Now, Therefore, Be It Ordained by the City of Providence:

Section 1. To defray the expenses of the City of Providence for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1976, the sums of money, or so much thereof, as are authorized by law, indicated in the accompanying schedule, are hereby appropriated for the objects and purposes, and in the amounts expressed therein, provided that payments thereunder shall be subject to the provisions of the Charter of the City of Providence, Chapter 832 of the Public Laws of 1940, enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Rhode Island at its January Session, A.D. 1940, and approved April 26, 1940, as amended, and subject to the provisions of the City Ordinances relative to the expenditures of money from the City Treasury. Title I Revenue Sharing, Fiscal Assistance to State and Local Government rules and regulations shall govern the portion of this Budget so designated.

Sec. 2. All moneys appropriated are to be expended under the direction of the respective department heads unless otherwise provided, subject to the approval of the Director of Finance. All moneys specifically earmarked with Federal Revenue Sharing Funds shall be so provided unless amended. Any unused Federal Revenue Sharing moneys not appropriated or not used shall not revert to surplus; but shall be reappropriated in the following fiscal year.

Sec. 3. The payments to the School Fund of the following estimated receipts, included in the appropriation of \$34,029,492.00 for the support of the Public Schools for the City of Providence fiscal period 1975-1976, will be increased or decreased to conform with the actual amounts received from such sources during the City of Providence fiscal year 1975-1976.

An Ordinance Establishing a Compensation Plan for the City of Providence and Repealing Chapter 1975-21, Approved August 9, 1975, as Amended.

Be it ordained by the City of Providence:

Section 1. The following Compensation Plan is hereby adopted as the official Compensation Plan for all City Officials and Workers Services and shall be applied to positions in the service as hereinafter provided. Each salaried position is placed in one of thirty-five "Pay Grades" each of which contains five "Steps" in order to provide for periodic increases. Sec. 2. The minimum rate of pay for any class of position shall be payable to any person on his first appointment to the position allocated to the class, provided however, that with the recommendation of the Director of Finance and approval of the Mayor, he may enter the position at any other step in the "Pay Grade" and pro-

vided further, that if a person already in the service is transferred, he may with the recommendation of the Director of Finance and approval of the Mayor, enter the new position at the same rate of pay as he had previously received.

Sec. 3. Any employees employed in a position allocated to a class carrying minimum and maximum pay rates may be granted a pay increase from one step to the next higher step within established grade, subject to the following:

1. One "Pay Grade" step per year.
2. Recommendations for step increases shall be made by department heads or the Chairman of Bureaus or Commissioners at the time of submission of annual budget estimates, and at no other time. Such recommendations shall be made on the basis of the quality of work and the seniority of individual employees.
3. The Director of Finance shall review such proposed step increases for availability of funds and conformity to the provisions of this Ordinance, and shall recommend approval or disapproval of the increase to the Mayor.
4. An employee entering the city service shall be eligible for a step increase on the first day of the succeeding January, April, July or October next following the completion of twelve months of service by said employee in accordance with the provisions of sub-sections 1, 2, 3, and 5 of this Section.
5. Any employee who is transferred from a position not carrying a minimum and maximum pay rate to one that carries a minimum and maximum pay rate shall receive either his present salary or the minimum salary of the new position, whichever is greater, but in no case shall the new salary exceed the maximum salary of his new position.
6. Increased compensation received by an individual as the result of promotion from a lower to a higher class shall not be deemed a step increase in the sense of the term as used in this

section and in the event of promotion shall automatically receive the minimum salary for the class to which he has been promoted. If such minimum salary is the same or less than the salary he received prior to his promotion, he may receive a salary which shall be one full increment higher than his prior salary, but in no case to exceed the maximum.

Sec. 4. A given rate of pay as expressed in the compensation plan may be commuted to weekly, daily or hourly rate and established by a department head or Chairman of a Bureau or Commission with the approval of the Mayor and the Director of Finance, as the rate of pay for employees of a particular class: provided, however, that all employees of a given class in a given unit of a department shall be paid on the same basis, excepting part-time and temporary employees.

Sec. 5 No Officer or employee of the City shall issue a check for payment of, or pay any salary or compensation to any person holding, or claiming to hold a position in the classified service, unless the Personnel Director shall have first certified that the persons named on the payroll or account of such compensation have been appointed and are employed in accordance with this Ordinance.

Sec. 6. Chapter 1975-21 of the Ordinance approved August 9, 1975 with all amendments thereto is hereby repealed.

Sec. 7. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage and shall be retroactive to July 1, 1975.

An Emergency Ordinance Authorizing the City Council of the City of Providence, Rhode Island, to File an Application for Funding Under the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, for Funds for the Community Development Block Grant Entitlement Funds for the Fiscal Year, 1977.

Be It Ordained By The City of Providence:

Whereas, The City of Providence is eligible to receive Community Development Block Grant Entitlement Funds for the Fiscal Year, 1977 under Section 106 (a) or (h) of Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, (Public Laws 93-383), and

Whereas, The said Application for Funding shall be filed with the Department of Housing and Urban Development, not later than April 15, 1976.

Section 1. The City Council of the City of Providence, County of Providence, State of Rhode Island, hereby authorized the City of Providence, through its official representative, the Mayor, to file an application for Community Development Block Grant Entitlement Funds for the fiscal year, 1977, under Section 106 (a) or (h) of Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, (Public Laws 93-383) to do all acts necessary to successfully acquire said funds.

Sec. 2. All monies received by the City of Providence from the federal government under the provisions of Section 106 (a) or (h) of Title I of the Housing and Community Development

Act of 1974, (Public Laws 93-383), shall be expended in accordance with the provisions of said Act and shall be by Ordinance of the City Council. The Citizens Advisory Committee may comment on the plan for expenditure of funds so received. The City Council will consider the views of the Citizens Advisory Committee but it shall retain to itself the final approval for the expenditure of funds. No funds received under said Act shall be allocated for specific projects nor expended without the approval of the City Council.

Sec. 3. The Mayor and City Council may require any and all information relative to the expenditure of Community Development Act funds and at any time conduct investigations pursuant to the existing provisions of the City Charter, and shall require that all employees of the said program shall be qualified electors and residents in the City of Providence, Rhode Island.

Sec. 4. Upon the written request of the City Council of the City of Providence, Rhode Island, names, addresses and salaries of all personnel engaged in this program shall be submitted to the said Council.

Sec. 5. There shall be submitted to the City Council and the Citizens Advisory Committee by the Finance Director of the Community Development Act, on a monthly basis a line item budget showing (a) Project Account, (b) Amount budgeted, (c) Amount expended, (d) balance.

Sec. 6. The Mayor shall submit to the City Council and the Citizens Advisory Committee on

a Quarterly basis a narrative progress report on each program including supporting data.

Sec. 7. The Mayor shall be responsible for negotiating all contracts with outside agencies subject to approval by Ordinance of the City Council.

Sec. 8. Amendments to the Community Development Program during the program year necessitating the reallocation of funds or the designation of new activities shall be subject to at least one Public Hearing, review by the Citizens Advisory Committee and final approval by Ordinance of the City Council.

Sec. 9. This Emergency Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage by the City Council.

COUNCILMAN GORODETSKY: I would like to ask that my next remarks be included in the Journal of Proceedings. This Ordinance has problems, legal in nature, and sometimes difficult when you are faced with that kind of a matter to vote on. A close examination of it indicates conflicts of a legal nature which I don't really like to vote for. I feel, however, there isn't much choice. I certainly do not wish to see a valuable program for our City be crushed.

The reason I have asked that my remarks be included in the Journal, is so that when the vote is announced, I feel confident that all of my fellow council people will vote for this as well. At least it has been transmitted from the Committee with the recommendation it be passed. I intend to vote in favor of passage. but I did not wish the Journal of Proceedings to show my vote of "Aye" without the clear explanation that I definitely am not in favor of many of the provisions contained in this Ordinance as it is presented.

COUNCILMAN GARAN: I would also like my remarks included in the Journal of Proceedings. I would like to take this opportunity to commend the Chairman of the Committee, Ralph Fagnoli, who put in a great deal of work in examining the program and making up the Ordinance, above and beyond committee meetings. He put in a

great deal of time in this Ordinance, attending numerous meetings, and I have looked it over and I am an Attorney and am satisfied with the way he brought it out. I think it follows federal guidelines quite adequately and gives the Councilmen some say in the running of this program, which they should have.

When Councilman Fagnoli originally began the work of looking into this program, he came under some criticism in the Journal, an editorial, he came under a great deal of fire, as to what direction he was going, but when all was said and done, the Councilman knew what the people in his district wanted.

I think the people of Mount Pleasant have clearly vindicated the Councilman on his views of the program. There is a lesson to learn, that lesson is that the elected representatives of the people are the ones that know the needs of the people. The appointed officials serve a function in the City Government also, they work very diligently; but the elected representatives of the people have a greater sensitivity to what the feelings of the people are and the results of Councilmen Fagnoli and the Committee's work on this program show that the Council must play a role in this program, if it is to be worthwhile in this City.

COUNCILMAN MANSOLILLO: Last Thursday at a meeting of the Committee on Urban Redevelopment, Renewal and Planning, I voted against recommending this Ordinance for passage by the full City Council. I rise this evening to note I will be voting in favor of it, although I am a little confused at some of the language of the Ordinance where it relates to the Administration of the program and the Council's part in that process.

I expressed my thoughts to the Committee. Initially I was concerned with the administration, as the Mayor has not been given an opportunity to inspect the contents of the proposed Ordinance when presented to us by our Committee Chairman, Ralph Fagnoli, and as I have in the recent past, been concerned about the communication between the Council and the Mayor, I re-

main concerned about that and feel as though we both, the Executive and Legislative branch of Government in Providence, need to resolve the constant conflict in relation to communicating our positions in the proper form since we are elected public officials and duly responsible, as Councilman Garan pointed out for the welfare of the City.

So just to reiterate my position, it was, as my brothers and sister on the Committee know, I voted negatively on recommending passage of this Ordinance. I feel as though, given the fact that we must accomplish action on this before April 15th, and given the fact there are serious questions in relation to the Council role as I see in the administration of the program, despite this, I am voting for passage of the Ordinance.

COUNCILMAN FARGNOLI: I would like to say a few words, the reason why that section was put into our Ordinance was because the Council should have an input and if you people have been reading the papers and following the Community Development Program, you know it has been mismanaged by the Committee and the people running the program, not the Mayor, it is the people.

There has been money given away, any way they want, and without qualifications. It has been poorly managed and with the City Council having an input, we can put our heads together and make sure it goes to the right place. As to legal points, I spent six months speaking to HUD in Boston and Washington, and know the guidelines of what to put in and do not have to be a lawyer to do so.

COUNCILMAN LYNCH: I would like to commend my colleague, Councilman Fargnoli, for the hard work he has put into the consideration of this program. Councilman Garan struck it on the head when he talked about placing some of the burden upon the elected officials of the thirteen wards. The way this was passed last year, and it was incorrect in Resolution form, what

was included was perhaps wrong. We talked to the Department of Housing and Urban Development and they said it was something that had to be handled locally. Mayor Cianci felt it gave him carte blanche authority. I don't think this is what HUD had in mind at all.

The City Council always controlled the purse strings in the City of Providence and should, whether it be federal, state or City funds. For us to have the experience to attend the meetings, such as we did, in our neighborhood and have people come in from outside the neighborhood and tell our constituents what to do in the neighborhood, the Council are the elected representatives and are the closest to the people in the thirteen wards. Already they are fighting as to where the \$210,000 that was proposed to use for a recreational gathering facility is to be spent.

My point and Ralph's is that we feel out of this multi million dollar expenditure, some should be spent in all areas of the City. We do not feel that because our constituents do not want the facility, we should lose the money. We are going to make every effort to make sure the money stays in the Mount Pleasant area and Elmhurst area for improvements for playground, park, and recreational facilities.

COUNCILMAN CROWLEY, in appreciation, rises to thank the City Council for being so good to him during his recent illness.

COUNCILMAN HENRIES requests and is granted the Privilege of the Floor and makes the following remarks:

"I would like to make a few comments in reference to an article in the Evening Bulletin, Tuesday, April 6 1976 pertaining to the opposition to the spending of Community Development money for a community center in the Mount Pleasant section of the city.

On that evening, reference was made to "undesirables" and "troublemakers" going into that area. Some of the people attending that meeting have given the impression that there are no un-

desirables or troublemakers residing in the Mt. Pleasant section of the city and that they are isolated from such people.

It is true that there are some objectionable residents who live in the South Providence area as it was suggested that evening, but also there are some that live throughout the city, state, county and world — and also in Mount Pleasant. Undesirables and troublemakers have no criteria to meet. They are not bred exclusively in less affluent areas; they come from families with in any level of income.

If it is fear, as the article states, that is depriving the youngsters of Mt. Pleasant from having a community center, then I believe that the adults of that area need to again sit and reevaluate their decision of last Monday.

Undoubtedly, there are young people in Mt. Pleasant who wish to avail themselves of a community center. I suggest that the Community Development money earmarked for that center be divided equally among the other neighborhood community centers that will be providing the recreation services for the young people of Mt. Pleasant."
