

No. 15. Resolution Creating a Joint Special Committee on Pending Suits.

RESOLVED, That Edward M. Flanagan, Peter F. Reilly, Henry T. Farrell, Robert W. Parkinson, William E. McCabe, Rush Sturges and John J. Cashman be and they are hereby appointed a Joint Special Committee acting under the advice and direction of the City Solicitor and subject to his approval and that of the Mayor, to settle and refer on behalf of the City of Providence any action either at law or in equity or any statutory proceedings in which the City is a party pending in the Courts of the State or any and all claims which have been or which hereafter may be made against said City; and said committee is hereby directed to report quarterly to the City Council.

No. 16. Resolution Creating a Joint Special Committee on Municipal Stadium.

any committee thereof and urge the passage of legislation authorizing the use of voting machines at all elections in the City of Providence, and regulating the use of same.

No. 18. Resolution Directing the City Solicitor to Apply for Legislation Relative to the Use of Voting Machines in the City of Providence.

(Approved January 11, 1935.)

RESOLVED, That the City Solicitor be and he is hereby authorized and directed to appear before the General Assembly and any committee thereof, and urge the passage of legislation authorizing and empowering the City of Providence, by vote of its City Council, to purchase or lease voting machines, and to order their use in any one or more voting places of said city, and permitting said Council to order the experimental use of leased machines at any election in one or more voting places of said City of Providence.

No. 19. Resolution Directing the City Solicitor to Apply for Legislation Relative to Restoring to the Electorate of the City of Providence the Right to Elect a City Treasurer, Director of Public Aid and Harbor Master.

RESOLVED, That the City Solicitor be, and he hereby is, authorized, empowered and directed to appear before the General Assembly of the State of Rhode Island, at its January Session, A. D. 1935, and before any committee thereof, and urge the passage of legislation restoring to the electorate of the

City of Providence the right to elect by popular vote a City Treasurer, a Director of Public Aid, and a Harbor Master of the City of Providence.

No. 20. Resolution Approving a State Unemployment Relief Program for the Month Ending January 31, 1935 in Accordance With "The State Unemployment Relief Act of 1934."

(Approved January 11, 1935.)

RESOLVED, That the City Council of the City of Providence hereby approves the accompanying program for the City of Providence for the month ending January 31, 1935, in accordance with the requirements of "The State Unemployment Relief Act of 1934."

LEASE.

THIS INDENTURE OF LEASE, entered into on the first day of March, A. D. 1935, by and between the City of Providence, a municipal corporation created by and under the laws of the State of Rhode Island, hereinafter called the lessor, and the State of Rhode Island and Providence Plantations, hereinafter called the lessee,

WITNESSETH: That the said lessor doth demise and lease unto the said lessee that certain tract or parcel of land located in the Town of Scituate, in the County of Providence, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point in the northerly line of the Danielson pike, so called, at its intersection with the easterly line of the road to Elmdale, so called, thence northerly, bounding westerly on said road to Elmdale, five hundred (500) feet, thence southeasterly bounding northeasterly on other land of this lessor, seven hundred and eighty (780) feet more or less; thence southerly bounding easterly on land of this lessor, formerly of Nils J. Tyring and wife, five hundred (500) feet to the northerly line of Danielson pike;

thence westerly bounding southerly on said Danielson pike, five hundred ninety-four (594) feet more or less, to road to Elmdale and the point and place of beginning.

Said tract is a portion of parcel formerly owned by Susan S. Aldrich, but now of the City of Providence, and designated as Parcel Number 270 on Sheet A-2 of plat of lands entitled "City of Providence Water Supply Board, Plat of lands in the Towns of Scituate, Foster and Johnston, condemned by the City of Providence for Water Supply Purposes under Chapter 1278 of the Public Laws of 1915 prepared by the Water Supply Board September 30, 1916."

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD the same with the appurtenances thereof unto the said lessee, its successors and assigns, for and during the term of ninety-nine years from the said first day of March, A. D. 1935, yielding and paying therefor during said term a yearly rental of twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars, payable annually in advance on said first day of March during each and every year.

And the said lessee, for itself and for its successors and assigns, covenants with the said lessor, its successors and assigns, that it will pay said rent at the times and in the manner aforesaid, and that in case of failure on its part to pay the same within sixty days subsequent to the time above specified (and it shall not be required that demand be made for the same) or in case of failure to perform all the covenants and agreements herein contained on its part to be kept and performed, said lessor, its successors and assigns, shall be at liberty to enter upon said demised premises and declare this lease at an end and take immediate possession of the premises.

It is further covenanted and agreed by said lessee that said site shall be exclusively used for a State Police Barracks, and that any buildings located thereon shall be used solely by the State for State Police purposes; and that all construction and other operations under this lease will be performed in such

manner as to prevent damage to trees or structures and not to create any unsightly condition on said premises, and that said State Police Barracks will be constructed and maintained in a suitable manner, to the satisfaction of said lessor and its Commissioner of Public Works for the time being, or other city officer having control of said land.

And it is further covenanted that said lessee will take every precaution to prevent forest or grass fires by such clearing of brush or cutting of grass as may reasonably be necessary to reduce such fire hazard, but will not cut any trees without the permission of said Commissioner of Public Works of said city; and said lessee will obey all present and future regulations which said lessor may adopt for the protection of its water supply.

It is further expressly covenanted and agreed by said lessee that said lessee will install a system of sewage disposal satisfactory to the Commissioner of Public Works of said city, and comply with all orders of said Commissioner or his successors for the protection of said water supply system of the City of Providence.

It is further covenanted and agreed that this lease is upon the express condition that if any occupation or any manner of use by said lessee of said premises conflicts with any of the present or future regulations adopted by the City of Providence for the protection of its water supply, or in the opinion of the Commissioner of Public Works of the City of Providence or other authorized representative or representatives of said city, or of the City Council of said city, is in any manner detrimental to the purity of the water supply of said city, such representative or representatives, or said City Council may at any time terminate this lease by giving said lessee thirty days prior notice in writing of such termination and said lessee shall quit said premises.

It is further covenanted that upon the termination of this lease at the expiration of said term of ninety-nine years, or upon its earlier termination for any cause, all buildings and other improvements erected upon said land shall become and be the property of the said lessor.

And the said lessor, for itself and for its successors and assigns, covenants with the said lessee, its successors and assigns, that it paying the rent and performing the covenants and agreements on its part herein contained, may peaceably hold and enjoy said premises during said term without any lawful let or hindrance by the lessor or any person claiming by, through or under it.

Dunnne, its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized, and said State of Rhode Island and Providence Plantations by Theodore Francis Green, its Governor, thereunto duly authorized, the day and year first above written.

RESOLVED, That the City Treasurer, acting under the direction of the Joint Standing Committee on Finance, be and he is hereby authorized and directed to borrow under the authority of and in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 47 of the General Laws of the State of Rhode Island, as amended by Chapter 1617 of the Public Laws of 1930, and further amended by Chapter 1861 of the Public Laws of 1932, during the present financial year in anticipation of the receipt of the proceeds of the annual tax to be assessed in said present financial year, from time to time and in such amounts as he may be directed to borrow by the Joint Standing Committee on Finance, a sum not to exceed Three Hundred Thousand (\$300,000.00) Dollars, and to issue and sell at private sale the City's negotiable notes original or in renewal therefor, bearing interest at a rate not exceeding six per centum (6%) per annum, payable not later than one year from the date of the original notes so issued or renewed or paid and carrying on their face the designation "Note in Anticipation of Taxes," said original and renewal notes to be signed by the City Treasurer and countersigned by the Mayor and Chairman of the Joint Standing Committee on Finance.

The money thus authorized is hereby appropriated for and shall be allocated by the Joint Standing Committee on Finance, first, to pay any deficit or deficits now existing in the account or accounts of any sub-division or sub-divisions of the Depart-

ment of Public Works, and then to the accounts of the various sub-divisions of the said Department of Public Works, from time to time during the balance of the fiscal year ending September 30, 1935, and in such proportional sums as the Joint Standing Committee on Finance shall determine.

AN ACT

IN AMENDMENT OF CHAPTER 780 OF THE PUBLIC LAWS APPROVED APRIL 26, 1889 AND OF CHAPTER 467 OF THE PUBLIC LAWS APPROVED MARCH 31, 1909, AS AMENDED BY CHAPTER 1968 OF THE PUBLIC LAWS APPROVED MARCH 16, 1932.

It is enacted by the General Assembly as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 1 of Chapter 780 of the Public Laws, approved April 26, 1889 as amended by Chapter 1968 of the Public Laws approved March 16, 1932 is hereby further amended so as to read as follows:

“Section 1. The City Council of the City of Providence in joint convention assembled as soon as may be after the passage of this act, and upon the first Monday in January A. D. 1938, or as soon as possible thereafter, and upon the first Monday in January, or as soon as possible thereafter, in every third year thereafter; shall elect a Superintendent of Health for said City, who shall hold office for the term of three years thereafter, and until another is elected and qualified to act in his place. Said Superintendent of Health shall exercise all the powers and authority and do and perform all the duties heretofore vested in or exercised by and pertaining to the office of Superintendent of Health, including his existing ex-officio powers and duties, and in addition thereto he shall be ex-officio City or Local Registrar. He shall not be ex-officio Superintendent of the Charles V. Chapin Hospital and of any other hospital or hospitals of said City. He shall receive such salary as may be fixed from time to time by the City Council of the City of Providence.”

SEC. 2. Section 1 of Chapter 467 of the Public Laws, approved March 31, 1909 as amended by Chapter 1968 of the Public Laws approved March 16, 1932 is hereby further amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 1. The Board of Hospital Commissioners of the City of Providence shall consist of the Mayor and the Superintendent of Health of said City, ex-officio, and three other members elected by the City Council of the City of Providence in joint convention. The elective members of said Board now serving shall continue to serve for the terms for which they were severally elected and until their successors are elected and qualified, and on the first Monday in January, A. D. 1936 or as soon as possible thereafter and annually on the first Monday in January thereafter, or as soon as possible thereafter, one such elective member shall be elected in like manner for the term of three years. Said elective members shall hold office until their successors are elected and qualified. In case any person elected as a member of said Board shall decline to serve or neglect to qualify, or a vacancy among the elective members shall occur for any cause, said office or vacancy shall be filled by said City Council in like manner for the term of said office or unexpired term. Such ex-officio members shall receive no further compensation, and such other members shall receive no compensation for their services as members of said Board. The Mayor shall be chairman of said Board; and said Board shall elect annually one of their members as secretary, and shall keep a record of all their proceedings."

SEC. 3. Section 2 of said Chapter 467 as amended by Chapter 1968 of the Public Laws approved March 16, 1932, is hereby further amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 2. Said Board shall have the care and custody of the Charles V. Chapin Hospital and any other hospital or hospitals of the City, and of all lands, buildings, improvements, furnishings and equipment of said City acquired or used for hospital purposes; and shall manage and conduct all such hospitals of said City. Said Board shall have power to appoint,

remove, organize and control a Superintendent of the Charles V. Chapin Hospital and of all other hospitals of said City, and a Deputy Superintendent of the Charles V. Chapin Hospital and other hospitals and all other officers, agents or employees required to maintain or carry on such hospital or hospitals and shall fix their compensation and define their duties. Said Board shall provide for the maintenance of said Superintendent. In the absence or disability of the Superintendent of such hospital or hospitals the Deputy Superintendent shall have all the powers and perform all the duties of the Superintendent. Said Board may make rules and regulations for the government of any or all the same not repugnant to the laws of the State or of said City; and shall have the expenditure for any or all said purposes, of such sums of money as may be appropriated hereafter from time to time by said City Council therefor, and incident to the same may make any and all purchases and contracts, except as otherwise provided by ordinance or special vote of said City Council; and shall pay over to the City Treasurer of said City any and all income received by said board from or on account of patients in any such hospital or hospitals, or from any other source or sources, and at such time or times as may be fixed by said City Council; and shall have such further powers and duties as may from time to time be prescribed by said City Council."

SEC. 4. The Superintendent of Health of the City of Providence shall continue to hold and execute the duties of the office of Superintendent of the Charles V. Chapin Hospital or of any other hospital or hospitals of said City until a Superintendent of said hospital or hospitals is elected and qualified to act as is provided by this Act.

SEC. 5. This Act shall take effect upon its passage and any and all Acts and parts of Acts inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

CHINES AND GAMES OF SKILL IN THE CITY OF
PROVIDENCE.

It is enacted by the General Assembly as follows:

SECTION 1. No person or corporation shall operate or permit to be operated either as owner, lessee, bailee or otherwise any machine or device for vending cigars, cigarettes, candy or any other article or merchandise of any nature whatsoever, or operate or permit to be operated any machine or device for playing games of skill, in the City of Providence without a license therefore granted by the bureau of police and fire. Said bureau of police and fire for each such license shall fix and cause to be paid into the City Treasury of said City of Providence a fee not exceeding fifty dollars. Licenses granted hereunder shall terminate with the Thursday next following the first Wednesday in April next after granting of the same, but may be granted in March of any year for the next following year, and may terminate on such date as may be specified therein.

SEC. 2. Said bureau of police and fire in each case of granting a license may make such rules, regulations and conditions relative to the granting, holding and exercising such licenses as it may deem necessary and advisable and as are not inconsistent with law, and may at any time at its pleasure suspend or revoke any such license by it granted. Such license shall be displayed in a conspicuous place where the aforesaid machines or devices are operated. Any person, not being licensed, who operates or permits to be operated any of the aforesaid machines or devices, and every such licensed person or corporation and servants or agents and every servant or agent of any such licensee or licensees who shall violate any of the provisions of such license or of any of such rules, regulations or conditions or any of the provisions of this chapter shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars.

SEC. 3. This Act shall take effect upon its passage.

D. 1935, and before any committee thereof, and urge the passage of legislation authorizing the City of Providence to issue bonds for the payment or funding of the indebtedness of said city evidenced by notes now outstanding and heretofore issued in anticipation of taxes, substantially in accordance with the accompanying draft Act.

AN ACT
AUTHORIZING THE CITY OF PROVIDENCE TO IS-
SUE BONDS FOR FUNDING PURPOSES.

It is enacted by the General Assembly as follows:

SECTION 1. The City of Providence is hereby authorized and empowered, in addition to and not in substitution for authority previously granted, to issue, in addition to the bonds heretofore issued and now outstanding, under its corporate name and seal, bonds in serial form to an amount not exceeding three hundred thousand dollars. Said bonds shall be of any denomination not exceeding twenty thousand dollars each, shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding four and one-half per centum per annum, payable semi-annually; the principal thereof and the interest thereon shall be payable in any coin or currency of the United States of America which, at the time of payment, is legal tender, for public and private debts, and the debt secured by said bonds shall be obligatory on said City in the same manner and to the same extent as other debts lawfully contracted by said City. The dates of maturity of said bonds shall in no case be more than ten years after date of issue and not more than thirty thousand dollars shall become due and payable in any one year: Provided, however, that no bonds issued under the provisions of this Act shall mature later than the year 1945.

SEC. 2. Said bonds shall be signed by the City Treasurer and countersigned by the Mayor of the City of Providence, and shall be issued and sold at such times and in such amounts as the City Council of said City shall determine: Provided, however, that the premiums, if any, arising from the sale of said bonds shall be applied to the payment of the principal of said bonds in the order of their maturity. The proceeds arising from the sale of the bonds authorized by this Act shall be delivered to the City Treasurer, and such proceeds, except as hereinbefore provided in respect to the premium arising from the sale thereof, shall be expended for the payment or funding of the in-

debtedness of said City evidenced by notes now outstanding and heretofore issued in anticipation of taxes. No purchaser of any of said bonds, however, shall be in any way responsible for the proper application of the proceeds derived from the sale thereof.

SEC. 3. The City of Providence shall annually appropriate a sum sufficient to pay the interest upon the bonds issued and outstanding under authority of this Act, and also to pay the principal of the bonds maturing in any such year, until said bonds are paid in full. All obligations of said City which are incurred under authority of this Act shall be excepted from the operation of Section 22 of Chapter 47 of the General Laws, as amended.

SEC. 4. This Act shall take effect upon its passage.

No. 85. Resolution Urging the Governor and the General Assembly to Give Immediate Consideration to the Financial Stringency Existing in the Cities and Towns of This State.

(Approved March 12, 1935.)

RESOLVED, That the City Council of the City of Providence do and it hereby does respectfully urge the Governor of our State and the Members of the Rhode Island State Legislature to give immediate consideration to the financial stringency now existing in the cities and towns of the State, caused mainly by the economic depression, and

BE IT RESOLVED, That ways and means of providing additional revenue for said cities and towns be sought and enacted into law by said Legislature, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That copies of this Resolution be sent to the Governor, to the Presiding Officer of the Senate and to the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

No. 86. Resolution Transferring the Sum of \$75,000.00 from the Reserved Fund to Deficiency in Revenue.

No. 107. An Ordinance Providing for the Issue of Emergency Unemployment Relief Bonds.

(Approved April 6, 1935.)

It is ordained by the City Council of the City of Providence as follows:

SECTION 1. The City of Providence will issue the bonds of said City to the amount of one million (\$1,000,000.00) dollars, designated as "Emergency Unemployment Relief Loan" under and by virtue of the authority granted by Chapter 2011 of the Public Laws of Rhode Island, approved February 15, 1933.

SEC. 2. The City Treasurer, with the advice and consent of the Joint Standing Committee on Finance, shall sell and dispose

of such bonds at not less than par and accrued interest, if any, and shall receive the proceeds arising from such sale, and said proceeds shall be applied for the purposes named in said Chapter 2011 of said Public Laws, or for payment and cancellation of any notes issued thereunder as provided in Chapter 1017 of said Public Laws, passed at the January Session, A. D. 1902, and for no other purpose.

SEC. 3. Said bonds shall be issued in serial form and one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000.00) of such issue shall be payable each year on the first day of May, beginning with the first day of May, 1936, until final payment is made on the first day of May, 1945.

SEC. 4. All bidders for said bonds shall be required to name the rate of interest that said bonds shall bear, but not in multiples of less than one quarter of one per centum. Such rate of interest, when bid, shall apply to the entire issue of said bonds. Said interest shall be payable on the first days of November and May in each year.

SEC. 5. Said bonds shall bear date as of May 1, 1935 and shall be payable yearly as provided in Section 3, and both principal and interest shall be payable in any coin or currency of the United States of America which, at the time of payment, is legal tender for public and private debts, at the fiscal agency of the City of Providence in New York City, or at the office of the City Treasurer in said City of Providence. Said bonds shall be signed by the City Treasurer, countersigned by the Mayor, and registered by the City Auditor, who shall certify the registry of each bond, and the certificate of the City Auditor that said bonds have been registered by him shall be conclusive evidence that said bonds have been issued as hereinbefore provided.

RESOLVED, That the City Treasurer, acting under the direction of the Joint Standing Committee on Finance, be and he is hereby authorized and directed to borrow under the authority of and in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 47 of the General Laws of the State of Rhode Island, as amended by Chapter 1617 of the Public Laws of 1930 and Chapter 1861 of the Public Laws of 1932, during the present financial year, in anticipation of the receipt of the proceeds of the annual tax to be assessed in said present financial year, from time to time and in such amounts as he may be directed to borrow by the Joint Standing Committee on Finance, a sum not to exceed one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000.00), and to issue and sell at private sale the City's negotiable notes original and in renewal therefor, bearing interest at a rate not exceeding six per centum (6%) per annum, payable not later than one year from the date of the original notes so issued or renewed or paid and carrying on their face the designation "Note in Anticipation of Taxes", said original and renewal notes to be

signed by the City Treasurer and countersigned by the Mayor and the Chairman of the Joint Standing Committee on Finance.

The money thus authorized is hereby appropriated for the purpose of paying for materials, supplies, supervision, transportation and all other necessary expenses on projects formerly carried on under the Civil Works Administration and now carried on under the Federal Emergency Re-employment Administration.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the City Council hereby petitions the President and the Congress of the United States to repeal the processing tax on cotton and to enact legislation which will give adequate protection to the cotton textile industry against importations of goods manufactured by cheap labor abroad, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City Clerk is hereby directed to send copies of this Resolution to the President of the United States and to the senators and representatives in Congress from the State of Rhode Island.

No. 158. Resolution Authorizing His Honor the Mayor to Execute an Agreement Between the City of Providence and the Rhode Island Department of Public Works Relative to the Improvement of the Reservoir Avenue Bridge Approaches.

AGREEMENT BY CITY OF PROVIDENCE

TO MAINTAIN RESERVOIR AVE. R. R. BRIDGE APPROACHES IMPROVED UNDER NATIONAL INDUSTRIAL RECOVERY ACT.

The CITY OF PROVIDENCE, State of RHODE ISLAND, hereinafter referred to as CITY OF PROVIDENCE, and the RHODE ISLAND DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS, DIVISION OF ROADS AND BRIDGES, hereinafter referred to as the HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT, hereby agree as follows:

1. That the HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT will submit a project for the improvement of $0.25 \pm$ miles of the *Municipal* highway from *Narragansett avenue* to *Columbus square*, known as *Reservoir ave. Bridge and Approaches*, and to be designated as *R. I. U. S. P. W.* project No. *NRM 37-D* (1935) and will

recommend its approval by the Secretary of Agriculture for construction with funds apportioned to the State under Section 204 of the National Industrial Recovery Act; subject, however to the condition that the CITY OF PROVIDENCE shall provide for proper maintenance of the street and approaches to the bridge after completion of the improvement.

2. That the said CITY OF PROVIDENCE hereby requests the HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT to submit the aforementioned project with recommendation that it be approved by the Secretary of Agriculture, and agrees that if such project is approved and constructed by the HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT and the Secretary of Agriculture, the CITY OF PROVIDENCE thereafter, at its own cost and expense, will maintain the street and approaches (but not the bridge structure) in a manner satisfactory to the above mentioned authorities or their authorized representatives, and will make ample provision each year for such maintenance.

No. 159. Resolution Appropriating the Sum of \$200,000.00 for Paving and Repaving Certain Streets.

(Approved May 9, 1935.)

RESOLVED, That the City Treasurer, acting under the direction of the Joint Standing Committee on Finance, is hereby authorized and directed to borrow from time to time and in such amounts as may be necessary, the sum of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000.00), in accordance with the provisions of an Act passed by the General Assembly at its January Session, A. D. 1935, entitled "An Act authorizing the City of Providence to hire the sum of eight hundred thousand dollars for highway purposes;" and to issue the City's notes therefor bearing interest at a rate not exceeding 6 per centum per annum, signed by him and countersigned by the Mayor and the Chairman of said Joint Standing Committee on Finance and to renew any such notes from time to time as the same become due.

The money thus obtained is hereby appropriated for and shall be exclusively used and expended for the purposes of paving and repaving such highways in the City of Providence as the City Council may determine and/or for the purpose of acquiring land in said City of Providence for highway purposes.

No. 160. Resolution Providing for the Assessment and Collection of Taxes.

(Approved May 9, 1935.)

RESOLVED, That the City Council of the City of Providence hereby orders the assessment and collection of a tax on the ratable real estate and tangible personal property and ratable intangible personal property (the tax on ratable intangible property to be at the rate of forty cents on each one hundred dollars of the value thereof) in a sum not less than twelve million four hundred and eight-five thousand dollars (\$12,485,000.00) nor more than twelve million six hundred and eighty-five thousand dollars (\$12,685,000.00); said tax is for ordinary expenses, charges and sinking funds, for the payment of interest and indebtedness in whole or in part of said City, for the payment of the City's proportion of the State tax and for other purposes authorized by law.

The Board of Assessors shall assess and apportion said tax on the inhabitants and ratable property of said City as of the fifteenth day of June, A. D. 1935, at 12 o'clock noon, Eastern Standard Time, according to law, and shall, on completion of said assessment, date and sign the same, and shall make out and certify to the City Treasurer of the City of Providence on or before the sixteenth day of September, A. D. 1935, a complete list of the names of the persons taxed and of the total value of all the real estate taxed to each person, also the amount of personal estate assessed against each person, and also the total amount of the tax assessed against each person on said real estate and personal estate, opposite the name of the person or persons assessed, the assessment of real estate and of personal estate to appear in separate columns in said list. Said tax shall be due and payable on and between the first day of October next and the twenty-fourth day of October, A. D. 1935 next, and all taxes remaining unpaid on said last named day, shall carry until collected a penalty at the rate of eight per centum per annum upon such unpaid taxes. Provided,

however, said tax may be paid in four installments, the first installment of twenty-five per centum on or before the twenty-fourth day of October A. D. 1935 and the remaining installments as follows: twenty-five per centum on the twenty-fourth day of January, A. D. 1936; twenty-five per centum on the twenty-fourth day of April, A. D. 1936; and twenty-five per centum on the twenty-fourth day of July, A. D. 1936. All installments remaining unpaid after the date on which the first installment becomes due and payable shall carry until collected a penalty at the rate of eight per centum per annum. The City Treasurer shall by advertisement in the public newspapers of the City, notify all persons assessed to pay their respective taxes at his office on and between said first and twenty-fourth days of October, A. D. 1935, both days inclusive; said treasurer shall attend daily during said periods, Sundays and holidays excepted, at his office from nine o'clock a. m. to five o'clock p. m. to receive said taxes; except Saturdays when he shall attend from nine o'clock a. m. to twelve o'clock noon, with the exception of Saturday, October nineteenth, when the hours shall be from nine o'clock a. m. to five o'clock p. m.

M I N U T E

Clifford H. Griffin, M. D. was born in Fall River, Massachusetts, May 6, 1870. He was graduated in 1894 from Brown University, where he had been elected to Phi Beta Kappa, honorary scholastic society, attended Harvard Medical School and received his degree in 1898. While a medical student he served as the first principal of the evening high school in this City. Dr. Griffin served as an interne at the Rhode Island Hospital from the time of his graduation from Harvard until 1900, when he became surgeon in the Police Department.

In 1909, Dr. Griffin was appointed medical examiner for Providence by the late Governor Aram J. Pothier. The State Board of Health, in 1918, named Dr. Griffin as its physician to treat drug addicts in Providence and vicinity under the narcotic drug act passed that year by the General Assembly.

Connected with the Police Department for thirty-five years, Dr. Griffin was acquainted with every member of the department during that period. He gave physical examinations to every member of the force, passed on the injuries and illnesses of all policemen for many years, treating many of them and winning their high esteem.

Besides his duties with the Police Department, Dr. Griffin submitted scores of reports annually as medical examiner and testified in many murder cases where his testimony was recognized as authoritative. He also conducted a successful general practice of medicine in this City for a period of thirty-five years and in spite of the pressure of his official duties and private practice which was heavy, he found time to indulge in the hobby of amateur photography. Dr. Griffin also served on the Providence School Committee from the old Fourth

Ward and was a member of the House of Representatives, declining re-election because of the volume of professional work.

Dr. Griffin's life was one of unselfish and devoted service to the people of this City and State in whose behalf he had labored so earnestly for many years. In his passing the City has lost a conscientious and faithful servant. The members of the City Council deplore the death of Dr. Griffin and extend to his family this expression of profound sympathy in its bereavement.

The Zoning map accompanying and made a part of Chapter 370 of the Ordinances approved June 6, 1923, entitled "An Ordinance Zoning the City of Providence and Establishing Height, Area and Use Districts" is hereby amended by changing from an Apartment-House District D-1 to a Business District D-1, certain land on the westerly side of America street, bounded and described as follows:

"Beginning at a point in the westerly line of America street, 42.2 feet southerly from the southwest corner of America street and Federal street; and at the northeast corner of lot 241 as shown on assessors plat 28; thence southerly bounding easterly on America street 40 feet; thence westerly bounding southerly on lot 242, on said assessors plat 28, 100 feet; thence northerly bounding westerly on lot 207, on said assessors plat 28, 40 feet; thence easterly bounding northerly in part on lot 925 and in part on lot 240, on said assessors plat 28; 100 feet to America street, and the point and place of beginning."

SEC. 2. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

General Laws of the State of Rhode Island, as amended by Chapter 1617 of the Public Laws of 1930, and further amended by Chapter 1861 of the Public Laws of 1932, during the present financial year in anticipation of the receipt of the proceeds of the annual tax to be assessed in said present financial year, from time to time and in such amounts as he may be directed to borrow by the Joint Standing Committee on Finance, a sum not to exceed twenty-five thousand (\$25,000.00) dollars, and to issue and sell at private sale the City's negotiable notes original or in renewal therefor, bearing interest at a rate not exceeding six per centum (6%) per annum, payable not later than one year from the date of the original notes so issued or renewed or paid and carrying on their face the designation "Note in Anticipation of Taxes," said original and renewal notes to be signed by the City Treasurer and countersigned by the Mayor and Chairman of the Joint Standing Committee on Finance.

The money thus authorized is hereby appropriated for and shall be expended under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Buildings to make the necessary changes and additions to the Richmond Street Fire Station for the proper housing of certain apparatus now located in the fire headquarters building and to provide proper quarters for the personnel attendant thereto.

No. 185. Resolution Appropriating the Sum of \$20,000.00 for Plans and Specifications for Building and Furnishing Hope Street and Mount Pleasant High School Buildings.

(Approved June 5, 1935.)

RESOLVED, That the City Treasurer, acting under the direction of the Joint Standing Committee on Finance, be and he is hereby authorized and directed to borrow from time to time and in such amounts as may be necessary not exceeding twenty thousand (\$20,000.00) dollars, in accordance with the provisions of

Chapter 1808 of the Public Laws of 1931, said sum or so much thereof as may be necessary to be charged to a loan account authorized by this Resolution, and to issue the City's notes therefor, bearing interest at a rate not exceeding six per centum (6%) per annum, signed by him and countersigned by the Mayor and Chairman of the said Committee on Finance. The money thus obtained shall be exclusively used and expended for the preparation and completion of plans and specifications for the building and furnishing of two senior high school buildings, together with partial supervision of the construction of said buildings; one building to be located on the Mount Pleasant High School site, and the other on the Hope Street High School site.

No. 186. Resolution Appropriating the Sum of \$65,000.00 for Sewer Purposes.

(Approved June 5, 1935.)

RESOLVED, That the sum of sixty-five thousand dollars (\$65,000.00) be and the same is hereby added to the appropriation for sewers, and the City Treasurer acting under the direction of the Joint Standing Committee on Finance is hereby authorized to hire the same under the provisions of an Act passed by the General Assembly at its January Session, A. D. 1932, entitled "An Act Authorizing the City of Providence to hire the sum of four hundred thousand dollars for sewer purposes".

No. 187. Resolution Approving a State Unemployment Relief Program for the Month Ending June 30, 1935 in Accordance with "The State Unemployment Relief Act of 1934."

(Approved June 5, 1935.)

RESOLVED, That the City Council of the City of Providence

hereby approves the accompanying program for the City of Providence for the month ending June 30, 1935, in accordance with the requirements of "The State Unemployment Relief Act of 1934."

No. 188. Resolution Allowing Certain City Employees Leave of Absence to Attend the Conventions of Various War Veteran Organizations and Creating a Committee to Verify War Service.

(Approved June 5, 1935.)

RESOLVED, That the heads of departments be and they are hereby authorized to allow employees of the City of Providence in their respective departments who served in the armed forces of the United States during the several wars, and who desire to attend the Annual Convention of the American Legion in St. Louis, Missouri, September 22 to 26, inclusive, 1935, the Annual Convention of the United Spanish War Veterans in San Antonio, Texas, September 15 to 19, inclusive, 1935, or the National Encampment of the Veterans of Foreign Wars in New Orleans, Louisiana, September 15 to 20, inclusive, 1935, a leave of absence for such purpose without loss of pay; and that a Joint Special Committee, consisting of four Councilmen to be appointed by the President of the Common Council and one Alderman to be appointed by His Honor the Mayor, be and is hereby created for the purpose of verifying the war service of those employees who apply for such leave of absence.

No. 189. Resolution Granting Permission to the Outlet Company to Place a Felt Base Rug on the Sidewalk in Front of Said Store for the Period of One Week.

(Approved June 5, 1935.)

RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he

is hereby requested to grant permission to the Outlet Company of Providence to place a felt base rug on the sidewalk in front of said Outlet Company on Weybosset street for a period of one week, it being understood that said rug will be cemented to the sidewalk and that said rug will be covered by a bond issued by the Maryland Casualty Company of Baltimore, Maryland and satisfactory to the City Solicitor and the Commissioner of Public Works.

No. 190. Resolution to Construct a Sewer in Belair Avenue.

(Approved June 5, 1935.)

RESOLVED, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby directed to cause a main drain or common sewer to be constructed in Belair avenue, from near Phillips street to Cypress street and from near Cypress street to Larch street, in accordance with the plans and specifications of the City Engineer.

CHAPTER 903.

No. 191. An Ordinance Reducing Salaries and Compensation for the Period of One Year.

(Approved June 6, 1935.)

It is ordained by the City Council of the City of Providence as follows:

SECTION 1. The salaries to be paid to the several City officers and the compensation to be paid to the City employees in accordance with salary schedules and wage scales now established, wherever said salaries and compensation are subject to the control or approval of the City Council or the

Board of Aldermen, shall be reduced by a sum equal to ten per centum thereof, commencing on the first Monday in October, A. D. 1935. This reduction of ten per centum shall be effective for the period of one year.

SEC. 2. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances, in so far as the same are inconsistent herewith, are hereby suspended for said period of one year.

SEC. 3. This Ordinance shall take effect on the first Monday in October, A. D. 1935.

CHAPTER 904.

No. 193. An Ordinance Providing for the Issue of Unemployment Relief Bonds.

(Approved June 8, 1935.)

It is ordained by the City Council of the City of Providence as follows:

SECTION 1. The City of Providence will issue the bonds of said City to the amount of three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000.00) designated as "Unemployment Relief Loan" under and by virtue of the authority granted by an act of the General Assembly of the State of Rhode Island in its January Session, A. D. 1935, entitled "An Act Authorizing the City of Providence to issue Bonds for Funding Purposes", approved April 4, 1935.

SEC. 2. The City Treasurer, with the advice and consent of the Joint Standing Committee on Finance, shall sell and dispose of such bonds to the Board of Commissioners of Sinking Funds or to the Employees' Retirement System of the City of Providence at par, and shall receive the proceeds arising from such sale, and said proceeds shall be applied for the purposes named in said act of said General Assembly entitled "An Act Authorizing the City of Providence to issue Bonds for Funding Purposes", approved April 4, 1935, for the payment and cancellation of any notes issued under the authority of Chapter 1617 of the Public Laws of 1930, as amended, for the payment or funding of the indebtedness of said City evidenced by notes now outstanding and heretofore issued in anticipation of taxes, and for no other purpose.

SEC. 3. Said bonds shall be issued in serial form and thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000.00) of such issue shall be payable each year on the first day of June, beginning with the first day of June, A. D. 1936, until final payment is made on the first day of June, A. D. 1945, with interest at the rate of two per centum per annum, payable on the first days of December and June in each year.

SEC. 4. Said bonds shall bear date as of June 1, 1935, and shall be payable yearly as provided in Section 3, and both principal and interest shall be payable in any coin or currency of the United States of America which, at the time of payment, is legal tender for public and private debts, at the fiscal agency of the City of Providence in New York City, or at the office of the City Treasurer in said City of Providence. Said bonds shall be signed by the City Treasurer, countersigned by the Mayor, and registered by the City Auditor, who shall certify the registry of each bond, and the certificate of the City Auditor that said bonds have been registered by him shall be conclusive evidence that said bonds have been issued as hereinbefore provided.

No. 194. Resolution Directing the City Solicitor to Apply for Legislation Relative to Hiring the Sum of \$50,000.00 for Park Purposes.

(Approved June 8, 1935.)

RESOLVED, That the City Solicitor be and he is hereby directed to apply to the General Assembly at its January Session A. D. 1936, for authority to hire the sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00), said sum to be expended for park purposes.

No. 195. Resolution Directing the City Solicitor to Apply for Legislation Relative to Appropriating Annually the Sum of \$1,000.00 for the Jewish Orphanage of Rhode Island.

(Approved June 8, 1935.)

RESOLVED, That the City Solicitor be and he is hereby directed to apply to the General Assembly at its January Session A. D. 1936, for permissive legislation allowing the City of Providence to appropriate annually a sum not in excess of one thousand dollars for aid in the operation of the Jewish Orphanage of Rhode Island.

No. 196. Resolution Creating a Joint Special Committee on the Observance of Fourth of July, 1935, and Appropriating the Sum of \$350.00 Therefor.

(Approved June 8, 1935.)

RESOLVED, That the Joint Special Committee of the City Council, consisting of five members of the Common Council to be appointed by the President thereof, and four Aldermen to be appointed by the Mayor, is hereby created for the purpose

of arranging a proper celebration of the Fourth of July, 1935; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the sum of \$350.00 or so much thereof as may be necessary therefor, be and the same is hereby appropriated for the purpose of defraying the expenses of said Joint Special Committee; said sum to be charged to the appropriation for Contingencies.

No. 197. Resolution Appropriating the Sum of \$16,000.00 for Sewers in Connection with the Federal Emergency Relief Administration Program.

(Approved June 8, 1935.)

RESOLVED, That the sum of sixteen thousand dollars (\$16,000.00) be and the same is hereby added to the appropriation for sewers, and the City Treasurer, acting under the direction of the Joint Standing Committee on Finance, is hereby authorized to hire the same under the provisions of an Act passed by the General Assembly at its January Session, A. D. 1932, entitled "An Act Authorizing the City of Providence to Hire the sum of Four Hundred Thousand Dollars for Sewer Purposes." Said sum to be used in connection with the Federal Emergency Relief Administration Program of the City and to be used for the purchase of material and equipment and supervision.

No. 198. Resolution to Provide Work on a Relief Project for Unemployed Persons by the Construction of One Storm Sewer.

(Approved June 8, 1935.)

RESOLVED, That the City of Providence do, and it hereby does, submit to Edward P. Reidy, Local Emergency Relief Ad-

ministrator, on forms in triplicate to be furnished by the Federal Emergency Relief Administration for submission of such application to the State Emergency Relief Administration, with recommendation for approval, the following project, namely, Construction of one storm sewer in the City of Providence, to provide work on a relief project at wages for unemployed persons able and willing to work in accordance with the Rules and Regulations of the Federal Emergency Relief Administration, on the condition that such portion of the materials, supplies and transportation that it shall be the duty of the City of Providence to supply shall be furnished by the said City of Providence in accordance with the Rules and Regulations of the Federal Emergency Relief Administration, subject to the provisions of Chapter 6 of the Ordinances of the said City of Providence, 1914, entitled "Board of Contract and Supply," and all amendments and additions thereto, and the provisions of said Chapter 6 of said Ordinances shall in no way be abrogated by the terms of this Resolution, and on the further condition that only articles, materials and supplies produced in the United States under codes of fair competition under Title I of the National Industrial Recovery Act, or under the Re-Employment Agreement of the President of the United States shall be used in the performance of the work under said project, except when the Federal Emergency Relief Administration certifies that this requirement is not in the public interest, or that the consequent cost is unreasonable, and that, so far as is practicable, and subject to the Rules and Regulations of the Federal Emergency Relief Administration, preference shall also be given to the use of locally produced materials if such does not involve higher cost, inferior quality or insufficient quantity.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Mayor of the City of Providence, and the Commissioner of Public Works be and they are hereby authorized and directed to prepare all necessary data on said project, execute all necessary documents, sign said application, and submit the same to the Local Emergency Relief Administrator for resubmission to the State Emergency Relief Administration for approval.

No. 199. Resolution Authorizing the Joint Standing Committee on City Property to Sell Certain Land and Buildings of the State Street School Property.

(Approved June 8, 1935.)

RESOLVED, That the Joint Standing Committee on City Property be and it is hereby authorized to sell at private sale to Nathan Berk for the sum of twenty-seven hundred dollars the land and buildings known as the State Street School property, situated on the easterly side of State street, the same being the lot and buildings now leased to the Berk Lace and Braid Manufacturing Company by the City of Providence and which is more fully described in the accompanying draft deed. Said parcel or tract of land contains 10,885 square feet of land. The deed of conveyance from said City of Providence to said Nathan Berk is to be substantially in accordance with the accompanying draft deed.

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

SECTION 1. The Mayor of the City of Providence, acting for and on behalf of said city, is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to execute an amendment to P. W. A. Docket No. 1249 by adding to the description of "The Project" contained in the Grant Agreement between the said city and the United States of America the following figures and data and itemized estimates, namely:

The difference in the amount of contracts already awarded, to-wit, \$373,206.22, plus the contract to be awarded, to-wit, \$164,865.00, totalling \$538,071.00, and the amount of original estimate \$475,000.00, namely, \$63,071.00; and the payment of \$30,000.00 for royalty fees paid in lieu of litigation and for release of all claims of whatever kind held by the Activated Sludge, Inc.; and \$37,000.00 for engineering expenses involving inspection, supervision, and office expenses chargeable to said project; and requesting an additional grant of 30% of said additional costs involved therein, which said amendment is hereby approved and the Mayor is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to submit the amendment to the project, plan and agreement in final form to the Governor of the State of Rhode Island for presentation to the Emergency Public Works Commission for approval, and to the Federal Public Works Administration for approval, and to act for the city in doing all things required by said agreement to be done by or in behalf of said city.

No. 228. Resolution Accepting for Highway Purposes a Certain Parcel of Land on the Corner of Benefit and College Streets.

(Approved July 2, 1935.)

RESOLVED, That the City Council hereby accepts for highway purposes that certain tract or parcel of land located at the northwesterly corner of Benefit and College streets, in the City of Providence, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at the northwesterly corner of Benefit street and College street as College street now exists subject to a proposed change of line; thence westerly along the present northerly line of College street, bounding southerly on College street one hundred thirty-one and ninety-one one hundredths (131.91) feet to a point in the proposed new northerly line of College street; thence easterly along the proposed new line of College street making an interior angle of $13^{\circ} 17' 50''$ and bounding northerly on land of Rhode Island School of Design twenty-one and sixty-nine one hundredths (21.69) feet to the tangent point of a curve; thence in a general easterly direction in the arc of said curve with a radius of three hundred thirty (330) feet and a central angle of $17^{\circ} 04' 20''$ and bounding northerly on land of Rhode Island School of Design ninety-eight and thirty-three one hundredths (98.33) feet to the tangent point of a reverse curve; thence in a general northeasterly direction in the arc of said reverse curve with a radius of ten (10.00) feet and a central angle of $99^{\circ} 51' 10''$ and bounding northwesterly on land of Rhode Island School of Design seventeen and forty-three one hundredths (17.43) feet to a point in the westerly line of Benefit street; thence southerly in the present westerly line of Benefit street bounding easterly on Benefit street twenty-four and twenty-nine one hundredths (24.29) feet to point of beginning.

Said parcel is defined by the letters N-S-H-G-F-N as shown on plan entitled "Providence, R. I. City Engineer's Office, Street Line Dept. April 14, 1932—054446." Said parcel contains 1,367 square feet of land.

This gift is accepted subject to the condition that the Rhode Island School of Design, the present owner, may retain possession of the buildings and improvements located upon said parcel of land for a period not exceeding six months from the

date of passage of this Resolution, but said Rhode Island School of Design may tear down and remove said buildings and improvements at any time after passage of this Resolution, and prior to the end of said period.

His Honor the Mayor is hereby authorized to accept a deed of said parcel of land, and record the same whenever the Board of Aldermen of the City of Providence abandons another certain triangular parcel of land at the northeasterly corner of College street and Market square.

to execute a lease to the Superior Oil Company of the parcel of land at the northeasterly corner of Rugby street and Aldrich street containing approximately 9,170 square feet of land, at a rental of fifty dollars per year. WITNESSETH, that the said LESSOR, for and in consideration of the rents and covenants hereinafter specified and contained, on the part of the said LESSEE, its successors and assigns, to be kept and performed, does hereby demise and lease unto the said LESSEE, its successors and assigns, for and during the term of twenty years beginning on the first day of June, A. D. 1935,

That certain tract or parcel of land situated at the northeasterly corner of Rugby street and Aldrich street in said City of Providence, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at the northeasterly corner of Rugby street and Aldrich street, thence northerly bounding westerly on said Rugby street one hundred eight and seventy-three one hundredths (108.73) feet to a corner; thence northeasterly making an interior angle of $113^{\circ}-01'-50''$ and

bounding northwesterly on land now or formerly of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company seventy and thirty-seven one hundredths (70.37) feet to a corner; thence southerly making an interior angle of 90° and bounding easterly on land now or formerly of Leo Mariano and Agostino Vellero, one hundred and seven one hundredths (100.07) feet to the northerly line of Aldrich street; thence westerly making an interior angle of 90° and bounding southerly on Aldrich street one hundred twelve and ninety-one one hundredths (112.91) feet to the northeasterly corner of Aldrich and Rugby streets and the point and place of beginning. Said parcel contains approximately 9,170 square feet of land. Said parcel is designated by the letters A-B-C-D-A as shown on accompanying plan entitled "Providence, R. I., City Engineer's Office, City Property Department, May 1, 1935, 056283."

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD the same, with all the rights and privileges thereof to the said LESSEE, its successors and assigns, for and during the term of twenty years from the first day of June, A. D. 1935, they yielding and paying therefor as a yearly rent the sum of fifty (\$50.00) dollars, payable in advance.

PROVIDED ALWAYS, and this lease is made upon the following express conditions: That the said LESSEE, its successors and assigns, shall during the continuance of this lease use and occupy the aforescribed premises for the purpose of storing gasoline thereon and maintaining a station thereon for the sale of gasoline; that they shall observe and abide by all statutes, laws, ordinances, rules and regulations which are now in force or which may be hereafter enacted relative to the storage or sale of gasoline; that they shall not use or occupy or suffer said premises, or any part thereof, to be used or occupied for any unlawful business or any unlawful or immoral purposes whatsoever; that they will preserve the peace and maintain good order on said premises at all times; that they will not assign, underlet or part with the possession of the whole or any part of the demised premises without first obtaining the writ-

ten consent of the LESSOR, acting by and through the Joint Standing Committee on City Property.

It is further understood and agreed by and between the parties that this lease is upon the express condition that no building or construction shall be placed over or upon the existing 110 inch storm sewer or over or upon the 28 inch by 42 inch sanitary sewer now located upon the premises, nor shall the property be used in any way so as to endanger said sewers, or either or both of them, and any and all construction of any kind shall be subject to the approval of the City Engineer for the time being of said CITY OF PROVIDENCE.

It is further understood and agreed by and between the parties that the LESSOR shall have the right at any time to enter upon the premises for the purpose of inspecting or repairing said sewers, without cost to said LESSOR for disturbance of business or for any other reason, and it is mutually agreed by and between the parties that if at any time the CITY OF PROVIDENCE shall improve any of the land adjoining said leased premises for highway purposes, the CITY OF PROVIDENCE may enter upon said land and remove and destroy driveways or other property without being liable for any damages to the LESSEE, and that the LESSEE will at its own expense cause the driveways or other structures on the leased premises to conform to the grade of said Rugby street and Aldrich street as the same may be laid out.

It is further understood and agreed by and between the parties hereto that any buildings or other improvements now or hereafter erected on said premises are and shall be held at the sole risk of the said LESSEE, its successors and assigns.

It is further agreed by and between the parties hereto that if at any time during the continuance of this lease, in the opinion of the Board of Fire Commissioners of the CITY OF PROVIDENCE the public safety will be better protected by the removal from said premises of said gasoline, then and in that event said party of the first part, upon receipt from said

Board of Fire Commissioners of a writing to that effect may forthwith terminate the within lease by a written notice to said LESSEE, its successors and assigns, and in that event a just abatement of the rent shall be made between the parties.

And it is further understood and agreed that upon any violation of any of the foregoing conditions or covenants, the said LESSOR, by any agent duly authorized, shall be at liberty to terminate this lease, and may thereupon lawfully, immediately or at any time thereafter, and without notice or demand, enter into and upon said premises and repossess the same as of their former estate.

And it is further understood and agreed by and between the parties hereto that if the said LESSEE, its successors and assigns, shall not within one month from and after the expiration or other termination of this lease remove any and all buildings, structures and other improvements now or hereafter erected on said premises by said LESSEE, the same shall become and be the sole and lawful property of the said LESSOR.

It is further understood and agreed by and between the parties hereto that all buildings and improvements erected or placed upon said land are and shall be pledged for the payment of all rents accruing or owing under this lease. And at any time after default in the payment of any rent or sum of money accruing or owing under this lease, and such default shall have continued for the space of thirty (30) days from and after written notice as hereinafter provided is served upon the LESSEE, it shall be lawful for the LESSOR to enforce said pledge by selling the buildings and improvements, or any of them on said premises at public auction, first giving notice once a week at least for three successive weeks of the time and place of such sale by advertisement in some newspaper published in said CITY OF PROVIDENCE; and in its or their own name or names, or as the attorney or attorneys of the LESSEE, (for that purpose by these presents duly authorized and appointed with full power of substitution and revocation) to make, execute and deliver to the purchaser or purchasers there-

of good and sufficient transfers or bills of sale thereof; and to receive the proceeds of such sale or sales, and from such proceeds to retain the amount of rent then due from the LESSEE and all other sums of money accruing or owing under this lease, together with the expenses incident to such sale or sales, rendering and paying the surplus of said proceeds, if any there be, to the LESSEE; said notice may be served by leaving the same at any office on the premises hereby leased with any person there employed, or by posting the same on any outer door of any building now or hereafter on said premises.

It is furthermore agreed by and between the parties that if the City Council of the CITY OF PROVIDENCE shall determine that the premises hereby leased are needed for public or municipal purposes, the LESSOR acting by and through said City Council may terminate this lease upon giving the LESSEE at least four months notice in writing.

The money thus authorized, which is in addition to that authorized by City Council Resolution No. 183, approved June 5, 1935, is hereby appropriated for and shall be expended under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Buildings for the purpose of altering and repairing the old Technical High School Building for use as headquarters for the administrative and supervisory staff of the School Department.

No. 285. Resolution Appropriating an Additional \$7,500.00 for Changes to the Richmond Street Fire Station.

SECTION 1. Section 2 of Chapter 492 of the Ordinances, approved December 23, 1925, entitled "An Ordinance providing

for a uniform display of the United States Flag on certain days", as amended by Chapter 502 of the Ordinances, approved February 5, 1926, as amended by Chapter 519 of the Ordinances approved July 7, 1926, is hereby further amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 2. Said owner or lessee is hereby authorized to display, from sunrise to sunset, a standard United States Flag, 3 ft. x 5 ft. upon a flag staff inserted in and extending 12 ft. above the top of the said socket, upon the following days: The 12th day of February (Grand Army Flag Day in honor of the birthday of Abraham Lincoln), the 22nd day of February (Washington's Birthday), the 4th day of May (Rhode Island Independence Day), the 14th day of June (National Flag Day), the 30th day of May (Memorial Day), the 4th day of July (Independence Day), the first Monday in September (Labor Day), the 12th day of October (Columbus Day), the 11th day of November (Armistice Day) and such other days of national importance or patriotic significance as the Mayor of the City of Providence may from time to time designate. When any of said days shall fall upon Sunday, said owner or lessee may display said flag in the manner hereinbefore provided upon the following day. Said owner or lessee is also authorized to display upon said flag staff the flag emblem of the American Red Cross upon such days as the Mayor of the City of Providence may from time to time designate."

SEC. 2. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

CHAPTER 910.

Beginning at the northwesterly corner of Smith street and Richter street, thence southerly along the westerly line of Richter street to the southeasterly corner of lot 75 on Assessor's Plat 82, thence westerly along the southerly lines of lots 75 and 76 on said plat 82 to the southwesterly corner of said lot 76, thence northerly along the westerly line of said lot 76 to the southeasterly corner of lot 77, thence westerly along the southerly lines of lots 77 and 78 to the easterly line of Oakland avenue, thence northeasterly and crossing Oakland avenue to the southeasterly corner of lot 177 on Assessor's Plat 82, thence westerly along the southerly line of lot 177 to an angle in said lot 177, thence northwesterly along the southwesterly lines of lots 177-176-175-174-173-172-171 on said Assessor's Plat 82 to the southwesterly corner of lot 171, thence northeasterly along the northwesterly line of lot 171 to the southwesterly line of Smith street, thence northwesterly and crossing Smith street to the southwesterly corner of lot 175 on Assessor's Plat 120, thence northerly along the westerly line of lot 175 to the northwesterly corner thereof, thence easterly along the northerly lines of lots 175 and 174 on said Plat 120 to the westerly line of Pembroke avenue, thence southeasterly and crossing Pembroke avenue to the northwesterly corner of lot 173, thence easterly along the northerly lines of lots 173 and 172 to the northeasterly corner of said lot 172, thence southerly along the easterly line

of lot 172 to the northwesterly corner of lot 100, thence easterly along the northerly line of lot 100 to the westerly line of Oakland avenue, thence southeasterly and crossing Oakland avenue to the northwesterly corner of lot 64 on Assessor's Plat 69, thence easterly along the northerly lines of lots 64 and 2 on said Plat 69 to the northeasterly corner of lot 2, thence easterly in continuation of said last described line across lot 13 on said Assessor's Plat 69 to the westerly line of Randolph street, thence southerly along the westerly line of Randolph street to the northwesterly corner of Smith and Randolph streets, thence southwestery across Smith street to the northwesterly corner of Smith and Richter streets and the Point and place of beginning.

SEC. 2. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Whereas, In the course of our history, the American people

have built up an ideal of sportsmanship which has grown out of and in harmony with American traditions; and

Whereas, We look upon our athletic life as one of the finest manifestations of our heritage; and

Whereas, Today when we face the prospect of the international Olympic Games being held in Nazi Germany, a government which has violated every sound principle of democracy and religious freedom, we are aghast and we cannot without protest countenance the prospect of the sullyng of American athletic traditions by co-operation amid surroundings where athletes are discriminated against on the basis of race or creed; and

Whereas, Jew, Catholic and Protestant have known the bitter barbs of Nazi hate; free labor and people who would cherish democratic government have been persecuted; young men and women of all these groups find themselves discriminated against in athletics in Nazi Germany; and

Whereas, We feel that to participate in such an atmosphere would be a prostitution of American athletic traditions which recognize honest athletic skill, regardless of color, race, religion or politics; therefore, be it

RESOLVED by the City Council of Providence, That the American Olympic Committee be and it is hereby requested to withdraw all teams from the United States of America from participation in the Olympic Games to be held in Berlin in 1936; and be it further

RESOLVED, That in the event of the formal participation of any teams from America in these games, that the Providence athletes be requested to refuse to participate in any trials to become members of any Olympic team; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Clerk of the City Council be and he is hereby directed to send copies of this Resolution to the American Olympic Committee, and the National Amateur Athletic Union.

Smith, two hundred ninety-one and eighteen one hundredths (291.18) feet to an angle in said proposed new westerly line of Reservoir avenue at point marked "H" on said condemnation plat, thence continuing northerly making an exterior angle of $170^{\circ} 03' 20''$ and bounding westerly in part on land now or formerly of Providence Buick Company, Inc., in part on land now or formerly of Packard Motor Car Company of Boston, in part on land now or formerly of Columbus Park Realty Corporation, and in part on land now or formerly of George P. Said parcel contains 15,728 square feet of land.

The Board of Contract and Supply is hereby further authorized as a part of any such agreement made by it to sell to the owner or owners

thereof any and all improvements upon the premises to said owner or owners and is also authorized, as a part of any such agreement, to convey to the owner or owners thereof any excess land which said City may acquire by reason of said condemnation from such owner or owners.

The Joint Standing Committee on City Property is hereby authorized and directed to collect all rents or other charges for the occupancy of any and all lands or premises condemned pursuant to the provisions of this Resolution, and to sell at public auction or private sale in its discretion any and all improvements on said premises which have not been sold to the owner or owners thereof as a part of a settlement agreement as hereinbefore provided.

No. 368. An Ordinance in Amendment of and in Addition to Chapter 524 of the Ordinances Approved September 27, 1926, Entitled "An Ordinance Respecting the Construction, Repair, Maintenance and Removal of Buildings and Other Structures Within the City of Providence."

(Approved December 7, 1935.)

It is ordained by the City Council of the City of Providence as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 34 of Chapter 524 of the Ordinances approved September 27, 1926, entitled "An Ordinance respect-

ing the construction, repair, maintenance and removal of buildings and other structures within the City of Providence", is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 34. Parapet Walls. The height of a parapet wall shall be determined as the vertical distance from the roof line where it intersects the exterior wall to the top of the coping or cap covering the parapet wall.

"The minimum height of a parapet wall for any building shall be one (1) foot.

"The maximum height of a parapet wall for a wooden building shall be four (4) feet.

"The maximum height of a parapet wall for a masonry building shall be six (6) feet.

"Parapet walls not over four (4) feet in height may be built continuous. If over four (4) feet high, such walls shall have such openings or means of access to the roof as the Inspector may deem necessary for fire fighting purposes.

"Parapet walls shall in all cases be built integral with the main wall of the building and shall be self-supporting without external braces or supports of any nature.

"Parapet walls on masonry buildings shall be built of masonry at least eight (8) inches thick. All such walls shall be coped with metal covered wood, stone, terra cotta, or other material satisfactory to the Inspector."

SEC. 2. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

SECTION 1. Sec. 4 of Chapter 60 of the Revised Ordinances of 1914, entitled "Signs" as amended by Chapter 268 approved October 9, 1920 is hereby further amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 4. No sign shall, or shall be permitted to, extend or project over any such sidewalk, which does not relate exclusively to the occupation or use of, or the business conducted on, the adjoining premises. No sign shall extend or project out beyond the street line more than seventy-five per centum of the width of the sidewalk immediately beneath, provided, however, that in no event shall any such sign extend or project out beyond such street line more than nine feet; except in the case of a sign erected upon any shelter canopy or marquee constructed and maintained according to law over any sidewalk, in which case such sign may extend the width of such shelter, canopy or marquee. In every case the lower edge of the sign shall not be less than ten feet above every part of the sidewalk immediately beneath, except that the lower edge of any sign which does not extend out more than two feet over the sidewalk immediately beneath may be not less than eight and one-half feet above every part of the sidewalk immediately beneath."

SEC. 2. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

CHAPTER 915.

No. 370. An Ordinance Providing for the Issue of Highway Bonds.

(Approved December 7, 1935.)

It is ordained by the City Council of the City of Providence as follows:

SECTION 1. The City of Providence will issue the bonds of said City to the amount of nine hundred thousand (\$900,000.00) dollars, designated as "Highway Loan" as follows: six hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$650,000.00) under and by virtue of the authority granted by Chapter 1973 of the Public Laws of Rhode Island, approved April 1, 1932 and two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000.00) under and by virtue of the authority granted by Chapter 2224 of the Public Laws of Rhode Island, approved April 4, 1935.

SEC. 2. The City Treasurer, with the advice and consent of the Joint Standing Committee on Finance, shall sell and dispose of such bonds at not less than par and accrued interest, if any, and shall receive the proceeds arising from such sale, and said proceeds shall be applied for the purposes named in said Chapters 1973 and 2224 of said Public Laws, or for payment and cancellation of any notes issued thereunder as provided in Chapter 1017 of said Public Laws, passed at the January Session, A. D. 1902, and for no other purpose.

SEC. 3. Said bonds shall be issued in serial form and sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000.00) of such issue shall be payable each year on the first day of January, beginning with the first day of January, 1937, until final payment is made on the first day of January, 1951.

SEC. 4. All bidders for said bonds shall be required to name the rate of interest that said bonds shall bear, but not in multiples of less than one quarter of one per centum. Such rate of interest, when bid, shall apply to the entire issue of said bonds. Said interest shall be payable on the first days of July and January in each year.

SEC. 5. Said bonds shall bear date as of January 1, 1936 and shall be payable yearly as provided in Section 3, and both

principal and interest shall be payable in any coin or currency of the United States of America which, at the time of payment, is legal tender for public and private debts, at the fiscal agency of the City of Providence in New York City, or at the office of the City Treasurer in said City of Providence. Said bonds shall be signed by the City Treasurer, countersigned by the Mayor and City Clerk, and registered by the City Auditor, who shall certify the registry of each bond, and the certificate of the City Auditor that said bonds have been registered by him shall be conclusive evidence that said bonds have been issued as hereinbefore provided.

CHAPTER 916.

No. 374. An Ordinance Providing for the Issue of Emergency Unemployment Relief Bonds.

(Approved December 7, 1935.)

*It is ordained by the City Council of the City of Providence
as follows:*

SECTION 1. The City of Providence will issue the bonds of said City to the amount of six hundred thousand (\$600,000.00) dollars, designated as "Emergency Unemployment Relief Loan" under and by virtue of the authority granted by Chapter 2011 of the Public Laws of Rhode Island, approved February 15, 1933.

SEC. 2. The City Treasurer, with the advice and consent of the Joint Standing Committee on Finance, shall sell and dispose of such bonds at not less than par and accrued interest, if any, and shall receive the proceeds arising from such sale, and said proceeds shall be applied for the purposes named in said Chapter 2011 of said Public Laws, or for payment and cancellation of any notes issued thereunder as provided in Chapter 1017 of

said Public Laws, passed at the January Session, A. D. 1902, and for no other purpose.

SEC. 3. Said bonds shall be issued in serial form and forty thousand dollars (\$40,000.00) of such issue shall be payable each year on the first day of January, beginning with the first day of January, 1937, until final payment is made on the first day of January, 1951.

SEC. 4. All bidders for said bonds shall be required to name the rate of interest that said bonds shall bear, but not in multiples of less than one quarter of one per centum. Such rate of interest, when bid, shall apply to the entire issue of said bonds. Said interest shall be payable on the first days of July and January in each year.

SEC. 5. Said bonds shall bear date as of January 1, 1936 and shall be payable yearly as provided in Section 3, and both principal and interest shall be payable in any coin or currency of the United States of America which, at the time of payment, is legal tender for public and private debts, at the fiscal agency of the City of Providence in New York City, or at the office of the City Treasurer in said City of Providence. Said bonds shall be signed by the City Treasurer, countersigned by the Mayor, and registered by the City Auditor, who shall certify the registry of each bond, and the certificate of the City Auditor that said bonds have been registered by him shall be conclusive evidence that said bonds have been issued as hereinbefore provided.

No. 372. Resolution Appropriating the Sum of \$3,000.00 for Certain Alterations to the Weybosset Street and America Street Comfort Stations.

(Approved December 7, 1935.)

RESOLVED, That the City Treasurer, acting under the direction of the Joint Standing Committee on Finance, be and he is

hereby authorized and directed to borrow from time to time and in such amounts as may be necessary three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00), and to issue therefor the City's notes bearing interest at a rate not exceeding six per cent. per annum, signed by him and countersigned by the Mayor and the Chairman of said Committee on Finance. The money thus obtained shall be exclusively used and expended for establishing and maintaining Public Comfort Stations in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 1376 of the Public Laws, passed by the General Assembly March 29, 1906, as amended by Chapter 596 of the Public Laws, passed by the General Assembly and approved March 8, 1910, entitled "An Act in amendment of Section 1 of Chapter 1376 of the Public Laws, entitled 'An Act authorizing the City of Providence to establish Public Comfort Stations in said City', passed at the January Session, A. D. 1906".

The City of Providence hereby authorizes and directs the expenditure of the money so obtained as aforesaid, and in its behalf authorizes and directs the Joint Committee on Public Comfort Stations to construct a roof over the Weybosset Street Comfort Station and to alter and relocate the entrance at America Street Comfort Station; all substantially in accordance with the plans of the Commissioner of Public Buildings, provided the cost of said construction and alterations shall not exceed the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00), which sum or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated therefor, the same to be charged to the Loan Account for Public Comfort Stations authorized by this Resolution.

No. 373. Resolution to Pay to the Rhode Island Hospital Trust Company the Sum of \$9,691.47 on Account of Duplicate Payment of Taxes.

(Approved December 7, 1935.)

RESOLVED, That the sum of nine thousand six hundred ninety-

one and 47/100 dollars (\$9,691.47) be and the same is hereby ordered paid to the Rhode Island Hospital Trust Company, said sum representing a duplicate payment of taxes for the year 1935 on property owned by the Joseph Banigan Estate and leased by said Rhode Island Hospital Trust Company to the Alice Building, Inc., the said sum of nine thousand six hundred ninety-one and 47/100 dollars (\$9,691.47) having been paid on the same day by both parties.

No. 374. Resolution to Pay to Charles Boedeker the Sum of \$75.00 as Compensation for Injuries and Damages.

(Approved December 7, 1935.)

RESOLVED, That to Charles Boedeker, (Philip A. Gory, attorney), the sum of seventy-five dollars (\$75.00) be allowed, whenever the City shall be released in a manner satisfactory to the City Solicitor of all claims for injuries and damages received by him July 19, 1935, by reason of a defect in the sidewalk adjoining the premises numbered 142-144 Althea Street, said sum to be paid in the ordinary course of payments by the City of Providence, according to the Ordinances governing such payments.

No. 375. Resolution to Pay to Jane T. Langlands the Sum of \$100.00 as Compensation for Injuries and Damages.

(Approved December 7, 1935.)

RESOLVED, That the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) be allowed to Jane T. payments by the City of Providence, according to the Ordinances governing such payments.

SECTION 1. The Mayor of the City of Providence, acting for and on behalf of said City, is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to execute an amendment to PWA Docket No. 6579—High School by adding to the item designated as "Cost of Project" as shown on page 5, Section one of said "Grant Agreement", a copy of which accompanies Chapter 890 of the Ordinances, approved December 7, 1934, the sum of approximately nine hundred thousand (\$900,000.00) dollars, and requesting an additional grant of thirty per cent. of said additional cost, which said amendment is hereby approved and the Mayor is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to submit the amendment to the project, plan and agreement in final form to the Governor of the State of Rhode Island for presentation to the Emergency Public Works Commission for ap-

proval, and the Federal Public Works Administration for approval, and to act for the City in doing all things required by said agreement to be done by or in behalf of said City.

SEC. 2. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

CHAPTER 918.

No. 392. An Ordinance Providing for the Issue of P. W. A. School Loan Bonds.

(Approved December 12, 1935.)

It is ordained by the City Council of the City of Providence as follows:

SECTION 1. The City of Providence will issue the bonds of said City to the amount of nine hundred thousand (\$900,000.00) dollars designated as "P. W. A. School Loan" under and by virtue of the authority granted by Chapter 2078 of the Public Laws of Rhode Island, approved June 29, 1933.

SEC. 2. The City Treasurer, with the advice and consent of the Joint Standing Committee on Finance, shall issue said bonds, or cause them to be issued, from time to time, under the corporate name and seal of the City of Providence to the Board of Commissioners of Sinking Funds, to the Employees' Retirement System of the City of Providence, and to the various trust funds held by the City, at par, for cash, or if the said Joint Standing Committee on Finance shall direct that any part of said nine hundred thousand (\$900,000.00) dollars in bonds should be sold at public sale, then any premium arising from the sale of said bonds shall be applied to the payment of said bonds in the order of their maturity; and when issued the full amount of said bonds shall be applied for the purpose of fulfill-

ing an agreement entered into between the City of Providence and the Federal Government in conformity with Title II of the National Industrial Recovery Act, approved June 16, 1933, and in conformity with application (P. W. A. Docket Number 6579 as amended) made by the City of Providence for a grant from the Federal Government to aid the City of Providence (Providence County, Rhode Island) in financing a project consisting of the construction of two fire-proof Senior High School Buildings, one Senior High School Building on the Mount Pleasant avenue site in said City of Providence and one Senior High School Building on the Hope Reservoir site in the City of Providence.

SEC. 3. The cash received from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in a special bank account or accounts in a bank or banks which are members of the Federal Reserve System on the following basis:

(a). Of the total amount of nine hundred thousand (\$900,000.00) dollars, six hundred and thirty thousand (\$630,000.00) dollars shall be placed in said special account or accounts subject to withdrawal only in payment for the City of Providence portion of cost of said two fire-proof Senior High School Buildings.

(b). Of the total amount of nine hundred thousand (\$900,000.00) dollars, two hundred and seventy thousand (\$270,000.00) dollars shall be placed in a special bank account and designated as an account to pay the first four and one-half years, approximately, interest and principal on the total issue of said nine hundred thousand (\$900,000.00) dollars of bonds.

SEC. 4. Said bonds shall be issued in serial form and thirty thousand (\$30,000.00) dollars of such issue shall be payable each year on the first day of January, beginning with the first day of January, 1936, until final payment is made on the first day of January, 1965, with interest at the rate of three per centum per annum, payable on the first days of July and January in each year.

SEC. 5. Said bonds shall bear date as of January 1, 1935 and shall be payable yearly as provided in Section 4, and both principal and interest shall be payable in any coin or currency of the United States of America which, at the time of payment, is legal tender for public and private debts, at the fiscal agency of the City of Providence in New York City or at the office of the City Treasurer in said City of Providence. Said bonds shall be signed by the City Treasurer, countersigned by the Mayor, and registered by the City Auditor, who shall certify the registry of each bond, and the certificate of the City Auditor that said bonds have been registered by him shall be conclusive evidence that said bonds have been issued as hereinbefore provided.

SEC. 6. The authority herein granted is in addition to and not in substitution for the authority granted by Chapter 892 of the Ordinances approved December 7, 1934.

SEC. 7. Said bonds shall be issued subject to the approval of the Emergency Public Works Commission, as provided under the terms and provisions of said Chapter 2078 of the Public Laws of the State of Rhode Island, approved June 29, 1933.

CHAPTER 919.

No. 393. An Ordinance Providing for the Appropriation of Additional Federal Grant in Connection with PWA Docket No. 6579—High School.

(Approved December 12, 1935.)

It is ordained by the City Council of the City of Providence as follows:

SECTION 1. All sums of money not exceeding two hundred

and sixty-three thousand (\$263,000.00) dollars that shall accrue to the City of Providence by and under a signed and executed agreement by and between the City of Providence and the Federal Government as represented in an application (PWA Docket No. 6579) of the said City of Providence for a grant from the Federal Government to aid in financing a project consisting of the construction of two fireproof Senior High School Buildings, all in conformity with Title II, National Industrial Recovery Act, be and the same is hereby appropriated for the sole purpose of fulfilling the terms of said agreement.

SEC. 2. This authority is in addition to and not in substitution for the authority granted by Chapter 891 of the Ordinances, approved December 7, 1934.

SEC. 3. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

No. 394. Resolution Authorizing the City Treasurer to Borrow the Sum of \$130,000.00 for the Additional Cost of the Sewage Disposal Plant.

(Approved December 12, 1935.)

RESOLVED, That the City Treasurer acting under the direction of the Joint Standing Committee on Finance be, and he is hereby authorized, under and by virtue of Chapter 2078 of the Public Laws of 1933, and Chapter 1017 of the Public Laws of 1902, to borrow such sums of money as are necessary, but not in excess of one hundred and thirty thousand dollars (\$130,000.00), and to issue the City's notes therefor at a rate of interest not to exceed four per centum (4%) per annum, the proceeds arising from the sale of said notes to be used for the purpose of paying for the additional cost of the sewage disposal plant being erected by the City of Providence under an amended grant agreement between the said City of Providence and the federal government (P. W. A. Docket No. 1249), and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That any portion of the above sum of one hundred and thirty thousand dollars (\$130,000.00) that shall accrue to the City in the form of a grant from said federal government is hereby appropriated for and shall be exclusively used for the purpose of cancelling an equivalent sum of the borrowing authorized by this Resolution.

No. 395. Resolution Authorizing the Board of Contract and Supply to Award the Contracts Pursuant to Docket No. 1249, Sewage Disposal Plant and Docket No. 6579, Senior High Schools.

(Approved December 12, 1935.)

Whereas, By virtue of an official notification received in letter form from the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works, signed by the State Director for Rhode Island and Connecticut, for the Administrator of said Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works, notifying the City of Providence that amendatory grant agreement will be sent to the City of Providence in the very near future increasing the amount of the grants that would accrue to the City of Providence under Docket No. 1249—Sewage Disposal Plant and Docket No. 6579—Senior High Schools, but that pending the receipt of said amendatory grant agreements no objection would be had by the said Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works to the City of Providence proceeding with the construction work on said projects on the basis of the increase in said grants.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the City Council of the City of Providence hereby authorizes and directs the Board of Contract and Supply to proceed with the awarding of the contracts pursuant to said Docket No. 1249 and Docket No. 6579, subject to the final approval of said contracts by the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works or its representative in Rhode Island.

No. 396. Resolution Creating a Joint Special Committee to Confer with the Finance Committee Relative to New Forms of Revenue.
