P R E F A C E.

This work has been heretofore published at periods varying from two to three years, that being as often as it was found to pay. But our population is now more than three times as large as it was when we commenced the work, in 1824; and from the rapid sale of the two last editions, and from other considerations, we are induced to prepare a new edition for 1853-'54. We shall make it an annual publication hereafter, should the public sustain us. In the mean time we will remark, that we shall spare neither labor nor expense to make the work as accurate as possible.

That the city of Providence, with a population of 47,000 inhabitants, will not annually sustain a work so necessary, and indispensable as this, we will not believe. Very few places in New-England have increased in wealth and population as rapidly as we have for the last ten years; and we are probably increasing as fast at the present moment as at any former period, and must continue to increase, so long as our diversified manufacturing interests are sustained, or our citizens preserve their indomitable energy of character.

OUR STREETS.—We think it must have been apparent to all who have had occasion to pass our most frequented streets, that we greatly need new or enlarged avenues to the central portions of our city. The early founders of the town probably thought but little of the convenience of their posterity; and under the peculiar and trying circumstances in which they were placed, it is not strange that it should

have been so. And although "there remains yet much land to be possessed," or built upon in the suburbs, it must be confessed that the central portions of the city are getting to be much crowded. Among the streets on the East side which are often blocked up by the numerous vehicles continually passing, may be mentioned Market square, North and South Main, South Water and Canal streets. On the West side, Westminster, Broad, Dorrance and West Water. The latter certainly might be greatly improved by cutting off the East end of Union Block and removing Mason's store. And Dorrance street, if carried through to Exchange street, would also be a very great improvement. These alterations, we understand, are in contemplation, and it is certainly "a consummation devoutly to be wished," that they may be speedily accomplished. As land and buildings must be bought, the sooner it is done, the better, as property wanted for public uses, was never yet, we believe, known to fall in value.

To his brethren of the press, who have at different periods kindly noticed the work, he would return his hearty thanks; and hopes the present and future numbers (should he be spared to issue them,) may be found still more worthy of their commendation.

The kind-hearted will find a *Benevolent*, and the friendly a *Friendship* street. In memory of the benefactors of the town, we have *Brown*, *Butler* and *Dexter* streets, and of early distinguished settlers, a list of near a hundred, too numerous for insertion here. From the names of trees, we have *Cedar*, *Cherry*, *Cypress*, *Elm*, *Hickory*, *Foy*, *Larch*, *Lime*, *Lemon*, *Linden*, *Maple*, *Myrtle*, *Mulberry*, *Oak*, *Orange*, *Olive*, *Pine*, *Spruce*, *Sycamore*, *Vine*, *Walnut*, *Willow* and *Woodbine*. Among distinguished revolutionary names, we have *Washington*, *Adams*, *Lafayette*, *Franklin*, *Jefferson*, *Greene*, *Warren*, *Monroe*, *Barlow* and *Olney*; and of those of a later period, *Webster*, *Harrison*, *Perry*, *Polk*, *Pierce*, &c. Of party names, *Federal* and *Republican*. Those discontented would do well to remove into *Content* street, and the wretched into *Happy* street; while the fractious should keep clear of *Cross* street, the thirsty should repair to *Well*, to *Fountain* or to *Brook* street; those who are cold should go to *Furnace* street; the contemplative to *Elm* grove, to *Fields*, to *Forest*, or to *Meadow* street. Those who would cross the river must not take *Ferry* street. The vegetarian will supply his simple wants in *Garden* street. The gentle should fly to *Dove* street, and the bold to *Eagle* street. The desponding should remove to *Hope* street, and the oppressed to *Liberty* street. Some would prefer *Back* street to *Front* street, while the difficult would not live in any *Common* street, though they might like *Pleasant* street. Of the benefactors of the town, we preserve the names of *Butler*, *Brown* and *Dexter*. To those in pursuit of learning, we recommend *College* street, to legal gentlemen *Blackstone* street, to those wishing legal advice, either *Carpenter*, *Rickmond*, *Whipple*, *Burrill*, *Burgess*, *Pratt*, *Dwight* or *Hopkin* streets. Those seeking pure air should ascend to *Mountain* street, while the meek should descend to *Valley* street. Those partial to the English would of course choose *Victoria* street, while the son of Erin would rejoice in *Shanrock* street. Those partial to Indian names would prefer *Mohawk* alley or *Tippicanoe* street. Those of high and aspiring notions would select *Prospect* street, where they might look down on thousands below them, while some, still more aspiring, would never be satisfied till they reached *Planet* or *Star* streets. The Friends are well represented by *Penn*, *Army*, *Meador*, *Tobey*, *Congdon*, *Anthony*, *Holden*, *Lockwood* and *Harkness* streets. Three of the seasons are remembered in *Spring*, *Winter* and *Summer* streets. Those partial to a cold climate, may choose *Greenland* street, while those who prefer a hot one can select *India* street. The ambitious will choose *Power* street, and may perhaps aspire to *President* street. The devotional can be accommodated with either *Church*, *Chapel* or *Meeting* streets; while those grasping for large territories, will seize *America* or *Asia* streets. Our boys will find their own names, as *John*, *James*, *Francis*, *William*, *George*, *Thomas*, &c. while our young children, in their earliest lessons of *A B C D*, are beginning to repeat the names of our streets.

HISTORICAL.

A friend has put into our hands the *American Journal and General Advertiser*, of April 22, 1779, published by Southwick & Wheeler, of this town, from which we make a few extracts, for the amusement of our readers.

By advices received from Boston, since our last, we learn, that the Continental frigate Warren, John Hopkins, Esq. Commander, arrived there from a short cruize of five or six weeks, Friday afternoon last. Capt. Hopkins, in company with the Continental ships of war *Queen of France*, Capt. Joseph Olney, and *Ranger*, Capt. Simpson, has taken, during his cruize, a fleet of eight sail of vessels, bound to Georgia, with provisions, &c. for the enemy's army in that quarter. viz The armed ship *Jason*, fitted at New-York, as convoy to the fleet, of 20 guns and 150 men; the armed ship *Maria*, of 16 guns and 84 men; the privateer schooner *Hibernia*, of 8 guns; the brig *Patriot*; the brig *Prince Frederic*; the brig *Bachelor*; the brig *John*; and schooner *Chance*. On board the *Maria* were 1800 barrels of flour, and accoutrements complete for a regiment of light horse.

The above fleet had on board a Colonel Campbell, a Hessian Colonel, a Major, several Captains, and a number of other commissioned officers, about 20 in the whole, whom Capt. Hopkins brought in with him.

By a gentleman who left Boston Tuesday evening last, we are informed, that the ship *Jason*, and four other of the above prizes are arrived safe in port.

The armed ship *Putnam*, of Connecticut, has taken and sent in to a safe port, the privateer sloop *Hunter*, of 8 guns, fitted out at New-York.

Extract of a letter from an officer of high rank, dated

"Camp, Middlebrook, April 12.

"Yesterday General Sullivan arrived in camp. The last accounts from the Southward were favorable; the enemy's force on the decline, and ours increasing rapidly. Count de Estaing has received a large reinforcement of ships and land forces. 'Tis to be hoped he will give Byron a severe drubbing; we expect the Minister of France in camp every hour. He is one of the politest men you ever saw."

Extracts of two letters from a gentleman in Philadelphia, dated March 28th and 29th.

"Herewith I send you two or three of our latest newspapers, and a pamphlet published by the Council, in the case of General Arnold. I assure you the General is not looked upon in a very favorable point of light. I am told *blacker* charges, with full proofs, will shortly appear: if so, you may expect a copy. Last week he purchased an elegant seat, four miles from this city, for which he gave \$20,000."

PETITION FOR A DIVISION OF PROVIDENCE, 1770.

To the Honorable General Assembly, to be held at South-Kingstown on the last Monday of February, 1770.

The humble Petition of a number of Freemen and others, living in that part of the Town of Providence which lieth on the west side of Weybosset Bridge, sheweth;—

That the inhabitants in that part of the town amount to the number of about twelve hundred, among whom are at least one hundred freemen, altho it is but a few years since building houses took place there. As the Point (so called) was very uneven, the water very shoal on that side, and a want of fresh water in a great part of it, tradesmen chiefly fixed themselves there. However, by diligence and industry, they surmounted many difficulties to effect a settlement. They levelled several hills, which stood in their way, filled up sunken and low places, laid out and made divers commodious streets and lanes, and extended their settlement to the degree in which it appears at this day; and have reason to hope that with a blessing on their future industry they will in a few years become very populous. They further shew, that even at this time there are but a few merchants among them, their situation rendering mercantile affairs more difficult to be pursued than mechanic business and manufactures, for which reason they suppose the population of the Point was delayed until tradesmen unable to purchase places or fix themselves on the other side (a part of the town taken up by merchants and traders) became so numerous that they sat down on the Point (called Weybosset) which altho it was within the jurisdiction of the town, was not considered as belonging to the compact settlement, or in any measure convenient for trade.— Besides, Nature herself hath interposed and divided them from the old settlements by an arm of the sea, so that altho they be near, they are absolutely detached from them. Besides this detachment formed by Nature, the interests, views and occupations of the inhabitants on either side of the water, and their modes of getting a living are so distinct and different, that an united force of the whole for public service can never be expected; divisions and contentions must forever ensue in any corporate body in a case like this.

Furthermore, the petitioners beg leave to remark that they have in many instances been aggrieved by their powerful neighbors on the other side of the Bridge, the particulars whereof they forbear to mention, from a tenderness to them, and love of that union and harmony which ought if possible to be kept up in every community. They are sorry that the views on each side are so incompatible as to oblige them to give this information, as they should be very glad to harmonize with the other and larger parts of the town, if it could be done consistant with their interest and natural rights.

The following selections, from ancient files of newspapers, were published in the PROVIDENCE DIRECTORY for 1830. As a new generation has arisen since that period, it is believed their republication at this time cannot fail to prove interesting. They are well worthy of preservation.

PROVIDENCE, JUNE 20, 1768.

On Tuesday morning last, the Eastern post brought the very interesting and important intelligence that the State of New-Hampshire had adopted the proposed Constitution, whereby the structure of the National Government was completed, and the Federal Edifice firmly established on nine glorious pillars. The joy of the people burst forth like a blaze, catching from breast to breast, till it pervaded the whole town, and it was impossible to restrain the most public testimonials of

their satisfaction. All the bells were set a ringing, and continued the joyful peal with but short intermissions, through the day. At 12 o'clock, a salute was fired by the United train of artillery on Federal Hill, in honor of the States which had adopted the Constitution, which was several times repeated in the course of the day. All the schools were dismissed for the day, and general gratulations diffusing the most sincere jousiance among all ranks, succeeded. The *evening*, and several of those who have heretofore appeared against the Constitution, now heartily joined in the general joy, which soon extended itself to the far seats of the Muses on College Hill, when the scholars, with their books under their arms, unanimously joined in a solemn procession, and *peripatetically* and philosophically, in honor of the day, named the beautiful green round the College, the Federal Parade. The town of Providence is truly federal, and as the new Constitution will in its operation and consequences be more especially beneficial to this State than to any other in the confederacy—it is hoped the people thereof will soon be so convinced of it as to call a Convention, agreeable to the recommendation of Congress, for adding the Rhode-Island Pillar, which, though amongst the smallest, may yet be considered as not the least deserving, when a little more of its seeming Anti-federalism shall be rubbed off, and its genuine and intrinsic worth appear.—*Prov. Gaz.*

From the same, of June 27, 1768.

At a general and very respectable meeting of the inhabitants of this town, convened pursuant to notice given, in order to collect their opinions as to the most eligible mode of commemorating the anniversary of Independence, and of celebrating the auspicious event of the adoption of the Federal Constitution by nine States, it was voted,

1st. That the Hon. Jabez Bowen, Esq. be chosen Chairman of this meeting.

2dly. That the erection of the Ninth Pillar of the Federal structure, and the anniversary of American Independence be celebrated on Friday next, the 4th of July; and that an entertainment be prepared on said day, for as many of our fellow citizens as will honor it with their presence.

3dly. That Capt. Paul Allen, Mr. Thomas L. Halsey, Mr. Thomas Jones, Mr. Jeremiah F. Jenkins, and Mr. Robert Newell, be a committee to procure by subscription the necessary funds for providing the supplies and defraying incidental expenses.

4thly. That the aforesaid committee, together with Col. Zephaniah Andrews, Col. Daniel Tillinghast, Col. Christopher Olney, Deacon James Green, Joseph Martin, Esq., Col. Wm. Russell, Col. Joseph Nightingale, Mr. George Benson, Mr. John Mason, Mr. Joshua Hacker, Welcome Arnold, Esq., Dea. Barzillai Richmond, Dea. Samuel Nightingale, Col. Levi Hall, Col. John Whipple, Mr. Aaron Mason, Major Charles Keen, David Howell, Esq. and Major James Burrill, be a committee to superintend and direct the business of the day; and that they also designate the place of celebration, after agreeing with the owners of the soil.

5thly. That the Rev. Enos Hitchcock be requested to deliver an oration, or discourse, suitable to the occasion, at the Baptist church, at half past ten o'clock, A. M.

6thly. That the Rev. Clergy be requested to attend at the entertainment; and that the Chairman, Nicholas Brown, John Jenckes, and Joseph Martin, Esqrs. be appointed a committee to wait on the Clergy with this request.

7thly. That the committee for purchasing supplies and superintending the business of the day, direct what articles and supplies shall be procured for the entertainment.

8thly. That John Brown, Benjamin Bourne and Theodore Foster, Esqrs. be appointed a committee to prepare an invitation to the inhabitants of town and country to attend on the occasion, and partake in the festivities of the day, and cause said invitation to be inserted in the newspapers.

9thly. That said last mentioned committee be requested to give particular invitation to his Excellency the Governor, his Honor the Deputy Governor, and the Assistants, to honor the day with their presence.

10thly. That the United Company of the Train of Artillery, commanded by Col. Daniel Tillinghast, be requested to usher in the day with a discharge of cannon, and to cause the other necessary frings on the occasion.

PROVIDENCE, JULY 5, 1768.

In pursuance of the intention mentioned in our last paper, yesterday was celebrated as a festival in this town. At the moment of sunrise commenced a discharge of thirteen cannon. At 11 o'clock, a very numerous assembly attended at the Baptist meeting-house, for the purpose of religious exercises and hearing an oration delivered by the Rev. Mr. Hitchcock. The oration was

preceded by a prayer by Dr. Manning, and followed by another by the Rev. Mr. Snow. Some select pieces of music were interspersed, and well performed, instrumentally as well as vocally, in the latter of which, some female voices added inimitable grace; and the Rev. Mr. Stanford dismissed the assembly by a very pertinent and solemn benediction.

The oration was full of manly eloquence and learning—on the late Revolution—the state of public affairs, and the New Constitution, together with the ratification thereof by NINE STATES. The most profound attention marked at once the abilities of the speaker, and the politeness of the audience.

About 2 o'clock, the procession was formed and moved to Federal Plain, where the entertainment was provided. The fall of rain just at that time detracted somewhat from the intended regularity of the procession; but the rain fortunately ceasing, the people partook of the repast at a table upwards of a thousand feet in length, the whole overspread with a canopy of canvass. Two well fattened oxen had been provided for the occasion, one of which was roasted whole, besides hams, wine, punch, &c. &c. The number of people who partook of the entertainment was not accurately ascertained, but was estimated to be between 5 and 6000, many of them from remote parts of the State, and some from the neighboring States. Fortunately, no accident took place to mar the felicity of the day, every countenance beaming with heart-felt joy, which discovered itself also, by repeated huzzas and acclamations during the time of drinking the toasts.

About 6 o'clock, the people retired from the plain to the State House parade, and after thirteen cheers, returned to their several homes with decency and order. The following toasts were drank, under a discharge of thirteen cannon:

1. The Congress.
2. Our great and good ally, Louis XVI. and the other friendly powers of Europe.
3. His Excellency George Washington, Esq.
4. His Excellency John Adams, Esq. late Minister at the Court of London.
5. The brave Officers and Soldiers of the late American army.
6. The memory of the Heroes who have fallen in defence of American liberty.
7. The memory of General Greene.
8. Agriculture, Manufactures and Commerce.
9. The virtuous daughters of America.
10. A speedy coalition of parties, in pursuit of the public good.
11. May the United States enjoy freedom, under a just and efficient government.
12. Liberty and happiness to all mankind.
13. THE DAY.

The celebrity of the day was heightened by the attendance and alertness of the United Company of the Train of Artillery, under the orders of Col. Tillinghast, who closed the celebration by a discharge of thirteen cannon from Federal hill.

[At the time the preceding article was published, it was probably deemed best to make no allusion to a very unpleasant circumstance connected with the celebration. Some three or four hundred men from the country, of the anti-federal party, which then had the ascendancy in the State, appeared near the ground, under arms, and threatened an attack. A committee of citizens was delegated to meet and remonstrate with them—the difficulty was compromised, and the enemy quietly withdrew, and left the citizens to enjoy their feast.]

ARRIVAL OF GEN. WASHINGTON IN PROVIDENCE, AUGUST 13, 1790.

On Wednesday, about 4 o'clock, P. M. arrived from New-York, in the packet Hancock, Capt. Brown, the President of the United States, with his Suite, accompanied by Gov. Clinton of New-York, Thomas Jefferson, Esq. Secretary of State, Theodore Foster, Esq. one of the Senators from this State, Judge Blair, Mr. Smith of South Carolina, and Mr. Gilman of New-Hampshire, members of Congress. A procession was formed agreeable to a previous arrangement, and the President escorted to his lodgings at Mr. Daggett's.

[Here follows the order of procession.]

The arrival of Capt. Brown, at the entrance of the harbor, was announced by the discharge of a cannon from Federal Hill, when the procession was formed at the south end of the town. On the President's landing, he was welcomed by a federal discharge of cannon and the ringing of bells. The concourse of people was prodigious. The procession was conducted with great decorum, and exceeded anything of the kind before exhibited in this town.

All ages, classes and sexes, were full of sensibility on this joyful occasion. The brilliant appearance of the ladies from the windows was politely noticed by the President, and gave animation to the scene. On the President's arrival at Mr. Daggett's, another federal salute took place, and after three cheers, the procession

retired. On the evening of the same day, the President and many others took a walk on the College green, to view the illumination of that edifice, which was done by the students, and made a most splendid appearance.

On Thursday, in the forenoon, the President, accompanied by the gentlemen who came passengers with him, and many of the citizens, walked through the principal streets, to view the town, in the course of which they were escorted to the College by the Students, and by Dr. Manning introduced into the College Library and Museum, and afterwards went on board a large Indiaman on the stocks, belonging to Messrs. Brown & Francis.

At 3 o'clock, an elegant entertainment was served in the Court House, for upwards of 200 persons—and many toasts were drank under discharges of cannon. At the close, the President gave as a toast, "The Town of Providence"—rose from the table, and went immediately on board Capt. Brown's packet, for departure. He was attended by a very numerous procession, which returned to Gov. Fenner's, and after three cheers, dispersed in good order.

It may be proper to remark, that no untoward accident took place—that every countenance indicated the most heart-felt joy, and that we have reason to believe the President was perfectly satisfied with his reception.

The following addresses were presented on Thursday:

To the President of the United States.

SIR—We, the inhabitants of Providence, beg leave to offer you our congratulations on your safe arrival in this place.

We are sensibly affected by the honor conferred on the State, and on us in particular, in the present visit; and be assured, Sir, we shall think ourselves peculiarly happy, if by your utmost attentions, it can be made agreeable to you.

We gladly seize this first opportunity to express the most sincere satisfaction in your election to the Presidency of the United States. The unbiassed voice of a great nation, which unanimously called you to that important trust, is an event of which the annals of history affords no example; nor will future times see it followed, unless the most transcendent merit and the clearest fame should be united in the same person.

As General of the armies of the United States, and as their President, we are attached to you by every motive of gratitude and affection. To the conduct and magnanimity of her Commander in Chief, uniformly displayed in the course of a long and arduous war, America is indebted, under the smiles of heaven, for her freedom and independence: And the consummate prudence and ability, manifested by the exercise of the powers delegated to the President of the United States, exhibit to the world a character of no less celebrity in the cabinet than in the field.

From our most excellent Constitution, and the benign influence of those virtues which characterize your administration, we entertain the most pleasing hopes of the extension of Commerce, the encouragement of Agriculture and Manufactures, and of the establishment of public faith, and private credit; and that the liberties of America will be transmitted to very late posterity.

We ardently pray that a life so conducive to the welfare of millions, may be long preserved, and that, when the fatal shaft shall be sped, which will deprive America of her great Benefactor, you may ascend those regions where only exalted virtue will be fully rewarded.

Done in Town Meeting, legally assembled, this 17th day of August, 1790, and in the fifteenth year of Independence.

THE PRESIDENT'S ANSWER.

To the Inhabitants of Providence.

GENTLEMEN—The congratulations which you offer me, upon my arrival in this place, are received with no small degree of pleasure. For your attentions and endeavors to render the town agreeable to me, and for your expressions of satisfaction at my election to the Presidency of the United States, I return to you my warmest thanks.

My sensibility is warmly excited by your ardent declaration of attachment to my person, and the Constitution.

As, under the smiles of Heaven, America is indebted for freedom and independence rather to the joint exertions of the citizens of the several States, in which it may be your boast to have borne no inconsiderable share, than to the conduct of her Commander in Chief—so is she indebted for their support rather to a con-

tinuation of those exertions, than to the prudence and ability manifested in the exercise of the powers delegated to the President of the United States.

Your hopes of the extension of Commerce, the encouragement of Agriculture and Manufactures, and the establishment of the public faith, as reared upon our Constitution, are well founded; and it is my earnest wish that you may extensively enjoy the benefits arising from them.

I thank you, gentlemen, for your prayer for my future welfare, and offer up my best wishes for your individual and collective happiness.

THE ADDRESS OF THE CORPORATION OF RHODE-ISLAND COLLEGE.

Sir—Though among the last to congratulate you on your advancement to that dignified and important station to which the unanimous voice of a free country has called you, the Corporation of Rhode Island College claim to be among the first in warmth of affection for your person, and in esteem for your public character. In placing you at the head of the United States, regard was had no less to the influence of your example over the morals of the people, than to your talents in the administration of government. Happy are we to observe that similar motives have influenced your conduct in filling the lower offices in the Executive Department. We most devoutly venerate that superintending Providence, which in the course of events propitious to this country, has called you forth to establish, after having defended, our rights and liberties.

Agitated in the hour of doubtful conflict, exulting in your victories, we watched your footsteps with the most anxious solicitude. Our fervent supplications to Heaven, that you might be furnished with that wisdom and prudence necessary to guide us to freedom and independence, have been heard and most graciously answered.

For the preservation of this freedom, one great object still demands our peculiar attention—the education of our youth. THE PRESIDENT'S ANSWER.

To the Corporation of Rhode-Island College.

GENTLEMEN—The circumstances which have, until this time, prevented you from offering your congratulations on my advancement to the station I hold in the government of the United States, do not diminish the pleasure I feel in receiving this flattering proof of your affection and esteem; for which I request you will accept my thanks.

In repeating thus publicly, my sense of the zeal you displayed for the success of the cause of your country, I only add a single suffrage to the general testimony, which all who were associated with you in the most critical and doubtful moments of our struggle for liberty and independence, have constantly borne in your favor.

While I cannot remain insensible to the indulgence with which you regard the influence of my example, and the tenor of my conduct, I rejoice in having so favorable an opportunity of felicitating the State of Rhode-Island on the co-operation I am sure to find in the measures adopted by the guardians of literature in this place, for improving the morals of the rising generation, and inculcating upon their minds, principles peculiarly calculated for the preservation of our rights and liberties. You may rely on whatever protection I may be able to offer, in so important an object as the education of our youth.

I will now conclude, gentlemen, by expressing my acknowledgments, for the tender manner in which you mention the restoration of my health on a late occa-

sion; and with ardent wishes that Heaven may prosper the literary Institution under your care, in giving you the best of its blessings in this world, as well as the world to come.

GEORGE WASHINGTON.

The members of the Society of the Cincinnati who were in town, waited upon the President on Thursday, and by his permission were introduced by Col. Olney, who verbally addressed him to the following purport:—

Sir—I have the honor to wait upon your Excellency with the members of the Cincinnati of the State of Rhode-Island, assembled on this happy occasion, to pay their respects to you in person, and to congratulate you on your safe arrival in this town; wishing you the enjoyment of health, and prosperity in the government over which you preside. As many of the gentlemen have not the honor of a personal acquaintance with your Excellency, with your permission, Sir, I will introduce them.

To which the President was pleased to reply:—
“It gives me great pleasure to see so many of my old military companions, on the present occasion, and I shall be happy to take them by the hand.” After a particular introduction, the President expressed the most sincere wishes for their health and prosperity.

The President afterwards embarked on board Capt. Brown's packet, for New-York.

YELLOW FEVER IN PROVIDENCE IN 1800.

The inhabitants were greatly alarmed by the prevalence of Yellow Fever, which commenced August 15, and continued till Oct. 5. Forty-one persons died, and a considerable number recovered. The disease was confined entirely to the south part of the town, to a distance “not more than two hundred yards in extent,” while every other part of the town enjoyed unusual health.

The sum of \$2000 was raised in Philadelphia, “for the use of the poor of Providence and its districts, who suffered by the fever,” which sum was duly received.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS IN PROVIDENCE.

These invaluable institutions were commenced on the last Monday in October, 1800. The first measures taken for their establishment, were introduced in the Select Committee of the Providence Association of Mechanics and Manufacturers.

“Death loves a shining mark, a signal blow,

On the day succeeding this meeting, the town were called to, gather on this mournful occasion, when it was voted and resolved unanimously, that Tuesday the 6th inst. be set apart for humiliation and mourning, on account of the death of the late General GEORGE WASHINGTON.

Voted, That Col. Nathan Fisher, Col. Henry Smith, Major Robert Taylor, Major Amos Maine Atwell, Cols Jeremiah Olney, John Whipple, Christopher Olney, Charles Lippitt, Esq. and Mr. Jeremiah F. Jenkins, be a Committee of Arrangements.

Voted, That it be recommended to the inhabitants to shut up their shops, and abstain from their secular affairs on said day, and that they also wear a badge of mourning on the left arm until the 22d day of February next.

Agreeably to the foregoing resolutions, and according to arrangements previously made by the joint committee, at 10 o'clock A. M. on Tuesday last, a procession was formed in Broad-street, in the following order:--

Col. Smith's Light Dragoons, with Standard and Music in mourning.

Col. Howell's Independent Volunteers, with Standard in mourning.

MASONIC LODGES.

Mount Vernon Lodge, St. John's Lodge, Royal Arch Chapter.

Each member wearing his jewels; emblems and standards bore the badges of sorrow appropriate to the Craft. To the memory of their beloved Brother, the GRAND MASTER of the United States, was exhibited a striking and affecting emblem of his dissolution. Four Children, sons of a Mason, dressed in white surplices, with white helmet caps and plumes, the initials G. W. in front, bore a small Bier, covered with a white pall, edged with black, on which was placed an Urn, covered and festooned in black, with waving black plumes on the top. On the pedestal was inscribed, "Sacred to the Memory of our beloved Brother, GEORGE WASHINGTON." Over it was extended a handsome Arch, with this inscription in front; "Holiness to the Lord;" on the reverse, "Temple of Virtue, Seat of Masonry." The Arch was supported by two Knights Templars, and preceded by the Standard of that order. Two Standards of white, trimmed with black, were displayed, on which were written the cardinal virtues of Masonry, "Faith, Hope, Charity," also the characteristics of Masonry, "Wisdom, Strength, Beauty."

CITIZENS.

The solemn day was announced at sunrise, by the discharge of 16 cannon, in quick succession, from Col. Fisher's artillery. The muffled bells tolled a solemn knell. At 11, the procession proceeded from Broad street to the house of Col. Jeremiah Olney, where the Bier was taken up, when it moved, in slow march, to solemn music, to the Baptist meeting-house. The military in front halted, and opened to the right and left, with arms reversed, and leaning on their arms. The procession moved through, the music playing a dead march. The whole having entered the house, and the audience composed, the Throne of Grace was addressed by the Rev. Stephen Gano, in a style at once impressive and affecting. An elegant and pertinent Oration was then pro-

nounced by Col. George R. Burrill. A funeral anthem, sung by the united choirs of the several religious societies, solemnized the heart to all the tenderness of woe. The meeting-house exhibited such affecting testimonials of affliction, as were highly calculated to impress the mind with seriousness and solemn veneration. The pulpit was entirely covered with black, with the addition of a mourning-piece in front, representing a pedestal and urn, with three angels over it, as guarding the *richest dust of America*; the pedestal inscribed with this motto, "*Sacred to the Memory of the illustrious WASINGTON*;" under it the following lines;—

"Glory with all her lamps shall burn,
And watch the Warrior's sleeping clay,
Till the last trumpet rouse his urn,
To aid the triumphs of the day."

The canopy over the pulpit was shrouded and the curtains at the windows were overhung with black. The chandelier was also elegantly ornamented with the habiliments of mourning. On the galleries and urns were likewise exhibited the emblems of sorrow. On the south side of the pulpit a stage was erected, covered with black, for the accommodation of the four little masters who accompanied the procession, who surrounded the urn placed thereon. Their deportment during the solemnization was highly becoming, and much beyond their years. The design, which was highly emblematic, greatly increased the solemnity of the scene.

On no occasion do we recollect observing so crowded and attentive an audience. The solemnity of the scene pervaded every heart. The exercise being finished, the procession formed as before, and marched to solemn music to the Episcopal Church, where the Bier passed through the ranks of the military, leaning on their arms reversed, into the church-yard. A solemn funeral dirge was played on the organ, as the Bier was set down, after which the service was pronounced by Rev. A. L. Clarke.

A detachment of the troops concluded the last funeral honors, by firing three volleys. The Bier then passed under the Masonic Arch, and was deposited under the church. The procession returned to Col. Olney's, to the tune of the President's march, with drums unmuffled. The whole were then dismissed. The Masons returned to Masons' Hall, and deposited the Urn, as a monument to their deceased Brother. Minute guns were discharged during the march of the procession, and half hour guns until sunset. The bells tolled their solemn peals until nine at night. The colors of the shipping in the harbor, and the large standard at the bridge, were hoisted half mast.

The transactions of the day were conducted with the utmost order and regularity. They were evincive of the grateful remembrance of HIM, who was "first in war, first in peace, and first in the hearts of his countrymen."

From the United States Chronicle of January 22, 1801.

FIRE.—Yesterday between the hours of 9 and 10 in the morning, this town was alarmed by the cry of fire;—it was breaking

out in Mr. John Corlis's large new store on his wharf, and was soon at such a fearful height that no exertions could stop the destructive progress; the wind was fresh at N. W. and the fire continued to rage with unabated fury until past 2 P. M. in which time the following dwelling houses, stores, &c. were totally destroyed, viz. The store in which the fire was first discovered—the large stores adjoining, the property of the heirs of the late Welcome Arnold, Esq.—the large and elegant seat of Thomas Lloyd Halsey, Esq. (late the property of Mr. Sterry) with the extensive range of stores, &c. back of it—the large brick house late Col. Nightingale's, with stores, &c. on the wharf—that very large store lately built by Messrs. Clark and Nightingale—the house, stores, &c. belonging to Col. Jeremiah Olney, (late Gov. Cooke's)—Capt. Daniel Bucklin's house, out-houses, &c.—the houses, stores, &c. belonging to Messrs. Moses Eddy and Brothers, Mrs. Arnold's, &c. On the east side of the street, a large house the property of Mr. Joseph Peck—Mr. Nicholas Power's house (occupied by Miss Power)—Mr. William Harding's house, &c. Mrs. Hull's house, &c. Mr. Corlis's house was on fire several times, but by the unemitted exertions of the inhabitants, was saved.

The damage cannot at present be estimated—but must be very great. Indeed the town of Providence never before, by this destructive element, suffered a loss which will bear any comparison with this. It is not yet ascertained how the fire originated. As the ruins were burning all last night, a strong military patrol was appointed, who attended that duty.

The late freshet has occasioned a greater loss of property, and more real distress, than any event of the kind, in this vicinity, since its first settlement. It began to rain the night of Friday the 13th inst. and continued with but little intermission till Sunday morning. The two expensive bridges across Seekonk river were entirely carried away; all the bridges across Pawtucket river, as far up as we have heard from, are impassable; and, except at Pawtucket Falls, and Martin's Way, about six miles above Pawtucket, are chiefly destroyed. Several valuable mills and Iron works on that river have been also destroyed, particularly two mills at Woonsocket, belonging to James Arnold, Esq. and the Iron-works belonging to Stephen Jenckes, Esq. a little above Pawtucket Falls. Two of the bridges over Moshassuck river, in this town,—half the bridges at Pawtuxet, and several other bridges and dams across Pawtuxet river, are carried away. Great exertions are making to replace nearly all the bridges, as soon as the season will admit, as the public in general, and this town and vicinity in particular, are greatly incommoded by the almost entire interruption of communication. Few scenes could equal in grandeur and sublimity the appearance at Pawtucket Falls during the whole of Sunday. The quantity, descent and rapidity of the water, sweeping before it the huge rocks of the abutment of the bridge; the houses, stores and iron-works, with their foundation that stood in its way, and swallowing the whole in the turgid gul.

below, filled the mind with astonishment, and excited the highest degree of reverence and awe towards the Being who governs the elements, and holds the mighty waters as in the hollow of his hand. No sooner had the water abated, than a scene of horror and dismay succeeded. In the midst of the pleasant village of Pawtucket, and in the place where many industrious and thriving men had been constantly employed in the iron-manufactories, not a trace was left of house or shop. The very earth was gone, and the solid and cragged rock alone was left unmoved.

WAR.—On Wednesday evening last, the President's Proclamation was received in this town. The bells of the several houses of worship tolled during the greater part of yesterday, the shops and stores were generally shut, and the flags of the shipping at the wharves, as well as that on the Great Bridge, were displayed at half mast. Every thing wore the aspect of mourning, expressing the feelings of our citizens upon the great national calamity which has befallen us.

FIRE.—On Tuesday morning last, between the hours of 3 and 4, the inhabitants of this town were alarmed by the cry of fire. It proved to be in the large and elegant church belonging to the Benevolent Congregational Society, which, notwithstanding the animated exertions of the citizens, was entirely consumed. A part of the organ, the clock, and some other articles, were preserved. There is no doubt but the fire was occasioned by an incendiary, supposed with an intention to destroy the town; and indeed had it not been for the favorable circumstance of a continued shower of rain, it is supposed his diabolical wishes might have been gratified. We are sorry to state that the Rev. Mr. Edes, the worthy Pastor, was injured, though not seriously, by the fall of a piece of timber.

Since writing the above, two men have been taken up and confined, who are strongly suspected of being the incendiaries.

[A reward of \$500 was afterwards offered by the Town Council, for the discovery of the incendiary, but without success.]

PEACE.—It is with the most lively and heartfelt satisfaction, that we have it in our power this week to announce the joyful news of a TREATY OF PEACE, on honorable terms, having been concluded between the American and British Commissioners, on the 24th of December last; which glorious news was received in this town on Monday afternoon last, and was immediately announced by the firing of cannon and ringing of bells. In the evening a partial illumination took place; and on Tuesday evening, the town was most splendidly illuminated, in testimony of the joy of the inhabitants. Never before, we believe, has the town of Providence exhibited signs of such sincere and universal pleasure, as were witnessed on the receipt of the intelligence. With sincere gratitude we would exclaim, *Laus Deo.*

AWFUL STORM.—It devolves upon us, and we exercise it as a melancholy duty, to present to the public a brief and general account of the awful storm which was so severely experienced in this town, on Saturday last. We are aware that a more minute and circumstantial narrative will be expected from those whose province it is to "note the passing tidings of the time;" but let it be remembered that imminent danger precludes nicety of remark, and diversity of ruin forbids accuracy of calculation. Those who had no property to lose, had *household treasures* to save, and we may be allowed to say that the preservation of the objects of human affection is more important than the rescue of goods and chattels. Whether we consider the violence of the late storm, or the desolation which ensued, we do not incur the hazard of contradiction in pronouncing it the most sublime and tremendous elemental strife that has been witnessed for centuries by the inhabitants of this town. It seemed as if He, who "rides upon the whirlwind and directs the storm," had permitted sea and air to combine their strength and terror, to give us an impressive assurance of His power, to humble our pride and to discipline our affections. "The angry spirit of the waters" rose in might and majesty, and the productions of nature and the fabrics of art were the victims of his fury.

A storm of rain from the N. E. commenced on Friday last, and continued with little intermission till Saturday morning, when the wind was from the East. Between 8 and 9, however, it shifted to the S. E. and continued to blow with increasing violence till half past 11, when suddenly changing to the West, the progress of the calamity we now deplore was happily staid. The tide rose to an unprecedented and terrifying height, [12 feet higher than spring tides] and inundated the streets in various parts of the town. It extended in Westminster street a considerable distance beyond the Theatre [where Grace Church now stands.] The lives of many families, particularly on the West side, were in imminent danger. Consternation and dismay were depicted in every countenance—all were eager to fly, but knew not where to find an ark of safety. Vessels were forced into the streets and threatened destruction to the surrounding buildings. Women and children were rescued from chamber windows, and men were seen buffeting the torrent in the streets, to save a friend, or secure an asylum.

Weybosset Bridge was entirely carried away about 10 o'clock.

Every vessel in port, with two exceptions, were driven from their moorings. Thirty-five sail, including 4 ships, (one of them over 500 tons) 9 brigs, 7 schooners, and 15 sloops, now form a melancholy dismantled line at the head of the Cove. One of them drifted within the limits of North-Providence, and, strange as it may appear, Pleasant-street is the anchorage ground for a burdensome sloop.

Our wharves, on which were stored the riches of every clime, exhibit the most sad and repulsive aspect. Scarcely a vestige remains of the stores (many of them very spacious) which crowded

the wharves bordering on Weybosset street. Most of those south of the Market House to India Point, shared a similar fate.

Many of our streets, but a few days since the theatre of virtuous and prosperous enterprise, are almost barricaded by an accumulation of lumber, scows, boats, &c. and peopled by busy sufferers, who are anxious to identify, reclaim and preserve their property.

The sufferings and losses of the inhabitants at Eddy's Point were very severe. Several dwelling houses were carried away, while others were divested by the pitiless storm, of every article of provision, clothing and furniture.

The damage sustained at India Point was very extensive. The valuable distillery there is rendered inoperative for many months.

Mill Bridge, at the North end, is rendered impassable for any but foot passengers; and the upper works of the Bridge at India Point are entirely gone.

The *third* story of the Washington Insurance Office, occupied by the Mount Vernon Lodge, was much injured, being perforated by the bowsprit of the ship Ganges, when she rushed with impetuosity up the river. This handsome building was otherwise, but not materially, injured.

The Rev. Mr. Williams' meeting-house, situated in a very exposed place, received considerable injury, and had the tide continued to rise for a few minutes longer, must inevitably have swelled the catalogue of devastation.

The Second Baptist meeting-house, injudiciously located near the water, was totally destroyed by the winds and waves, and the relics are now to be seen in our streets.

The elegant fence which encloses the First Baptist meeting-house was injured in several places by the fall of surrounding poplars; but, to the astonishment of every one, the magnificent spire of that superb edifice still towers sublime.

We do not learn that any other public buildings have sustained material damage.

Chimnies, trees, fences, &c. were prostrated in every direction.

We are happy to state that amid this war of elements and wreck of matter, only two persons were lost—Mr. David Butler and Mr. Reuben Winslow, who were unhappily drowned at India Point.

It is computed that Five Hundred Buildings of various descriptions have been destroyed.

The loss consequent upon this sad calamity is estimated at a million and a half of dollars.

We forbear, on the present occasion to name a single sufferer, as every one must directly or indirectly participate in a calamity so extensive. Many poor men have lost their all—the thrifty tradesman, who, but a few days since, had opulence and eminence in perspective, beholds himself all but a bankrupt—and the wealthy merchant feels that his losses must teach him prudence, even in the dispensation of his charities.

ARRIVAL OF THE PRESIDENT.—On Monday evening last, about half past 8 o'clock, his Excellency the President of the U. States, [Monroe] arrived here in the steam boat Firefly, accompanied by the revenue cutter Vigilant, Capt. Cahoon and the U. States schooner Lynx. On landing at the wharf of Gen. Carrington he was received with every demonstration of regard by the Town's Committee, and a large number of citizens, escorted by the four independent military companies selected for the purpose, and a numerous procession of citizens, to his lodgings at Chappotin's Hotel, which had been prepared in the most elegant and commodious manner for his reception. Although it had been expected that his Excellency would arrive in the afternoon of that day, accordingly no preparations had been made for an illumination, many of the houses in the streets through which he passed were brilliantly lighted up and exhibited a very handsome appearance; and as he passed through our streets, he was greeted by the firing of cannon, the ringing of bells, and the display of our national flag at different parts of the town, as well as on board the vessels in the harbor. On arriving at his lodgings, he was several times cheered by the citizens, and appeared to reciprocate the joy which was expressed on every countenance, by repeatedly bowing to those who had assembled opposite the Hotel, for the purpose of testifying their regard and attachment to the Chief Magistrate of the U. States. On the next morning a large number of our citizens and other gentlemen who had arrived here, were introduced to his Excellency, after which he mounted on horseback, and took a view of the town, accompanied by Mr. Mason, his private Secretary, Com. Perry and Gen. Swift, and by a considerable number of our most distinguished citizens on horseback, and appeared much pleased with the situation and general appearance of the town. He visited Brown University, and was received with politeness by the government and students of that Institution. He left town about 11 o'clock, A. M. and was escorted to the line by the Independent Company of Light Dragoons, of this town, the Smithfield and Cumberland Light Dragoons, and a numerous cavalcade of citizens. On arriving at Pawtucket, he visited the Cotton Manufacturing establishments at that place; he then reviewed the troops at Seekonk and Wrentham, and dined at the latter place, and arrived at Dedham the same day, where he lodged. On passing the line at Pawtucket, he was received and welcomed by Col. Sumner, Aid to General Brooks, and in all the different towns in Massachusetts through which he passed, was received with the greatest respect and attention.

When formed in line, General Lafayette and Suite, preceded by the Chief Marshal and Aids, the Committee of Arrangements, and followed by the carriages of the Town Council and Cincinnati, will pass through the line to the State House, where he will be received by the Aids of the Governor, and conducted to the Senate Chamber, and be received by His Excellency the Governor, in behalf of the State.

The Committee will then conduct him to Horton's Hotel.

The bells will commence ringing when the signal guns are fired, and will continue to ring, until he reaches the State House.

The United Train of Artillery, Colonel Hodges, and the Marine Artillery, Col Stewart, are detached for the purpose of firing salutes, the latter on the arrival of the General at the line of the town; the former on his arrival at the State House.

Col. Hodges will be stationed on Prospect Hill; and Col. Stewart at the Dexter Training Ground.

The Town Council will receive the General at the line of the town.

The Committee respectfully invite the citizens to co-operate in the preceding arrangements, and suggest the propriety of attending strictly to the above regulations, as it will be impossible to move with ease and convenience, unless aided by all the community.

A delegation from the Town Council and their associates of the Cincinnati, composing the General Committee of the town of Providence, was despatched towards Hartford on Friday, with a view of meeting the General, and tendering him the earnest wishes of the inhabitants, that he would honor them with a visit. On Sunday morning, it was feared by the General Committee, that from a change in the General's expected route, their delegation might not be able to see him until he should have arrived in the State, and two gentlemen were despatched on the other two different roads to Connecticut, with similar instructions to those of the first Committee, the return of which gave information that the General, in company with the first Committee, was at Eaton's in Plainfield, and would proceed into town in the course of the forenoon of Monday. Early on that morning, says the American of yesterday, (to which paper we are indebted for all of the following account, for which credit is given by quotation marks) "the troops and citizens were in readiness to meet him, and the western road was lined with citizens, crowding towards the point where the reception was to take place. Every horse and vehicle in the town appeared to be in requisition, and the windows on the streets through which the General was to pass, were thronged with females, waiting to greet the Nation's Guest. The Governor's Aids proceeded as far as Fish's Hotel, where they met the General and were introduced by the Committee who had attended him from Connecticut. Colonel Mullett, the senior Aid, in a short Address, expressed the satisfaction they felt at the honor of the introduction, and the earnest wish of the Executive to welcome the General in his own, and in the name of the State. To which the General replied in a warm and concise manner. He was then conducted to the carriage provided for him, by the Governor's Aids, and accompanied by them until he reached the line of the town, where the military were drawn up, and an immense concourse of citizens on foot, mounted, and in carriages, were waiting his arrival."

The Town Council and their associates received the General about 12 o'clock, at the line of the town, where he alighted, and was addressed by Col. Carlile, acting President of the Council, and Chairman of the General Committee, as follows:

Sir—The General Committee, consisting of the Town Council of the town of Providence, and the members of the State Society of Cincinnati, who are associated with them in the pleasing duty, beg leave, respectfully to address you: We congratulate you on your pleasant and prosperous voyage across the Atlantic; and welcome you to the American shore and to the town which we represent.

While the friends of liberal principles and good government, in both hemispheres, have abundant reason to be grateful for your disinterested and valuable services in the cause of freedom, the American people are peculiarly indebted to you, for the zeal with which you espoused their cause in the darkest period of their Revolution, and when the hearts of the most sanguine friends of their Independence, were appalled at the dark clouds which were lowering on their political horizon. The hour of calamity is the most certain test of the sincerity of professions. You espoused the cause of America in such an hour; and, parting from the endearments of domestic felicity, crossed the wide ocean and exposed your life in defence of her liberties. Your military career was as brilliant as it was serviceable. The confidence of our beloved Washington was not misplaced, when bestowed on you.

In all the vicissitudes of life; in prosperity and adversity; in every change of the political state of Europe, the affectionate regard of the American people has followed you: the nation will never forget your devotion or your services.

To which address the General made a short, appropriate, animated and affecting reply.

"He was then received with military honors, and conducted to the barouche prepared for his reception, and being seated was greeted with a spontaneous burst of feeling, from the immense concourse of spectators. The procession was then put in motion, agreeably to the order of arrangements; and when formed, extended more than a mile. The General uncovered, rode alone in the barouche, drawn by four white horses, bestowing through the whole march, the most complaisant smiles and greetings on all around; shaking, most cordially, the hands of those who crowded around the carriage and took advantage of every pause in the procession, to obtain the high honor of a grasp of the hand of Lafayette—a circumstance which every citizen will be proud hereafter to tell his children. As the General proceeded up the hill leading from Olneyville, he was again greeted with the shouts of a large collection of citizens, assembled on the high bank directly over the road.

"The Marine Artillery stationed on the Dexter Training Ground, pealed their welcome as he passed, and the General soon entered the populous part of the town. In passing through High and Westminster-streets, and until he arrived at the Court House, he was welcomed by that most expressive token of affectionate interest, the waving of white handkerchiefs by the fair hands of the ladies, who crowded every building from which they could obtain a view of this distinguished personage. Many females, we observed, in the excess of their feelings, suspended this token of welcome, to gaze more intently upon the object whom alone they appeared to see in the whole procession, and many a fine eye was wet with the gush of a tear, which the rush of so many sublime and sympathetic emotions sent warm from the heart.

As those in the rear of the procession descended High-street, the forward view was uncommonly fine. The long procession extending to the bridge, and there apparently lost in an immense

sea of heads, and the reflection that the multitude who had assembled, and the impulses which animated them were all devoted to one man, and that man a private individual, a foreigner, coming among us with a claim upon our gratitude, which the intervention of 40 years, instead of diminishing, seemed to have been collecting in one reservoir of feeling, was calculated to excite emotions which it is as impossible to describe as to forget.

"On arriving in front of the State House, the General alighted and was received in a peculiarly interesting manner. The poplar avenue leading to the building was lined on each side with nearly two hundred misses arrayed in white, protected by a file of soldiers on each side, and holding in their hands bunches of flowers, which (as the General proceeded up the avenue, supported by the Governor's Aids) they strewed in his path, at the same time waving their white handkerchiefs. The General was afterwards pleased to express the peculiar and high satisfaction he took in this simple and touching arrangement.

"On reaching the landing of the stairs, the General turned toward the multitude, and at the same moment, the veteran Captain Stephen Olney (who served under the General repeatedly, and was the first to force the enemy's works at Yorktown, in which he was seconded, at another point, almost simultaneously by Lafayette) approached the General, who instantly recognized his old companion in arms, and embraced and kissed him in the most earnest and affectionate manner. A thrill went through the whole assembly, and scarcely a dry eye was to be found among the spectators, while the shouts of the multitude, at first suppressed, and then, uttered in a manner tempered by the scene, evinced the deep feeling and proud associations it had excited.

"The General was then conducted to the Senate Chamber, where he was appropriately introduced to his Excellency, the members of the Committee, Town Council, &c.

"After this ceremony, he came below, and there in the most familiar manner shook the hands of a number of ladies and gentlemen. Among the rest, the venerable William Russell, now in his 85th year was introduced to him. The General shook both the veteran's hands in a most affectionate manner, and in an announcement, that slightly marked a foreign accent, said he was extremely happy to take his old friend by the hand once more, as it recalled to his memory the delightful associations of his youth. Mr. Russell appeared at first scarcely to comprehend the scene, but in a moment, as if the whole had rushed upon his recollection, he exclaimed in a voice broken by age and still more subdued by feeling, "Oh, my dear Marquis, how happy I am to see you once more! I remember well the time I served under you as a volunteer on Rhode Island!" The General was evidently touched, and on this, as on several other occasions, the tear started to his eye. He then proceeded on foot to the accommodations provided for him, and after entering the Hotel appeared on the piazza and was greeted in the warmest manner. For nearly two hours, he stood in his apartment and in the most affable manner received the congratulations of every individual who chose to be introduced to him.

"After dinner, in company with the Town Council, &c. the General prepared to proceed on his journey.

"At about half-past four, the troops (at the particular request of General Lafayette, who expressed his admiration of their discipline, and military appearance) were drawn up for review, in a line extending on the street toward Pawtucket. The General then proceeded on foot, and was greeted on entering the street, with the same joyous acclamations. Supported by the arm of the Governor, he walked in front of the line of troops, stopping to shake hands with all the principal officers. On arriving at the extreme wing, he halted, and his carriage was drawn up for his reception. Here the Chief Marshal expressed very appropriately, the gratitude of himself and his fellow-citizens for the honor conferred on the town by his presence, and assured the General, (who expressed his particular thanks to the Chief Marshal for his kind attentions, and his warmest and most respectful gratitude to the people for the highly gratifying testimonials of affection they had shown him) that the obligation was entirely on the side of himself and his fellow-citizens.

"His Excellency also addressed the General, and assuring him of his high consideration for his character, and the peculiar satisfaction he had enjoyed in the interview, took his leave for the present, hoping to have the honor of soon paying his respects to him again. The General, with much feeling, reiterated his grateful acknowledgments to his Excellency and to the citizens, and assured him he should soon embrace another opportunity to visit the town. He also

begged the Governor to convey his most respectful thanks to all who had done him so much honor. He then entered the carriage accompanied by his Excellency, Colonel Bowen, and Zachariah Allen, Esq., and amid the cheers of the populace, left the town. He was escorted into Massachusetts by the Cincinnati, &c. and a numerous company of citizens on horseback and in carriages (many of whom accompanied him to Boston) where he was received by the Boston Deputation, and conveyed on his route. Much credit is due to the Town Council, the Committees, and the Chief Marshal and assistants, for the prompt and handsome manner they have carried the wishes of the citizens into effect, and the fine military appearance of the troops, and their neat and ready manœuvres, fully justified the compliment bestowed upon them by our distinguished guest.

"The General, on being asked if he was not fatigued with his exertions, promptly replied, that he experienced too much *pleasure*, to find any time for fatigue.

"We are aware, notwithstanding the length of this article, we have omitted many highly interesting circumstances, and in the hurry of composition, may have committed some errors. But the feeling which this event has excited, we are satisfied will be one of the proudest recollections the citizens of the town and of the State can ever dwell upon, and we have the satisfaction of saying, that for our means, our population, and the short notice of the visit of our guest as well as his still shorter stay, no place in the Union can exhibit warmer and more grateful testimonials of their affection for this MAN OF THE AGE, the truly and intrinsically *illustrious* LAFAYETTE."

FIRE OF MAY 21, 1825.

A destructive fire broke out in or near a cabinet maker's shop, occupied by Mr Rhodes G. Allen, at about 11 o'clock, P. M., and before it could be subdued consumed thirteen buildings, one of which was the Universalist Chapel, which cost \$19,000—\$3000 only being insured upon it. Several of the buildings destroyed were dwelling houses.

1827. A Committee was appointed by the town to build the Dexter Asylum, who immediately proceeded to the duties of their appointment, and under whose directions the present capacious building was completed in 1830. This building is 170 feet in length; the centre part is 55 feet deep, and the wings 45 feet. Its cost was \$43,000.

The first public meeting was holden in April, in the First Baptist Meeting House on the subject of promoting Temperance. It was well attended, and addressed by several of the clergy and other citizens. There were several meetings held at the same place by adjournment, at which many appeals were made to the citizens to practice moderation and temperance, but none broached the doctrine of total abstinence. These meetings, however, were the parent of the numerous temperance, total abstinence and cold water societies which now abound here, shedding their benign and healthy influence over the moral atmosphere of the community.

1828. Cove-street was completed, and a new bridge was built, by the Providence Washington Insurance Company, connecting it with Canal street.

1830. Population of the town was 16,543. A proposition for a City Charter failed to procure the number of votes required by the legislature, which was three-fifths of the number of persons voting.

1831. A riot of four days continuance commenced Sept. 21, in Olney's lane, North End. It originated with some sailors and the colored people living in the lane, one of the former being shot by a black man, and instantly killed. An immediate attack was made on the houses, and two were promptly destroyed. Each evening the mob increased in number and violence. The efforts of the Town Council and the Sheriff to suppress it were ineffectual, and the services of the military were called into requisition by the Governor.

On the fourth evening, the corps, near Shingle Bridge, were assailed by the crowd, with stones and other missiles, and were commanded to fire, which they did, and four men fell mortally wounded. The crowd dispersed, and quiet was restored. Nearly twenty small houses had been destroyed or badly injured. At a town meeting, Nov. 23, more than three-fifths of the votes polled were in favor of a City Charter.

The following statistics, copied from an article published in the Daily Evening Transcript, 1845, appear to have been gathered with care, and are interesting as showing the growth of the city and the increase of trade.

In the year 1800, when the first census was taken by act of Congress, the population of the town was 7614.

In 1810,	10,511,	increase	2457	32 per cent.

By a census taken by order of the town in 1825, the population numbered 15,941. On the East side, 8729—West side, 7212.

In the year 1827, the Town Tax was \$40,000, assessed on two thousand persons, and on a valuation of \$6,350,200. Ratio, 63 cents on \$100.

In the year 1844, the Tax was \$66,000, assessed on 3300 persons, and on a valuation of \$22,495,000. Real Estate, 12,167,000; Personal, 10,328,000. Rate, 36 cents on \$100.

The quantity of grain imported into this city in 1830, as reported at the Custom House, was 375,148 bushels. Of flour, the same year, 68,473. Bales of cotton, 46,166

The population of this city in 1850 was 41,513. Gain in the preceding ten years, 18,352, or about 70 per cent. It is believed that our population now is at least 47,000; some estimate it more. The number of dwelling houses in the city in 1850, was 5403, and of families, 7905.

Societies and Institutions in Providence.

BROWN UNIVERSITY.

This institution of learning was founded by the Baptists in 1764. It received its present name in honor of its most liberal benefactor, the late NICHOLAS BROWN, by a vote of the corporation passed September 6, 1804.

The Charter which is now the "Constitution" of Brown University, was granted at the session of the Legislature in February, 1764. This Charter secures to the Baptists forever the government of the College. Some of its provisions are as follows:—"That into this liberal and Catholic institution shall never be admitted any religious tests: but on the contrary all the members hereof shall forever enjoy full, free, absolute and uninterrupted liberty of conscience: And that the places of Professors, Tutors, and all other officers, the President alone excepted, shall be free and open for all denominations of Protestants: And that youth of all religious denominations shall and may be freely admitted to the equal advantages, emoluments, and honors of the College or University."

The Corporation for the regulation and government of the University, consists of two branches; "that of the trustees and that of the Fellowship." There are thirty-six Trustees, and twelve of the Fellowship, including the President. Of the Trustees, twenty-two by the Charter, are to be Baptists, five of the denomination called Friends, or Quakers, four Congregationalists, and five Episcopalians. Of the Fellows, eight are to be Baptists, "and the rest indifferently of any or all denominations." The President must be a Baptist. "The instruction and immediate government of the College," says the Charter, "shall forever be and rest in the President and Fellows, or Fellowship."

In 1850 material changes were made in the system of instruction at Brown University; the range of studies was greatly extended; and the sum of \$125,000 raised by subscription, mostly among the citizens of Providence, was added to the College funds.

FIRST GRADE. There are now established in the City *twenty-two Primary Schools*. These schools are designed for pupils from five years of age to six or seven, according to their advancement in learning. Each school is under the immediate government and instruction of two female teachers—a Preceptress and an Assistant, and usually contains about one hundred and thirty pupils. The teachers in these schools, besides teaching the elements of *Reading, Spelling, and Arithmetic*, give their pupils much oral instruction of a familiar kind, suited to their age, with daily exercises in *Vocal Music*.

SECOND GRADE.—There are *sixteen Intermediate Schools* established for children from six to eight or nine years of age, including those that were formerly in the first classes in the Primary Schools, and those in the lowest classes in the grammar Schools. Each of these schools usually contains about one hundred and twenty pupils, who are under the instruction and management of two female teachers—a Preceptress and an assistant. The scholars in these schools advance progressively to more difficult lessons in *Reading, Spelling, and Arithmetic*, and begin to take lessons in *Writing and Geography*. *Vocal Music*, in these schools is taught by a *professional Teacher*, employed by the School Committee.

THIRD GRADE. *Seven Grammar Schools* are now established in the City, for the instruction of scholars from eight or nine years old to twelve or fourteen. Each Grammar School, except the one for colored children, usually contains upwards of two hundred pupils, who are under the government and instruction of a Master and three Female Assistants.

In these schools the scholars use a new set of text books, which present more enlarged and accurate views of the branches they have already begun, and in these books continue their exercises in *Reading, Spelling, Writing, Arithmetic and Geography*, and commence *English Grammar, the History of the United States and General History*. Instruction in *Vocal Music* is given in these schools, and also in the High School, by a professional Teacher.

FOURTH GRADE. The High School with two departments—one for boys and one for girls. Each department will accommodate one hundred and twenty pupils—making two hundred and forty in the school. The full course of studies in this school occupies *three years*, and in accordance with this arrangement the boys are divided into three classes of forty each, and placed in separate rooms, under the government and instruction of a Master. The girls are also divided into three classes, and each class placed in a separate room, under the care and instruction of a Mistress. The course of studies in each department is adapted to the conditions of the pupils in after life, each sex pursuing all the common branches alike, but the boys taking the more scientific course, and the girls the more literary. The art of drawing is taught in both departments by a professional Teacher.

No Evening schools were kept last winter.

NORMAL SCHOOL.

The last autumn a Normal School was established in the city of Providence, by Messrs. Greene, Russell, Colburn and Guyot. The term commenced on the 1st of November, and the school will close

about the 1st of April. Instruction is here given in the modes of teaching, and by the ablest practical teachers. The gentlemen concerned are all distinguished and well known in their several departments. Prof. Greene as a grammarian, Mr. Russell as an elocutionist, Mr. Colburn as a mathematician, and Prof. Guyot in geography.

The school will be opened again the next fall and winter. The success, so far, has equalled the expectations of its best friends. A large number of teachers have been in constant attendance from the commencement.

I have no hesitation in saying that this institution, established under private auspices, is more likely to succeed, more likely to do good, and to realize the proper idea of a Normal School, than any institution established under corporate or State patronage, with permanent officers and fixed salaries, could possibly do. The tendency of the latter is continually to degenerate.—*School Commissioners' Report, 1853.*

TEACHERS' INSTITUTES.

During the past year as in previous years, meetings have been held in different parts of the State, for the gratuitous instruction of those Teachers who attended. These meetings are generally denominated "Teachers' Institutes," and continue for one week. Lectures are delivered upon the various modes of teaching in the different branches of education, discussions are held upon different topics, in which the lecturers and teachers take part, and addresses are delivered to the parents and others who are assembled together, frequently in large numbers, by the interest they excite. The last of these meetings was held at Central Falls, and is considered to have been one of the most interesting and useful ever held in this State.—*School Commissioners' Report, 1853.*

RIENDS' YEARLY MEETING BOARDING SCHOOL.

Established in 1819.

This Institution is under the direction of a committee of the New England Yearly Meeting, who appoint Superintendents and teachers. The number of teachers varies with the number of scholars, who are taught in the various branches of an English education, including the Mathematics, and the Latin, Greek and French languages. Lectures are regularly delivered in Natural Philosophy and Chemistry, illustrated by experiments, and occasionally upon other subjects embraced in the course of study in the school. Through the liberality of a number of its friends, the Institution has recently received a valuable Mineralogical Cabinet.

The whole number of teachers is 8; of scholars, about 155.

DEXTER ASYLUM.

The general superintendence of this Institution is placed in charge of the Mayor and Aldermen, who act as a Board of overseers. They hold quarterly meetings at the Asylum on the first Saturday of August, November, February and May. They also appoint one from their body weekly, to act as a visiting committee for that period, who reports the next succeeding Monday, to the

Board of Aldermen, the state of the establishment during his tour of duty. The immediate charge of the house is in care of a Master and Matron, annually appointed by the Board of Aldermen. The present incumbents are Hollis Chaffin and wife. Divine service is performed at the chapel every Sabbath.

The medical department is entrusted to a Board of Physicians, appointed annually by the Mayor and Aldermen. This Board at present consists of Drs. Collins and Ely, who attend the sick quarterly in succession. In all cases of peculiar interest or difficulty, they meet in consultation—keep a record of sickness, a report of which is made to the Board of Overseers at their quarterly meetings; and also an annual report of the sick during the year, at the meeting of the Board on the first Saturday in August. The number of inmates in the Institution is between one and two hundred.

RHODE-ISLAND STATE PRISON.

Extracts from the Report of the Inspectors of the State Prison, Jan. 14, 1853.

Since the date of the last report, the new wing of the prison has been completed, in obedience to the direction of the General Assembly. It is a neat and substantial structure, well lighted, easily warmed, ventilated, and as secure as any building of this kind can be constructed. It contains 88 cells, which have cost about, \$200 each.

The amount granted by the Legislature for the erection of the prison was \$16,000. There has been received, from the sale of old materials credited to the State, \$177,13. There remains in the hands of the inspectors, \$11,34. There is now due for bills unpaid, \$1,466,58. The total cost of the prison is \$17,632,37, or \$1,632,37 more than the original estimate.

The whole work has been superintended by Abner Peckham, Esq., a member of the Board, who was appointed by his associates to this duty. Mr. Peckham has devoted himself to this labor with great skill, and with scrupulous fidelity. The Board ask that an appropriation of \$500 be made as a remuneration to Mr. Peckham, for his very valuable services. They also ask for an appropriation of \$1,466,58, to pay the bills now remaining due for the construction of the prison.

The amounts received and expended for the State Prison and the County Jail, respectively, are as follows :

The cost of maintaining the State Prison was \$3,834,98; the income from the same was \$2,053,32, leaving a balance of expense of \$1,781,66.

The cost of maintaining the County Jail was \$4,431,16; the income from the same, from all sources, \$832,05; leaving a balance of expense of \$3,589,11.

The Inspectors respectfully request that any part of the State Prison may be used as a County Jail, at the pleasure of the Board.

The health of the prison since the last report has been remarkably good. No case of serious illness has occurred, and most of the disease which has existed has been contracted before entering the prison.

They have purchased a lot on the corner of Friendship and Prince-st. and intend to commence the building immediately. This is the lot formerly occupied by Rev. Dr. Hall's Society as a burial ground, and is eligibly situated on the top of the rising ground in the westerly part of the city. It is expected that the house will be built of brick, in the Norman style of architecture, ninety-two feet long and sixty wide, with a tall steeple.

We learn that the Pine-st. Baptist Church and Society also contemplate erecting a new house of worship, on Broad-street, opposite Chestnut, and are making steady progress in their enterprise. It is expected that the house and lot will cost from 40 to \$50,000.

REPORT TO THE CITY COUNCIL.

TO THE HON. CITY COUNCIL:—

As required by the Ordinance, the undersigned, a Committee appointed by the Board of Firewards, do hereby report the state of the Fire Department for the year ending June 6th, 1853.

There are twelve Engines and twelve Hose Carriages in good order, ten of which are in active service—No. 5 and Hydraulic No. 1, off duty. No. 5 has been off since October last, in consequence of the Company being disbanded by the Board for refusing to do duty; Hydraulic company No. 1, off since the 17th May last, but probably after their election this evening, they will be ready for duty; two Hook and Ladder Carriages, with Ladders, Hooks, &c., one in good order, the other indifferent; Eight thousand three hundred and fifty feet of Hose, about Seven thousand feet of which is in good order, the other indifferent.

The Houses are all in good order, with the exception of No. 4, which is in bad condition. No. 9 is in good order, but too small, and does not compare with Houses recently built.

There are on hand four old Engines, three old Hose Carriages, and a quantity of old Hose.

There have been during the year, sixty-nine fires in the City, by which the loss on buildings amounts to Twenty-eight thousand eight hundred and fifty dollars, (\$28,850,) and on Wares Fifty-seven thousand two hundred dollars, (\$57,200,) making the total loss Eighty-six thousand and fifty dollars, (\$86,050,)—as nearly as could be ascertained—on which there has been Sixty-nine thousand one hundred dollars (\$69,100,) insurance. During the same period there have been twenty-two alarms, which originated out of the City, and fifty-four false alarms, making a total of one hundred and forty-five times the department have been called out. Many of the above fires were barns, and supposed to be the work of incendiaries.

There have been but three fires of importance during the year—the McNeal building, so called, on Exchange Place, October 16th; Almy's cotton waste store-house, on Canal-street, October 23d, and a starch factory, owned by James G. Anthony and others, with a

machine shop unoccupied and a dwelling house, all on Eddy Street. The loss on the three fires was about Thirty thousand dollars—insurance about Nineteen thousand dollars.

The Board would particularly call the attention of your honorable body, to the inefficient supply of water in many locations in the City. On the West side, in the vicinity of Broadway, there is no water at all to be had, and many other locations in the West part of the city are equally destitute. On the East side, at the North end of the city, the supply is very small; also on the hill and over to the East, property is unprotected by water; and as our city is growing more compact, either more reservoirs must be built, or some other plan should be adopted to increase the facilities for water in times of fire.

The Board would also suggest that an Ordinance should be passed, empowering the Chief to sell old Engines, old Hoses, and all other property which is laid aside, unfit for use by the Department.

There are two sessions of the General Assembly held each year, one at Newport on the 1st Tuesday of May, for election and other business, and adjourns to meet at Newport the 2d Monday in June. The other session is on the last Monday in Oct. at South Kingstown once in two years, and the intermediate years alternately at Bristol and East Greenwich; and an adjournment from the Oct. session to be held annually in Providence, in January.

PROVIDENCE YOUNG MEN'S CHRISTIAN UNION.

Constitution adopted April 12, 1853.

The object of this Association, as stated in the Constitution, is "the spiritual, mental and social improvement of the Young Men residing in our community, and especially of Young Men who come from abroad to reside among us." "Any person of good moral character who believes in the truth of Christianity, without distinction of sect or party," may become a member by a vote of a majority of the Board of Directors. Each member pays one dollar annually, or may become a Life member by the payment of twenty dollars at one time. The President, three Vice-Presidents, Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary, Librarian, Treasurer and five others constitute the Board of Directors. No denomination or sect can have more than two members on the Board of Directors, at the same time. The Board of Directors meets monthly and the objects of the Association are to be accomplished by such means as the Board may direct. The usual means in similar institutions are a Library, Reading Room, Public Lectures and various committees.
