ORDINANCES SECOND READING

The following Ordinances were in City
Council April 4, 2002, Read and Passed the
First Time and are severally returned for
Passage the Second Time:

An Ordinance relating to Aggressive
Panhandling, As Amended.

Be it ordained by the City of Providence:

Section 1. For purposes of this section:

A. "Aggressive manner" shall mean:

1. Approaching or speaking to a person(s), or following a person(s) before, during, or after soliciting, if that conduct is intended or is likely to cause a reasonable person to fear bodily harm to oneself or to another, or damage to or loss of property;

2. Following the person being solicited, with the intent of asking that person for money or other things of value;

3. Intentionally touching or causing physical contact with another person without the person's consent in the course of soliciting;

4. Intentionally blocking or interfering with the safe or free passage of a pedestrian or vehicle by any means, including unreasonably causing a pedestrian or vehicle operator to take evasive action to avoid physical contact;

5. Using violent or threatening gestures toward a person solicited;

6. Continuing to solicit from a person after the person has given a negative response to such soliciting;

7. Speaking in a volume unreasonably loud under the circumstances;

8. Soliciting money from anyone who is waiting in line for entry to a building or for another purpose.

B. "Soliciting" shall mean asking for money or objects of value, with the intention that the money or object be transferred at that time, and at that place. Soliciting shall include using the

spoken, written or printed word, bodily gestures, signs or any other means of communication with the purpose of obtaining an immediate donation of money or other thing of value.

C. "Public place" shall mean a place to which a governmental entity has title, to which the public has access, including but not limited to any street, highway, parking lot, plaza, transportation facility, school, place of amusement, park or playground.

Section 2. No person shall solicit in an aggressive manner in a public place.

Section 3. Violations of these sections shall be punishable by the penalties listed in Section 1-10 of the Code of Ordinance.

Section 4. If any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this law is determined to be invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, it shall in no way affect the validity of any remaining portions of this law.

Section 5. This Ordinance shall take effect upon passage.

An Ordinance establishing a Tax Stabilization Plan for 100 Fountain Street, As Amended.

Be it ordained by the City of Providence:

Whereas, Section 21-169 of the Ordinances of the City of Providence grants authority to the City Council, pursuant to Section 44-3-9 of the General Laws of the State of Rhode Island, as amended, to exempt property used for industrial, commercial or residential purposes

from the payment of property tax if the granting of the exemption meets certain conditions set forth in said Section of the Ordinances; and

Whereas, Steelwood Realty, LLC (hereinafter referred to as the "Developer") has made application under, and has satisfied each condition of the above-mentioned Ordinance; and

Whereas, Steelwood Realty, LLC is a commercial concern who intends to convert its building located at 100 Fountain Street in the City of Providence to residential use, on Assessor's Plat 25, Lot 166 ("Project");

Whereas, the Project will cause an increase in the tax base of the City and will increase residential apartments in the DownCity Arts & Entertainment District in the City; and

Whereas, it is in the interest of the residents of the City of Providence to grant such an exemption to induce the development and construction of the apartments in the City, and such exemption will inure to the benefit of the City;

Be it ordained by the City of Providence

Section 1. That the finding set forth in the preceding WHEREAS Clauses are hereby made and confirmed.

Section 2. Transfers. As long as Steelwood Realty, LLC owns or operates the facility, it will continue to pay taxes on the facility. Steelwood Realty, LLC, its successors and assigns, agrees that this property will be subject to taxation at the expiration of the tax treaty. Steelwood Realty, LLC also agrees not to transfer the property to a tax-exempt entity or to allow any

transfer by any subsequent transferee to a tax-exempt entity during the term of the tax treaty. Steelwood Realty, LLC is also required as a condition precedent to this tax treaty to record notice of the requirement that the property covered by this Ordinance be transferred only to a tax paying entity, as set forth herein in the Land Evidence Records of the City of Providence. Notwithstanding this provision, in the event that the successor to the property does not make the payments under the tax treaty, Steelwood Realty, LLC will be responsible to make payments in lieu of taxes to the City of Providence in the amounts set forth in the attached schedule. In the event that the property covered by this Ordinance is transferred to a tax-exempt entity, whether by Steelwood Realty, LLC or any subsequent transferee of such property, Steelwood Realty, LLC will be responsible to make payments in lieu of taxes to the City of Providence equal to the amount of taxes which would have been paid to the City of Providence if such prohibition against transfer to a tax-exempt entity had not been violated. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary herein or in the tax treaty used in connection herewith, the provisions of this *Section 2* shall continue to be given full force and effect until such time as the same shall be amended or terminated by majority vote of the City Council of Providence.

Section 3. Employment. It shall be the goal and Steelwood Realty, LLC shall use its best efforts to award to Minority Business Enterprises as defined in Rhode Island General Laws, Section 37-14.1 ("MBE Act") no less than 20% of the dollar value of the construction costs for the Project (as determined in accordance with the rules and regulations promulgated pursuant to the MBE Act). It shall be Steelwood Realty, LLC's further goal to award to women business enterprises ("WBE") no less than 20%

of the dollar value of the construction costs for the projects (as determined in accordance with Section 21-52 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Providence). It shall be a further goal of Steelwood Realty, LLC to achieve a minimum level of 20% for minority and 20% for female employment. It shall further be the goal of Steelwood Realty, LLC to give a preference to suppliers from the City of Providence during construction.

Section 4. Purpose. The City of Providence had entered this tax treaty as a result of increasing demand for apartments in the City's Arts and Entertainment District by artists interested in taking advantage of the tax incentives available in that district as well as other professionals seeking apartments in the Center of the DownCity Area. As required by state law, 100 Fountain Street is a former commercial building being converted into residential use. In consideration of this tax treaty, as long as the project consists of residential units, the developer and all successors and assigns shall maintain no less than twenty percent (20%) of the units in the project at below market rates. The rental rate shall be equal to the per square foot fair market rate for the downtown Providence area as determined from time to time by a RI certified real estate appraiser less ten percent (10%), but in no event shall such rates for the below market units be less than the current per square foot market rate less ten percent (10%), as set forth below. The City and the Developer acknowledge for the purposes of this document, the current per square foot market rate for the downtown area of Providence is three hundred dollars (\$300.00) per square foot. The City and the Developer also acknowledge that in no event shall the set aside requirements of below market units extend beyond the term of this treaty. The Developer shall be required to report

annually to the City as to compliance with this provision. This treaty shall only be in effect as long as the property is utilized primarily for residential purposes and failure to use the building for primarily residential purposes would render that treaty null and void. The parties do not intend that this agreement would extend to the use of the building as a "dormitory" or "apartment dormitory" use.¹ In fact, use of the building for "dormitory" or "apartment dormitory" purposes would also render the treaty null and void. The treaty being rendered null and void for any reason would require the owner to pay all taxes and fees as due and owing as if no treaty had been entered.

¹For purposes of this ordinance, the definition of the term "dormitory" or "apartment dormitory" is defined according to Section 1000.12 of the Zoning Ordinance for the City of Providence.

Section 5. Conditions. The schedule listed below is based upon information provided to the Tax Assessor by Steelwood Realty, LLC including, but not limited to, estimated construction costs. In the event any of this information is inaccurate or proves to be erroneous, this treaty shall be modified to reflect the accurate information. This tax treaty is also conditioned upon commencement of construction upon the payment of any and all taxes due and owing on the property within ninety (90) days of this Ordinance going into effect. Failure to begin construction within that time frame or failure to make said payment in full shall render the tax treaty null and void. The treaty being rendered null and void for any reason would require the owner to pay all taxes and fees as if no treaty had been entered.

Section 6. Back Taxes. That the real property taxes payable to the City by the Project during the term of this Ordinance shall

be based upon the real property tax rates in effect for the City's 1998 fiscal year. The treaty is further conditioned upon Steelwood Realty, LLC at all times owing no back taxes to the City of Providence or remaining current on a payment plan approved by the Tax Collector. Failure to make said timely payments may render this treaty null and void at the sole discretion of the City of Providence.

Section 7. Exemption Rates. That the City, in accordance with Section 44-3-9 of the Rhode Island General Laws and Section 21-169 of the Code of Ordinances for the City of Providence, is hereby authorized to grant an exemption from the assessed valuation for tax purposes as of December 13, 2000 up to and including December 31, 2009 to Steelwood Realty, LLC located on Westminster Street in Providence, Rhode Island, on a portion of Assessor's Plat 25, Lot 166 as provided in the above mentioned Ordinance, in accordance with the schedule in Exhibit A.

Section 8. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Section 9. Applicable Law. This agreement shall be construed under the laws of the State of Rhode Island.

Section 10. Notices. All notices, requests, consents, approvals, and other communications which may or are required to be served or given shall be in writing and shall be sent registered or certified mail and addressed to the following parties set forth below:

Resolution in Support of the USS Saratoga Museum Project.

Whereas, The USS Saratoga Museum Foundation has worked diligently for three years to relocate the super carrier Saratoga from the US Navy Base at Middletown, RI to Quonset Point, historic home of the Navy's carrier component through three wars; and

Whereas, The Saratoga, the first super carrier to be selected to become a Museum, will also be a Patriotic Memorial, and Educational Center and a Family Attraction; and

Whereas, The Saratoga Foundation has been engaged in a fundraising drive to obtain the \$8.5 million for relocation, mooring and development of the Museum; and

Whereas, The United States Navy has placed the USS Saratoga in Donation Status and has designated the Rhode Island Saratoga Museum Foundation as the Sole Eligible Recipient of the ship; and

Whereas, The USS Saratoga Museum Project has the exiting potential to become a significant

and self-sufficient economic engine, creating jobs and generating major and positive economic impact in our community, region and state, and at the same time, benefiting other ongoing and planned development at Quonset/Davisville; and

Whereas, Additionally, the Saratoga project is designed to be a major education resource for Washington County and the surrounding region, to include a Vocational School and other business development programs to educate youth, train and retrain workers, and to be a useful and attractive component of the industrial park; and

Whereas, The Saratoga project is supported by a wide range of Rhode Island interest and organizations, including veterans, elected officials, labor union leaders, educators, environmentalists, and business and community groups; and

Whereas, Resolutions of support of the Saratoga project have been passed by RI cities and towns and both houses of the General Assembly; and

Whereas, The Town of Exeter views with serious concern the recent refusal by the Governor and the Rhode Island Economic Development Corporation Board to extend the conditional approval agreement for the Saratoga project; and

Whereas, The Town of North Kingstown has been the homeport of Naval aviation and numerous aircraft carriers in the 1940's, 1950's and 1960's, and the Town of Exeter believes the Saratoga project will be a substantial benefit and a valuable asset to the community, region, and the entire state.

Now, therefore, be it Resolved, That the City of Providence confirms its enthusiastic support for the USS Saratoga Museum at Quonset Point and strongly supports the continuing fundraising efforts underway for the project; and be it

Further Resolved, That the City Council of the City of Providence urges all interested parties: the Governor, the General Assembly, elected officials of the cities and towns, RI Economic Development Corporation, chambers of commerce and tourism agencies, and all citizens to join us in a cooperative effort to raise the funding necessary and overcome all obstacles to make the Saratoga Museum a reality.

It is kind of appropriate that some of my colleagues received these the other day and some received them this evening. The Public Safety Complex is an amazing building, I think it is a beacon for what the city is all about, how safe the city can be and the hard working men and women who work in that building. The other day it was a wonderful experience to see that, however, there is always a however, and I stand this evening to defend my colleagues, I think I have duty to that. I think about the hours that were spent by each and every member of this council discussing that issue and some of our biggest attractors were the people who would be actually working those facilities. Not because they were opposed because quite frankly they never thought this project would see the light of day but it was this council that had the intestinal fortitude, the foresight and the wisdom to put together a project that I am very proud of and I am certainly very parochial because it lands in the thirteenth ward as it was previously. Just some of the meetings that took place going back as early as June of 2000 and I know they were prior discussions just formal meetings and my esteem colleague the President Pro-Tempore Balbina Young and certainly many members of this council who sat with the various city officials, construction managers, developers of the Public Safety Complex, the Planning Department to ensure that minorities and women business component participation was outlined in the contract. I mean there were literally hundreds of hours that were spent

doing that. These meetings, we met officially from June 5, 2000 right up until February 13, 2002 and in fact as a result of that we had the impromptu walk through of the Public Safety Complex. From 1998 right up until May 27, 1999 that day and you knew it was going to be problematic because I believe once again I am going to have to pick on my colleague Councilwoman DiRuzzo my good friend, I turned to her when the comment was made. I didn't put this program together, well my colleague the Majority Leader often uses the terminology due diligence, well this is a matter of common courtesy. This council was on the forefront of that particular issue and we deliberated laboriously on the funding, the property valuations, the Tax Stabilization proposals, the Public Hearings that took place, the numerous and lengthy discussions privately, personally, on the phones, with individuals, the Planning Department, the hands on meetings by council members, with construction managers, architects and project managers. What was even more disturbing was the fact that there was a Public Safety Neighborhood Steering Committee that spent many hours hearing testimony with a hands on approach with the design, with the shrubbery, with the type of material. It took place not only in the Planning Department, not only here but also in my neighborhood. People from the West Broadway Neighborhood Association, people from the Federal Hill Commerce Association, people from the Down City Businessmen's Association, people from the Broadway Restoration Program, people from the Historical Society, people from the Preservation Society, guess what? Not even a mention, they were not even referred to. In fact the Chairperson of that committee is a city

employee who is very active in my neighborhood. I understand what it is all about, I truly do but even where my colleagues sat there was no specific spot for the members of the council. Some sat behind me in the last row and some sat on the other side. It may seem like small potatoes but it is just a matter of a little bit of courtesy, a little bit of due diligence and a little bit of common sense. Let's be more parochial, those of you that have had ribbon cuttings in your neighborhood, those of you that have had the openings of an envelope in your neighborhood, very often you are asked to speak. Well, I can tell you this, I was with this project again

when it was a concept and even before that in its embryonic stage, I was not asked to make a few remarks. It is just not right, I think it is disrespectful, I think it is discourteous and I would never wish that on any of my colleagues and I would be as offended if it happened in your neighborhood with regard to members of this esteem body because believe it or not I know some people consider this a part time body but I know one thing, we have a full time responsibility. Thank you very much.
