COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT

PROGRAM YEAR 16 - 1990-1991

The Community Development Block Grant Program is entering its 16th Program Year. The Community Development Block Grant is a program of Federal assistance to cities and is administered by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The purpose of the Community Development Block Grant program is the development of viable urban communities by providing decent housing and a suitable living environment and expanding economic opportunities principally for persons of low and moderate income. Every individual activity funded by the CDBG must meet one of three national objectives. These objectives are, benefit to low and moderate income persons or families, aid in the elimination of slums or blight or meeting needs of a particular urgency in the City.

Over the past six years, the Community Development Block Grant has been steadily declining. In the current program year, Year 15, the amount of \$5,658,000 was made available. In the up-coming program year, Year 16, the amount available has been decreased by \$333,000 to \$5,325,000.

The budget presented here outlines programs in the areas of housing, parks and open spaces, assistance to the homeless, community and public facilities, neighborhood improvement and economic development.
