To the Honorable Board of Park Commissioners:

Reviewing our work at the close of this year, it is pleasant to note that, while much of our work may not be particularly noticeable to the casual observer, we really have accomplished some splendid permanent development and improvements.

In our routine work, we have exerted every possible measure to the end that park facilities and properties be adequately maintained and our service carried on in a way to best serve the public and we have broadened the scope of our service wherever possible.

As we have so many times stated, more and more is demanded in the way of park services as is well proven by the continually increasing attendance and use of park facilities and services. No more striking demand could be made than the extensive use to which parks and playgrounds are put. It is manifestly evident that our citizens desire and appreciate the advantages and benefits offered and are anxious to avail themselves of every new feature, and this naturally gives added stimulus to our work. We have a fine program in readiness and are expanding our services in every practical way possible.

Roger Williams Park is known all over the country for its natural as well as horticultural beauty -- 452 acres comprising beautiful hills and lakes which contribute so much to its natural beauty. It is also noted for its famous display gardens - rose gardens, tulip displays and innumerable varieties of flowers, shrubs and trees.

We might say here, however, there is plenty of landscape work which might still be done; in fact, there are areas which have never been cultivated which could be developed for the further use and enjoyment of the public.

Our regular routine work includes systematic maintenance of grounds - cutting grass, re-seeding, fertilizing, protection treatment of trees, mulching, and cultivating newly planted trees, spraying, replacement and additional planting; maintenance of buildings and equipment -- and in winter, the usual work on roads - snow removal, clearing the lakes for skating, etc.

This work must be kept up persistently regardless of new development and improvements as it is a fact recognized by experienced park executives that deterioration of park property is insidious in its progress and often may escape public attention until irreparable damage occurs.

During the past year, we planted approximately 5000 shade and specimen trees, evergreens and shrubbery throughout the Park System.

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Visitors to Roger Williams Park are thrilled with the profusion of blooms in spring when, in addition to the gorgeous array of tulips, hyacinths, azaleas, etc., the park is aglow with the beautiful coloring of flowering cherry trees, crab trees, pink and white dogwood.

Then we follow with planting of various species of annuals so that there is a continual display of flowering plants for the entire season in the many beds throughout the park.

Our Rose Gardens are noted for their fine display of outstanding hybrids and rambler roses, and attract flower-lovers not only from our own state but from neighboring states as well.

Our Chrysanthemum Show in November features numerous new varieties each year; thousands visit our greenhouses to see this show.

Our Christmas Display in Roger Williams Park featuring the Nativity Scene, the Christmas Village, etc. continues to be a very popular attraction. It is estimated that approximately 750,000 visit the park during this two-weeks display.

The keen interest manifested in these various projects is proven by the numerous inquiries that we receive from people all over New England asking to be advised as to dates, etc.

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CONSTRUCTION
AND
REPAIRS

During the past year, we built a new cement pool for our seals and ducks. This pool is 54 feet long by 38 feet wide, 3 feet deep at one end and graded down to one inch at the other end. It was a pleasant surprise to find out that our experiment of putting both seals and ducks in the same pool panned out beautifully.

We have built 796 square yards of new sidewalks in Roger Williams Park -- on the south side of the Oriental Garden, around the Duck Pond and opposite the Merry-go-round.

We constructed 500 feet of cement wall with cyclone fence around the north and east sides of the Poultry Yard in Roger Williams Park; also 460 feet of cyclone fence was erected around the Lower Nursery and Buffalo Pen.

The iron fence on the Elmwood Avenue side of the park has been scraped and painted - also the iron fence at the Broad Street side.

The first floor of the Casino building has been completely renovated. The old soda fountain has been removed and replaced with a mahogany bar with stainless steel sinks and electric coolers. New overhead lighting has replaced old-style fixtures - walls and ceilings have been painted - modern toilets have been installed in both the Ladies' and Gents' rooms. We have long wanted to make this renovation. We now have a beautiful up-to-date building.

We have also replaced the old toilets in the Museum and in the Boat House.

A new boiler and oil burner were installed in the Bird House. This change-over from coal to oil was an excellent improvement as it makes it possible now to maintain a more even heat during the night and serves as a good protection for our birds.

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NEW
EQUIPMENT

Each year we have aimed at modernizing our Department with the best and latest mechanical equipment available; during the past year, we have added some fine equipment to our inventory such as:

- 1 set 3-gang Mowers
- 2 30" Power Mowers
- 1 Leaf Pulverizer
- 1 Pick-up Truck
- 1 Business Coupe
- 1 Tractor with 5-foot cycle bar
and snow plow attachment

It is now possible for us to accomplish the necessary work of maintaining the Park System efficiently and economically.

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ZOO & AVIARY

We hope to further enlarge both our Zoo and Aviary in the near future since they have such definite appeal to the public. All large parks aim at an up-to-date zoo and, despite the fact that the maintenance and care of animals is a big expense, it must be admitted that many thousands of our citizens find enjoyable diversion in watching their antics and students also study their habits and traits.

While a great many children enjoy the more active forms of recreation provided in Roger Williams Park such as row boats, merry-go-round, the various other children's rides, fishing, horse-back riding, miniature auto racing, etc. there are large numbers of children of all ages who spend a great deal of time around the animal pens.

Our latest additions, Bunny Village and "Beaver Dam", have drawn great numbers of visitors - thousands come here daily during the summer months.

A new feature of study in the Aviary is a special bee-hive built along the same principle as an aquarium for gold fish. The front, sides and back of the hive are glass. A glass tube marked "Entrance" leads from the outdoors into the hive and another marked "Exit" leads from the hive. A swarm of about 18,000 was installed in the hive and visitors and students are keenly interested in their activities..... This gift was presented to the children of Providence by the Town Criers and has proven very popular.

During the past fiscal year, we constructed a house for our pheasants, also a house for bison. In the construction of new animal shelters, we aim at building little houses giving the effect of residential homes which adds interest and is more in conformity with other buildings in the park, rather than the box-type construction of former years.

While a Zoo is by no means one of the primary features supplied by park departments, it is nevertheless an extremely popular one and we hope to proceed with the construction of other suitable buildings to provide a modern zoo and aviary in Roger Williams Park.

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MUSEUM

Numerous lectures have been given throughout the year to public and private schools and to various charitable organizations.

We now furnish three courses in Astronomy - elementary, advanced and navigation. These classes are well attended and very helpful to students. Staff members also teach courses in Trees and Shrubs. Nature Games and Bird Lore are popular with the smaller children. As an additional feature of interest to visitors to the Museum, we have included classes in Nature Art and Handicraft in our program.

Our Weaving Classes conducted on Saturday mornings are especially popular. Some of the students in this class have shown a definite aptitude for this type of work and have turned out beautiful work.

Adult lectures have been given by various members of the Astronomical Society, by the Director of the Audubon Society and by faculty members of Brown University.

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The Rhode Island Bird Room has been completely renovated. All cases have been done in modern style, and beautiful wall maps of the bird migration routes have been installed. Four cases in the Foreign Bird Room have been completed, showing the birds in their different geographical relationship.

We have installed new up-to-date toilets in the Ladies' and Gents' rooms at the Museum; both of these rooms have been painted. We have also installed a water cooler for the convenience of visitors to the Museum.

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GOLF COURSE

An additional appropriation of \$10,000.00 was made available for the purchase of new equipment such as power mowers, markers and incidental equipment; also for the purchase of loam, fertilizer, grass seed, etc.

An aerofier which was added to our equipment was used exclusively at the Golf Course. This machine aerofies the soil by opening small holes in the turf and is most beneficial to our fairways where there is tremendous foot traffic and heavy compaction. This machine also permits faster and better penetration of fertilizers and water. We also added the following equipment to our inventory:

- 1 Rotary Soil Screener with Motor
- 1 Portable Sprayer with Tractor Hitch
- 1 30" Power Mower
- 2 Additional sections for 4-gang Fairway Mower
- 11 Buckner Sprinklers

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- 33 tons Fertilizer
- 25 " Dolomite
- 750 lbs Arsenate of Lead
- 200 " Bordeaux Mixture
- 375 " Grass Seed
- 25 " Calo Clor

All this equipment and material has aided us immeasurably toward better maintenance of the Golf Course. All 18 tees have been graded and seeded - and we have succeeded in developing perfect tees. Our greens, too, were kept in excellent condition despite the hot dry summer.

The interior of the Club has been repaired and painted, and a new floor laid. New furniture and decorations have added much to the general atmosphere of the club. New purchases included:

- 12 Chrome Chairs
- 2 Divans
- 2 Tables
- 1 Stool

The dressing rooms and shower rooms have been renovated - fluorescent lights have been installed -- also new curtains and drapes, dressing table and mirror.

To meet a growing demand for lockers at the Golf Course, we increased these facilities, during the past season, by the addition of 12 new metal lockers. With a total now of 266, no more space is available at the present time for additional lockers. However, we hope to enlarge the Club House in the near future and will then be in position to offer more lockers for the convenience of the players.

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ALLENS AVE

As one feature in line with Mayor Reynolds' plans for beautifying our City, the Park Department has completed a project of landscaping approximately 2 acres of City-owned property on Allens Avenue, both sides of the fire station. The entire area had to be graded; this necessitated the removal of a lot of fill; then trees, shrubbery and grass seed were planted.

This land had formerly been used for pipe storage by the Sewer Department and had presented a very unsightly appearance.

FRANCIS ST

A reinforced concrete wall was built on both sides of the subway on Francis Street to hold the bank and stop erosion. It was then filled in with gravel and 8 inches of loam - maple trees and evergreens were planted, as well as beds of shrubbery. These improvements have added a great deal to the appearance of this part of our civic center.

Permanent benches have been constructed on both sides of Francis Street at this point for the convenience of bus patrons. New benches have been installed in City Hall Park also, and have proven a great accomodation to the public.

UNION
STATION

675 square yards of new sidewalk was constructed on the East and West Approach to the Union Station.

PERSHING
SQUARE

During the past year, we landscaped and planted grass seed and various species of evergreens and shrubbery in the Municipal Parking Lot at Pershing Square.

Our landscaping adds a touch of beauty to this very practical parking area and places it in a different category than the ordinary bleak parking lot.

BLACKSTONE
BOULEVARD

To eliminate blind corners at various intersections along Blackstone Boulevard, we have re-arranged several evergreen beds. Many more tulips than in previous years were planted during the past season, all of which adds to the attractiveness of this parkway. We have received numerous compliments on these improvements.

RIVER
DRIVE

We have further beautified our park property along the banks of the Seekonk River by the planting of numerous additional cherry trees.

Mrs Peter Goelet Gerry recently donated 75 double pink flowering Japanese cherry trees to be planted along the river road. These trees will add greatly to our development of this strip of water-front property in the near future when the trees come into bloom.

COOPERATION

The Park Department cooperated with other City departments throughout the year as much as possible. For instance, we constructed another section of granite wall and erected cyclone fence at the playground on Camp and Cypress Streets:

Planted evergreens and shrubbery to complete the landscaping in the new development at Sessions Street playground:

At Pocasset Avenue and Blackstone Street bath houses, we graded the grounds, planted evergreens and grass seed:

At the Veterans Administration Building on Hope Street, we did considerable work on the grounds -- graded and seeded the lawns, planted evergreens and beautified the place generally.

At the Hartford Avenue entrance to the Dennis J. Roberts Expressway, we cleaned up the grounds and cut the grass; also, planted a bed of evergreens around the newly erected monument.

The Park Department took care of the grounds around the abandoned fire station on Roger Williams Avenue, now being used by Civil Defence Authorities.

We also took care of the grounds in front of the Court House.

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We would like to say, too, that we have received friendly and courteous cooperation on the part of all other city departments, especially the Public Works Department, Police and Fire Departments, Water Supply Board and the Public Buildings Department.
