceed three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000.00), and to issue and sell at private sale the City's negotiable notes original and in renewal therefor, bearing interest at a rate not exceeding six per centum (6%) per annum, payable not later than one year from the date of the original notes so issued or renewed or paid and carrying on their face the designation "Note in Anticipation of Taxes," said original and renewal notes to be signed by the City Treasurer and countersigned by the Mayor and the Chairman of the Joint Standing Committee on Finance.

The money thus authorized is hereby appropriated for the purpose of paying for materials, supplies, supervision, transportation and all other necessary expenses on projects carried on under the Civil Works Administration, the portion authorized for supervision, however not to exceed forty thousand dollars (\$40,000.00) of the total appropriation.

No. 368. Resolution Directing the City Solicitor to Apply for Legislation Relative to Work Done by the City of Providence Upon Any Way or Street, Exempting Said City from Liability by Reason of Injuries.

(Approved December 14, 1933.)

RESOLVED, That the City Solicitor be, and he hereby is, authorized and directed to appear before the General Assembly of the State of Rhode Island, or any committee thereof, at its January Session, A. D. 1934, and urge the passage of legislation setting forth that work done by the City of Providence

upon any way or street, in mending, repairing or regrading the same shall not constitute an acceptance of such way or street, and exempting the said City of Providence from any liability by reason of injuries suffered by any person or persons travelling upon such unaccepted way or street, substantially in accordance with the accompanying draft act.

AN ACT

CONCERNING THE STATUS OF UNACCEPTED WAYS OR STREETS, AND THE NON-LIABILITY OF THE CITY OF PROVIDENCE TO PAY COMPENSATION OR DAMAGES BY REASON OF INJURIES UPON SUCH WAYS OR STREETS.

It is enacted by the General Assembly as follows:

SECTION 1. No work done by the City of Providence upon any way or street in mending, repairing or regrading the same shall constitute or be any evidence of an acceptance of such way or street by the said City of Providence, nor shall it in any way change the status of said way or street; and such mending, repairing or regrading of such way or street shall in no way render the said City of Providence liable to pay compensation or damages by reason of injuries suffered by any person or persons travelling upon such way or street.

SEC. 2. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

No. 369. Resolution Accepting a Deed from the Proprietors of Swan Point Cemetery of Land at the Junction of Hope Street and Blackstone Boulevard for Park Purposes.

(Approved December 14, 1933.)

RESOLVED, That the City Council of the City of Providence hereby accepts a deed from The Proprietors of Swan Point Cemetery to a tract or parcel of land situated at the junction of Hope street and Blackstone boulevard for park purposes. Said deed is dated November 29, A. D. 1933, and a copy thereof is attached hereto. The City of Providence accepts said deed subject to the conditions stated therein, and further agrees that within a period of five years, it will develop and improve said premises for public park purposes exclusively, and thereafter at all reasonable times to keep the same open for use for said purposes.

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, THAT

The Proprietors of Swan Point Cemetery, a corporation existing under the laws of the State of Rhode Island and located in the City of Providence, in said State, hereinafter called the GRANTOR, in consideration of the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) to it paid by the City of Providence, a municipal corporation existing under the laws of said State, hereinafter called the GRANTEE, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, and also in consideration of the agreement of said City of Providence under which this deed and the grant and conveyance evidenced hereby is accepted by said City as hereinafter stated, DOES HEREBY give, grant, bargain, sell and convey unto the said Grantee, its successors and assigns forever, but subject to the conditions hereinafter specified, all of its right, title and interests in and to—

That certain tract or parcel of land situated at the junction of Hope street and Blackstone boulevard bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of the easterly line of Hope street and the westerly line of Blackstone boulevard; thence southeasterly bounding northeasterly on Blackstone boulevard three hundred eleven and ninety-four one-hundredths (311.94) feet to the tangent point of a curve;

thence in a general southeasterly direction in the arc of said curve which has a radius of twenty-five hundred thirty-nine (2539) feet and a central angle of $10^{\circ} 04' 06''$ two hundred seventy-three and ninety-six one-hundredths (273.96) feet bounding northeasterly on said boulevard to the northwesterly line of a twenty-foot strip designated as "Street" on that certain plat entitled "Central Plat East Avenue Belonging to Lydia C. Beginning at the northwesterly corner of Blackstone boulevard and the twenty-foot strip marked "Street" on the above mentioned "Central Plat;" thence in a general southeasterly direction in the arc of said curve with a radius of two thousand five hundred thirty-nine (2539) feet (said curve being the same which is mentioned in the description of the tract or parcel of land first above described) and bounding easterly on said boulevard one hundred seventy-two and two-tenths (172.2) feet to the northwesterly line of North avenue as laid out, delineated and designated on said "Central Plat;" thence southwesterly bounding southeasterly on said North avenue seven hundred eleven and eighteen one-hundredths (711.18) feet to the easterly line of Hope street; thence northerly making an interior angle of $45^{\circ} 24' 30''$ and bounding westerly on Hope street two hundred forty-one and fifty-three one-hundredths (241.53) feet to the northwesterly line of said twenty-foot strip marked "Street" on said "Central Plat;" thence northeasterly bounding north westerly on the tract or parcel of land first above described five hundred thirty-two and eighty-five one-hundredths (532.85) feet to the westerly line of Blackstone boulevard and the point of beginning.

That no waiver at any time or times by the grantor, its successors or assigns, of the aforesaid right to enforce the foregoing conditions or any of them by entry and termination of the estate hereinbefore granted in case of the breach of the aforesaid conditions of any of them shall in any manner or to any degree affect or impair the right of entry for conditions broken or the right to terminate the estate hereinbefore granted, as hereinbefore reserved, in case of any subsequent or other breach; and that no extension of time which may at any time or times be granted by the grantor, its successors or assigns, to the grantee, its successors and assigns, for the performance of said conditions or any of them shall affect or impair in any manner or to any degree the right of entry for conditions broken or the right to terminate the estate hereinbefore granted, as hereinbefore reserved, in the event of the commission or continuance of the breach of such conditions or any of them after such extension shall have expired or in the event of any subsequent or other breach; and that no delay on the part of the grantor, its successors or assigns, in the exercise of said right of entry and termination of the estate hereinbefore granted, as hereinbefore reserved, in case of the breach of said conditions or any of them shall affect or impair in any manner or to any degree said right of entry and termination of the estate hereinbefore granted in case of the continuance of such breach or breaches or in the case of any subsequent or other breach or breaches.

No. 371. Resolution Authorizing the Commissioner of Public Works to Connect Dead Ends of the Water Supply System.

(Approved December 22, 1933.)

RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized and directed to cause the connection of the dead ends of the water supply system in order to provide additional high pressure mains for secure fire protection in the business district; to increase areas served; to install pumps to increase areas served and increase pressure in pipes on border line of gravity system; and to eliminate dead ends

in present system, said work to be carried on in accordance with the plans and specifications of the City Engineer.

No. 372. Resolution Transferring the Sum of \$150,000.00 from the Water Works Depreciation and Extension Fund to the City Treasurer.

(Approved December 22, 1933.)

RESOLVED, That the Board of Commissioners of Sinking Funds is hereby directed to transfer the sum of one hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000.00) from the Water Works Depreciation and Extension Fund to the City Treasurer, to be expended under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works, for the purpose of connecting dead ends and other work incidental to the extension of present mains and system. Any unexpended balance under this Resolution shall be credited back to the Water Works Depreciation and Extension Fund.
